### FIFTEENTH YEAR

The absence of any form of thorough and systematic organization had forced a sort of guerilla warfare against an enemy entrenched against an enemy entrenched behind a barrier of wealth, sellishness and indifference. He advocated the selection of a broad and international platform, and recommended an aggressive policy for the dissemination of the views and literature of the association in order that Senators semination of the views and literature of the association in order that Senators, Congressmen, business men, farmers and mechanics might become acquainted with the advantages that would be gained from a deepening of the canals. A branch of the association it was proposed to forms should be established in every province and every state on the continent. Delegates Mackenzi Blaine and Steele took part in the discussion which followed the reading of the paper.

Vice-President Smalley, St. Paul, suggested the advisability of holding a meeting in the Northwest at an early date, in order that such States as Nebraska, the Dakotas, Kansas and other States night be interested.

A NOTABLE EVENT IN THE HISTORY OF PRESBYTERIANISM.

Presbyterians throughout Canada are looking with a great deal of interest to the forthcoming jubilee of Knox College, Toronto, which will be celebrated on Tuesday and Wednesday, the 2nd and 3rd of October next.

By the jubilee the progress of 50 years will be demonstrated, and the results of halfa century of arduous work brought home to that branch of the Protestant church in Canada which Knox College represents. From Knox College some of the most eminent Presbyterian divines in this and other countries have been recruited, and its graduates are found all over this continent, as well as in England and Scotland. The history of Knox College commenced with the separation of the Free Church Board from the Established Church some 50 years ago. One special reason for the college being located in this city was that the large Protestant element was west of Kingston. Latterly the college



REV. W. CAVEN, D.D., PRINCIPAL. has been very closely identified with Toronto University, among the students of which the Presbyterian element is large, and from which quite a proportion of Knox College students is drawn. The widespread influence of the college will be seen when it is stated that over

THREE HUNDRED OF ITS GRADUATES are at present in ministerial charge in Canada and a considerable number in the United States. There are also some in Scotland and England, a number are in the mission fields of India and China, and the reis a colored graduate in charge of a church at Louisville, Ky. The graduates of the college maintain a missionary in China, and the students have a society for home mission work we have a society for home mission wo and keep 19 missionaries in the fie during the summer season.

The famous Dr. J. Munro Gibson, the author of a number of well known works, was a graduate of Knox College. He went from the college to Erskine



church, Montreal, from there to the Second Presbyterian church, Chicago, and at present occupies the St. John's Wood church, London. Another graduate is Dr. Donald Fraser, pastor of the Presbyterian church of Marylebone, London. He 'first took charge of the Cote street Presbyterian church, Montreal, resigning that to accept a call in Inverness, Scotland. The Rev. R. M. Thornton, of London, England, graduated from Knox, he also occupying the pulpit of Knox church, Montreal, leaving that for a church in Glasgow. Principal Patton, of Princeton University, received the greater part of his ecclesiastical education at Knox, although he did not graduate from there.

THE HISTORY OF KNOX COLLEGE. cannot fail to be read with interest by all members of that denomination, of which the college is one of the chief supports. At the disruption of the church in Canada, in 1844, the professors and property of Queen's College remained with the synod in connection with the church of Scotland. Nearly all the students, however, cast in their lot with the synod of the Free church, which at its first meeting, resolved to try and take steps towards training candidates for the ministry. At meetings of the commission of synod, within the next

Governor-General of Canada, and which was purchased and remodelled as a divinity hall and students' boarding establishment. This was the seat of the college at the time (1861) of the union of the United Presbyterian church. At the meeting of the synod in 1846 the name of "Knox's College" was first given to the theological seminary. This name it retained till 1858, when, in the Act of incorporation, it was designated "Knox's College."



Ten years afterwards, when, for the first time, the synod resolved to appoint a principal, Dr. Willis was chosen to occupy this position. In 1848 the Rev. Mr. Rintoul, having been released from the charge of the Streetsville congregation, was appointed interim professor of Hebrew, and in the same year the Rev. William Lyall, formerly minister of the Free Church of Scotland, was appointed professor of classical literature and general mentral training, in which department he continued to give instructions till his removal to Nova Scotia, where he became a professor in the Free Church College, Halifax.

Prof. Esson died in 1853, and the synod then resolved to appoint a professor to whom should be assigned the departments of logic, mental and moral philosophy, and the evidences of natural and revealed religion. Rev. George Paxton Young, minister of Knox church, Hamilton, was appointed to this position in 1853. Three years later he was relieved from the department of evidences, and Dr. Robert Burns, minister of Knox church, was appointed professor of evidences and church history. Dr. Burns, Dr. Willis and Mr. Young were the professors in the college at the time of the union between the Free and United Presbyterian churches in 1861, when the colleges of the two church were amalgemated.



### THE LIQUOR TRAFFIC.

The Virtues of the System Used in Swe den and Norway.

In summarizing his conclusion as to the advantages and disadvantages of the Gothenburg or company monopoly system of liquor traffic in operation in Sweden and Norway, Dr. E. R. L. Gould insists that the system was not originated with the idea of stopping the consumption of liquors, but to reduce the evils consequent upon inordinate indulgence in alcoholic drinks. It is founded, too, upon the principle that, since, taking human nature and practices as we find them, it is impossible immediately to eradicate the evil completely, it is better to regulate it through the higher rather than the lower elements of the community. Its strength lies along the line of preventive, rather than of reformatory elements. Among the advantages named is, first the complete divorcing of the liquor traffic from politics. Further, the company monopoly has been so administered that a general reduction of the number of licenses has been brought about everywhere, and consequently a lessening of the temptation to drink. "It would be a very strange condition of affairs, indeed, in any matter of this kind, if, when the element of private gain was entirely eliminated, a resulting improvement did not take place." A series of effective checks is imposed against a breach of trust, supposing there may exist an inclination to commit it. The companies have, in some measure, gone beyond the legal requirements in the line of general interest, particularly in raising the age of minority from 15, where the law puts it, to 18, as regards selling drink to young persons, and also in insisting immediately on cash payments. They have gradually raised the price of drinks and reduced their strength. In Norway the saloons are closed on Sundays and at those times of day when the workman is most tempted to drink. All men employed are paid closed on Sundays and at those times of day when the workman is most tempted to drink. All men employed are paid fair fixed salaries, and there is no temptation to push sales. All taxes are paid under the company system without shuffling. The cause of temperance has been assisted financially and otherwise. The profits on sales of drink are expended for the relief of society. No community which has tried the system has afterwards abandoned it. The measure is supported by the temperance party, though many of them would prefer prohibition. The disadvantages are laid mostly to defects in existing law rather than to faults inherent in the system itself. The monopoly does not extend far enough, but should cover fermented drinks; the limit for retail sales is not fixed high enough; the sale of liquors is often conenough; the sale of liquors is often con-nected with general business from which it should be separated; a monopoly of production by the state does not exist; the question of profits is still too conspicuous, and, from the temperance view of the case, it is feared that the upper classes of society do not wish to go further than the Gothenburg system.— Popular Science Monthly.

Prof. Spencar, in outlining the progress of the falls, says that a little stream draining the Erie basin once fell about 200 feet from the brow of the Niagara escarpment. This stream was not over one-fourth the volume of the present cataract, and consequently excavated the gorge at a much slower rate than at present. During the early history of the river the waters of the three upper lakes emptied through the Huron basin by way of the Ottawa river. The height of the falls has increased several times. The first episode, represented by a small river episode, represented by a small river falling 200 feet, lasted 11,000 years. Then the height of the falls was increased to 400 feet, and took the drainage of all the upper great lakes. At the same time there was a series of casades, three in all, the lower graining on the upper there was a series of casades, three in all, the lower gaining on the upper until finally they were all united in one great cataract, much higher than that of to-day. Subsequently the waters were raised at the head of Lake Ontario, and the falls approximated to the present conditions after a lapse of 1,000 years, and another 1,000 years was probably occupied by transitorial changes of a very gradual character. A New Etectric Locomotive. An electric locomotive of 1000 horse-An electric locomotive of 1000 horse-power is, says The Engineer and Iron Trades Advertiser, under construction in London, from the plans of Sprague, Duncan & Hutchinson, to the order of the North American Company. It is intended for slow speed and heavy trac-tion in switching service. The machine is carried upon four pairs of division is carried upon four pairs of driving wheels, all coupled. The frame is of steel, with deep pedestals. The 56-inch wheels are close coupled; the first and last pairs only are flanged. There is a motor in each axle, the weight of the armature coming directly on the wheels, and that of the field magnets is on the journals through the pedestals; no spring supports are used. The four motors ail are of the alternating type, are wound for 860 volts, at 225 revolutions, which will be the equivalent of 35 miles an hour when in multiple.


