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## Report of the Session of Knox Church, Ottawa,

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Submitted at the Annual Meeting of the Congregation, held January 13th, 1876.

The Session, in accordance with a desire expressed at the last annual meeting of the Congregation, have much pleasure in submitting the following report, and as this is the first submitted by the Session, it may prove of interest, if, without confining it to the year just closed, some of the leading events in the history of the Congregation be given from its first formation.

On the 7th of November, 1844, a meeting of those interested in the movement following the disruption in the Church of Scotland, and the consequent disruption in the Presbyterian Church of Canada in connection with the Church of Scotland, was held in the Methodist Church, Upper Town, (lately known as St. Andrew's Church, Roman Catholic), for the purpose, among other things, of making arrangements for holding religious services on the Lord's Day. The meeting was addressed by the Rev. Henry Gordon, of Gananoque.

On the Sabbath following the Congregation met in the forenoun in the British Wesleyan Chapel, Rideau Street, in the afternoon in the Methodist Church, and again in the evening in the British Wesleyan Chapel, Mr. Cordon officiating.

Thereafter the Congregation continued to meet in the British Wesleyan Chapel, which they rented till such time as they should be enabled to erect a place of worship for themselves. The religious exercises on these occasions were conducted by Mr. Thomas Wardrope, then master of the Bytown Grammar School, who was commissioned to act as Catechist by the Presbytery of Kingston, as also by the Home Mission Committee of the Synod of the Presbyterian Church of Canada, and commended to the brethren at Bytown in terms following:

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"As one worthy of their entire confidence and esteem, and well qualified through the Great Head of the Church to promote their edification, by conducting the exercises of public worship with the reading and exposition of the word of God, and the subordinate standards of the Church."

The Commission to act in the said capacity was transmitted to Mr. Wardrope by the Rev. Alex. Gale, minister at Hamilton, and Convener of the Home Mission Committee, with the anxious desire that he would undertake the office proposed to him, looking to the Lord to prosper him in the performance of its duties.

This state of things continued till the month of June, 1845, in which month the Synod of the Presbyterian Church of Canada met at Cobourg.

To this meeting of Synod Mr. Donald Kennedy, Elder, was deputed by the congregation, with a petition that Mr. Wardrope might be duly and regularly licensed to preach the Gospel, in order to his receiving from the congregation, a call to be their pastor. The petition was favourably entertained by the Synod; and the Presbytery of Kingston, before leaving Cobourg, met, and solemnly licensed Mr. Wardrope. A unanimous call immediately followed this, which, having been sustained by the Presbytery, and accepted by Mr. Wardrope, his ordination was appointed to take place on the 13th day of August, 1845. On that occasion the late Rev. Dr. Robert Burns, of Toronto, preached and presided, his text on the occasion being Is. 62. 10, "Lift up a Standard for the people." The Rev. Mr. Smart of Brockville addressed the Minister, and the Rev. Mr. McLean of Picton the people.

Meanwhile a place of worship was being erected.

After the ordination, it was deemed necessary for the welfare of the church, that a number of elders should be elected, to co-operate with the two, namely, Mr George Severight and Mr. Donald Kennedy, who had entered the Congregation as elders. Four were chosen:—Mr. Alexander Kennedy, Mr. John Durie, Mr. Alex. Anderson and Mr. A. Wilson, and ordained, on Sabbath, the 11th day of December, 1845. At the

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meeting of Session which followed, Mr. Durie was appointed Session Clerk. Mr. Durie was also appointed Sabbath School Superintendent, which office he held till the year 1865. Mr. Alex. Mutchmor, the present Superintendent, was appointed in 1866.

The new Church on Daly Street, named Knox Church, was opened for public worship on Sabbath, January 11th, 1846, the Rev. Wm. Lochead, of Osgoode, preaching in the forenoon, the Rev. Henry Gordon, of Gananoque, in the afternoon, and the Rev. Mr. Wardrope in the evening.

The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was dispensed, for the first time, in the Church, on Sabbath, February 1st, 1846.

During the pastorate of the Rev. Mr. Wardrope, the following additional elders were chosen, namely:—Mr. George Hay and Mr. Wm. Taylor, ordained December 15th, 1850; Mr. Donald Robertson, inducted March 16th, 1856; Mr. Wm. Hutchison, inducted Dec. 17th, 1864; Mr. Alex. Mutchmor, ordained March 2nd, 1866; Mr. Johr McMillan, Mr. S. S. M. Hunter and Mr. Peter Fairbairn ordained, and Mr. Alex. Anderson inducted, Nov. 25th, 1866.

At a meeting of Session, held May 26th, 1864, the subject of Church extension was taken up, and after due deliberation it was agreed: "From the difficulty long felt of supplying sufficient church accommodation to applicants who were desirous of connecting themselves with the Congregation, and the large increase to the population which would necessarily follow the removal of the Government to this city, to bring the matter before the Presbytery at its first meeting, in order that action might be taken for establishing a Missionary Station near the centre of the city, to be entirely under the control of the Presbytery."

The Presbytery having taken action in the matter, three elders, namely, Mr. Donald Kennedy, Mr. Wm. Taylor and Mr. Wm. Hutchison, along with several members of Knox Church, volunteered to identify themselves with the movement, and aid in securing its success, and the result of this effort was the organization of Bank Street Church.

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e wellected, ht and ion as , Mr. nd orht the The Rev. Mr. Wardrope, to whom Presbyterianism owes much, in this city and neighbourhood, after a faithful and succe sful ministry of twenty-five years, having received a call from the Congregation of Chalmer's Church, Guelph, resigned the charge of Know Church and removed to Guelph, in Sept., 1869. Respected and beloved, his loss was deeply felt, and after years of separation his name is still held by us in affectionate remembrance.

For many months after the removal of Mr. Wardrope, Knox Church remained a vacant charge. At length, a unanimous call having been forwarded and accepted by the Rev. Wm. McLaren of Belleville, his induction took place on the 14th day of July, 1870. On the Sabbath following, the Rev. Mr. Wardrope preached, introducing the newly appointed Pastor to the Congregation.

Mr. Donald Robertson, elder, after fifteen years of faithful service in the office, died, in March, 1871. Concerning his loss a suitable minute was entered in the records of Session. And here it may be stated, that of any elder chosen by the Congregation, and while still in connexion with the Session of Knox Church, up to the present time, this is the only death that has occurred.

The following persons, having been elected elders by the Congregation, were ordained: Mr. Donald Masson and Mr. John Thorburn on the 1st, and Mr. Hiram Robertson on the 30th day of March, 1873.

During the ministry of the Rev. Mr. McLaren, a ministry characterized by great ability, and with zeal and earnestness in promoting the Lord's work, the work of erecting the present Church edifice was entered upon; but before its completion, and while the Congregation were anxiously struggling with the undertaking, Mr. McLaren was appointed to the Chair of Systematic Theology, in Knox College, Toronto, by the General Assembly, at its meeting in June, 1873, causing him to resign his charge, after a pastorate of three years, and leaving Knox Church, for the second time in its history, vacant.

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Look us, and co Bank Stre Congrega a beginnin The new Church having been completed, was formally opened on the 10th day of January, 1874; but not without the Congregation having been much weakened by a considerable igned portion of the people remaining behind, to worship in the Old opt.,

The Rev. Thos. Wardrope preached in the forenoon, after the Rev. Professor McLaren in the afternoon, and the Rev. Principal McVicar in the evening.

After the lapse of nearly two years, our prayers, doubtless many and earnest, were heard and answered by Him who giveth pastors according to His own heart. A unanimous call was forwarded to the Rev. F. W. Farries, of Paris, and the call having been sustained by the Presbytery, and accepted by him, he was inducted as pastor of Knox Church, on the 29th day of April, 1875; and, on Sabbath, May 2nd, introduced to the Congregation by his predecessor, the Rev. Professor McLaren.

Since Mr. Farries' settlement our progress has been very There has been a steadily increasing attendance encouraging. at Public Worship, the Sabbath School, Bible Class and Prayer Meeting, and a large addition made to the names on our Communion Roll. As additional means of improvement there have been recently organized, a Young People's Class, conducted by the pastor, and a Young Men's Association, all of these tending to, and we may trust, giving evidence of, Spiritual Progress. By the last returns made to the General Assembly we appeared as having one hundred and thirty-five communicants, and eighty families, now we have one hundred and ninety-five communicants, and one hundred and twenty families, shewing an increase, during the year, of sixty communicants, (twenty-four of these received on profession of faith, and twenty-six by certificates from other congregations,) and forty families.

Of the fund for the relief of the poor there is a balance of \$47 07 in the hands of the Session.

Looking to the year 1844, the day of small things with us, and contrasting it with our condition now; the condition of Bank Street and Daly Street Congregations, as well as of other Congregations in or around the city, all originating from so feeble a beginning, we are ready to exclaim, "What hath God wrought!"

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Thankful for the past, let us take courage in looking to the future, ever remembering that there is promised help from a Saviour ever near.

Before closing, we would congratulate the Congregation on the consummation of the union between the Canada Presbyterian Church and the Tresbyterian Church in connection with the Church of Scotland, a union destined, as we trust, greatly to promote the work of the Lord, not only in this Dominion, but in other parts of the world.

"May the Lord biess us and keep us, may the Lord make his face shine upon us, and be gracious unto us." "May the God of hope fill us with all jo, and peace in believing, that we may abound in hope, through the power of the Holy Ghost."

# The Temporal Committee of Knox Church, Ottawa.

31st December, 1875.

At the expiration of their term of office, your Committee beg to submit their Financial Statement for the past year. An examination of it will disclose several unwelcome features most prominent amongst which is the fact, that financially we are to-day in a worse position than we were this time twelvemonths.

The Statement presented on the 31st day of December, 1874, shewed a floating debt against the congregation amounting to \$3,845 86—the corresponding statement for the past year shows that debt to have increased to the sum of \$5,083 56, being an increase during twelve months of not less than \$1237 70. These are the figures shewn in your Treasurer's account which however are an under-statement. The deficiency is in reality \$5,397 86, or \$314 30 more than shewn by him. This arises from the fact that the last mentioned sum was contributed for a special object, and has been applied to meet the current expenditure of the year. Whence it came and for what object, will hereafter appear.

An analysis of the accounts will shew more clearly how the above shortage arises, and enable you better to understand the facts.

The Revenue of the Church naturally divides itself into three branches, which may be described as, 1st Ordinary, 2nd Extraordinary, and 3rd Special.

With the latter-the Special-we have little or nothing to

do. It comprises merely collections for the different schemes of the Church, of which your Committee is merely the custodian. They are ordered by the Session and paid over to that body as received—thus merely passing through our hands, without affecting our balances.

The 1st, or Ordinary Revenue, comprehends those sources of income upon which we rely with certainty from year to year, to meet our expenditure. It comprises the following heads, viz.: Weekly Contributions, Arrears, and Ordinary Collections. From these we have received the following amounts:

The 2nd, or Extraordinary Revenue, is derived from sources other than above, and which although yielding a considerable amount cannot be relied upon as a branch of income like the former. It includes the following items and amounts, viz:—

It will thus be seen that our current revenue shows a large deficiency—both of above branches yielding only the sum of \$5459 83.

Such is our present financial position—one calling for the gravest consideration on the part not only of the in-coming Committee, but of the Congregation at large. Our duty has been to lay the facts plainly and explicitly before you, in the confident hope that an acquaintance with them will lead on your part to an application of the remedy. That remedy is to increase the amount under the head of Ordinary Revenue, so as to make it suffice to meet our current expenses.

We shall next proceed to estimate the amount which will be required for that purpose during the year 1876.

or in round numbers we may safely calculate upon \$7,500. This is a large sum for a small congregation such as ours, more especially in a time of severe financial depression like the present. However, it must be met, and judging from what has been done by Knox Church in the past, we feel assured that the means will be forthcoming, and our successors in office enabled te meet all your obligations.

There is another matter, which under present circumstances your Committee approach with considerable hesitation—that is, the subject of our floating debt and the effort initiated to insure its discharge. In the month of November last your

Committee prepared two circulars upon the subject. One was addressed to members and adherents of the congregation, the other to outside friends in the city and elsewhere. In the first of these, after narrating the total debt of the congregation, and the amount which had been consolidated, the following remarks occur: "The remaining \$5000 is in the shape of a floating debt, owing upon Promissory Notes of individual members of your Committee. In the present state of financial depression, it is becoming increasingly difficult to procure from the banks an extension of time upon these notes as they fall due, and then only at an exorbitant rate of interest. The position is an unpleasant one, and daily becoming more and more so, as the members of the Committee are liable to be compelled at any moment to protect their paper. They feel that it is placing them in a position, which, as servants of the congregation, they should not be expected to occupy. For this reason they seek to be relieved from this responsibility, and trust that now that the congregation has been fully informed of the true state of matters, a successful effort will at once be made, and the burden of their difficulties removed.

With this object in view, your Committee propose to initiate a scheme for clearing off the above debt of \$5,000. They propose to ask subscriptions from members and adherents, extending over one year, to be applied to this purpose. These subscriptions may be paid either monthly or quarterly, so as to be as little burdensome as possible, and your Committee earnestly trust that the response to this appeal will be of so liberal a nature as to ensure the liquidation of our entire floating debt within the above period.

To the above appeal only a partial response has as yet been made, but so far the result has been satisfactory. Thirtythree individuals have responded, and promise an aggregate amount of \$1515 to be paid before the close of the present year.

In response to the second circular, addressed to outside friends, the sum of \$246 30 has been received or promised, together making the sum of \$1761 30, or nearly one-third of the required amount. In view of so satisfactory a result, your Comin un rid o annu remo Comin anxie

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Committee are of opinion that the effort should be persevered in until the object has been achieved and the fleating debt got rid of. The effect of doing so would be to at once reduce our annual obligations by nearly \$500, and at the same time remove a most burdensome load from the shoulders of your Committee, and relieve them from their greatest source of anxiety and responsibility.

It is from the money derived from the above source that the \$314 30 before alluded to has been received, and being in the nature of a contribution for a specific object, cannot be diverted therefrom, and must therefore remain a debt against the congregation,

We have thus shown as explicitly as possible:-

1st. Our present financial condition.

2nd. The requirements of the coming year, and

3rd. The condition of our floating debt.

Your Committee cannot close this report without adverting to a matter of vital importance to our present state and future prospects, which forms one of our strongest grounds of confidence in the future welfare and prosperity of our We refer to what in our last report was stated to be our greatest want—the want of a Pastor to fill our then vacant Pulpit. That want has now been supplied, and we have reason to rejoice that in the good Providence of God it has been so, so worthily. Every cloud has its silver lining, and in this our dark day, this fact is to us our gleam of hope, our guarantee of brighter days yet to come. In our Pastor, Mr. Farries, we recognise one, who in the brief period of his sojourn amongst us, has already found his way to the hearts of our people—one in whom we have confidence as a faithful and zealous servant of our Lord and master, and whose ministrations have already been productive of important results. In view of results already achieved since his arrival amongst us, we have faith and hope of greater things in the future.

That these hopes may be realized, and that in the future,
