OFFICIALS WHO "WINK." The Ottawa Journal Again Appears as Defendant in the Recent Case by Justice Falconbridge. Mr. Justice Falconbridge has delivered judgment in the case of the Ottawa Journal against the plaintiff's appeal from the order of the local judge at Ottawa directing the journal to pay costs of \$400 to be furnished within four weeks or otherwise the action is dismissed.
