

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

The issues were plain and I proved by quotations from the writings of and Major Foster knew not whereof they wrote, were in face ignorant of the subject on which they undertook to enlighten your readers. Major Foster in your issue of to-day owns up. He says is hardly required Mr. Leys' letter to prove that Dutch cattle, of which the Holstein-Friesians are an offshoot or branch, make excellent beef, and again, "but the best example of all, because on the largest scale is the almost daily importation of these animals from Rotterdam via Harwich into Great Britain to supply the Metropolitan meat market," We will, therefore, grant that Holstein-Friesian cattle will, if duly cared for and fattened, make splendid beet," I admire Major Foster's honesty. It requires a good deal of moral courage to come out squarely in a newspaper and say "I was wrong;" the Major has done it and he is to be "highly commended." In his first letter he said, "aize was not of paramount importance," Will he allow me again to set him right? I find in the bylaws of the Holstein-Friesian Association, so much admired by Major Foster, that this Association is formed for the purpose of the registration of those "arge black and white cattle imported from Holland and their descendants." In the bylaws of the Anerican branch of the North Holland Herd Book, I find almost the same words used; and again in a Canadian

North Holland Herd Book, I find almost the same words used; and again in a Canadian association, of which one of the Smiths is President, you will find in their Articles of Association, "Thorough-bred Holstein-Friesians shall be held to mean and refer only to those large improved black and white cattle registered or hereinafter to be registered in the Holstein-Friesian Herd Book of America and their descendants etc., etc." Now, surely Major Foster will admit his error, but lest he should not be able to bring himself to do it, I will quote for his instruction from an article which appears in the November number of the Holstein-Friesian register, especially written by Smith, Powell and Lamb for The Ohio Farmer. They, after giving the good qualities of the Holstein cow for the dairy, say she is "primarily a dairy cow of large size." qualities of the Holstein cow for the dairy, say the is "primarily a dairy cow of large size." I suppose the meaning of that is plain, and coming from the owners of "Netherland Prince," the grandsire of Major Foster's herd, won't be gainsayed by him, in fact it cannot be by any one, because the Holstein cow is first and foremost a cow of large size. Small ones may have some good qualities, but they fail to be good much less fine specimens of the breed. Our friend will no doubt in time admit his error in this as frankly as he has done in the other.

Major Foster in his letter reminds us of the story told of an Irish attorney named Smith, who wrote across the brief he was giving to counsel, "No case, blackguard the plaintiff's attorney." I fancy this attorney must have been related to Smith Brothers, because the characteristics of the breed are the same. Smith Brothers abuse the various associations who appoint the the various associations who appoint the judges, vilify the judges at every fair and insinuate all sorts of things against myself. I am a bad man because I am a member of the legislature; the Oakfale herd has gained prizes through improper means: they accuse the directors of appointing judges who will favor me and charge the judges with favor me, and charge the judges with partiality and ignorance. Having no case they seek to draw the attention of your they seek to draw the attention of your readers from the issues and try to gain some cheap advertising by giving the pedigrees of their cattle and telling how many prizes one sow won at a number of country fairs in the wilds of Michigan. They say that they bought six head of cattle from Thomas B. Wales and that Meroedes Prince, at one time owned by Mr. Wales, brought over \$2000 as auction. I have before me "The Country Gentleman," containing a short account of Mr. Wales' sale, and though a large number of his fine cattle went for high prices, not one of them was bought by the Smiths. That is good sound common sense and will commend itself to any intelligent man or woman interested in dairy cattle. Now, ir, the Smiths and Major Foster say that the Oakdale Herd is composed of fine beef producing animals; I know that the cows are heavy and rich milkers, and that the animals are individually superjor to those of their berds.
