SAY THEY CAN PROVE THAT "INNER CIRCLE" OF MINERS CONCEIVED MANY MURDERS

This is the Prosecution's Contention in the Haywood Murder Trial---Haywood Clique Countenanced Assassination and Even Planned it---Startling Revelations Expected at Trial

BOISE, Idaho, June 4.—The trial of Wm. Haywood, secretary and treasurer of the Western Federation of Miners, charged with the murder of Frank Steenberg, former governor of the state of Idaho, commences in earnest this morning, when at 9:30 o'clock James H. Hayley, leading counsel for the prosecution makes his opening address to the jury, sworn in yesterday to try what is probably the most important case brought into a court in this country. The charge will be that Haywood, one of the high officials of a powerful labor organization having been given authority by the members to use his office and the funds of the Western Federation to promote its interests purely as a labor organization...

RAILWAY PASSAGES IN COUNTY COURT

Daniel Mullin and Judge Forbes Made it Interesting at This Morning's Hearing of the Golding-London Case --- The Case Unfinished.

A sharp passage-of-arms between Judge Forbes and Daniel Mullin, a number of lively tilts between Mr. Mullin and Policeman Crawford and a generally warm session marked today's proceedings in the highway robbery case against Joseph London and William Golding. In taking Crawford's evidence and during his address to the jury Mr. Mullin referred sarcastically to the officer as a "Heavenborn detective," a coming man and an embryo detective, and expressed little or no confidence in his statements or those of Beckwith. For Deputy Chief Justice, however, he had only good words, and referred to the official as a credit to the police force and to the city. Judge Forbes, expressed wonder at the number of idle men who had no better employment than to come to court as spectators and towards the hour of adjournment said he wished the constables would do their duty and keep order in the court by putting out a man who had committed some misdemeanor. "That man leaning over the rail" said his honor, and the guilty party walked out of court. Mr. Mullin acting for London, addressed the jury and Mr. Mullin, Golding's counsel had not concluded when court adjourned till 2 o'clock. Wm. Golding was recalled and stated on the night before his arrest Policeman Crawford saw him at Clancy's house on St. Patrick street. Mrs. Alfred Whitehead

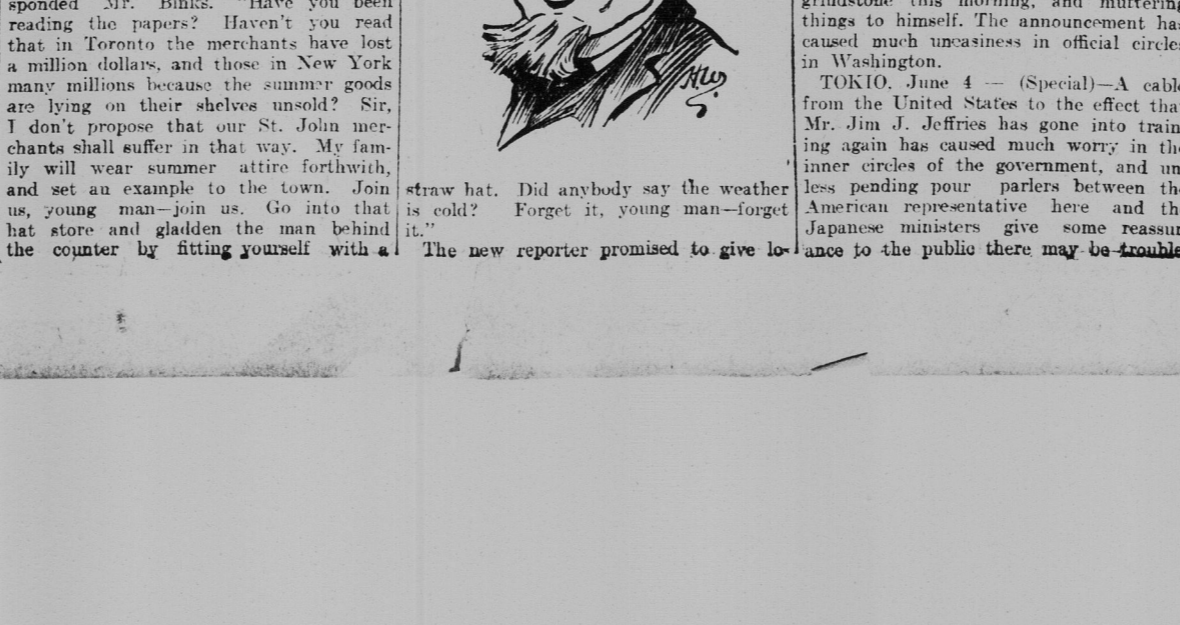

FLOUR IS HIGHER

Price May Go To \$6.00 Here Before Fall.

A recent issue of a Boston paper states that the price of flour in that city jumped \$1 a barrel in the month of May. The retail price is given as \$6.25 with retail \$7.25. In the course of the article the statement is made that a rise of one cent a bushel on wheat means about ten cents on a barrel of flour.

One of the local dealers was shown the article yesterday. Commenting on it he said that the profit of \$1 between the retail and jobbing price is just about double what is made here. He also said that an advance of one cent in wheat will make a barrel of flour, he said, and that means only five cents.

Concerning the rise that has taken place in the price of flour here, he said that during May Ontarios went up forty cents and Manobas from fifty to seventy cents a barrel. It is likely enough, he added, that Ontario flour will go higher, although no official announcement of any change is yet to hand. He would not be greatly surprised to see flour selling at \$6 here before fall but it all depended on the price of wheat and there were so many factors that went into the determination of that, that it would be rash to speculate on it.

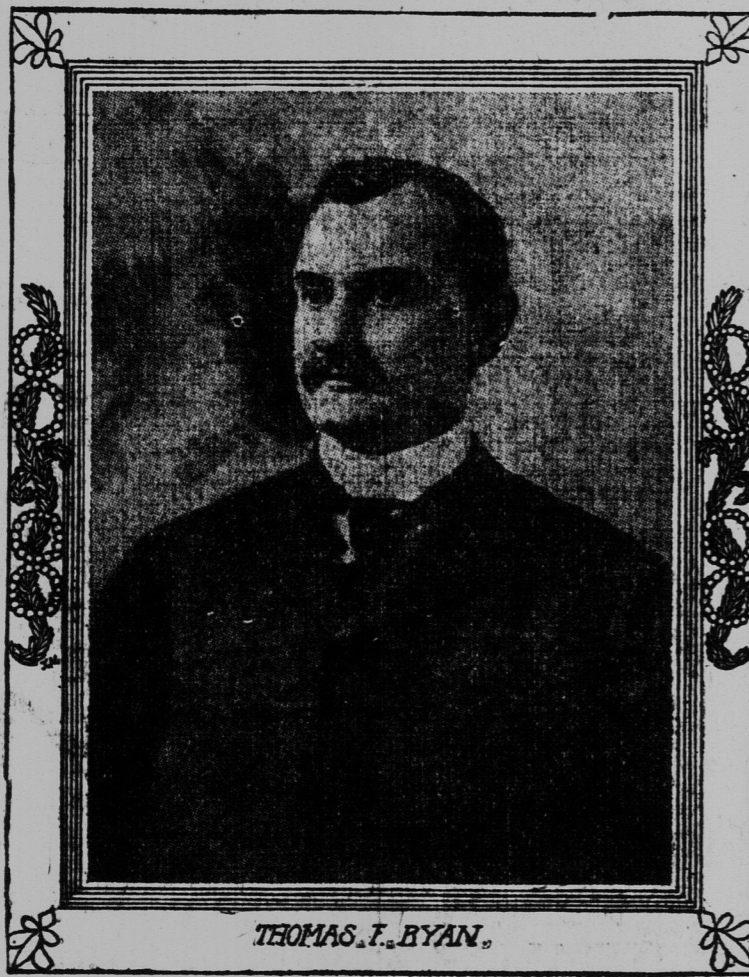

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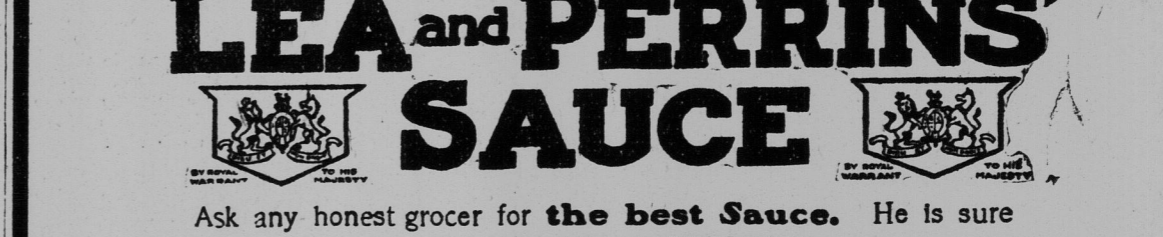

TRANSPORTATION IS THE GREAT CANADIAN PROBLEM

"Ralph Connor" Addresses the Canadian Club on Canadian Ideals—First is Devotion to Self Development, Second is Unity.

The address of Rev. C. W. Gordon (Ralph Connor) before the St. John Canadian Club Monday afternoon drew the largest number which has yet attended the luncheons of the club.

The first ideal for Canada should be a devotion to self-development. This at the first glance might seem a selfish suggestion, but the first duty of any organization or organization was to care for itself, else it could not fly serve any altruistic purpose.

"There should be on this coast a very large and well equipped harbor. I don't know where it is. Probably you do. I understand that you have everything but the harbor."

In the growth of trade the figures were equally encouraging. From 1893 to 1898 the increase in the volume of trade in Canada was \$33,000,000. Since 1893, in fourteen years, the increase has been \$89,000,000.

Closely associated with the shipping business is the fact concerning the shipping engaged in Canadian trade was \$9,000,000 and the tonnage 81,000 tons.

"Why do I expect so much from the waterways of Canada? We are entirely thoroughly and utterly dissatisfied with the railroads. It is not because they are not managed properly nor because of officials at the head are inefficient. It is because they have bitten off more than they can chew.

"This is a question of far greater magnitude than anyone thinks of. I know that the railroad officials are big men but they look at the question from the windows of the railroad offices. I look at the question from the windows of growing Canada and do not care a fig for T. P. or the C. N. R.

"Imperial federation is largely a question of transportation. At the colonial conference I believe the representative from Canada put his finger exactly on the spot. You may have been as disappointed at first as I was at the want of an imperial note in the claims of our prime minister, but I believe from further consideration and study of conditions that he had his finger on the right spot.
