### DEED.

NICHOLSON.—Of Braselias, from cold contracted in camp at the town of Glasgow, Barren County, Kentucky, on the 20th of October ultimo, Mr. THOMAS NICHOLSON, aged 33 years, formerly a resident of St. Thomas, and brother-in-law to the publisher of this paper.

Deceased was born in Washington, Essex County, England, and settled in Saint Thomas, a few years ago, and was a man of high standing in the community. He was a heart and eminent social qualities, became an early and a member of the Masonic Fraternity of this town, and continued a highly respected connection with the brotherhood throughout life. Leaving Canada some three years since, he sought a change of scene in the flourishing State of Illinois. He was directed to reside in a town in its early bloom, immediately afterwards broke out. Mr. Nicholson recuperated, and after a sojourn of one year found himself in camp at Glasgow in the State of Kentucky. Here he suffered untold hardships, with exposures to night air, and a Southern climate, told upon his constitution at no time stopping a single day. His body followed, terminating after six months' bodily suffering in death, on the 20th of last month. The mortal remains, enclosed in a metallic coffin, were conveyed to Clinton, Illinois, his last place of residence, and an attestation of the universal respect entertained for him by his comrades in the military service, with all the honors pertaining to a beloved soldier, was accorded him, as also by the entire Masonic Lodges of the place, who accompanied the remains to the grave in the military cemetery, with the honors of the Fraternity, and by the observance of a funeral.

We are questioning the number of those who would have a solemn funeral upon the dead, but since we see that they have hereafter will be in just accordance with their merits here in the city. But this much we will say for deceased, and it is this, that we esteemed him as a companion, respected him as a citizen, admired him as a soldier, but loved him as a relation. We need not dwell upon his life again, well may the poet's lines apply to our deceased companion.

The boast of heraldry, the pomp of power, And all that beauty, all that wealth e'er gave, Await alike the inevitable hour— The paths of glory lead but to the grave!

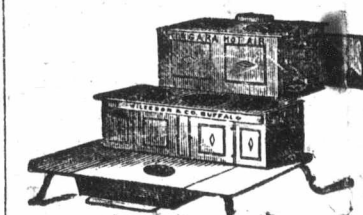
