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WAR EAGLE DEAL SETTLED

The Toronto Syndicate Takes Formal Possession

AT THE SPOKANE MEETING

The London Capitalists Who Got Left are Now Kicking Hard

They Claim That They Had a Prior Contract to Purchase the Mine, But Mr. T. G. Blacklock Stated Last Night That the Complaint Was Not Worrying the Toronto Men—How the Victoria Board of Trade Looks at the Mining Laws—General Mining Topics.

Yesterday morning the agent in Rossland of the Gooderham-Blacklock-Cox syndicate wired his principals in Toronto that he had just taken formal possession of the War Eagle property, the details of the deal having been arranged at a meeting in Spokane on Wednesday, and the purchase money paid over.

Simultaneously with this settlement came the rather startling announcement that the Toronto men's title to the property would be disputed. On Tuesday the Rossland War Eagle Company of London, Eng., wired their solicitors in this city to notify the original owners and the purchasers that they would dispute the sale.

Such notification was forthwith made and the Londoners assert that they will insist on their right to the mine under an alleged prior contract of purchase. The English company say they held an option on the property, and are sure as they that they have a right to the mine that they have issued a prospectus on the strength of it.

Mr. T. G. Blacklock, who has been seen last evening by The World and laughingly said that he had received the notice referred to but it was not for him. The English company's claim would not affect the syndicate's interests in the least.

DEEP TEST FOR ROSSLAND

Proposition to Sink a 1200 Foot Test Shaft

Mr. W. A. Campbell, formerly of Toronto, but now of Rossland, is the author of a proposition that the mine owners of the company combine on the purchase of some promising claims and mine developments on the ore bodies by rapid sinking to a depth of 1,000 or 1,200 feet.
