FIERCE EQUINOCTIAL GALE RAGED AROUND WATFORD

Doing Considerable Damage in Town and Country

A storm of tornado intensity raged over Ontario on Good Friday, many thousands of dollars loss resulting. The wind which wiped out so much property is reported to have attained a record vel-ocity at some points. Wires fell in all all directions before the storm and not in many years has there been such prostra-tion of telegraph and telephone service. The wind blew gently in the morning but towards 10.45 it started to hustle along at about 50 miles an hour. The final spurt in the last lap touched 65 miles an hour. From about 11 o'clock the high wind continued until late in the

evening, doing damage all the time.

In Watford the storm seemed at its worst about 11.45, and never in the history of the town has so much damage worst about 11.49, and never in the mistory of the town has so much damage
been done by wind on a rampage. The
upper front of D. A. Maxwell's machine
shop fell into the street with a crash just
before noon; roofs were torn off, trees
and poles uprooted, fences laid low, windows blown out, chimneys crumbled and
fell, and boards and shingles were flying
about like cardboard. Shortly after noon
the roof of the old Dominion House,
owned by R. Auld, was lifted off and
hnrled into the street in front of the
Guide-Advocate office, causing a shower
of mud that spattered the nearby buildings. Mr. Ed. Thompson, Brooke, was
driving past at the time and had a miraculous escape from death. A piece of
roof, probably 20 by 30 faet, was hurled
over his head and dropped in front of the
rig. In its descent flying pieces broke
a number of windows. Part of the front
of Cameron's carriage house was blown
off and the metal roof of his horse stable on and the metal roof of his horse stable was carried over the barn and deposited in the vacant lot beyond. The roof of C. B. Matthews' storehouse was badly damaged, and the smoke stack blown off and the metal roof of his horse stab over, S. Saunders & Son's smoke stack also collapsed. A corner of the Merchants Bank building was blown off, also one of the windows demolished. The plate glass front of Matthews' feed store came out with a crash, and many other windows followed suite. The brick cornice of W. E. Fitzgerald's office was in a moment a heap of brick on the side-walk. Part of the coping was ripped off the old Trinity church, and parts of three windows blown in. Part of roof of the Grand Trunk freight shed was blown off.

The coping on front of the Guide-Advocate offic was torn off and thrown on the roof of J. D. Brown's barber shop, demolishing the rear chimney and badly damaging the roof. A number of house chimneys fell and eavetroughing was ripped off many buildings.

In the country the damage was very great, hardly a farm that did not share in the disaster. Sides of barns were blown off, roofs carried away, or the shingles ripped off. In many instances buildings were saved by prompt action in anchoring them with chains, etc. There is hardly a windmill left in the district. Some of the farmers lost heavily, among them being Alex. Laird, heavily, among them being Alex. Laird, 18 sideroad. He and his son John had a narrow escape from death. While working in the barn the new part was ripped away from the main part, carried off its foundation and completely demolished, and the rest of the building bably dam-aged. Andrew Thompson, 2nd line and the rest of the binding baby damaged. Andrew Thompson, 2nd line north, lost the roof off his fine barn. John Lowry, 6th line, had about 40 feet of barn roof blown off. James McManus, 12 sideroad, lost his silo and had his 12 sideroad, lost his silo and had his barns damaged. And. Anld's barn was swept clean of shingles, 25,000 being required to repair it. George Fenner's barn was lifted up over the cattle and deposited some distance, and not a head of the stock therein hurt. Damages similar to those mentioned occurred on nearly every farm in the district, and it will take many dollars and much hard will take many dollars and much hard work to place the buildings in the condi-tion they were in before the storm, to say nothing of the silos and windmills that were demolished and the small stuff that





KITCHEN SHOWER.

Household Articles Masquerading In Many Amusing Disguises.

A kitchen shower may be lifted out of the commonplace and be made interesting, even artistic and certainly amusing by dressing up each article given until it looks like something else. The costuming needed for such mas-querading is plenty of crape paper, bolts of cheap baby ribbon and a paper of pins.

Decorate buckets and wooden pails with paper, frills and paper flowers until they resemble gay trash baskets.

Get a half dozen flat wire egg beat-

ers, tie the handles of two together with light wire and make a wire hook to resemble a coat hanger. Wind the entire framework with strips of crape paper and tie on a huge tissue paper bow. Give a set of three of the hang-

Fashion a jardiniere made from the lid of a wooden box, in which put, point down, a fence of paring knives with the handles up. Weave in strips of crape paper in several colors and leave only the tips of the handles showing as a border. Fill the center with a potted plant.

Egg beaters and potato mashers make amusing dolls, with heads made from potatoes, apples or painted rags and a body made, so the utensil will stand, from rolls of cardboard. Dress in tissue paper hat and gown.

Clothespins may be turned into amusing dolls with crape paper, using marshmallows for heads, each decorated with features in black ink. To present these dolls erect fill a long baking dish with moss or sand and stick the pins into it. Drape the pau with double frills of neutral tinted paper, so as not to detract from the gay-

ety of the dolls.



In the report of the Minister of Edu-cation for the year 1912 an optimistic tone is taken towards teacher's salaries, and the Minister records gratifying in-creases in salary schedules

It is noted that the average salary paid to men teachers in the elementary schools during the year was \$767, and to women teachers \$518, an increase of \$56 and \$35 over the previous year's figures.

There are 868 teachers in training at present in normal schools, and although the outlook is promising, rural districts-will have to resort to special inducements to get certificated teachers.
