BELIEVE OFFER OF ROOSEVELT IS REJECTED
Said to Have 60,000 to 75,000 Men Ready for Mobilization—Urge Him to Go to Front Via Canada

New York, March 28.—The New York Sun says: "Rumors have reached here that Colonel Roosevelt's offer, to President Wilson, of a fully manned and armed division has been rejected. As the colonel now is devil-fish fighting in Florida, the contention is that the offer could have been obtained. When the news was conveyed to men known to have enlisted in the division many of them said the colonel would be urged to take his command to the European battle front by way of Canada. They are hopeful their commander's love of a fight will compel him to accept the suggestion if he feels that his action will not imperil his country."

PROFESSOR SMITH OF MOUNT ALLISON DIED THIS MORNING
For Many Years Professor of Classics—Prolonged Student and Man of High Literary Attainment

This morning at his home in Seckville, N. B., Dr. Alfred D. Smith, professor of classics of the University of Mount Allison, passed away. Professor Smith is well known in the city of St. John by professional men. Speaking of him to a Times reporter this morning, H. A. Powell, K.C., who was a close friend of the professor, said: "In the death of Professor Smith the maritime provinces have lost its most widely read and learned classical scholar. Sidney Smith called Macaulay a 'book in lace,' and Doctor Smith was a walking encyclopedia. He was a man who delved deep into almost every branch of knowledge and had supplied himself with its richest stores. He was not a mere book-worm, as he had opinions and strong opinions on almost every subject."

HOSPITAL SHIP WAS BLAZING WITH LIGHT AND EASILY IDENTIFIED WHEN HUNS SANK HER
London, March 28.—The survivors of the British hospital ship Asturias were landed at a village on the shore of an unnamed lake, The villagers were aroused early in the morning by the noise of motor boats and other craft speeding to and fro and hastened to the assistance of the refugees. As many as possible of the survivors were supplied with clothes and wraps, but the village wardrobes were soon exhausted and quilts and blankets were called into service. The refugees said that the torpedo which sank the hospital ship, struck near the stern and almost missed. One of the women nurses on board, who was attached to the British field hospital in Serbia said: "We had no warning of any kind and we thought that a hospital ship would be sacred even to the Germans. Of course we had heard threats to the contrary, but the thing seemed so utterly barbarous that I dismissed it from my mind. We sailed through the Bay of Biscay without fear and without trying to avoid detection. When the Asturias was attacked she was blazing with light and easy to identify."

WAR PRISONERS

THE FEDERAL ELECTIONS

There is a growing impression that the Ottawa government is preparing for an election in the early summer. It is suggested that Lieut.-Col. Blomdin is being staged in Canada in order to divert attention from Bourassa and Lavergne, and the other Nationalists who made the Borden-Nationalist government a possibility. It is also suggested that Sir Robert Borden will return from London with a plan to save the Empire, with the proviso that unless he is returned to power the Empire cannot be saved.

All this is interesting if true, but the people of Canada are not likely to be carried off their feet as they were in 1911. They have seen how much the government cares for those who are properly certified by the patronage committee. The war scandals and other scandals are not forgotten. Moreover, the people have a fuller appreciation of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, who preferred defeat to an alliance with the Nationalists—the disturbers and enemies of unity in Canada.

THE WAR SITUATION

Lest the German retirement on the western front should cause a feeling of over-confidence, the French minister of war told the Chamber of Deputies yesterday that it would be possible to regard this retreat as a ruse. M. Painleve declared that Germany is assembling an army larger and better equipped than ever before, and that this army must be overcome by the Allies. Following his speech the bill calling the 1918 class of recruits was adopted by the Chamber.

While the French war minister was warning France of a tremendous task yet to be performed, Lord Balfour in the British House of Lords was telling the country that the Germans are building submarines faster than the British

are destroying them, and that he believed the Germans had more men in their armies and more food in Germany than had been imagined in England. Along with these rather pessimistic utterances came the disquieting rumor that Germany is prepared to offer most attractive terms to Russia in order to bring about a separate peace with that country. There is, however, another side to the picture. If Germany can assemble a great army the Allies can assemble a greater one. WOMEN IN POLITICS

How the women of Ontario are taking to politics is entertainingly told by a correspondent of the Toronto Globe, in his report of a Liberal meeting in Dunnville, to choose a candidate for the legislature. The report covers addresses delivered by women as well as by men, and shows that they have a good grasp of provincial affairs. The introductory part of the report is worth quoting in full, as follows:

"Women of Haldimand at least have killed the too easy assumption that in country constituencies women will be indifferent to the vote. One-third of a large gathering at the Grand Theatre in Dunnville, to choose a candidate for the legislature, was composed of women. More-over, they took due share, not merely in the formation of one of the most intelligent and sympathetic audiences conceivable to listen to political addresses which touched their daily lives, but the nomination of Mr. D. Z. Gibson to be Liberal candidate for this constituency in the Ontario legislature was seconded in a most able, businesslike way by a woman, Mrs. (Dr.) J. W. Burns of Caldwell. Were the phrase not already somewhat hackneyed, one might apply and aptly terms this gathering historic. It was, for Ontario women, in fact and deed the formation of a new Arthurian Round Table of equality, destined to be the fair beginning of a time."

"Yet there was here the odd, indefinable touch of that something which is going to make a change in the quality rather than the size of the voters' lists in the province, for 'woman, in her hour of ease, uncertain, coy and hard to please,' seemed to take the granting of the franchise with an ardour man can not explain. The Globe reporter, borrowing a woman's virtue of inquisitiveness, asked many a little knot of women in the audience if they thought other women would take warmly to the ballot box. Other women's opinions always fascinate women. Most of them smilingly said they would; some wondered how women who knew nothing about the whole field of politics would learn, but agreed with alacrity that they could find out a candidate's merits quite as quickly, if not better than mere men. The women, too, accepted to the full the duty of 'equal service.' They bore a share of the subscriptions made in the hall towards the expense of the candidature, and out of a finance committee of six appointed there and then three were women. They are the first officially elected on such an executive in Ontario."

The people of Belgium have made another appeal to the neutral nations in behalf of the working classes of that country, who under German oppression are threatened with "starvation or death." We are led to wonder why all the neutral nations do not turn upon Germany, and by cutting off food supplies and taking the field against her hasten the end of her career as a savagery.

The destruction of a British hospital ship without warning is another typical act of German barbarity. While a considerable number of lives were lost it is fortunate that the vessel was not filled with wounded men.

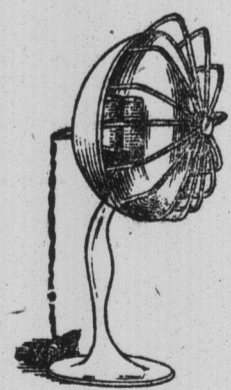

BOWLING NOT A GAME OF LUCK

World's Champion Talks To Times Readers

ARCHIE WALSH INTERVIEWED

Something of St. John Boy's Career on The Alleys, Where He Has Won Phenomenal Success—Accuracy And Confidence Essentials in The Game

"Bowling is practically the winter sport of the United States and is making deep inroads into the winter games of Canada," said Archie Walsh, champion candle pin bowler, in the course of an interview with a Times reporter, who is at present in the city spending a few

weeks in his home town. Through the instigation of George Magee, manager of the Y.M.C.I. bowling alleys in Cliff street, Walsh decided to pay a visit to St. John and will give an exhibition at the Y.M.C.I.

Mr. Walsh was born in St. John, New Brunswick, some twenty-seven years ago. He has been living more than twenty years in the United States, where he has done nearly all his spectacular bowling and has made all his records. "I began the game very young," he said. "At the age of sixteen I took a liking to it and became known as the 'Boy Wonder' throughout New England. Even today I have difficulty in making people believe I am twenty-seven and the youthful epithet of 'Boy Wonder' sticks to me yet."

Gradually Walsh's fame as a bowler spread throughout New England and as far as Washington. From the early age of sixteen up to the present day Walsh has been steadily making records in that period of eleven years, he has established records that today stand, has been on winning teams that have made records galore and has probably participated in more games than any other bowler in the game.

Asked what were the essentials of a champion bowler, Walsh remarked that "accuracy and confidence were the two great assets. Accuracy is the greatest of all, followed closely by confidence. Confidence in my own ability to win," he said, "has played a great part in the success that I have attained in the bowling game."

"A bowler must have a natural born ability for the game or he can never be a champion or make a real mark at bowling," he added. "Luck has nothing to do with a champion. Luck does not count in the persistent game of bowling."

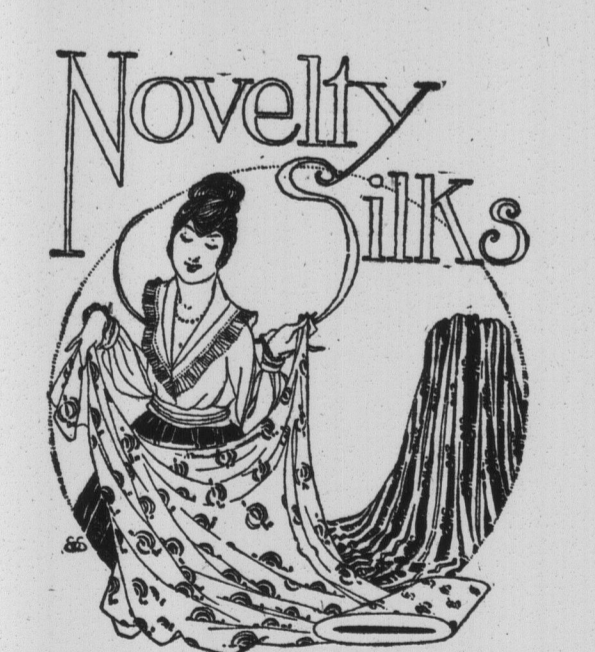

Lord Beresford Gives Warning as to Submarines; Hospital Ship Sunk

London, March 27, 6.25 p.m.—Losses of merchant vessels amounting to more than 420,000 tons thus far in March have resulted from war measures of the Central Powers, Lord Charles Beresford said in the house of lords today.

In a debate in the house of lords on the British blockade Lord Beresford said that with longer days and calmer weather the losses would increase, and that the public ought to have the facts brought home to it. The number of vessels destroyed thus far this month was given by him as 255.

Lord Beresford expressed the opinion that captures of submarines by the British were not at all equivalent to the new submarines the Germans were launching. He believed the Germans had more men and more food than had been imagined in England. The foreign office, he said, had too much power over the navy, to the detriment of the navy. The losses of British, allied and neutral vessels for February, he said, amounted to 281 vessels, with an aggregate tonnage of more than 500,000.

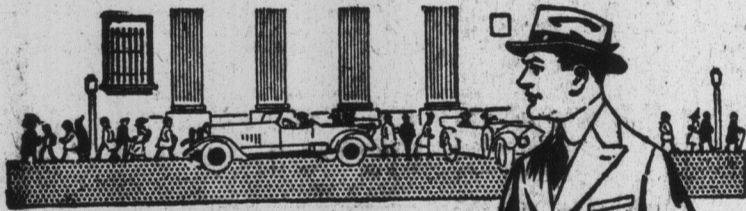
London, March 27.—The British hospital ship Asturias was torpedoed without warning, it was officially announced today. Thirty-one persons were killed, and twelve are missing.

The British hospital ship Asturias, while steaming with all navigating lights and with all proper distinguishing Red Cross signs, visibility illuminated, was torpedoed without warning on the night of March 26. The following casualties occurred: Military, dead, 15; missing, 3, including one female staff nurse; injured, 17, crew, dead, 20, with 9 missing, including one stewardess; crew injured, 22.

The torpedoing of the hospital ship is included in the list of achievements claimed by U-boats, as reported in a wireless press message yesterday. It is understood that when the Asturias was torpedoed she was carrying no wounded. She had disembarked a considerable number of wounded at a certain British port and was on a return voyage with some 300 persons aboard.

London, March 27.—Two British torpedo boat destroyers have been sunk, one by striking a mine and another after a collision with a steamer was officially announced tonight.

MORE GAINS SHOWN IN THE WAR CABLES RECEIVED LAST NIGHT

The British and French troops have made additional important gains against the Germans on the line running from Neuvilly to the British center at several points. Field Marshal Sir Douglas Haig's men have pushed forward appreciably nearer the St. Quentin-Cambrai road, occupying the villages of Longuevent and Equancourt, and in addition have recaptured from the Germans a position north of Neuvilly-Cambrai, which the Germans took from them in an attack Monday night.

The gains in the forest of La Fere, which they drove the Germans completely out of the lower forest of Coucy and also captured the villages of Petit Berain, Verberie and Coucy. The French line in this region to the western outskirts of the forest of Gouy. In the Soissons sector further progress was made north of Neuvilly-Margival and northeast of Lefebvre.

The German war office admits the capture by the British of the town of Roisel, about eleven miles northwest of St. Quentin, and in reality taken on Saturday, and the falling back of the German forces before the French at Neuvilly in the forest region south of La Fere, "in order to avoid being out-flanked."

Violent artillery fighting in the region of Verdun and at various points in Belgium, notably near Dinant, Steenstraete and Hiet Sas, has been in progress.

On the Russian front, the Russians have been forced to fall back before the Germans south of Bronnitski, according to a statement of the Petrograd war office. In the fighting Berlin claims that more than 300 Russians were made prisoners, and four machine guns and seven mine-throwers were captured. Russian attacks near Lofak, in Volynia, and in Galicia were repulsed by the Teutonic allies, says Berlin.

Apparently a renewal of fighting in Roumania is indicated by the German official communication, which says the Roumans have been prevented from carrying out an attack south of the Trosna Valley.

In the Austro-Italian theatre, along the Julian front, the Teuton made an attack in force between Dosso Felle and Fritide and captured a section of Italian trenches on Hill 126. At all other places, however, the attack met with repulse, according to Rome.

About 400 yards of Teutonic allied trenches have been captured by the French near the Cervaraia Crest in Serbia. Macedonia, however, with some 100 prisoners. A Bulgarian attack in the Cerna river bend in this region was repulsed.

Certainly the most cruel sacrifice is that of these thousands of young men, who sacrificed themselves before having even lived, in order that the country may be saved."
