

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

CANADIANS WILL NOT STAND IT

They Are British and They Will Have Their Cabinet British

his Most Improper Position or

Get Out, Says The Star.

Montreal, Oct. 16 .- (Special.) - The Star today says: "We have more respect for the open enemies of our flag than for the Little Empire men who are lukewarm in their loyalty to the old flag. They are like Mr. Tarte, who, through the misfortune of having to wear wooden shoes in his younger days, gives his first love to France, but ing to wear wooden shoes in his younger days, gives his first love to France, but condescends to accept the honors and emoluments of a British Minister of the Crown, But to do Mr. Tarte justice, he has the courage to declare his national preferences, and that is something. Recent events have made it imperatively necessary that Canada's position with regard to the Empire should be defined beyond doubt or cavil. There is, happliy, no question about the feeling of the Canadian people as a whole. To assert their loyalty would be superfluous. But Canada is now, and long has been, big enough and strong enough to bear her share of the active responsibilities of the Empire. There is something unutterably mean in the position of Canadians who are willing to accept the protection of the Royal Navy and the British army year after year and then to ask: 'What has Canada to do with the quarrels of the Empire in Africa, or in Germany, or in France?' "All that we have to do with these quarrels is that they are our quarrels. And the people of Canada will expect the Government of Canada to take an upequivocal position in recognition of this fact. Canadians will be satisfied with no grudging compromises and with no 'Good Lord, good devil' professions of political allegiance. The Dominion Government will have to recognize frankly and squarely that the Canadian contribution to the Empire, and not, as Mr. Tarte's paper pretends, a mere volunteer movement of individual Canadians. One way to do this is for the Government to undertake the whole cost of the Canadian expedition, and another way is to insist upon the Minister of Public Works withdrawing from his ambiguous and most improper position or else getting out of the Government. We do not believe the people of Canada will stand more tomfoolery on this question. They are British, and they will have their Government British also, or they will know the reason why."



It is quite true that your telegram addressed to me from Yarmouth on the 5th insteader of the Opposition of this month never reached me until yesterday, when, after enquiries made, on my request, at the telegraph offices in this city, it was found that it had never left Halifax. However, I have been made familiar with it, along with the whole people of Canada, to whom you had taken the precaution of communicating it.

I am sorry to hear from you that the action which the Government has taken to have 1000 Canadian volunteers sent to the Transvaal seems to you insufficient, inas-

Mr. Chamberlain's Note.

4th October, 1899.

The Secretary of State for War and the Commander-in-Chief desire that you express their high appreciation of the signal exhibition of patriotic spirit of the people of Canada, shown by the offers to serve in South Africa, and to furnish the following information to assist the organization of forces into units suitable for the Empire's military, requirements:

Firstly, units should consist of about 125 men.

men.
Secondly, they may be of infantry, mounted infantry or cavairy, in view of numbers already available. Infantry are needed most, and cavairy are the least serviceable. Thirdly, all should be armed with decimal 303 rifles or carbines, which can be supplied by the Imperial Government, if necessary.

Fourthly, all must provide their own equipment and the mounted troops their own horses.

Fifthly, not more than one captain and three subalterns are to be allowed to each unit. The whole force may be commanded by an officer mot higher than major.

In considering the numbers which can be employed, the Secretary of State for War will be guided by the nature of the offers, but he desires that each colony should be fairly represented, and the limits necessary if the force is to be fully utilized by the available staff as an integral portion of the Imperial forces. The Imperial Government would gladly accept units.

The conditions are as follows:

Troops to be disembarked at port of landing in South Africa, fully equipped at the cost of the Colonial Government or volunteers. From the date of disembarkation the Imperial rates, supplies and ammunition, and will defray, expenses of transport back to Canada, and pay wound pensions and compassionate allowances at Imperial rates.

Troops to embark not later than 31st October, proceeding direct to Cape Town for orders. Inform accordingly all who have offered to raise volunteers.

The Government of Canada is restricted in its powers. It is responsible to Parliament, and it can do very little without the permission of Parliament. There is no doubt as to the attitude of the Government on all questions that mean menace to British interests, but in this present case our limitations are very clearly defined. And so it is that we have not offered a Canadian contingent to the home authorities. The Militian Department duly transmitted individual offers to the Imperial Government, and the reply from the War Office, as published in Saturday's Globe, shows their attitude on the question. As to Canada's turnishing a contingent, the Government has not discussed the question, for the reasons which I think must be easily understood by everyone who understands the constitutional law on the question. The statement in The Military Gazette, published this morning is a pure invention. Far from possessing any foundation in fact, it is wholly imaginative."

Reform of the Tariff.

There was another question—the reform of the tariff. Ine Conservatives had said the National Policy was a panacea, a horn or pienty, and they shouled themselves hoarse. A digression into local politics was now made. Sir Wilfrid read a letter from J. J. Mason of Bowmanville, in which the West Durham Prohibition Association asked him to devote some time to discussing the plebiscite vote and the action of the Government therewith. Mr. Mason intimated that the vote entitled the country to some advanced legislation along prohibitory lines. Sir Wilfrid declared he had no fault to find with the request. He declared the adverse vote in Quebec had nothing to do with the decision the Government had come to. A conclusion was arrived at not by balancing the votes for and against but by counting the votes in favor of prohibition without reference to the others, and comparing them with the whole possible vote. It was found that the votes in favor were less than 23 per cent, of the whole electorate. This proved that Canada was not ripe for prohibition. Hence the Government was not warranted in introducing prohibitory legislation.

As to the question of an advance in legislation, Sir Wilfrid said every class of citizens would always find him ready to listen to its views for the welfare of Canada.
