Neither is it known how well the northern and southern flanks of his army are keeping pace with the retirement in the centre.

heavy losses of the Italians in men and guns, engagements successful for the enemy have taken place on the Tagliamento plain, while the Rome communication announces that there has been fighting on the hills of St. Daniels Del Friuli northwest of Uudine and from four to five miles east of the Tagliamento. Meanwhile preparations to aid the Italians in their hour of extremity are being rushed by all the allies. Jules Cambon, general secretary of the French ministry of foreign affairs, in a statement has expressed the conviction that the Italians will be able to stem the tide of the invasion with the aid of the French and their troops sent to reinforce them. The American government is to waive all exports restrictions in favor of Italy permitting that country to take whatever materials she requires, regardless of prospective shortages here. A large amount of shipping also is to be given Italy to work in conjunction with her own merchant marine in taking supplies overseas.

The new Italian premier, in a message to General Cadorna, has assured the commander-in-chief that all classes of the populace of Italy are with him in hour of trial and will stand by him and the army until victory rests with them. A similar message was sent to the British prime minister.

On the other battlefronts no big operations have taken place. The Germans Wednesday made no attempt to force out the Canadians from their positions captured the previous day in the region of Passchendaele. Along the Chemin-Des-Dames and in the Verdun sector, intensive bombardments continue. Still another mutiny among the Germans is reported. This time it was among the troops in Belgium, who are declared to have refused to go to the front and even to have fired on their officers, several of whom were wounded.

# The Next Step

HE Proclamation, which issued October 13th, calls for men of Class One to report for service or claim exemption on or before November 10th, 1917. This call includes bachelors and widowers without children (not otherwise excepted) who were 20 years old on the 13th October, 1917, and whose 34th birthday did not occur before January 1st, 1917.

It is pointed out that no man will be called to the colors until about December 10th, by which date it is expected that most, if not all, applications for exemption will have been dealt with. So that, it is obvious no one will gain any advantage by delay in reporting for service or claiming exemption.

# Registered Letter

THE REPORT FOR SERVICE or CLAIM FOR EXEMPTION should be made on the forms obtainable at every Post Office in Canada, and handed back to the Postmaster, who will issue an official receipt and will transmit the form itself to the

The man reporting for service, or claiming exemption will thereafter be notified by registered letter regarding what is further required of him.

Men who REPORT FOR SERVICE and on whose behalf no claim for exemption is received, will, if not already medically examined, be ordered to attend at the nearest Medical Board Centre for medical examination, and will be furnished with return transportation and also with subsistence.

EACH APPLICANT FOR EXEMPTION will be notified of the number and address of the tribunal by which the application will be considered and the date upon which it will be taken up, and he may thereupon submit in writing to the tribunal the facts upon which reliance is placed to support the application.

While applicants may await the day named in the notice and appear personally before the tribunal, this course is not recommended and will result in serious incon-

Remember all Reports for Service and Claims for Exemption should be made at once but must be made not later than November 19th, 1917.

# NEW G.O.C. CAME

Brigadier General Macdonell Here to Take up Duties in Command of N. B. Military District

to take over his new duties. He was met at the station by Brigadier-General Mc-Lean, Lieutenant-Colonel A. H. Powell, Col. E. Sturdee, Lieutenant-Colonel And-Col. E. Sturdee, Lieutenant-Colonel Andersop, Lieutenant-Colonel Spittal, Captain Blake and the junior officers of the command. He was escorted to the Royal Hotel, where he was the guest of General McLean at dinner. He will not take over his duties until tomorrow morning.

Now that the new G. O. C. has arrived it is expected that within a very short time all plans will be made for the forming of the province of New Brunswick into a separate military district. General Archibald Hayes Macdonnell was born at Toronto Feb. 6, 1868, of United Empire Loyalist descent, and is a son of the late Angus Macdonnell, of that city. He is a brother of Senator Claude Macdonell, former M. P. for Toronto. After graduating from Kingston Military College he became attached to the Royal Canadian Regiment as lieutenant in 1890, becoming captain in 1892 and major in 1905. In 1907 and 1908 he acted as D. A. A. G. for the maritime provinces and was D. A. Q. M. in 1910, in the latter year being appointed chief staff officer of the western Ontario command. He was also for a time A. A. G. of the first division and in 1911 was appointed a member of the board of visitors of the Royal Military College at Kingston.

In 1899 and 1900 General Macdonell, then captain, served with distinction in the South African war, taking part in the operations in Transvaaleast of Pretoria and in Cape Colony south of Orange River. He was mentioned in the despatches on different occasions in 1901 and was referred to as "A brave and meritorious officer." During his service in South Africa he was captured by General DeWet and was for six months a prisoner in the hands of the Boers. In 1901 he received the D. S. The general also served in West Africa in the Aro expedition, in the operations in Nigeria, Ibeku-Olokoroin, the Affixpo country, Mkpani, and in Ibikio and Obokum. For this service he was also mentioned in the despatches. About a year ago the order of the Companion of the Bath was conferred on Brigadier-General Macdonell by King George.

In the present war General Macdonell has seen much active service at the front and was also mentioned for bravery. He was wounded in battle a few months ago. He had only returned to Canada a few weeks when he was asked to accept the New Brunswick command.


