To independent outsiders it appears to be an act of folly on the part of the Toronto Electric Light Co. to reject the city's offer of \$125 per share for its stock. We have been anxious to support the city in its negotiations, and while we do not believe the actual plan of the company would be worth more than \$52.50 per share to the city, we were willing to make a generous allowance on account of the franchise and goodwill.

The confidential report of R. A. Ross, the expert electrical engineer, we believed would fully establish our contention, and we think an examination of his report does establish it. But Mr. Ross estimates the force of competition, the advantages of a clear field, the estimates of the company and other factors, and taking all things into account, suggests, not that the city should pay \$125 a share, but that in the event of the city deciding to purchase the company's asset, \$125 is the utmost limit to which the city could go.

### HUGE SEAS RAKED THE BOSTON FORE AND AFT

Jamaica Liner Unable to Make Progress For 85 Hours—Helmsman Lashed to Wheel

HALIFAX, March 11.—Eleven days out from Jamaica after battling with a fierce hurricane for over four days, the steamship Boston was put in port with her wheel house gone, two of her boats badly damaged, doors smashed and part of her railing washed overboard. The Boston, Captain Holstead, left Jamaica on Sunday, Feb. 26. She arrived at Turk's Island two days later and sailed for Halifax on Wednesday, Feb. 28. On entering the gulf stream she encountered a heavy northeast gale, which increased in velocity until it culminated in a fierce hurricane. The waves swept over her, sometimes covering her completely. The wheel house was carried away by a mountainous sea, one lifeboat and a jolly boat, were badly damaged, doors were smashed and part of the railing was carried away. Six persons were hurt and that of those on board that the man who steered had to be lashed to the wheel and the other men were life belts. The storm became fiercer and fiercer, and the ship was like a toy fighting against great odds. The sea boarded her continuously with terrific force, sending her on her beam ends and carrying almost everything in her path. The cabin filled with water and some of the captain's effects were a quantity of stores were destroyed. On Friday the storm abated. When the Boston arrived her coal bunkers were empty.

## HALF OF POPULATION ARE DISENFRANCHISED

### This is Result of Present System of Government, Says Sir Sandford Fleming

At a well attended meeting of the Canadian Institute on Saturday night Sir Sandford Fleming delivered an able address on "Electoral Reform." He contended that the present system of government in Canada was not truly representative, and in the election of its members offers a direct premium on corruption and bribery. His object in addressing the institute was not to advocate any special remedy for the present system, but to show that a remedy was needed and to explain several plans that have been suggested. Nearly 20 years ago he ventured to submit to the Canadian Institute a respectful appeal on this subject, which he at that time recognized to be of great importance to the people of Canada, and every part of the British Empire where direct free elections are established. The institute at once took up the matter with great vigor and appropriated the sum of \$1000 to be awarded in premiums for essays on the subject.

The speaker said that the political evil which everywhere attracts attention are attributable to imperfect methods of carrying out representative government. "The fundamental principle of representative or popular government is that the sovereign power of a state rests in and proceeds from the people, and that it is exercised by representatives of the people assembled in parliament. "We follow in a course which in its result operates in a manner diametrically opposed to the true theory of our political institutions. The theory is that the mass of electors shall be present in person and heard in the voices of their representatives in parliament. This is impossible as long as the present system of choosing members is in existence," declared Sir Sandford. He said it was clearly shown by statistics that the present electoral methods prevent a large portion of the community from being represented in parliament. Instead of the supreme power being exercised by the people's representatives, the whole power of the state is absolutely possessed by a minority, since the present system disfranchises half the population entitled to vote.

### MISSION ENDS.

The closing of the ten days mission services in the Anglican churches was marked at St. Albion's, Saturday night by an eloquent address by Bishop Sweeney, in which he spoke of the great good which had been accomplished all over the diocese thru the mission.

Rev. E. J. Doherty, M.A., of Norfolk, England, the missioner who has had charge of the services, gave an stirring sermon on the text, "Work Out Your Own Salvation." He said that it is not so much religion as a power that works within us," he said, "and the end of it is to give us the knowledge that God is in us. It is for us to work this great power out."

## DANGERS OF WORKING WOMEN

### Rev. Byron H. Stauffer Thinks There Are Too Many Young Girls in Stores

Taking his text from the book of Ruth, "Let her glean, and reproach her not," Rev. Byron H. Stauffer of Bond-street Congregational Church last evening preached a sermon on "Moral Dangers of Working Women." He drew attention to the vast difference between the time of Ruth and now, in the gleaming in the fields was the principal employment for women; to-day there were a thousand avenues of employment open. The industrial work was open to them. The argument that women should stick to domestic service had fallen flat.

In the oriental countries they dispensed the woman's question thru polygamy, that awful condition of affairs, dual marriage. In Roman Catholic countries they dispensed of their surplus women by placing them in convents. He considered the placing for life of women in convents a blot on civilization. In Canada every field of endeavor awaited the women.

"We have two many fourteen-year-old girls working in the departmental stores of Toronto," declared the preacher. "These girls who start work thus early are old in the face and stunted in growth and education. The reason lies in the cupidity of the parents who desire perhaps to pay off a mortgage or debt. "It is now perfectly moral for a woman to work almost anywhere in the City of Toronto. I would rather bring a girl up in a thoroughly policed and church organized city like Toronto than in a little country burg. He warned the young woman from discussing her employer's domestic troubles with him. Early hours and keeping a touch with the church was the best way of avoiding the moral dangers of working women.

## SEPARATE CROWNING AS EMPEROR OF INDIA

A Thousand Details of Ceremonies at Delhi and at Carnarvon to Be Settled.

LONDON, March 12.—King George is now seen daily in Rotten Row cantering with equerries. He needs the bracing effect of exercise in the nipping air, for he is overwhelmed with the details of various ceremonial details of what must be the busiest year of his reign.

The precedents of the last coronation are followed closely, except the minor points, like the substitution of girls for boys as the Queen's train bearers, but a series of new questions have been raised for the Delhi coronation and the investiture of the Prince of Wales at Carnarvon, since tradition and recent practice do not cover them. Lord Curzon and other viceroys have been consulted respect-

ing the Delhi function, and the decision has been reached that it must not be treated as a recrowning of the king, already consecrated at Westminster Abbey, but as a separate crowning as Emperor of India. A thousand novel details connected with regalia and costume and Oriental pageantry need to be determined. The prince's investiture is almost equally as difficult, owing to Welsh sensitiveness. The Duke of Connaught, who is the King's closest adviser, has decided never to accept another military command. He may become Viceroy of India after serving a short term at Ottawa.

## TOLSTOI'S SON ON A VISIT TO AMERICA

Attributes His Late Father's Erratic Conduct to the Influence of an English Evangelist.  
NEW YORK, March 11.—The international floating hotel Mauretania brought many interesting passengers to her pier yesterday morning. Nearly all assembled in the brilliant illuminated lounge Thursday evening and listened to an address by Count Leo Tolstoy, third son of the late Russian philosopher.  
The count is forty-two years old, of medium height, with brown beard, long face, mild eyes, and teeth that gleam. He is a sculptor. He is deeply interested in social subjects and reform in educational methods. In Paris he has been two years studying with Rodin, the sculptor.  
The speaker produced two busts of his father which he had fashioned, one in plaster and the other in bronze. The

audience noted the likeness of the busts to the young count. He said he had been his father's intimate and co-worker in writing, editing and teaching, and enjoyed his father's entire confidence. The son attributed his father's erratic conduct during his last days to the influence of Lord Radstock, an English evangelist, under whose spell the elder count had fallen.  
The count was followed in the speaking by Dr. Wilfred Grenfell, the missionary physician to 20,000 fishermen on the coasts of Newfoundland and Labrador. Pastor Russell's Sermon

Not long ago I pointed out that the last 11 verses of St. Mark's Gospel in our common version are spurious—so recognized by all scholars, because these verses are not to be found in any of the oldest Greek MSS., and were evidently added to the Word of God in the seventh century or later. Moreover, we gave proofs of the untruthfulness of this addition. It is true that whoever believes the gospel of Christ may handle serpents with impunity and may drink deadly poisons without harm? Surely not. It is nothing short of a sin for those who know better to acknowledge these verses and to use them to bolster up their crime as to the Word of God as to take away from it.

To-day I invite attention to some other dead files in the common version of God's Word, which have had much to do with twisting the theology once delivered to the saints. Take for instance the closing words of the Lord's prayer: "Thine is the kingdom and power and glory."

These words, if uttered by old Lord, should be found in the old Greek MSS. But they are not found therein. They are, therefore, to be rejected as additions made by people centuries later. Matthew's Gospel was written. These words were introduced when the faith of the church respecting the kingdom of Messiah was changed and changing from what it was originally. All through the New Testament the second coming of Christ in power and glory to establish His kingdom and to glorify the church, His bride, is the end of this gospel age. But as the time drew lang a change of sentiment came into the church. It became popular and rich. Its bishops were respected. Finally the prayer prevailed that God did not intend to delay the establishment of the kingdom until the second coming of Christ, but did intend to establish it in the hands of the church during this age and use the church for the conquering of the world and the fulfilling of all the promises of the past.

In line with this the most prominent bishop of the time was recognized as divinely appointed to represent Christ in the world and to bring about the millennium in His stead and to bring about the millennium, etc. This was the bishop of Rome, who subsequently was styled the Pope, and who claimed and was accorded the honorable title, "Vice-gerent of the Son of God." It is this day in words of the Pope on his thara or three-convict hat—Vicarius Dei Fili.

This change came in the general sentiment of the "Christian world." Messiah's kingdom was no longer to be looked for as coming, but was to be recognized as here. The Pope as Messiah's reigning representative, was to be acknowledged. All kingdoms that were to honor and obey the Pope were commanded to honor and obey the Pope. The various prophecies which tell of Messiah's kingdom glory were applied to the Pope, and are still so applied.

As those who would not receive Messiah was to be "destroyed from amongst the people," the Pope, who had erred wrong to destroy those who rejected and opposed the papal kingdom and to give them to the burning flame. The Lord's prayer was already in the Scriptures, and was known to many. It could not be eliminated. But some zealous person, fully believing that God's kingdom had come, felt justified in amending the prayer to correspond to what he supposed were the facts. Hence the prayer which begins, "Thy kingdom come," made to end by saying, "Thy kingdom has come in its glory and power."

If papacy is the kingdom of Messiah, it is certainly not what the Jews expected. It is certainly not what the masses of mankind had any reason to expect, altho the Pope is accepted by the majority of Christendom. Altho our protesting forefathers broke away from the Pope and denounced him as Anti-Christ and declared that he falsely sat in the place of Christ without authority, they, nevertheless, were imbued with the same error. They did not think to go back to the message of the Scriptures and to look for the Son of God to set up His kingdom at His second advent and to bless Israel and the world through His glorified church, and they held to the papal theory that God's kingdom was set up and was conquering the world, and that thus the Messianic reign mentioned in the prophecy is being fulfilled. They held that Christ himself is the invisible King, but that the Pope is not authorized to represent Him. Hence this spurious addition to the Word of God is as acceptable to Protestants as to Catholics; indeed, more so, if we may judge by the fact that the Catholics omit the spurious words, while the Protestant Bible quotes them.

More dead files in the precious document—Pastor Russell points out some of the spurious words in the Word of God contained in our common version. Bibles, shown to be false because not found in the oldest Greek MSS.—Dead files cause the apothecary's ointment to be applied to the Word of God.

The Bible, as it was recognized by the Apostolic Church and written down in the original Greek manuscripts. To the credit of such men as Luther, Calvin, Knox, Zwingli, Wesley and others living prior to our day we must explain that they had no opportunity for knowledge of the spurious passages of the Scriptures. Therefore, they have no responsibility such as devolves upon ministers of our day who should know all about these matters. We cannot on this occasion make further investigation, take out more of these dead files; but the Lord will, at some future time I trust, v. 7, 8, will have your attention. It is worthy of it. It has caused the Ointment to stink and has confused the minds of many of God's children by the way in which the error in this case has been interwoven with the truth.

My hearers should bear distinctly in mind that what I am here presenting is not at all in line with the presentation of the higher critics. Their method is to read thru the Scriptures and judge of them by their own keen intellectual powers, and thus to discriminate between what is written by the prophets credited, and which were additions.

I repeat higher criticism and accept the word of God in full. I reject nothing of the Bible. While it is not without its faults, it has so many excellent qualities and beautiful translations that I prefer it to any other generally use it. But I must not, I cannot, approve those portions of it which all orthodox scholars admit to be spurious. We must not handle the word of God deceitfully. If we do we must expect darkness instead of light, confusion instead of harmony.

Just three centuries ago our English Common Version Bible was published. This year its tercentenary is celebrated. It is a grand book. It has done a grand work. The fact that it is not perfect must not condemn a work possessed of so many glorious qualities. It was the result of seven years labor on the part of seven persons learned in the languages and appointed by King James of England for its preparation. They labored to some disadvantage by reason of some disavantages they were not commanded to give to follow an earlier translation styled, "The Bishop's Bible," and by other factors. The original would allow. They were also instructed that if the Tyndale, Coverdale, Matthew, Cranmer or Whitchoeur translation and the Geneva Bible agreed better with the text, theirs should be accepted as instead of the bishop's. The translation was, perhaps, the best that could be made at the time.

Published by kingly authority, it is now venerated by English and American Protestants as the best and come from the finger of God. This is a mistake.

The basis of our common version was the Latin Vulgate, which was diligently revised and compared with the Greek MSS. of the time. There were few Greek MSS. known at that time, whereas at the present time there are over 700. Three of these are quite ancient. The Sinaitic MS., found in a convent on Mt. Sinai, is now in the possession of the British Museum, where it is held in the highest honor. Its date is estimated to be about the year 331 A.D. This MS. is now in the possession of the Russian Government at St. Petersburg. (2) The Vatican MS., is credited with being next in age. It was found amongst old MSS. in the Vatican library and still there and extant. The date of its writing is estimated to be about the year 350 A.D. (3) The third of these oldest known Greek MSS. of the New Testament is styled the Alexandrine, because it was found in Alexandria in Egypt. It is now in the British Museum, where it is held in the highest honor. In this case, it is supposed to have been written about A.D. 450. The readings of all three of these Greek MSS. can be secured and the variations between their readings and our common version are so simply arranged as to leave no excuse or ignorance on the part of the Bible students. Our common version with notations of these MSS. can be obtained thru any bookseller. Prof. Theodor, writing respecting these ancient Greek MSS. says: "To treat such ancient authorities with neglect would be either unwarrantable or culpable negligence. Indeed, it would be a misunderstanding of Providence if, after all these documents had been preserved thru all the dangers of fourteen centuries and delivered safe into our hands, we were not ready to receive them with thankfulness as most valuable instruments for the elucidation of truth."
