Known for Days.

The foregoing paragraph in to-day's official journal, which was inserted by order of the King and Crown Prince, has turned into truth what, for several days past, has been regarded as an incredible tale. The Crown Princess, surrounded by her ladies in waiting and numerous attendants and servants of the royal household, has vanished so utterly that the police of every kingdom of Europe have for ten days been unable to trace her. The official announcement was made in order to obtain the aid of the general public in finding the Princess, and because the court fiction that she preferred to remain in retirement at Salzburg were informed of the disappearance, and in-quiries were made throut the whole countryside, but with no tangible result. HOW WIRELESS WORKS. Ryrie Bros., Jewelers, Electric Spark Causes Series of Waves to Spread.

a Marconi pole is from 500,000 to 2,000,000 per second. These waves are not to be confounded with the air waves, which cause sound, tho for the purposes of explanation they may be compared to them. When a poker is struck the vibrations of the steel rod transfer themselves to the surrounding air in the form of waves in the atmosphere.

Wireless telegraphy waves travel not by means of the atmosphere, but thru the far more intangible substance, ether, which is held to fill up space and penetrate all matter. Even in ordinary telegraphy the currents flows thru the ether surrounding the atoms of copper, rather than thru the wire itself. In wireless telegraphy the current does not flow thru wires, but from wires, using the ether which penetrates the atmosphere as a medium thru which to flow. Many years ago it was found out that electricity passed thru the space separating two long parallel wires. When a current of electricity was made to flow thru one wire a magnetic influence spread out from the wire, and on reaching the ether induced in it a state of electricity similar to the current flowing in the first wire. The current sus transferred, as it were, across a bridge of magnetism.

The waves which fly from the transmitting station almost instantly reach the distant receiving wire. The waves are then feeble and could not operate an instrument, so that a "coherer" and "relay" have to be used.

The coherer consists of metal filings,

The coherer consists of metal filings, which remain separate from one another, and offer resistance to a current until the Hertzian waves strike the aerial. Then the filings press together, and the obstruction is bridged. The relay current can then act, and a strong current instantly flows thruthe circuit and operates the machine, which prints the code on paper tape.

It has been said that two stations might be placed back to back, and the waves made to pass completely around the world. This would require waves of very great length in order to overcome the great curvature of the earth.

The induction method was the one used by all the earlier experimenters with wireless telegraphy, and it was not until Hertz published his experiments with the waves caused by the spark-gap method that Hertzian waves became the more popular field of work with electricians, Marconi is generally recognized as the first to make use of Hertzian waves for the basis of a system of telegraphy, properly so called.

Mr. Marconi's progress has been from tens to hundreds, then from hundreds to over 1000 miles, and now he has spanned the Atlantic, a distance of 2500 miles.
