AN ASSOCIATION ORGANIZED.

CONCLUSION OF THE DEEP WATERWAYS CONVENTION.

A Definite Platform is Decided Upon and Officers Elected—The Question Now Approaches a Practical Solution—Important Resolutions Are Adopted—Next Session Probably Protracted.

The great Deep Waterways Convention, one of the most important conventions ever held in this city, is over, and today the delegates will enjoy a well-earned recreation. The concluding business meeting of the convention took place last night, when organization of the International Deep Waterways Association was completed, and finally launched upon the world with a definite platform upon which all action in the future in connection with the deepening of the St. Lawrence route to the sea will proceed.

The Committee on Resolutions had no easy task before them. It may safely be said that to them was assigned the real business of the convention, and they set to work with a will. They commenced their labors on Tuesday evening, and their deliberations were continued until 3 o'clock yesterday morning, only to be resumed eight hours later. By 4 o'clock in the afternoon, however, they had prepared their report, and it was presented to the convention.

The convention first dealt with the platform, passing it as a whole without dissent. Then came the special resolutions, which were also adopted unanimously, although on the question of the throwing open to Canadian vessels of the Whitehall Canal, there was considerable discussion, several Canadian delegates urging that the resolution should embrace the whole of the New York State canal.

The platform, as adopted by the convention, was as follows:

Whereas this convention has assembled for the purpose of promoting the union of the lakes and the high seas by waterways of the greatest possible capacity and usefulness, and recognizing the supreme utility of such a waterway development, therefore resolved:

That the depth of all channels from the lakes and their seaboard connections be not less than 21 feet, and that all permanent structures be designed on a basis of not less than 21 feet, so as to enable the larger depth to be obtained, as may be demanded by the future necessities of commerce.

That this convention recognize the utility of the natural route to the sea by the St. Lawrence River, and be also expressed with the commercial necessity of the route reaching the American seaboard by the Hudson River.

That we recommend that the Governments of Canada and the United States appoint a joint commission for the purpose of determining the questions of natural cost and navigation, and that they may co-operate in all matters necessarily international in character.

That we commend to the Governments of Canada and the United States projects designed to extend marine commerce by means of waterways from the great lakes into new territories.

That as a preparation for the joint promotion of common interests it is desirable that permanent committees be constituted for the decision of all law and questions of an international character, which arise in any way between the peoples and Governments of the British Empire and the United States and the Colonies of the British Empire and to the Government of the United States.

Respeaking Lake Erie. The following additional resolutions were also adopted:

Whereas, it has been given as the opinion of eminent engineers that it is entirely practicable by employment of dams in the Niagara River to increase to a marked extent the depth of water in Lake Erie, as well as the dangerous shallows at the mouth of Detroit River at the foot of the lake.

And whereas, such an improvement would be of great importance and aid in establishing deep waterways in that part of the system between Lakes Erie and Ontario.

Resolved, that we express the desirability for determining by an international commission of Engineers of the outlet of the several lakes, and such works on the Niagara River as will central the level of Lake Erie, and enable Canadian deepening the waters of said lake, and also on any other part of the lake system in which such works may be expected.

Resolved, that with the least possible delay the present locks of St. Mary's Falls Canal should be deepened to 26 feet over the miter.

TO OPEN BURGLAR-PROOF SAFES.

The Ingenious Contrivance Which the Markdale Burglars Left Behind—Now in Possession of the Authorities.

Government Detective Rogers has returned from Markdale, where he has been investigating the facts in connection with the burglary of Macauloch & Young's private bank on Sept. 11. The burglars, who were undoubtedly professionals, probably the same gang that has been committing the numerous robberies in Northern Ontario, secured about \$600. They left behind them one of the most ingenious burglars' tools which has ever fallen into the possession of the authorities. It was discovered secreted under a mill-dam near the scene of the burglary. It is constructed entirely of steel, and was invented for the purpose of blowing open "burglar-proof" safes such as the one operated upon at Markdale. These safes are so constructed that it is impossible to drill a hole in them in which to insert the device. By means of the new tool, however, the combination of the safe can be broken completely out, and a hole thereby provided for the explosion.

Major Bessford Meets Instant Death at Halifax, N.S., Sept. 19.—A horrible case of accident or suicide occurred here this morning, shortly before noon. Major Bessford of the Royal Engineers, who only came to this station a few months ago, was the victim. He was on the roof garden of the Halifax Hotel, where he boarded with his wife and child. The accident occurred when he was leaning over the railing, and he fell backwards, striking his head on the edge of the roof.

A BRANTFORD MAN BURNED. In the Holocaust in the Washington Manufacturing Factory. Washington, Sept. 19.—The body of Robert Reitzel was taken out of the ruins of the Stump Mattress factory yesterday. The other victims yet to be found are six men and a woman. The bodies identified are as follows: William Adams, 35 years old; William M. Harry Bacon, who was injured, came from the same place.

The head and arms were cut off. It is thought that Duggan threw himself under the train which was passing at about midnight. He has not been working for some time and has been drinking hard of late. Duggan came here about four years ago from Brantford, Ont.

WHIPPED TO HIS DEATH.

CHINA'S NAVY IS CRIPPLED.

TWO OF HER WARSHIPS SUNK AND TWO BURNED.

A Six Hours' Naval Engagement in Which Both Fleets Suffer—Six Hundred Men Wrecked by a Transport Striking the Kites in the Battle—Concentration in Pekin.

London, Sept. 19.—The Foreign Office is in receipt of a telegram from the British Consul at Tien-Tsin confirming the report of the naval battle at the mouth of the Yalu River, between the Chinese northern squadron and the Japanese fleet. The battle lasted six hours. During the fight the Chinese warships Yang Wei and the Yung Yang caught fire, and were burned and run ashore, and the Chi Yuen and King Yuen were sunk. Four of the Japanese vessels were sunk, and the remainder of the fleet retreated. The Chinese then succeeded in landing the troops which they had on board. Admiral Ting, who was in command of the Chinese squadron, was severely wounded. After the battle the Chinese vessels proceeded to Wei-Hai-Wei, which place they reached in safety. It is supposed that some of the troops which were being conveyed by the Chinese vessels were lost during the engagement. Great consternation prevails in the palace at Pekin. The Emperor is determined to take the management of affairs into his own hands, but this step is not looked upon with favor by the Government officials, who consider such a course as beneath the dignity of His Majesty.

China's Sinking Her Ships. A despatch to the Times from Tien-Tsin says: "The Chinese and Japanese fleets met off Yalu on Sept. 17. The Japanese vessels made an attack at noon, while the Chinese were landing troops from their ships. The Chinese had been conveyed to Yalu by the Chinese northern squadron. The battle lasted until 9 o'clock. The Chinese lost the Chen Yuen, Chao Yung and Yang Wei. The Chi Yuen, which was engaged in the fight on the 27, escaped, and is believed to be safe. The Japanese are supposed to have lost three ships. Many Chinese were killed, among them Admiral Ting, commander of the fleet. Col. Von Hammer and a volunteer named Tyler. The landing of a large force of Chinese was successfully effected."

600 Were Drowned, 530 Killed.

A number of officers who were engaged in the naval battle in the Yalu River have arrived at Port Arthur with half a dozen warships badly damaged and with wounded crews. The Japanese Admiral Ting's fleet left port on Friday evening to convey seven steam transports conveying 10,000 troops. A number of Europeans in the service of the Chinese admiralty accompanied the troops. The transports were loaded near Wip, from which point they were to be sent to the front. They were mostly comprised of infantry. Nothing was seen of the Japanese fleet until the Chinese fleet reached the mouth of the Yalu River, when a fleet of Japanese warships were sighted. The Chinese transports were hurled forward and two warships were cleared for action. The efforts of the transport fleet were successful, and most of the men were gotten ashore before the naval battle began.

The Chen Yuen was the first vessel to open fire, and was soon engaged with two Japanese warships. About the same time, one of which is supposed to have been the cruiser Chi-tien, and all of the vessels of both fleets were engaged. The Chinese cruisers Chi-tien and King Yuen were the only vessels which men and a board of them were drowned.

A few of the men struggling in the water were picked up. The Chao Yung and Yang Wei, in manoeuvring for a better position, struck the Japanese transports and ran aground. The stranded vessels were helpless under the fire of the big gun. The Chinese ships and were finally set on fire by the enemy's shells and became wrecks.

It is feared some of the transport ships were sunk, including one whose troops are estimated at 1600 killed and wounded, and the Japanese loss is supposed to be 6000, but none of the details of the names or size of the vessels of the enemy which are alleged to have been taken.

Taking the Chinese best view of the battle, it is plain that the Japanese were really in serious jeopardy. The naval strength of China.

First Naval Battle Under Modern Conditions.

In an article referring to the naval battle between the Japanese and Chinese fleets, The Westminster Gazette says: "If the news is accurate, we have seen the greatest naval battle at sea since the days of the great admirals. It certainly bears out the anticipation that any such engagement would prove disastrous to both parties. The Japanese undoubtedly served their purpose. They have prevented the Chinese troops from landing. If such serious losses are admitted at Shanghai, it may fairly be concluded that the Japanese got the best of the battle all round."

London, Sept. 20.—The Daily News, in an article commenting on the naval battle off the mouth of the Yalu River, says: "We withhold our estimate of the consequences of the battle owing to the fact that the accounts of the fighting are still too meagre to enable us to form a definite opinion. It is our opinion, however, that if General Yamagata captures Korea he will lose again unless the Japanese fleet gains command of the sea; the war results primarily a naval one."

The Posts says the boat of Count Ho, Prince Minister of Education, the Japanese was the next strongest fleet to that of the Chinese in the Northern Pacific, and far more serviceable, has been unjustly treated. But there is no reason to suppose that China will lose the Yalu disaster if subsequent engagements.

The Standard speaks in high praise of the tactics of the Japanese, and expresses the opinion that it is "exceedingly unlikely that China will recover its position in Korea for a long time to come, unless Japan arrangements of the campaign." The Standard says, "contrasts strikingly with the usual military methods of the Japanese on the part of the Chinese. There is something almost childish in the latter's conduct. The same concludes by urging that the moment is now ripe for a Japanese advance. A branch of the failure of their previous efforts." The Standard says, "The Japanese fleet is a very powerful one, and it is not to be expected that it will be defeated by the German fleet."

BIG STREET CAR TRAVEL.

Shipping Business for the Street Car Company During Exhibition—Two Million Passengers Expected.
