WALL STREET IS UNSTEADY LOCAL MARKET STAGNANT

New York Shows Signs of Easing Off—Twin City Only Weak Issue Locally.

World Office, Wednesday Evening, May 5. Despite the list of transactions at the Toronto Stock Exchange it is still contended by brokers that there is practically a stagnation on this market. Prices in the main today were firm, but the inactivity of the market was the one and only feature.

Nothing in the dealings called for anything more than the passing reference. Such transactions as developed were made at fractional reductions from quotations of yesterday.

The only weak issue in the speculative end of the market was Twin City, which continues to act in a heavy manner and was offered at the close today at 103 without bids, although it sold during the morning session as high as 108 3/4.

No one seems to have any opinion on the market, but traders are hopeful that a favorable turn in prices and a stimulus will develop when less attention is paid to the bigger market at New York.

The Twin City report shows gross earnings for March of \$541,936, an increase over March, 1908, of \$7,314. Operating expenses, however, increased some \$27,000, and the net for the month is \$524,936, an increase of \$30,314. The gross for the three months of the year is \$1,550,698, an increase of \$142,860 over the same period last year, and the net \$1,171,722, an increase of \$67,000.

Involvement in the Dominion of Canada during April, as reported by R. G. Dun & Co., were 102 in number and \$46,192 in amount of defaulted indebtedness. This statement makes a favorable comparison with the 116 failures for \$119,981 in the same month last year, and the total liabilities were also smaller than in 1907, although in number defaults were somewhat heavier.
