

DR. SIBBALD WINS THE WEICK IN REAL ESTATE A Long Drawn-out Litigation with

Issued.

A Long Drawn-out Litigation with the Grand Trunk Railway Oompany. The Chancery Divisional Court yesterday gave judgment on the appeal of the Grand Trunk Railway in the action brought against it by Dr. Sibbald of Georgina and the ex-ecutors of Mrs. Anderson for damages arising out of an accident on the company's road where the town line between the townships of Georgina and North Gwillimbury crosses, the railway. In October, 1888, the doctor and Mrs. Anderson were driving along the town line when the horse, taking fright at a passing engine, ran away, throwing the occupants of the buggy in front of the engine. Mrs. Anderson received such injuries that she died next day and the doctor was badly injured.

died next day and the doctor was badly injured. The executors of Mrs. Anderson sued the company on behalf of Clarence and Allan Anderson, children of deceased, for \$20,000, and Dr. Sibbald also sued for damages. At the trial at Toronto, before Mr. Justice Street, the jury gave Dr. Sibbald \$2000 and gave Clarence Andorson \$2800 and Allan Anderson \$3200. The company appealed. The Chancery Court affirms the judgment in favor of Dr. Sibbald. As to the Andersons, they decide that the damages of \$3200 award-ed Allan Anderson having died, that the dam-ages in his favor be reduced to \$400. If the representatives of the children ac-cept this decision they will get the costs of the appeal. If they do not accept if there will be a new assessment of damages as to the children by a jury and the costs of the new trial will be disposed of by the trial judge.
