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MINUTES

OF THE

TORONTO CONFERENCE,

Held in the Bridge St. Methodist Church, Belleville,

JUNE 9th to JUNE 16th, 1880.

The Seventh Session of the Toronto Annual Conference was opened in the Bridge St. Church, Belleville, on Wednesday morning, the 9th of June, 1880, at 9 o'clock. The President, the Rev. John Shaw, in the chair. The 478th hymn was sung. The Secretary, the Rev. Thomas S. Keough, read the 4th Chapter of the 1st Epistle to the Corinthians; and the Revs. Dr. Harper and D. C. McDowell led the Conference in prayer.

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The President called the roll, and 170 members answered to their names.

The ballot for President resulted in the election of the Rev. Nicholas Ramsay Willoughby, M.A., who briefly addressed the Conference in acknowledgment of the honour conferred upon him.

The Rev. Samuel James Hunter was elected Secretary.

On nomination of the Secretary, the Revs. W. H. LAIRD and GEORGE BROWN were appointed Assistant-Secretaries, and the Rev. John S. Clarke, Journal Secretary.

On motion, the Conference re-affirmed the resolution of 1876, to elect by ballot a Committee of five to nominate the several Conference Committees not otherwise provided for. The following brethren were elected:—Rev. J. G. Laird, Rev. John Leardyd, Rev. Dr. Dewart, Rev. Dr. Potts, and Rev. J. E. Betts.

The Conference Prayer-Meeting was held as usual from 12 to 1 o'clock.

QUESTION.-Who have Died since last Conference?

1.—Rev. Thomas Derrick.

Bro. Derrick was a native of Cornwall, England; was early in life converted to God, and laboured in England as a local preacher for several years. He was a man of more than ordinary ability, possessed great powers of adaptation, had an aptness which almost approached to genuine wit, and was an excellent judge of human nature. His social qualities were superior; his sympathies were very strong; he was remarkably taking with strangers, which always gave him the advantage of a good start on a new circuit. His piety was cheerful and uniform. As a preacher he had an excellent voice, a remarkable verbal memory, was fluent and diffuse in style, and inclined to be poetic. He possessed an orderly mind; hence his sermons were clear and simple in their arrangement. His religion was broadly human, yet he ever carefully distinguished between the cos-

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mopolitan in creed and the cosmopolitan in charity; hence he was truly loyal to Scripture truth and earnest in his opposition to sophistical and prevalent error. He was a decided believer in the doctrines of Scripture as held by the Methodist Church, and fully and earnestly enforced these in his pulpit ministrations. He was perhaps even better as a platform speaker than as a preacher. Brother Derrick began his ministry in Canada in the year 1857. circuits were Danville, Actonvale, Leslieville, Montreal, Kingston, Hamilton, Cariboo, Nanaimo, Victoria, Burrard Inlet, and New Westminster. On account of failing health, he found it necessary to resign his charge at New Westminster. He sojourned in California for the benefit of his health during the past winter, where he formed many valued friendships. In the order of Divine Providence it fell to the lot of those new friends in a strange land to fulfil the last sad offices which it is in the power of human friends to minister. From the "California Christian Advocate" we glean the following particulars respecting our departed brother: On the 29th of March he started for the East, by the Overland route from Oakland, Cal., in company with the Rev. Dr. Guard and family. This was his last day on earth. He had been unwell for a few days, but his physician advised him to go, as his arrangements had been made to do so. He was better when he took the train, and ate a little lunch in the cars before reaching Sacramento. He was alone when he died, at a point somewhere between Sacramento and Rocklin, on the Central Pacific Railway. He passed away evidently in a moment and without a struggle. "He was not, for God took him." Christ said to His aged servant, "To day shalt thou be with me in paradise." His remains were sent back to Sacramento, in care of

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Mr. W. Guard, son of the Rev. Dr. Guard, and interred by Rev. Dr. Bentley, Methodist minister of Sacramento, on the afternoon of Wednesday, March 31st, 1880, in the presence of as many of the members of that place as could be got together at short notice, in the cemetery lot of the California Conference, between the graves of Rev. Elijah Merchant and Rev. Nathan N. Van Eaton. The minister officiating delivered a few remarks based upon a sketch of a sermon found upon his person, from Heb. vii. 25. "Thus died," says Dr. Bentley, "an honoured minister of the Gospel, aged sixty-five years; buried in a strange land by strangers, but borne to his final home methinks by the angels of God."

2.—REV. WILLIAM IRWIN.

The Rev. William Irwin was born at Fannybrook, County of Sligo, Ireland, September 15th, 1836. He was brought to Canada when a lad. The family settled in Artemesia, where, in his 20th year, he found the Saviour, under the ministry of the Rev. John L. Kerr. The year following his conversion he was put upon probation as a candidate for the ministry of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of Canada. Four years subsequently, having "obtained a good report" from the Circuits on which he laboured, he was received into full connexion and ordained.

In 1861, the year of his ordination, he married a Miss James, whose decease in 1875 marks the epoch of his failed health. This year he was compelled to ask the relation of a Superannuate, which he received from the Conference held at Picton.

Bro. Irwin hoped that a temporary rest would give occasion to a return of health. "Man proposes, God disposes."

The Master saw fit to disappoint this hope. For four years he lived dyingly, sinking gradually, slowly, surely into the grave; and on the 9th of October, 1879, in the forty-fourth year of his age, and twenty-third of his ministry, "he was not, for God took him."

Bro. Irwin possessed more than the average of physical and mental endowmen's and culture. A tall, well-proportioned body; honest, open countenance; a face beaming with good nature and intelligent and Christian manhood; a voice strong, clear and musical. In the pulpit and on the platform flashes of eloquence were not with him uncommon. As a preacher he was a workman who needed not to be ashamed. God gave him numerous seals to his ministry; many are the spiritual children who bless God for his labours. He was ever welcome to the homes of the people of the flocks over which the Holy Ghost made him an overseer. His pastorate was a benediction, God giving him the tongue of the learned to know how to speak a word in season to him that was weary. His name and memory are to-day, and long shall be, a hallowing influence. Death found him not expecting it, but prepared to depart and be with Christ. To his pastor, on the last day of his life on earth, he spoke hopefully and assuringly of the outlook, calmly, confidently trusting in Christ-no doubts, "I have," said he, "the best preparation possible to me." His end was peace.

3.—JONATHAN SCOTT.

Jonathan Scott was born in Nottingham, England, May 5th, 1803, and departed this life in Brampton, May 5th, 1880, aged 77, the day of his death coinciding with the day of his birth.

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He was converted to God in Chesterfield in 1816, receiving his trial ticket in September from the Rev. T. Ingham. His ticket for March, 1834, is endorsed "the last in England." In that year, in company with five other excellent candidates, he came to this country soon after the close of the Conference at which the union with the English Conference was consummated.

He was sent to Grape Island, and at the end of the year to the region of Lake Simcoe and Barrie, where he laboured with untiring industry and considerable success for the next four years. On his way to the remote Goderich Mission, in 1839, he was met by Connexional authorities and required to fill the editorial chair of the Guardian in the absence of its vigorous editor, the Rev. Egerton Ryerson. In 1840 and the three following years he was elected Editor; and on a subsequent re-election to that office he declined the honour.

In 1844 he returned to Circuit work, which he prosecuted for ten years with his usual fidelity and diligence and success.

In 1854, in consequence of Mrs. Scott's enfeebled health, he asked for and received a Supernumerary relation to the Conference. While sustaining this relation, he for seven years served the Church in the Mission Rooms in Toronto, and of this period, the Rev. Dr. Wood says, "He was faithful and punctual, preaching nearly every Sabbath while his strength allowed."

Though Bro. Scott's main strength consisted in his abilities as a writer, yet in the pulpit, and especially on the platform, he displayed real eloquence in his treatment and exhibition of his themes. As a pastor, in house-to-house visitation he delighted and excelled, even doing a great

deal of this work voluntarily while filling the editorial chair.

For the last ten years he resided in Brampton, more than one-half of which time he was unable to attend the house of God, and for the last two years to leave his own house. He gradually grew weaker, until for some weeks before his death he was unable to leave his bed. But his end was peace. When failing powers caused him to forget almost all beside, he remembered Christ, the Saviour of his youth, and in quiet, unfaltering trust in Him he fell asleep in the Lord.

4.--WILLIAM McCullough.

Bro. McCullough was born in Ireland, in the British army, January 16th, 1814, and was converted to God in December, 1825, in Lurgan, county of Armagh, under the ministry of the Rev. John Armstrong, and shortly afterwards was appointed class leader. In April, 1833, he was married to Miss Eliza Stinson, who had been converted at the same time. While he was yet young, those religious principles were implanted in his heart which so fully governed him in after-life. In 1834 he left his native land, and, with her who is now his sorrowing widow, emigrated to Canada. He resided for some time at Point Fortune, on the banks of the Ottawa. Having no acquaintance with agricultural, commercial, or artistic pursuits, but having obtained a respectable English education, with some knowledge of classics, he opened a select school. In 1838 he was licensed to preach, and shortly after removed to Bytown, now the city of Ottawa, and engaged in teaching. Here he was exceedingly useful both as a teacher and local preacher. After going through the toils of his school duties during the

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week, he would walk several miles on a Sabbath morning to conduct religious services where they were needed. In 1839 he was recommended by the Quarterly Meeting of the Bytown Station to the District Meeting, as a candidate for the itinerant work, and by the District Meeting to the Confer-He was put upon the list of reserve, so that if his services were required a Chairman might employ him. The late Henry Wilkinson was at that time Chairman of the Brockville District; and as the north part of the old Augusta Circuit had been set off for a separate Circuit with Kemptville as the head of it, he gladly took Brother Mc-Cullough, giving him charge, as he had to work the ground alone. Our brother, without delay, removed his family to Kemptville, not knowing anything about the remuneration to be given, but trusting entirely to the kindness of the people for their support. In those days the Connexional funds were not sufficient to afford assistance to such places as Kemptville; however, the Master, who has said the labourer is worthy of his hire, mercifully crowned our brother's labours with great success. A blessed revival of religion spread over the whole Circuit, so that the membership increased very greatly; and as their hearts warmed with gratitude to God for sending them a man so eminently successful, the supplies for his family were ample. In 1842, as the work in the town of Belleville required some special attention, Brother McCullough was selected as the one most likely to meet the case. For this he was ordained before his probation had expired, and the result of his labours proved the wisdom of the choice. After staying the full disciplinary term, he was sent to Cobourg, then in succession to Peterboro', Picton, Port Hope, Woodstock, and was Chairman of the Brantford District, besides being for one year agent for Vic-

toria College; then St. Catharines, St. Thomas, Napanee, Bradford, Newcastle, Oakville, Markham, and Colborne, where he obtained a superannuated relation; but for two years in this relation he supplied a small congregation at Graf-The following year he took charge of Plainville, where he finished his course September 19th, 1879, retaining an unshaken confidence in the mercy of God manifested in Christ Jesus. As a preacher, our brother was thoroughly sound and Wesleyan, declaring the well-understood doctrines of our Church, and these alone. He had a vigorous mind, a sound judgment, good perceptive faculties, a most tenacious memory, and was withal a most voracious reader; had good literary taste, as may be seen by his contributions to the Methodist Magazine. The pulpit to him was a holy place, and all the duties of the ministry were pleasurable. He loved to preach. On the platform he was at home and His pastoral duties were punctually and faithfully performed. The truth is, our brother was a man of more than ordinary ability; and he used that ability faithfully in building up the Church and bringing souls to Christ. None of his circuits were cultivated without more or less fruit, so that doubtless his crown is not a starless one. many already in the house of many mansions who will acknowledge him as the God-honoured instrument of their salvation. With these we have good reason for believing he is now exultingly singing, "Unto Him who hath loved us and washed us from our sins in His own blood, unto Him be glory and dominion forever. Amen."

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QUESTION.—How are the Ministers and Preachers Stationed for the ensuing year?

ANSWER :-

NICHOLAS RAMSAY WILLOUGHBY, M.A., PRESIDENT OF CONFERENCE.

4.—REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON APPOINTMENT OF DELEGATES TO ŒCUMENICAL COUNCIL.

The Committee on the Appointment of Delegates to the proposed Œcumenical Conference report as follows:—

1. That in view of the fact that the Toronto Conference embraces within its bounds the officials of several important departments of our Church work, we recommend that at least four delegates should be allotted to the Toronto Conference, making the representation as follows: Toronto, 4; London, 3; Montreal, 2; and the Maritime Conferences, 3.

2. That in view of the difficulty of making these appointments satisfactorily in the proposed united Committee of the three Western Conferences, this Committee recommends that four delegates to the Œcumenical Conference, three ministers and one layman, be now elected by ballot in this Conference, with the understanding that if only three delegates should be ultimately allotted to our Conference, then the three candidates having the highest number of votes-provided they have a majority—shall be the delegates appointed by this Conference; and that the two candidates having the next highest number of votes to the delegates elected shall be alternate delegates, who may take the place of any delegates who may be unable to attend the Conference. same manner, the layman having the second highest number of votes shall be an alternate, in case the layman elected cannot attend.

3. That a Committee of five be now appointed to consider the matter of expense, and report to our next Conference.

6.—REPORT OF THE MEMORIAL COMMITTEE.

Your Committee beg to report as follows:—

ON CATECHETICAL INSTRUCTION.

In regard to the Memorial from the Whitby District, respecting the thorough instruction of the children and youth of our Sabbath-Schools in the catechisms of the Church, this Committee considers that the subject is one of vast importance, and most intimately related to all the essential interests of the Church, both for the present and for the future. While recognizing the fact that the provisions of the Discipline are sufficiently explicit on this head, and that reiterated recommendations of Conference, that the Disciplinary requirements should be more thoroughly carried out, are almost annually made, yet it is matter of deep regret that we are very far indeed from having our Sabbath-School scholars very generally and adequately instructed in the doctrinal teaching of our excellent Catechisms, there not being 20 per cent. of the scholars of our schools learning the Catechism: It is therefore resolved, that we recommend to the Conference that a closer and more thorough inquiry, if possible, be made into this matter, in all our District Meetings each year, and that the subject be earnestly pressed upon the attention of our people generally through, the medium of the Pastoral Address of the present year.

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AN ADDITIONAL SUSTENTATION FUND.

With respect to the Memorial relating to the formation of a new Auxiliary Sustentation Fund for assisting to pay the salaries of ministers, so that each might receive the minimum allowance as provided by the General Conference, this Committee does not see its way to recommend the formation of any new Fund for this purpose, but recommends that, as far as possible, the utmost efforts shall be made by all superintendent ministers and their colleagues to increase the contributions to the Contingent Fund, that thereby larger grants to weak Circuits may be made available.

MEMORIAL RESPECTING REV. R. CLARKE.

In reference to the Memorial from Mr. Wm. Anglin, in relation to the investigation of the action of the Church Courts respecting a dispute between that gentleman and the Rev. Richard Clarke, your Committee recommends that as no official record appears in regard to this matter on the District Book, and as the Discipline requires that all such cases shall be adjudicated upon in the District, and referred to the District Meeting, we recommend that it be reported back to the Bradford District.

PUBLISHING THE SALARIES OF MINISTERS.

Respecting the Memorial from the Lindsay District requesting the Conference to authorize the publication in the Minutes of the amount paid by each Station, Circuit and Mission, for ministerial support, your Committee recommend that the Conference authorize this printed annual statement, and that the Schedules be so arranged that this statement may appear in the Minutes under the following headings:—Total appropriation for Minister or Preacher from the Circuit, including the items salary, board and fuel, horse-keep, house rent, allowance from the Contingent Fund, Mission Fund, Children's Fund, total received, and total deficiency.

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7.—REPORT OF THE SABBATH SCHOOL COM-MITTEE.

Your Committee have much pleasure to state that there are some evidences of improvement in the matters which have passed under their review. There is an increase of 14 Schools and nearly 2,000 scholars. There is also an increase of 285 in the number of conversions reported, there being 1,635 of these. Of the number meeting in class there is also an increase of 564; but there is one matter which has astonished your Committee in this connection, that there should be 549 fewer children learning the Catechism than were reported doing so last year. Your Committee, however, think that in all probability the number reported is hardly correct, inasmuch as there are a few questions taken from the Catechism and inserted in each Lesson in the Berean Leaves, which your Committee is glad to find has a large circulation in our schools, there being 12,476 reported. We are told that the Book Room sells 55,000 of these Lesson Leaves every month, and that in respect to Sabbath-school periodicals alone there has been issued the enormous sum of more than nine million pages, or 30,000 pages for every working day in the year. Still, however, your Committee cannot but express their fear that our excellent Catechism is not in that general use which its importance demands. They have examined the Reports very carefully on this subject, and they regret to find that in some of the largest Schools in what are regarded as leading Circuits no mention is made of the Catechism being taught. Under these circumstances, your Committee most emphatically

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reiterate the recommendation of former years, that the Ministers in their various Circuits would take this matter in hand, and by every means in their power seek to get the Catechisms of our Church into more general use. These are no times for laxity in teaching Christian doctrines. Your Committee are glad to observe that there is a slight increase in the amount of the collection taken in the Schools for the General Sunday-school Fund, but again they have to complain that some important Circuits have neglected to make the collection. Your Committee would remind the delinquents that the said collection is a General Conference appointment, and they, at least, regard it as imperative as that of any other in the list of Conference collections. Your Committee beg to recommend that the collection be taken in all our Schools in the month of September, and that this date be published in the Minutes. That it may be better attended to in future, your Committee have requested the Secretary to write an article for - the Christian Guardian, stating the purpose for which such collection is made.

With a view to bring the Sabbath-school into more close connection with the Church, your Committee beg to recommend that the Ministers should occasionally substitute a Children's service for the regular preaching service. They would also very respectfully recommend the Ministers to favour the formation of Temperance Societies in all our Schools, or at least get as many of the children as possible to sign a pledge against using any intoxicating drinks, and tobacco in every form.

Your Committee are glad to learn that the demand for the

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books which are contained in the Winnowed List has been very great, but still there is reason to fear that the circulation of light, trashy literature is also very great, and therefore every possible means should be used to stamp it out of existence.

Your Committee further suggest, that with a view to increase the efficiency of Sabbath-school Teachers, there should not only be the weekly meeting for the study of the lesson, but that also Normal Classes, on the plan recommended by Dr. Vincent, should be formed in every central locality.

Lastly, your Committee recommend the re-appointment of Rev. E. Barrass, M.A., as Secretary-Treasurer.

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8.—REPORT OF THE DIRECTORS OF THE ONTARIO LADIES' COLLEGE, WHITBY.

The Report of the Directors of Ontario Ladies' College was read by the Secretary. The Report was adopted, on motion by Rev. Dr. Dewart, seconded by Rev. Dr. Nelles.

The Directors of the Ontario Ladies' College have much pleasure in submitting their Sixth Annual Report, and feel highly gratified in being able to state that the past year has been one of the most successful since the opening of the institution. The important change made last year by the appointment of the Rev. J. J. Hare, M.A., as Governor and Principal, has proved entirely satisfactory, and has resulted in the increased efficiency of the management of the institution. We therefore request his re-appointment as Governor for the coming year. The unity of thought and feeling which has existed throughout the year; the gradual increase in the attendance of boarders, which now number seventy-six, being a slight increase over the attendance at the close of any preceding year; the numerous testimonials from parents and others as to the superior educational advantages, and pleasant, healthful surroundings of our College; the strong and enthusiastic determination on the part of all identified with the College to make it worthy of the Methodist Church and the Province of Ontario; —all lead us to believe that there is in store for Ontario Ladies' College a bright and prosperous future. We are pleased to report that we have engaged the services of Miss Adams, of Brookhurst, Cobourg, as Head Governess, who has been so long and favourably known in this country for her work in higher female education.

After six years of faithful effort, we believe that we have succeeded in placing this College, as an institution for the moral and intellectual training of young ladies, on a basis second to none in the Dominion; and we feel that we can justly claim for the coming year the cordial sympathy and hearty co-operation of every member of this Conference.

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We expect your practical aid and encouragement because of the superior facilities which we offer for thorough educational work, and because of the position occupied by several members of this Conference on our governing Board. Having invested a large amount of capital in securing buildings and grounds unrivalled in Canada for excellence and comfort, having ample accommodation for one hundred and twentyfive boarders, and having a staff of teachers in whom the Conference should have confidence, we ask that a united effort be made this year to greatly increase the attendance of pupils.

9.—REPORT OF VISIT TO THE ONTARIO LADIES' COLLEGE, WHITBY.

On Friday, the 21st of May, I had the pleasure of visiting the Ontario Ladies' College, Whitby. I made a somewhat thorough inspection of the institution, and attended examinations of a large number of classes—some ten or twelve. I was very greatly gratified with the evidences which I saw of the thoroughness of the instruction, and of the efficiency of management of the institution. The accomplished Principal conducts himself seven classes—a number too great in consideration of his other duties. I was greatly impressed with the special advantages offered-of which the students seemed fully to avail themselves-for the study of cotany, in the analysis of living specimens; of chemistry and physics, in the very complete apparatus for the elucidation of these subjects, and in the lectures of Prof. Haanel; of geology and physiology, in the excellent cabinet of fossils and of mounted specimens. The progress of the students in classics, mathematics, modern languages, the English branches, and the fine arts, was very remarkable—a fact

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which I attribute to the subdivision of the classes, and the greater attention which is thus bestowed on the individual students. The name and reputation of Mr. Torrington are a sufficient guarantee of the efficiency of the musical department.

The physical health of the students is admirably cared for by means of out-of-door calisthenic exercises. Of the 96 young ladies in attendance, 76 of whom are boarders, not one did not appear to be in the enjoyment of excellent health. I was glad to learn that three of the students purpose to go up to the intermediate examinations. I regret that no practical recognition is given by our system of public instruction to the high-class educational work which is done in our Ladies' Colleges; and would suggest that this Conference should memorialize the Minister of Education with a view to obtaining the official examination by the High School Inspectors of those institutions, and a practical recognition of the standing of successful students.

10.—REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CHURCH PROPERTY.

The Committee on Church Property met in the Bridge Street Methodist Church, Belleville, on Saturday, June 12th, 1880.

The Rev. Samuel Rose, D.D., was appointed Chairman, and the Rev. William Tomblin, Secretary.

The following cases were submitted to the consideration of the Committee, and, after due deliberation, they beg to report as follows:—

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TORONTO DISTRICT.

YONGE STREET NORTH CIRCUIT.—That the Trustees of the Richmond Hill Church be permitted to sell the old church property, and that the proceeds be applied towards liquidating the debt on the new property.

WHITBY DISTRICT.

PICKERING.—That permission be granted to the Trustees of the parsonage, on the Pickering Circuit, to sell a lot 28 x 54 feet, on the north-east corner of the parsonage property: the proceeds to be applied to pay the debt on the parsonage furniture.

NEWTONVILLE. —That permission be given to the Trustees of the Kendall congregation to sell the church known as the Methodist New Connexion Church, in the village of Kendall, reserving 24 feet on the north side of the lot. The proceeds, after paying the debt on the said church, to be applied on the improvement of the church now in use in Kendall.

COBOURG DISTRICT.

Colborne.—That the Trustees of the Colborne parsonage be permitted to dispose of the present parsonage, and to apply the funds in building or purchasing another.

CASTLETON.—That permission be given to the Trustees of the old Providence Church to sell the lot on which the said church stands, with a view of removing said church to a more eligible site.

BELLEVILLE DISTRICT.

THURLOW.—That the Trustees of Jones' School House be permitted to sell the property known by that name, and to apply the proceeds to the new brick church in that neighbourhood.

FRANKFORD.—That permission be granted to the Trustees of the old parsonage, in Frankford, to sell that property, and to devote the proceeds to the furnishing of the new parsonage.

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BRADFORD DISTRICT.

Schomberg have permission to exchange 14 feet in width, across said lot, for a lot farther south, 66 x 120 feet, on which to build a new church; also, to sell the remainder of the lot, with the old church. The proceeds to be applied to the building fund of the new church.

West Essa.—That permission be granted to sell the lot on which the Agnew's Church stood, consisting of a quarter of an acre. The proceeds to be applied to the erection of a church at Thompsonville.

SUTTON.—That permission be granted to the Trustees to sell the half acre in East Gwillimbury, from which the church, now at Mount Pleasant, was removed, and apply the proceeds to repairs of the church at Mount Pleasant.

CEDARDALE.—That the Trustees of the church at Cedardale be granted permission to sell said church, and pay the mortgage thereon; and to apply the balance to the erection of a church on a more eligible site.

BARRIE DISTRICT.

Penetanguishene.—That permission be granted to the Trustees of the Penetanguishene Church to sell the church lot at Penetanguishene, and apply the proceeds to the purchase of a suitable lot, and the erection thereon of a new and commodious church.

COLLINGWOOD DISTRICT.

Horning's Mills—That permission be given to the Trustees of the late New Connexion Church, at Lavender, to sell the said church and grounds, and apply the proceeds to burying ground purposes.

OWEN SOUND DISTRICT.

Chatsworth.—That the Trustees of the church known as "Totten's" be permitted to sell said church, and devote the proceeds to church purposes.

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WALKERTON DISTRICT.

Hanover.—That permission be granted to the Trustees of the Elmwood church lot to sell and convey the said church lot to the Stratford and Huron Railway Company, whose road, crossing the lot, has unfitted it for church purposes. The proceeds to be applied to the liquidation of the debt against said lot, and the balance to be applied towards purchasing another lot in Elmwood, or towards the erection of a new parsonage in Hanover, according to the discretion of the Trustee Board.

WINNIPEG DISTRICT.

HIGH BLUFF.—That the Trustees of High Bluff Church be granted permission to sell eight acres of the present church lot, and apply the proceeds to the liquidation of the debt on the parsonage.

11.—REPORT ON THE STATE OF THE WORK.

Your Committee find that the membership of the Church in this Conference has increased during the year by three hundred and sixty-eight. It becomes us to thank God for even a small advance. Yet, we feel that the fruits gathered are exceedingly limited compared with the vastly greater results which we ought to expect from the labours of so grand a host of workers, and such admirable and complete ecclesiastical organizations.

Numerous revivals of varied magnitude have occurred during the year; but retrogression has appeared at some points. We find it impossible to ascertain from the statistical returns what is the average attendance of our members at the class-meetings.

It gives us pleasure to report an increased number of conversions in our Sunday-schools, and the attendance of the scholars at class-meetings has been in excess of the former year.

It calls for thankfulness to the Lord, that the noble response to the appeal on behalf of the Relief and Extension movement has not injuriously affected the contributions to the ordinary Missionary Fund. Some of the other Connexional funds have, however, suffered diminution.

The returns in answer to the question, "What Churches and Parsonages have been built?" are extremely imperfect. We are aware, however, that very considerable energy has been displayed in this direction.

How far debts on Churches and Parsonages have been provided for, we have no information. But we have reason to know that financial burdens, in many cases, weigh down the energies and depress the spiritual life of our societies. And we would urge that more attention be paid to the directions laid down in the Discipline, page 123, paragraphs 397 and 398.

Taking a general view of the entire work, it appears to us that, with a view to greater efficiency and larger results in our work, an augmented comparative measure of importance should be attached to the ordinary ministrations of the Word, and prayer and praise; impressing upon our people, also, the urgent duty of abounding in prayer, both privately and in the prayer-meetings; also, exhorting our people that they may, with replenished spiritual life, constantly speak and live for Christ.

We would also suggest a recommendation that all our ministers preach, to some extent, every year, on the value and right use of the class-meeting, and endeavour to hold conferences on class-meetings within the Circuits.

We also think that it would serve the spiritual welfare of our Church if more attention were given to bring the children into the Church by early conversion and careful shepherdin

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chilhepherding, than to extraordinary revival efforts to procure their conversion after their attainment to more mature age.

We would also urge upon our ministers to give their special attention to increase the Superannuation and Contingent Funds.

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13.—REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

In the judgment of your Committee, the question of Prohibition is the most prominent phase of the Temperance work of to-day. To this end the various Temperance organizations are vigorously working; and to the furtherance of this enterprise many influential Churches have soleranly pledged themselves.

We heartily welcome the Scott Act as an instalment of this great principle, and view the attempt to destroy its force as unworthy of Canadian legislators; and we recognize with pleasure the noble independence of the Senate in rejecting this measure.

We rejoice that prominent members of the Cabinet are not ashamed to be publicly identified with Temperance organizations, and to take a noble stand as public advocates of prohibition.

We consider that the time has come when Methodist electors should carefully inquire into the principles of all candidates seeking their suffrages, in reference to this great question, before pledging their support; for every man interested in the Liquor Traffic, independent of party, will unite to prevent the consummation of the great end at which we aim. Eternal vigilance is the price of liberty.

The passage of a Beer Bill by the Legislature of Manitoba, thereby increasing the facilities for drunkenness, we regard as a public calamity. This Bill, though professedly intended to interdict drunkenness, we fear will rather increase the evil.

We recommend the formation of Temperance Societies in all our Sabbath-schools, and that a column be placed in our Schedules for the number of children who are members thereof.

We cordially welcome the introduction of one Temperance Lesson each quarter in the International Series of Lessons.

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We also recommend the preaching of a Temperance Sermon by each Minister of our Conference in the month of December.

We would recommend that all our Ministers give hearty support to all Temperance organizations, as aiming at the accomplishment of the same great end.

14.—REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE OF FIVE TO CONSIDER RESOLUTIONS NOT REFERRED TO OTHER COMMITTEES.

Respecting the request from the Algoma District, asking for the sum of \$300 to erect a church on the Bruce Mines Mission, the Committee beg to report that, while they sympathize with the people who belong to the above Mission in their efforts to build a church, the Conference has no funds at its disposal.

Anent the resolution from the same District asking for a transfer of the Japan Mission to the custody of the Methodist Episcopal Church of the United States, the Committee report that after the decided utterance of the last General Conference in favour of retaining the Mission, it would be inexpedient to agitate the question at the present time.

Concerning the Alderville Mission, on the Cobourg District, the Committee cannot recommend any change in its relation at present

In the case of the unsettled account between the Trustees of the Haliburton Church and Rev. J. R. Gibson, referred by the resolution of the Algoma District: as the Committee could not get any information, they are unable to report. They, however, state that the resolution of last year has not been carried out, and advise that the Chairman of the Lindsay District inquire into the matter and secure its adjustment at his earliest convenience.

COURSE OF STUDY

TO BE

PURSUED BY CANDIDATES FOR THE MINISTRY IN THE TORONTO CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST CHURCH OF CANADA.

Preliminary.—English Branches: English Grammar and Composition, Arithmetic, Geography, Ancient History (Schmitz'), Modern History (Collier's British Empire). Biblical History: New Testament History (Smith's). Theology: Wesley's Sermons, i. to lii.; Wesley on Christian Perfection.

The standard of qualification for young men recommended to be received into our Conferences as Probationers shall not be lower than fifty per cent. of the marks on the Preliminary Course of Study.

Any Candidate who may present a public school teacher's certificate of the second class, or a certificate of having passed a matriculation examination at any of our Universities, shall not be required to be examined on the English branches of the Preliminary Course; but he shall be required to pass an examination on the subjects of Biblical History and Theology—two and three, Preliminary Course—before the Examining Board of his Conference, or for the College at which he may be pursuing his studies.

First Year.—Biblical Introduction (Angus' Hand-book, Pt. i.); Biblical History (Smith's Old Testament History); Theology, (Fletcher's Checks, Chap. i. to v.)

Second Year.—Exegesis (Wesley's and Watson's Notes on Matthew; Wesley's and Whedon's Notes on John); Church History (Kurtz' History of the Church to the Reformation, Stevens' History of Methodism to the death of Wesley); Theology, (Watson's Institutes, Part ii., chap. i. to xvii.)

Third Year.—Exegesis (Wesley's and Whedon's Notes on Romans); Rhetoric (Whately's); Church History (Fisher's History of the Reformation); Theology (Watson's Institutes, Part ii., chap. xviii. to the end); Pearson on the Creed.

Fourth Year.—Theology (Watson's Institutes, Parts iii. and iv.); Apologetics (Hopkins' Evidence of Christianity; Garbett's

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Dogmatic Faith); Logic (Whately's); Metaphysics, Hamilton (Bowman's American Edition); Stewart's Active and Moral Powers; Discipline of the Methodist Church of Canada.

COURSE OF STUDY FOR GRADUATES IN ARTS.

Candidates who have proceeded to a degree in Arts, or who may do so prior to Ordination, shall pursue the following Course of Study:—

Preliminary.—Theology (Wesley's Sermons, i. to lii.; Wesley on Christian Perfection); Biblical History (Smith's New Testament).

First Year.—Biblical Introduction (Angus' Hand-book, Part i.); Theology, (Fletcher's Checks, i. to v.)

Second Year.—Biblical History (Smith's Old Testament); Theology (Garbett's Dogmatic Faith); Hopkins' Evidences of Christianity.

Third Year.—Exegesis (Gospels of Matthew and John in Greek; Wesley's, Watson's, and Whedon's Notes on Matthew and John); Church History (Kurtz' History of the Church to the Reformation); Theology (Watson's Institutes, Part ii, chaps. i. to xvii. inclusive, and Parts iii. and iv.)

Fourth Year.—Exegesis (Epistles to the Romans in Greek; Wesley and Whedon's Notes on Romans); Church History (Fisher's History of the Reformation; Stevens' History of Methodism to the death of Wesley); Theology (Watson's Institutes, Part ii., chap. xviii. to the end); Discipline of the Methodist Church of Canada.

COURSE OF STUDY FOR PROBATIONERS AT COLLEGE.

All Candidates on Probation, except Undergraduates in Arts, who are recognized by their Annual Conference as such, on being appointed to College, shall pursue the following Course of Study:—

First Year.—Systematic Theology; Exegesis; the Greek Language; Homiletical Studies; Rhetoric and the English Language; Logic; Church History; Hebrew, or Natural Science.

Second Year.—Systematic Theology; Exegesis of the New Testament in Greek; Homiletical Studies and Elocution; Metaphysics; Church History; Hebrew, or Natural Science.

Third Year.—Historical Theology; Exegesis of the New Testament in Greek; Homiletical Studies; Ethics and Evidences; Old Testament Exegesis, or Natural Science.

The option allowed in No. 5 each year shall be determined by the Faculty of Theology according to their judgment of the circumstances and ability of the student.

COURSE OF STUDY FOR CANDIDATES FOR THE GERMAN WORK.

All Candidates, before being recommended to the Conference to be received on trial, shall pass a satisfactory examination in the following subjects:—

Preliminary.—Elements of German Grammar; Nast's Larger Catechism; The Calverin Church History; The Discipline of the Methodist Church of Canada.

After admission on trial, they shall be examined each year during their probation as follows:—

First Year.—Jacoby's Compends of Doctrines and Scripture Proofs; Wesley's Sermons, Vol. i.; Hare on Justification; Kurtz' Sacred History; Webster's General History; Wurst's Grammar.

Second Year.—Wesley's Sermons, Vol. ii.; Wesley on Christian Perfection; Fletcher's Appeal; Saucer's Church History; Wurst's Grammar.

Third Year.—Nast's Introduction to the New Testament; Lisco's Exposition of the Creed; Nast's Wesley and his Coadjutors; Pearson on Infidelity; Ahn's First Course of English.

Fourth Year.—Warren's Logic; Luthard's Apologetics; Harless' Christian Ethics; Ahn's Second Course of English.

The Candidates shall present a written sermon each year on some subject embraced in the course of study.

The Board of Examiners shall meet the Probationers and Candidates for the Ministry in three sections, on the last Wednesday in April, 1881, at 9 o'clock a.m., as follows:—

THE EASTERN SECTION, comprising the Picton, Belleville, Cobourg and Peterborough Districts, in Trenton; the Revs. Wm. H. Laird and Samuel Sing attending the same.

THE CENTRAL SECTION, embracing the Lindsay, Whitby, Toronto, Brampton and Walkerton districts, in Weston; to be attended by the Revs. Dr. Hunter and Thomas A. Ferguson.

THE NORTHERN SECTION, including the Algoma, Collingwood, Bracebridge, Barrie, Owen Sound and Bradford districts, in Barrie; the Revs. John G. Laird and J. H. Starr attending the same.

The manuscript questions are to be placed in the Editor's hands not later than the first day of February next.

REGULATIONS RESPECTING CANDIDATES.

Before a Chairman or Superintendent shall propose a Candidate to the Conference to be admitted on probation, such Candidate must have been a member of our Church for one year, and a Local Preacher in good standing for six months, and approved and recommended by the Quarterly Official Meeting of the Circuit or Mission on which he resides. He must also pass a satisfactory written examination, and an oral examination such as the Examiners may deem necessary, on the subjects prescribed by the Conference as the Preliminary Course of Study.

No Candidate shall be recommended by any District Meeting to be received on trial for that year, who does not produce a certificate from the Examining Committee of the District to 1880

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which he belongs. But the cases of all young men on trial shall be reported to their respective District Meetings.

All recommendations of Candidates to be received on trial shall be made at the February Quarterly Official Meeting, and the Candidates recommended shall appear before the next meeting of the Examining Committee of the District to which they belong.

The District Meeting shall require the Superintendent of the Circuit, from which any young man is recommended to be received on trial, to give a written statement of his religious character, talents and usefulness, educational advantages and acquirements, employment and means of support, and such other particulars as the meeting may deem necessary; which statement shall be signed by him and recorded in the District Book.

If in any given year the number of Candidates recommended by the District Meetings shall be greater than the Stationing Committee deem it prudent to employ for that year, the Examining Board shall meet at Conference, and determine who are the most suitable to be employed in our Itinerant work, and who are to be placed on the List of Reserve; being governed by their own class lists and those of the District Meeting.

The District Meeting shall examine, as heretofore, all the Candidates in regard to their religious experience and belief of our doctrines, together with their general qualifications and suitability for our Itinerant work, and shall arrange them in three classes, according to the results of the Examination.

Nothing in our present Course of Study shall be understood to prevent a District Meeting, in special cases, from recommending a Candidate to the Conference for reception on trial, after examination by the Chairman, before the District Meeting, on the subject of the Preliminary Course of Study.

Moved by Rev. Dr. Hunter, seconded by Rev. D. C. McDowell:—

That the thanks of this Conference are due and are hereby presented to the Rev. T. S. Keough, for his faithful and efficient services as Secretary of Conference during the past year.

For the Official Sermon.

Moved by Rev. J. G. Laird, seconded by Rev. Dr. Potts: That the hearty thanks of this Conference be presented to the Rev. John Shaw, ex-President, for his very appropriate and instructive Official Sermon in connection with the Ordination Service last Sabbath.

To Dr. Ryerson.

Moved by Rev. Dr. Harper, seconded by Rev. Dr. Nelles: Whereas the Rev. Dr. Ryerson has kindly complied with the request of this Conference in the preparation of his admirable essays on the Epochs and Characterstics of Canadian Methodism, now in course of publication in the Canadian Monthly Magazine:

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Resolved,—That in our opinion the venerable Doctor has laid the whole Methodist Church under obligation by his exposition and defence of its principles and polity and the record of that historic struggle, in which he sustained so prominent a part, for our civil and religious rights, and that the thanks of this Conference are due and are hereby given him for the same.

Moved by Rev. John Hunt, seconded by Rev. W. H. Withrow, M. A.:—

That we desire to express our thankfulness to Almighty God that he has been graciously pleased to preserve the life and health of the venerable Egerton Ryerson, D.D., L L.D., and that he has been enabled to complete and publish his valuable and important work, "The History of the Loyalists of America,"—a work which at this time few men were competent to perform, and which we hereby commend, not only to our friends, both lay and ministerial, but also to all interested in the preservation of the history of our country, and we trust that he may still live to carry out other cherished literary projects.

To Dr. Jeffers.

Moved by Dr. Nelles, seconded by the Secretary of Conference:—

That we, the members of this Conference, having had the pleasure of hearing the Lecture by Rev. Dr. Jeffers, on the subject of Endless Punishment, cordially extend to him our hearty thanks therefor, and request him to publish it in pamphlet form for general circulation.

Dr. Jeffers promised to comply with the request.

To Belleville Mechanics' Institute.

The thanks of the Conference were sent to the Directors of the Belleville Mechanics' Institute for their invitation to visit the Institute and make use of the facilities which it afforded.

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To Families who entertained Ministers.

That the thanks of this Conference be given to the families who have entertained the members of this Conference. The Pastors are requested to intimate this from their pulpits next Sabbath, and publish it in the City papers.

To Railroad and Steamboat Companies.

That the thanks of this Conference be presented to the Railway and Steamboat Companies who have granted tickets of travel at reduced fares.

To the Bridge St. Church Choir.

That the thanks of this Conference be presented to the Choir of this Church for their valuable assistance at the services during Conference.

To the Conference Postmaster.

That the thanks of this Conference be presented to Mr. Henry Willoughby for his kind and efficient services as Postmaster during the Conference.

Greetings.

Fraternal and Christian greetings were exchanged by telegraph with the London and Montreal Conferences.

Special Resolutions.

General Conference Special Committee and the "Rights and Privileges of Annual Conferences."

Moved by Dr. Dewart, seconded by Dr. Hunter:

Whereas the Constitution of the Methodist Church of Canada, as accepted in good faith by the different bodies which united to form our present Church organization, provided that each Annual Conference should have the right to elect a representative to the Transfer Committee, in addition to the President of each Annual Conference:—

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Canada, th united hat each presentasident of And whereas the basis of union which became the Constitution of our Church, provided that any legislation of the General Conference which affected the rights and privileges of the Annual Conferences, should require to be passed by a two-thirds majority vote, and should not become law if it were disapproved by a majority of the Annual Conferences:—

And whereas the last General Conference adopted a measure which deprived the Annual Conferences of the privilege of electing a representative to the Transfer Committee, which they had previously possessed:—

And whereas this measure was not passed by the required two-thirds majority, and was disapproved by a majority of the Annual Conferences in 1879, which also duly elected their representatives to the Transfer Committee:—

And whereas the General Conference Special Committee, at a recent meeting, at which a bare quorum was present, assumed the right to review the acts of the said Annual Conferences, and declared the representatives elected by these Conferences illegally appointed; and the action of these Annual Conferences, in disapproving of the action of General Conference and appointing such representatives, illegal and invalid, thereby depriving the Annual Conferences of "rights and privileges" bestowed on these Conferences by the Constitution of the Church:—

Therefore, Resolved, I.—That we enter our emphatic protest against this action of the General Conference Special Committee, for the following reasons:—

I. Because we believe the General Conference Special Committee has exceeded the powers conferred upon it, in adjudicating upon a question at issue between the General Conference and the Annual Conferences.

2. Because this was not really a "question of law arising in the Annual Conferences," in the sense intended by the General Conference, in the clause on which the Conference Special Committee bases its authority to do what it has done.

3. Because, if the General Conference Special Committee had the authority which it claims, its decision directly contravenes the explicit law of the Discipline, which protects "the rights and privileges of the Annual Conferences," by requiring a two-thirds vote, and by giving these Annual Conferences a right of veto in all cases of legislation which affect those "rights and privileges."

II. Resolved,—That we view with deep regret and serious alarm this action of the Conference Special Committee, as overriding the provisions of the Discipline and the judgment of the Annual Conferences, tending to destroy corfidence in the validity of the provisions that are the basis of our present Church organization, and fraught with peril to the harmony and prosperity of our Church; and as we believe this action of the Conference Special Committee to be illegal and therefore invalid, that this Conference elect a representative to the Transfer Committee, in accordance with the unrepealed Constitution of the Church, and the expressed judgment and desire of a majority of the Annual Conference.

This resolution was carried by the Conference, and Dr. Ryerson gave notice that he would appeal against the action of the Conference to the next meeting of the General Conference Special Committee.

Sabbath Desecration.

Moved by Dr. Sutherland, seconded by Rev. W. J. Hewitt, and carried, that—

Whereas there seems to be a growing tendency to desecrate the Lord's Day by the running of street cars, pleasure boats, and railway trains for the carrying of passengers:—

And whereas the running of such street cars, boats, or trains, in connection with religious services, is used as an argument to justify their use for purposes of business or of pleasure:—

And whereas it is the bounden duty of Christians to "abstain from all appearance of evil;" therefore—

Resolved,—That we strongly disapprove of the use of street or railway trains or pleasure boats on the Lord's Day for any purpose whatsoever; and we most earnestly and affectionately exhort our people to discountenance such practices by every means in their power.

Scott Temperance Act.

Moved by Rev. E. Ryerson Young, seconded by Rev. Wm. Hunter, D.D.:

That whereas the Canada Temperance Act of 1878 declares, Section 57, as follows:—

In case more than one-half of all the votes polled are for the petition, the same shall be held to have been adopted; and the Returning Officer shall make his return to the Governor-General in Council accordingly:

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And whereas the following amendment to the above section received a majority of the votes in the recent session of the House of Commons—viz., that Section 57 of the said Canada Temperance Act is hereby repealed, and the following clause substituted therefor—"If a majority of the voters whose names are entered on the voters' list used at said polling vote for the adopting of the Bill, the same shall be held to have been adopted, but not otherwise, and the Returning Officer shall so make a return to the Governor General:"

And whereas we believe the effect of such amendment would be practically to frustrate the benevolent design of the said Act as originally passed:—

Therefore, Resolved,—I, That we, the Toronto Conference, in session in the City of Belleville, do hereby strongly disapprove of the aforesaid amendment; 2, That we hereby convey our hearty thanks to those members of the House of Commons who spoke and voted against said amendment; 3, That we cordially approve of the action of the Senate in restoring the original Section.

From the Senate of Victoria University.

I. The Senate of Victoria University desire to convey to the several Conferences, and to the Districts within their bounds, their sincere thanks for the establishing of the District Scholarships.

II. The Senate would respectfully suggest that each Scholarship hereafter be of the value of \$25, and that this be the uniform value throughout all the Districts.

III. That any District desiring to contribute more, must do so by establishing a second or third or fourth Scholarship of the value of \$25 each, and that the names of the Districts be announced in connection with the Scholarships when awarded by the Senate. Agreed to by the Conference.

Condolence to Dr. Wood.

Moved by the Rev. Dr. Ryerson, seconded by the Rev. Dr. Rice:

Whereas this Conference has learned with profound regret that on account of severe and protracted personal affliction, the Rev. Dr. Wood, the venerable Honorary Missionary Secretary of our Church, has felt obliged to ask for a superannuated relation:

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e for the and the General Resolved,—That we, as a Conference, desire to express our deep sympathy with our beloved brother in the circumstances which compel his retirement from that important department of our Church work, to which, for many years, he has given the best energies of his life.

We wish to place on record our deep sense of the great and lasting obligation under which the valuable labours, the wise counsels, and the administrative skill of Dr. Wood have laid our whole Church; and we pray that God may so restore the health of our brother as to enable him, for a much longer time, to lend the aid of his ripened wisdom and large experience to the missionary counsels of our Church; and that in the latest years of his life the consolations of God, and the holy hopes of that divine religion which he has so long and with such hallowed results preached to others, may abound more and more in his own soul.

Standing Resolutions.

Order of Connexional Collections.

The collections in aid of the Connexional Funds shall be taken up in the following order, viz.:

- 1. CONTINGENT FUND. In the months of September and March.
- 2. SUPERANNUATED MINISTERS' FUND.—In the month of October or November.
- 3. EDUCATIONAL FUND. In the month of February or April.
- 4. SABBATE SCHOOL FUND. In the month of September.
- 5. GENERAL CONFERENCE FUND. In the month of July.

Collections for Connexional Funds.

That it is the judgment of this Conference, that when collections for Connexional purposes are appointed to be taken in any of our churches, the whole of such collections throughout the day shall be appropriated to the respective Funds to which they are related, without any deduction for the Circuit, or any Trust or other Fund.

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Ministers Removing.

That in case of ministers removing, they shall be held responsible for the supply of the pulpit on their old Circuits two Sabbaths, and for the supply of the new the third Sabbath after the Conference.

Ordination Sermon.

That the Ordination Sermon be preached by the ex-President of Conference.

Application for Additional Preachers, and List of Reserves.

I. That in future no application or recommendation for the appointment of a young man, in addition to the Superintendent in any Circuit, shall be entertained by the Stationing Committee unless such application is accompanied by a distinct pledge from the Official Quarterly Meeting of such Circuit that, at the end of four years, they will receive a married man in place of such single man.

2. That the Chairmen of Districts are hereby instructed to bring before the Quarterly Official Meetings of Circuits on which a married and a single man have been stationed for the past four years, the necessity for making provision for two married men at the earliest practicable date.

3. That we recommend the formation by the President and Stationing Committee of a "List of Reserves," upon which shall be placed the names of all young men recommended for the ministry whose services are not imperatively required to supply the work.

4. That when young men are recommended for the work of the ministry, and are placed upon the "List of Reserves," it shall be distinctly understood that their probation shall not commence till they are appointed to a Circuit by the proper authorities.

Grade of Certificates of Probationers and Candidates.

That the District Meeting be required to include in their recommendations, concerning Probationers and Candidates, the average secured by them in their literary examinations, as well as the grade of their Certificates.

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Constitution of the Toronto Conference Missionary. Committee.

The Missionary Committee shall consist of the President and the Secretary of Conference, the Chairman of Districts, the General Secretaries, and the Lay Treasurer of the Society, and one layman from each District, to be appointed by the laymen at the May District Meeting.

Resolved,—That as the Constitution of the General Society makes no provision for the transmission of funds to the Head Office, it shall be an instruction to the Treasurer of the Committee to transmit promptly to the General Treasurers all contributions received by them.

PUBLIC SERVICES IN CONNECTION WITH THE SESSIONS OF CONFERENCE.

1.—TEMPERANCE MEETING.

The Annual Temperance Meeting was held in the Bridge Street Church on Tuesday evening, June 8th, 1880. The Rev. John Shaw presided. Addresses were delivered by the Revs. E. R. Young, Kennedy Creighton, John B. Armstrong, E. H. Dewart, D.D., and T. W. Casey, Esq.

2.—SACRAMENTAL SERVICE.

On Wednesday evening the Ministers of Conference and the members of the Church in Belleville partook together of the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper.

3.—EDUCATION.

The Conference Educational Meeting was held on Thursday evening, June 10th, the President in the chair. The Annual Report was read by Dr. Burwash. Stirring and thoughtful addresses were delivered by Rev. Prof. Reynar, Rev. Dr. Jeffers and Rev. Dr. Ryerson.

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4.—RECEPTION OF CANDIDATES FOR ORDINATION.

The Open Session of Conference for the reception into full connection with the Conference of the young brothren recommended for ordination, was held on Friday evening, June 11th, and proved to be one of the most interesting and profitable services which it was ever the privilege of the brethren to attend. After devotional exercises, the Secretary called the names of the candidates, viz.:—

After an appropriate address by the President, Brothers Sherin, Wilkinson, Dunlop, Barltrop, and Allen were called upon to relate their Christian experience and call to the ministry. The Nev. John Learoyd, in a speech of great earnestness and power, moved "That the young men whose names have been read by the Secretary, be now publicly received into full connection with this Conference." The Rev. Alexander Sutherland seconded the motion, and delivered a comprehensive, eloquent address. The resolution was adopted by a rising vote of the Conference. The young men were then affectionately and appropriately addressed by the venerable Dr. Ryerson, and the Session adjourned, the President pronouncing the benediction.

5.—ORDINATION SERVICE.

At the close of a deeply interesting Love Feast, the Ordination Service began, at 11 o'clock, Sabbath morning, June 13th. The official sermon was preached by the ex-President, Rev. John Shaw, from Gal. iv. 18—a discourse replete with wise counsels, and tender yet powerful appeals.

The Secretary presented the candidates for ordination, and the President, assisted by several senior ministers and the Chairmen of Districts, proceeded to ordain them ministers of the Methodist Church, according to the form prescribed by the Discipline.

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6.—MISSIONARY MEETING.

The Conference Missionary Meeting was held on Monday evening, June 14th, the Rev. the President presiding. The Rev. John McDougall, who was to leave the next morning for his home and work in the North-West, delivered an address of unusual interest and profit. The Rev. W. S. Griffin, ex-President of the London Conference, followed in his usual happy and entertaining way; and the Rev. F. W. Macdonald, of the British Weslyan Conference, closed with an address abounding in apt illustration, close incisive argument, and beautiful convincing thought.

7.—SUNDAY SCHOOL MEETING.

The Conference Sunday School Meeting was held on Tuesday evening, June 15th; the Rev. Dr. Potts presided. The Rev. E. Barrass, M.A., read the Conference Sunday School Report and delivered an admirable address. The Rev. W. H. Withrow, M.A., Editor of Sunday School periodicals, delighted and instructed the audience in a carefully prepared speech. The Revs. Dr. Nelles and Dr. Ryerson also delivered brief addresses.

8.—LECTURE BY DR. JEFFERS.

Though not on the Conference programme, it is fitting to note a lecture delivered, by request, by Dr. Jeffers, on Saturday evening, on "Endless Punishment." This question, occupying so large a share of public thought and attention, was handled by Dr. Jeffers in a masterly manner. For two hours he held the unbroken attention of a large and appreciative audience, and received at the close a hearty vote of thanks, with many commendatory expressions from several prominent ministers.

PASTORAL ADDRESS

OF THE

METHODIST CHURCH OF CANADA, TORONTO CONFERENCE,

TO THE

MEMBERS UNDER ITS CARE.

DEARLY BELOVED BRETHREN,-

Assembled as we are in our Annual Conference reviewing the mercies of the past, and looking forward to the duties that await us, our hearts and thoughts turn to you, our fellow-workes in the Master's vineyard, "brethren beloved and longed for, our joy and crown." For the manifold blessings of our past history we ask you to join us in devoutest gratitude to the Great Head of the Church. still sends gracious influences upon His Zion, "making them and the places round about a blessing." Our highest joy is to know that "God is with us," building up His people in their most holy faith, leading many of them onward to perfect and ever-deepening love, and crowning with success their efforts to save the perishing. He still gives the power to abide in Him, steadfast and unmovable, notwithstanding the scorn of blaspheming a heism, the temptations of business life, and the more insidious but more dangerous influences of earthliness, self-indulgence and ease. this we thank God on your behalf. Bearing you ever in our petitions to the mercy-seat, we pray that still He may "keep you from the evil," and may enable you "to know the love of Christ which passeth knowledge, that ye might

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be filled with all the fulness of God." The very small increase in membership will be a solemn call to earnest self-searching—to that intenser devotion, that complete and continual consecration, which ever secure the promised baptism of fire. This alone can make effective witnesse fors Christ, and be the guarantee of success.

We glorify God for the brotherly love which still binds us together. No alienation of feeling, but the most cordial unity, exists between ministry and laity. "Baptized by one Spirit into one Body," we rally together with united and growing loyalty to the study of the same truths, the extension of the same principles, the advancement of the same institutions; and these are the more precious as the heritage of heroic fathers, to which they gave their fervent and life-long devotion. To you as to us there is the one Infallible Standard in which we find so prominent those grand doctrines which occupy the eminent place in the teaching of our Methodistic fathers. These precious truths, we rejoice to say, are cherished with as ardent affection, proclaimed in their entirety with as strong emphasis, and owned by the Holy Ghost as powerfully as in the days of old. "Brethren, let us never fail to honour the Word. Let us not give long hours to business, politics or gossip, and say of the Word, or its exposition in the house of prayer, "What a weariness it is!" Let the mixed multitude who occasionally drift to a Christian service for the sake of gain or respectability, or criticism, declaim about the length of sermons, the dulness of prayers, and the number of services, but "let the Word of Christ dwell in you richly in all wisdom." Never in any age was there more need for that careful study which enables the true disciple "to give an answer to every man that asketh you a reason of the hope that is in you with meekness and fear."

Never was it more imperative that Christians should know how to be not "of the world," though in it In the daily contact with scoffers, doubters, or the multitude asleep in sin and forgetful of God, it is yours to manifest a manly integrity that never forgets the Golden Rule; that

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cannot swerve from right under any pressure or for any bribe; to show a kindly sympathy for the suffering, a longing desire for the salvation of all you can reach, and to give a humble, earnest testimony of personal joy and hope in Jesus that comes from a heart fully satisfied for itself. So shall ye be the "salt of the earth," the "light of the world," and multitudes who at first could not be impressed by your Bibles or your churches will be led to Christ.

Not by condoning, or sharing the absorbing amusements, the doubtful pleasures of the world, will you win their devotees to Christ." "Be filled with the Spirit;" then shall you show that you have found the truer joy. "Do all to the glory of God" is the one rule for you which is to guide in all all things, great and small. For you one joy transcends all other—to have, like Enoch, the testimony that

you please God.

Your love to God and your loyalty to Methodism has been shown by generous gifts from every part of the field to the Relief and Extension Fund, which now amounts to over \$112,000, of which over \$71,000 have been paid. That the crisis which has evoked this liberality may not occur again, and yet that our Missionary work may extend with growing rapidity, we ask your thoughtful co-operation in all plans of so arranging the work that we may have a greater number of independent circuits, and that double circuits may, by growth or re-arrangement provide for ministers with For a time some appointment may receive less attention from the minister, or be merged with others; but the development and employment of local talent will meet the necessity, and this agency has been, through all its history, one of the most efficient adjuncts of our system. And we trust that the spirit of benevolent zeal which has evoked this work; the spirit whose symbol is the ox standing be tween plough and altar, with "ready for either" as a motto; the spirit of unreserved consecration, prompting unceasing effort, may ever abide among us. Only then, and then most certainly, shall we spread "Scriptural holiness" over all this fair Dominion. Notwithstanding the general financial

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difficulties of the country, we rejoice to recognize in your support of the other funds of the Church a liberality which proves that as a people you are more and more fully realizing that of talent, time and property you are not owners but stewards only.

The salvation of our youth is, and ever must be, a foremost subject of concern and effort. How to train our Daniels, and Josephs, and Samuels, and Timothys, and Josiahs, that they may be godly from the earliest dawn of reponsibility to life's latest hour, even though torn early from the guardianship of home and exposed to constant temptations in their fiercest forms—than this, no question can be more important. Its solution mainly depends on your home-life. We rejoice to witness your growing co-operation in the work of Sabbath-schools and Bible-classes; to note the greater care in the selection of the most thoughtful and devoted as teachers; to see a more thorough preparation of the lessons, and to behold a more prevalent and ardent desire for the early dawning of the life of God in the souls of the scholars. Still, our chief anxiety is about the work and influence of the home.

Let the children see in you what they ought to be. to them in loving, personal persuasion, and rest not till you see that Christ is formed in their hearts. Let the Word speak to heart and conscience every day. Let the concise and accurate definitions and proofs of doctrine found in our Catechisms be taught, line upon line, by every parent and by every Sunday-school, till they are fixed in the memory, and shed their growing light upon the understanding. shall be a panoply against doubt and error. Let the memories of the home-life ever embrace the recollection of the grateful, trustful petitions of the family altar, and of those solemn experiences and feelings which it brings from on high. Only so can you hope to preserve them from the soul-destroying delusions of the age-from the vain amusements and corrupting principles which, like so many Upas trees, shed a quiet but killing influence on all who wander beneath their deadly shade. Have a watchful eye upon the books and

papers which enter your home. Let not one that tends to oppose the principles of God's Word be tolerated on any account. Sin is not to be tolerated. By every loyal soldier it is to be hated, denounced, resisted to the utmost. As invaluable auxiliaries in this great work we commend to you the literature of our own Church. The Guardian, the Banner, the Magazine, and the children's papers, are in every way reliable, and are worthy of your liberal patronage. We take it as a proof that you are not unmindful of this duty since the sales of the Book Room for the past year show a very gratifying increase, notwithstanding the increased cost of books and living.

We ask your continued efforts in the great cause of Temperance. Your work has been effective. Your influence has been felt in the halfs of legislation and throughout the country. Arduous work is yet before you. Vast are the evils and mighty the unscrupulous agencies of this soul-destroying traffic. Combine your energies at once to secure all that legislation makes your privilege, and let the power of moral suasion be employed more vigorously than ever in view of the special demands and opportunities of the present crisis.

Guard the sanctity of the Lord's Day. As citizens, oppose every attempt to open the way for excursions or amusements on that day. Yield not to those godless social customs which, in some places and cases, draw people from the house of prayer, and from the religious instruction of the children, to spend the day in visits, gossip, and feastings. Prayerful effort will enable you and your families to "keep it holy," and to call it "a delight, the holy of the Lord, honourable."

The educational work of the year shows advancement. The vast advantage and absolute necessity of a thoroughly equipped ministry are felt by the whole Church. For this high and holy vocation we need the most powerful minds, the warmest hearts, the best culture. We must pray that the "tongue of fire" may be given; we must also labour that

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the best talent may be developed and consecrated. less the rains fall from heaven will the garden bloom and prosper; but only in proportion to the culture given will it produce its choicest fruits in greatest abundance. Let us prayerfully ask how we can most fully prepare our rising youth for the grand possibilities of this great Dominion, and let us stand by our own Victoria University and our other great educational institutions. We still hold and teach, "He that believeth hath the witness in himself." On this fact of experience our fellowship in Christ is based. Where the experience is wanting, or where it is scouted as an impossibility or a mere imagination, we are not surprised to find one who can see no good in it-who can catch at any objection, however frivolous, to cast discredit upon it. Brethren, it would be no gain to the Church or to the individuals concerned to have on the Church roll a long list of moralists, formalists, and mere externalists. The wisest, the ripest, the most thoughtful of our people prize it as a precious Gospel privilege, and we are assured will still continue "steadfastly in fellowship," as well as in "the Apostle's doctrine, and breaking of bread, and in prayers." We trust that where youth or inexperience or timidity hin lers, or where misrepresentation has misled any, such judicious kindness may be shown by leaders and members as will make plain the right way.

We rejoice to inform you of the proposed Œcumenical Council of world-wide Methodism. We believe it may be made of immense service in toning down unseemly asperities, removing unhealthy emulations, providing for the more effective consolidation and prosecution of our common work, giving exercise and increase to all brotherly charities, and proving to one another and to the whole world that Methodism is one the world over. On its behalf we ask your fervent prayers.

Some of our brethren, worn down by toil, and enfeebled by sickness, have had to ask for the painful necessity of superannuation. Let our united sympathies cheer their forced retirement. Others have passed away triumphantly to the bright reward. Doubtless the coming year shall witness similar vacancies in pulpit and in pew. Thank God, like our fathers and brethren who have gone, we may have the Holy Ghost, so that "Christ shall be magnified in our body, whether it be by life or by death." Whether for the longer or the shorter service, for the doing or the suffering, we commend you to the God of infinite fulness, who is "able to make all grace abound to you, that having always all sufficiency in all things, ye may abound to every good work."
