



INTERNAL STRESS REVEALED IN CELLULOID MODELS


With the aid of celluloid models of gears, an engineer is enabled to ascer tain, almost at a glance, just how much internal strain similar gears made of steel will probably withstand, and where they are most likely to give way. Glass models were formerly used, but they proved too brittle. Rays of light are passed thru the models in operation, and a strain appears as a color fringe, enabling the proper constructional remedy to be applied.

ARTIFICIAL MEAT MADE FROM MALT GRAINS.

Artificial meat that closely re-sembles butchers' meat in taste, but has greater food value, is claimed to have been produced by a Belgian chemist. The artificial meat is made from malt grains, which are washed, pressed, and treated with sulphuric acid and lime. The mass is then filtered and dried until it has the appearance of a paste, and has the flavor of real flesh.



the opening into the ear.

Try dry heat first. Put a piece of fannel in the oven until quite hot and hold it over the baby's ear. A hot-water bag covered with flannel-may be held against the ear. Dry the ear carefully with absorbent cotton, and again try the het fiannel or bag. Repeat the washing every hour. It is not wise to drop oil or laudanum into the ear without direct orders from a declar.

New Vegetables

HE fresh, green vegetables just coming on the market are still delicate in flavor and need to be cooked quickly to be at their best.

They should be boiled in salted water, containing a little soda and should be cooked without covering. This insures keeping their

color bright and green String beans—Tip and tail and remove shreds from beans; throw into cold water until time to cook. When tender dress with salt, butter and pepper. Wax beans and butter beans are cooked the same as string beans,

but are usually finished with white sauce. Young beets are making their first appearance this season; they will cook in about thirty minutes if small. There is one important point to remember about beets; it is, that if the skin is broken the beautiful red

remember about beets; it is, that if the skin is broken the beautiful red juice flows out and they are then colorless and of poor flavor. So do not bruise or cut them before cooking; just wash carefully with a vegetable brush and cut off the tops, for greens, and bake, steam or boil.

Baked beets—Bake as you would potatoes, but about twice as long. I have had fine success cooking beets in cookery bags.

I place the clean beets in the bag with two tablespoons of water; fasten the opening, shut and place on a rack in the oven. When it is time for them to be done I try them with a cake straw. If it penetrates them I open the bag and skin and dress them; if they are still hard. I continue cooking. The

and season with butter, pepper, salt, and serve with beef tongue or corned Young carrots are sweeter now than they will be again until this season

next year. They are used raw, grated and seasoned, over salads. If/you cook them do not remove the tender skin until they are done. Carrots with new peas-Cook the carrots until half done; skin and dice them and add fresh, boiling, salted water and the peas. Cook together gently until done. Thicken with cream and flour and sprinkle in a little

Egg plant—Peel and cut in half-inch slices and cover with cold salted inder the water. Let stand over night. In the morning dip in batter and fry in a little butter or drip-

ping. An excellent breakfast dish in early spring. Cymlings, or turban squashes, are better known in the southern kitchen





armament trust of Germany are attempting to bring on a war for selfish profit, overlook the fact that if we establish thei ndustries necessary for the construction of armored battleships in Canada we will be founding another armament trust, and one with its headquarters in this country. It will not be satisfied with constructing three dreadnoughts, but will busy itself with stimulating a warlike spirit and thus keep our people in continual ferment." Eloquent Appeal.

Senator Lougheed closed with an eloquent appeal to the Liberal senators to lay aside party prejudice and rise above the clamor of their friends in the house. The senate in his opinion would assume a grave responsibility in throwing out a bill passed by the popular chamber in obedience to the mandate of the people. The bill was something more than a Cana-dian act of parliament; it was an

imperial matter.

Died of Inanition.

Mr. Lougheed said that the Laurier Government had felt impelled to carry into effect a system of naval defence for Canada and in 1909 the minister of militia and the minister of marine laid before the admiralty what Canada proposed to do The limit. marine laid before the admiralty what Canada proposed to do. The limitations of the scheme were such as to preclude it ever being of service to the Empire. It could not be said to have any fighting power nor provide for more than the policing of our own coasts and protection of our fisheries. "The scheme was anaemic and destitute in its constitution of the iron and blood which must ever characterize the fighting navy. It died of inanition."

Rejection Means Separation.
"If you reject this bill, you not only invite but practically announce separation from Great Britain. Canada, to maintain her self-respect, her dignity and her pride, mgust say in expressed terms to Great Britain hereafter, that having in the maintain time of necessity refused to answer your call, we propose to defend our-selves, and our pride compels us to absolve you from any sense of duty on your part, or expectation on ours, to extend to Canada hereafter the nelp and prestige of protection and defence by the empire.

"If Canada adopts such a policy as that now being proposed by the Lib eral party in Canada, I doubt if there is a British Canadian proud of the traditions and race from which he has sprung but would feel humiliated and ashamed of this Canada to which he belongs.

Mandate from People. "In conclusion permit me to say

that rumors have been rife that the senate of Canada would reject this "This bill is the expression of the direct representatives of the people, charged by the electorate of Canada to give voice to the publish wish that Canada should thus participate in the naval defence of the empire. The house of commons has a direct mandate from the people to pass this legislation.

Grave Responsibility.

"The senate would assume a grave responsibility in so denying the voice of the people. Notwithstanding the threats which have been made by the opponents of the bill in the commons that this senate would destroy it, yet I entertain a higher conception of this chamber than to believe that they are simply the echo of that opposition.

"Never since this senate was convened has it been called upon to make a pronouncement so grave, so fraught with responsibility, so fragmant with possibility and of such significance to the empire. This measure is in your hand. Will the pressure of



# SHOW UP BETTER

Absolute Lack of Ginger in Canadian Record Last Week No Definite News on Dissolu-Reflected Moderate Improvement.

> Bank clearings in the Dominion last reek totalled \$191,218,672, compared with \$174,602,487 in the preceding week and \$189,466,502 in the same period of last year. This was a slightly better showing than usual, several previous weeks having un below the corresponding period in 1912. Reduced to a percentage basis, the gain over last year was .9 per cent., which compared with a decrease of 6.8 in the week May 15. 2.4 per cent. in the week of May 8, 2 per cent. in the week of May 1. and 1 per cent. in the week of April 24. It will be seen from this record that last week was the first time in a full month that the clearings had equalled 17. Comparative daily bank clearings in Canada for the year to date, with comparisons, follow:

If stock market traders had hoped that the extra week-end holiday would instil some ginger into the speculative movement in the Toronto Exchange, they were sadly disappointed after following the course of the dealings for the first hour yesterday. The whole list was absolutely hide-bound by dulness, and as the day wore on it was plainly evident that there was no possibility of relief from the apathetic action. The consequence was that the session was one of the calmest witnessed so far this year.

The only sign of life apparent in the day's trading was a slight movement in some of the specialties, and even there no material vivacity was evident. In respect to the general list little need be said. Price changes were few and far between, and, where shown, were so small as to be without interest.

Specialties in Lead.

Practically the only feature was the action of Spanish River, which sold off to a new low record in exactly a year, and then regained a portion of its loss when supporting orders came into play. In the carly trading the shares were down to 56, which compared with the previous sale of 60, and on the later rally they were carried back to 57%, with the close a shade below that, leaving a net decline of 2½ points for the day. The incident was viewed as merely another demonstration of the poor market for the non-dividend-payers.

#### LONDON TALKING OF LOWER BANK RATE

Stock Market Quiet and Irregular -C. P. R. Down Once Again.

LONDON, May 26.—Money and discount rates were easy today. The Bank of England secured the bulk of the \$5,000,000 new gold offered in the open market, and an early reduction in the bank rate is being discussed.

The stock market was quiet, in view of the beginning of the settlement, but the tone was better on easier money, and the recovery in Americans. Copper and dlamond shares led a general improvement in the mining section. Consols gained an eighth and Paris supported its favorites, but Japanese bonds eased off under realizing.

American securities opened steady. Prices moved irregularly during the first hour, but later the market received fair support and advanced. In the late trading Canadian Pacific fell two points and the rest of the list dropped in sympathy. The closing was dull.

#### **FAILURE RECORD** SHOWS UP POORLY

The number of failures in the Dominion

Railway earnings continues to show a steady gain over those of the corresponding period of last year, the total of all roads reporting so far for the the first two weeks of the month (gross earnings) being \$15.508.320, again an increase of 8.5 per cent. as compared with the receipts of the same lines last year.

Finally, the day brought a number of railroad earnings, few of which were favorable, while those of Union Pacific and Atchison were quite the reverse.

As a partial offset to these adverse features, the constructive side found some comfort in an increase of the Brooklyn Rapid Transit dividend from a 5 to a 6 per cent, annual basis. 
