ITALIANS, REORGANIZED, HOLD BACK THE ENEMY

Make Stand Seven Miles West of Udine—Teutons Fail To Wreck Cadorna's Army—Withdrawal of British Units There Also Successful

Italian Headquarters, Oct. 31.—(By the Associated Press)—The bulletin of General Cadorna, the commander-in-chief, indicates that the Italian troops, perfectly reorganized, are holding back the enemy at a distance of seven miles west of Udine.

BRITISH WITH ITALIANS BACK WITH MAIN BODY

London, Nov. 1.—Reuter's correspondent at Italian army headquarters sends the following: "Perfect order prevails among the Italian troops on their new line of defence. They are eager again to offer combat to the enemy and are confident of their ability to turn the tables upon the Austro-Germans.

WELL CARRIED OUT

Italian Headquarters in Northern Italy, Oct. 31.—(By the Associated Press)—Premier Lloyd George has said that the horrors of a Zeppelin raid received much attention, whereas, in their relative importance to vast sections of London remaining untouched, they are forgotten.

BRITAIN WILL RESPOND

London, Nov. 1.—The military correspondent of the Times says of the Italian operations: "The fact that General Von Bulow, with an inconsiderable force of German forces, has burst through the Julian front and that Austrian columns have found other badly defended points in the Carnic Alps, is certainly very unfortunate and we have no need to minimize the gravity of the situation. Italy's eastern frontier temporarily is lost."

REV. DR. CARMAN NEAR TO DEATH

Toronto, Nov. 1.—Rev. Dr. Albert Carman, venerated superintendent emeritus of the Methodist church, is lying very ill at his home. He had been unconscious for a greater part of yesterday, and at his age, he is in his eighty-fourth year, the worst is feared.

GERMANS MAKING TROUBLE IN BRAZIL

Buenos Aires, Nov. 1.—Reports from Rio Janeiro say that the army is mobilizing in Southern Brazil to prevent, if possible, the uprising of the large German colonies there.

MAURA REQUESTED TO FORM NEW CABINET

Madrid, Nov. 1.—King Alfonso has asked Antonio Maura, former premier, to form a cabinet. Senor Maura is a leader of the Conservative party.

THIRTY IN ALL TAKE PART IN RAID

London, Nov. 1.—About thirty aeroplanes, in seven groups, took part in an air raid on England last night. Three of them penetrated to the heart of London, says an official report today.

THE WAR

This morning's news from the Italian front is vaguely reassuring, but there is at least this much comfort to be extracted from it by the Allied world.

As Mr. Frank H. Simonds has pointed out, more than three years of war have been remarkable because of the fact that there has been no development of any army on a great scale, notwithstanding the tremendous numbers in the field and the vast spaces over which the campaigns have swept forward and back, at times, as when the Germans went almost to Paris and were in turn swept back to the Aisne, or when the Russians were in full flight at the time of the German drive into Poland.

Mr. Simonds takes the broad view of the whole situation in reminding us that, serious as the Italian defeat is, and much as it may prolong the conflict, the real centre of gravity is on the western front, and that so long as the British and French are in the saddle there, while back of them are being accumulated the tremendous American reserves in men, in money and in industrial power, the Allied purpose, the Allied determination, and the certainty of eventual Allied success are beyond question.

Let this be added and ever kept in mind. The Italian defeat means a longer war and more work and more sacrifices by the Allies. Canada, therefore, must be ready to do even more than was thought necessary a few weeks or months ago. And our war programme must be accelerated, not alone with respect to raising men but likewise in connection with saving and giving and working for victory by our whole population. We must do our share—and a bit more if possible.

HARBOR PROTECTION

The damage done by the recent storm in and about St. John harbor, which was very extensive, should lead to a re-consideration of the whole case regarding the extension of the breakwater to Patridge Island and the construction of a new short breakwater extending eastward from the island itself.

The completion of St. John's harbor facilities is in no sense a partisan political question. Even in time of peace this is a national harbor, an essential link in any proper scheme of national transportation. In time of war both national and imperial considerations strongly suggest the advisability of pushing forward certain work which is obviously necessary not alone to provide additional accommodation but to safeguard the harbor facilities which we already possess and which are a national asset.

WAR AND LUXURIES

"The Canadian consumer, taking him as a whole, has bought more luxuries than ever before. The government has made no effort to stop the waste."

This charge, made by the Toronto Star, is fortified by a list of importations of luxuries into Canada in the years 1914-1917 inclusive. There was a falling off in 1915, because of unsettled conditions, but a great increase in 1916, and still greater in 1917. Here are a few items, comparing 1915 with 1917:

ly than the scale of wages, there have been many people who have been enabled to make abnormal profits. Reckless spending followed, and the habit spread to many of those who could not afford it, but who do as their neighbors do. Hence the demand for luxuries increased, and the amount of money thus wasted was withheld from useful purposes. The government took no action. It may be assumed that the new government will take a more serious view of its duty and responsibility and put an end to the carnival of reckless expenditure at a time when the need of money for war purposes is so urgent.

JAPAN AND THE WAR

Of the possible entry of Japanese armies into the field the Bangor Commercial says: "The French newspapers are devoting considerable space to a discussion of the likelihood of Japan sending troops to engage in the war on the side of the Allies and appear to regard such a move as a very likely possibility. In such event they regard Palestine, Mesopotamia and Macedonia as the most likely fields for such action, pointing out that the participation of a strong Japanese force in any of these theatres would speedily result in the rout of the opposing forces. It is also suggested that in case Japanese troops in large numbers were introduced into Macedonia it would be possible to withdraw the several hundred thousand soldiers the Allies now have practically idle around Saloniki for use elsewhere. It might be that the Allies would not care to withdraw their troops from Macedonia but would welcome Japanese assistance in that theatre as making more certain the success of the offensive that will assuredly be launched in the spring against Bulgaria."

Of course there is the problem of transportation to be reckoned with, and more important still, that of keeping the armies supplied in the field. It may be that these are too great to make it possible for Japan to throw the strength of her splendid armies into the balance against the Central Powers. Certainly if Russia fails to do her part it would be of immense advantage to the other Allies to be able to count on substantial aid from Japan and China.

The Times' special cable today is fraught with much of interest to Canadians as it gives intimate news of Friday's fighting in which the Dominion troops did so well. The story of that lieutenant's exploits is a noteworthy one, marred unfortunately by the regulations that prohibit the giving of his name.

Advertisement for Boys Liable to Term in Penitentiary featuring text: "BOYS LIABLE TO TERM IN PENITENTIARY In the police court yesterday afternoon two men, one charged with drinking liquor in a public street and also with supplying liquor to a soldier, and the other with drinking liquor in a public street, were fined \$30 each. They were allowed to go on the payment of the fine. In the juvenile court yesterday afternoon nine boys were before the magistrate, charged with breaking and destroying a house, the property of Samuel Naves, situated at the corner of Sheriff and Brook streets. The boys were between thirteen and sixteen years of age. It appears that the house in question has been unoccupied for a considerable length of time and that a short time ago the nine boys who were in court went to the house on several nights and destroyed and ruined a considerable portion of the building, tearing out the window frames, pulling down and carrying away the doors and trawling and ripping many of the boards from the walls. It was estimated in the court that the damage done would amount to at least \$150. Mr. Naves, however, was very leniently disposed to the boys and told the magistrate that he did not wish to have them prosecuted in case that they should make restitution, but he desired that they should keep away from the property in the future. The magistrate gave the boys a very severe lecture and told them that they were all liable to two years in the penitentiary. Some of the boys were going to school and some of them were working and the remainder did nothing at all for a living. The magistrate advised them that they had better find some employment. His honor allowed the boys to go on their promising to turn over a new leaf."

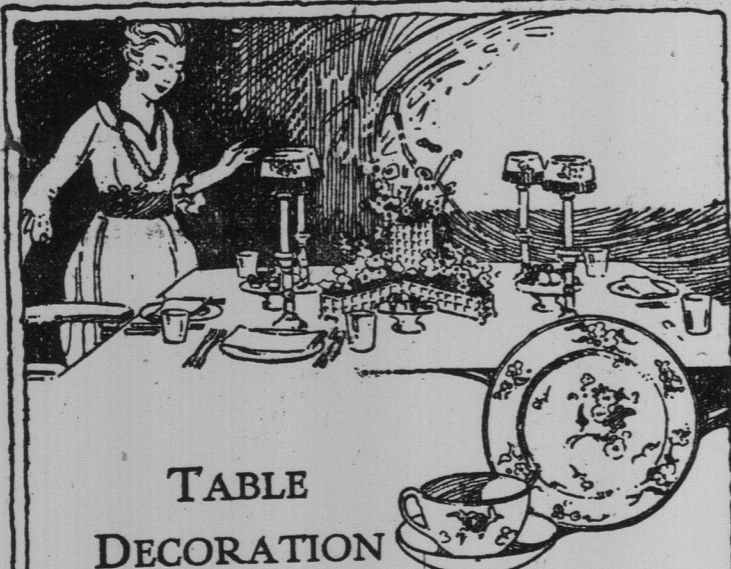

Saving Substitutes

Canadian Food Controller's Suggestions of War-time Dishes For Tomorrow

Save beef and bacon by using dishes like macaroni and cheese.

Macaroni and Cheese
Cook macaroni in boiling salted water for twenty minutes. Drain and pour over it cold water. Put a layer of macaroni. Sprinkle with grated cheese. Repeat. Pour the white sauce over this and cover all with buttered crumbs. Bake until the crumbs are brown.

Macaroni, Cheese and Tomato
Prepare as for macaroni and cheese, only use tomato sauce instead of white sauce. Prepare as for a white sauce, using tomato juice instead of milk.

Save bread and flour by using cereals like corn and buckwheat.

Try Johnny Cake
Cornmeal, 1 cup; white flour, 1 cup; sugar, 1-3 cup; sour milk, 1/2 cup; soda, 1/2 teaspoon; molasses, 1/2 teaspoon; salt, 1 teaspoon; molasses, 1/2 teaspoon. Mix and sift the dry ingredients twice, and gradually add the sour milk. Beat until light in a shallow greased pan, in a moderate oven. (Recipes by Domestic Science Expert, Food Controller's Office.)

DAUGHTER OF PEER ELOPES

Romances of Lochivar and Jock o' Hazeldean Outdone in Real Life

"She is won, we are gone over bank, rush and scurry; 'They'll have feet steeds that follow," quoth young Lochivar."

The fabulous romances of "Lochivar" and "Jock o' Hazeldean" are outdone in real life. A wounded officer who fell in love with his nurse, the daughter of a peer, culminating in a quick dash to Scotland, pursuers eluded by a "quick change" in a telephone-box, and the old ending, always new—"they lived happily ever after"—such is the real, true story of a marriage notice recently published with the blessings of everybody: WYNDHAM-MACKAY. On the 28th May, at the Church of Aloysius, Glasgow, Lieutenant Dennis Wyndham, Wilshire Regiment, son of Mrs. W. Wyndham, Cook of Pictou, Natal, South Africa, to Elsie Mackay, third daughter of Lord and Lady Inchape, Seamore place, Mayfair.

It was the "Daily Sketch" which first published the fuller details of the story. The "heroine" (the nurse) is the daughter of a peer, who objected to the patient as a bridegroom on the ground that in peace time he had been on the stage.

For this and other reasons, obstacles were placed in the way of the devoted couple, which, had they been less resourceful, would have kept them apart. "We are the two most amazingly happy persons in London," declared the bride, when invited to tell the story of his romance.

The charming bride enthusiastically endorsed the sentiment. Both gave details of their escape from provost-marshal and detectives. The story had its beginning more than twelve months ago. Captain Dennis Wyndham—he was then a lieutenant in the Royal Berkshire Regiment—was brought home from France suffering from gas poisoning and the effects of an accident.

He was taken to Lord and Lady Inchape's Hospital in Seamore place, Mayfair, where he was nursed by the Hon. Elsie Mackay. The acquaintance thus begun ripened into sincere affection, and eventually Captain Wyndham sought an interview with Lord Inchape. Because of the officer's connection with the stage his bride, who took up the narrative at this point, "we became secretly engaged."

Then she told the story of a very adventurous day, which ended in their eluding pursuers in London, and escaping to Scotland, where the wedding took place. "It was on the Saturday before May 23," declared this happy bride, "that we had arranged to get a marriage licence. We went to a registrar's office, but my father, who had heard of the arrangement, and had unexpectedly arrived in London from Scotland—he reached the house just as I was leaving it—had previously sent a collector to the office, and the registrar made an objection, which meant a delay in issuing the certificate."

"Thus we realized that active steps were being taken to prevent our marriage. My husband had been discharged from the hospital three weeks before and we learned that his leave had been cancelled, and he was liable to be arrested."

"However, we were allowed to finish the journey without further attention, and landed in Glasgow the next morning. I stayed with my husband's friends."

Only 10,316 Are Willing To Fight

One in Five Reported and of These Ten to One Want Exemption—Military News
Ottawa, Oct. 31—Official figures showing reports for service and claims for exemption up to and including October 29 show that 10,316 men of class A under the Military Service Act have reported and 108,266 have applied for exemption. The percentage which the total bear to the estimated male population between the ages of 20 and 35 unmarried or widowers without children is 19.64.
At Winnipeg 1,867 have reported for service and 9,886 applied for exemption, at Calgary the proportion is 1,449 to 11,988, at Regina 999 to 14,041, at Vancouver 1,568 to 4,995, at Kenora 216 to 622, at Toronto 2,118 to 21,514, at London 230 to 11,209, at Halifax 928 to 6,898, at St. John 281 to 3,475, at Kingston 305 to 3,882, at Montreal 401 to 7,106, and at Quebec 48 to 3,442.
The percentage of total registration to the estimated population is as follows: London, 29 per cent.; Toronto, 28 per cent.; Calgary, 28 per cent.; Winnipeg, 26 per cent.; Halifax, 22 per cent.; St. John, 22 per cent.; Regina, 21 per cent.; Kingston, 20 per cent.; Vancouver, 10 per cent.; Kenora, 10 per cent.; Montreal, 9 per cent.; Quebec, 8 per cent.

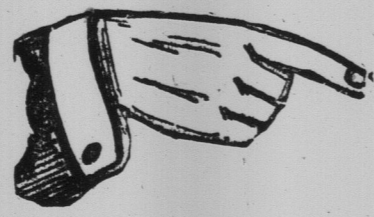

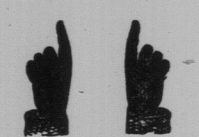

Election Date Is Fixed For December Seventeen

Overseas Soldiers Will Start Voting on November 20—Yukon's Polling Date is January 28

Ottawa, Oct. 31.—Writs were issued tonight calling for a general election on Monday, December 17. Nomination day is fixed for Monday, November 19. This applies to all constituencies except Yukon Territory. In the Yukon nomination day will be December 31 and polling day for four weeks later—Monday, January 28. All writs are returnable on February 27, 1918. Parliament is summoned to meet on the day following.

New Machinery.

The election will be without a parallel in the history of the dominion. The granting of the franchise to soldiers and sailors and their female relatives at home has entailed the creation of entirely new machinery. Military and naval polls will have to be held in France, Belgium, the United Kingdom, the West Indies, Canada and on the high seas of Europe and North America. In every polling sub-division in the dominion an enumerator will immediately have to set to work revising the electoral lists. The names of enfranchised female relatives of soldiers will have to be added. The names of aliens disfranchised by the war-time elections act will have to be deleted. Roughly, 20,000 enumerators will be required.

At the Front.

Military voters stationed in Canada will cast their votes on the same day as

civilian electors. But the difficulties of an election day at the front has made changes necessary. All soldiers overseas will begin voting on November 20 and military votes may be cast up to and including the ordinary polling day. There will necessarily be delay also in the counting of military votes. Military votes cast in France and Belgium will be counted at the office of the Canadian commissioner in Paris; those cast in the United Kingdom will be counted at the office of the Canadian high commissioner in London. Military votes cast in Bermuda and Canada will be counted under the supervision of the general returning officer at Ottawa, W. F. O'Connor. It is anticipated that about five weeks will elapse between polling day and final announcement by the general returning officer as to the final results in all electoral districts. The new house of commons will consist of 284 members, as compared with



221 in the last parliament. In a number of the constituencies, especially in Ontario, the prime minister has been greatly embarrassed by the refusal of nominated Conservative candidates to even consider an attempt at a bi-party renominating convention giving Liberal Unionists also a voice in the decision as to a candidate. The prime minister issued today a second appeal for the adoption of the Union spirit along this line. But there are indications that the strong Conservative partisans in some fifty or more ridings will still continue to ignore it. As the election campaign will start at once, there is immediate necessity for an understanding in each constituency as to who is to be the endorsed candidate of the government. The government's desire is to have only one such candidate in each riding. In New Brunswick the right principle has been adopted by Hon. F. B. Carvell in regard to appointment of non-partisans for returning officers and enumerators. In each case the sheriff has been appointed as returning officer and they have been requested to name as enumerators the municipal residents in each parish. Under this method there can be no criticism as to any deliberate attempt to manipulate the election machinery for the advantage of any one party and each side will have a fair show.



Medicine Hat, Alta., Oct. 31.—With perfect harmony and great enthusiasm Liberals and Conservatives of Medicine Hat federal constituency, in convention this afternoon, unanimously nominated Hon. Arthur L. Sifton for the house of commons. Nomination of Hon. Mr. Sifton was moved by Dr. Oliver Boyd, who recently resigned the Liberal candidature to make way for Mr. Sifton and was seconded by William Cousins, the veteran campaigner of the Conservative party. The nomination was passed unanimously, not another name being mentioned.

SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION AT WOODSTOCK, N. B.

Woodstock, N. B., Oct. 31.—The thirty-fourth annual Sunday school convention for the province of New Brunswick is now in session at Woodstock in the United Baptist church. The first meeting took place this morning at 9:15 o'clock. This consisted of a pre-convention conference for parish, county and union conference officials, led by the general secretary, Rev. W. A. Ross. Among things discussed in this conference the following were the most important: (1) The world, international, provincial, county and parish associations; (2) The value of organized Sunday school work; (3) The county association, its purpose, etc. The hours from noon to 2 p. m. were taken up with registration and the signing of delegates to homes. The number of delegates and the beginning forebodings a very successful convention. The first session of the convention took place at 2 p. m., the president, Rev. H. C. Archer, occupying the chair. After short devotion this session opened with an able address by Rev. W. A. Ross, in which he discussed the following problems: Co-ordinating church activities, training Sunday school officers, building up attendance. Three conferences were simultaneously held in different apartments of the church on the three following divisions: Elementary, teen age, adult and home department. Very interesting and able papers were read and addresses given. In the elementary conference Mrs. Warren James read a paper, My Class; Miss Miria McConaghy, The Teacher I Would Like to Be. This conference was led by Mrs. W. A. Ross. In the teen age conference two papers were given, Work With Teen Age Girls, by Mrs. S. B. Wass; Teen Age Needs of Boys, Rev. W. W. Malcolm. In the adult and home department conference addresses were given as follows: Successful Home Department Work, Mrs. Effie Bruce; Synthetic Bible Study for Adult Classes, C. W. Manser; The Organized Bible Class and the Community, Rev. J. W. Brown, Ph. D.; and Rev. J. C. B. Appel responded.

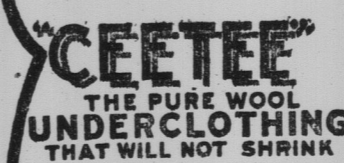

WAGE DEMANDS MAY BRING LABOR CRISIS

Chicago, Oct. 31.—A nation-wide labor crisis was seen today in railway circles as the result of increased wage demands. Two weeks ago the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen formulated demands which would make \$5 a day the minimum wage for switchmen. Yesterday the Switchmen's Union of North America drew up a schedule calling for a fifty percent advance. Tomorrow chairman of two big railway brotherhoods, the trainmen and the Order of Railroad Conductors, will meet in Chicago. Local meetings of representatives of tens of thousands of employees have made it plain that the general meeting here will make heavy demands upon the roads. Their attitude, according to railroad officials, confirms the prediction made at the time that the hurried passage of the Adamson Law postponed but did not avert the crisis.

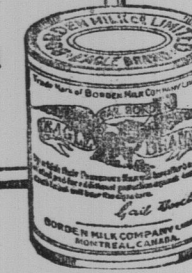

CANADIAN TROOPS IN FRANCE NOW NUMBER 125,000 MEN

Of These But 89,000 Are Fighting Force—The Number in England and Canada—More Infantry Needed

Ottawa, Nov. 1.—A statement issued by the department of militia shows that General Sir Arthur Currie's fighting force in France is made up as follows: Four divisions and cavalry brigades, 75,000; fighting corps troops, 11,000; total fighting troops, 86,000. Army service corps and medical service, 8,000; railway, forestry, labor, etc., services, 28,000; total lines of communication, 36,000; grand total, 125,000.

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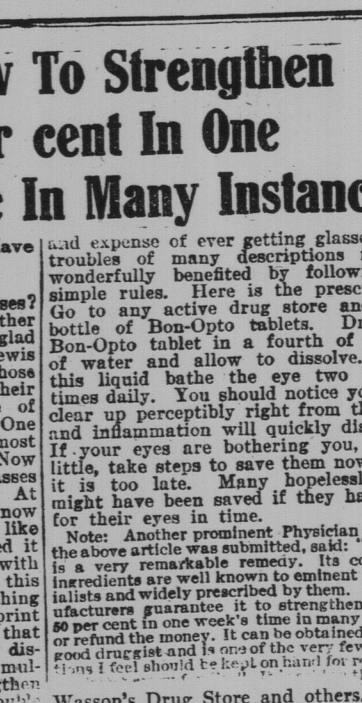
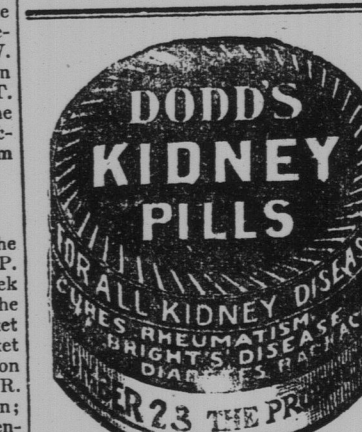

A RECLAMATION PLAN
A new city dump has been opened at the mouth of Courtenay Bay, near the foot of Sydney street and adjoining the oil works. This will prove a great convenience as there has been no dump within reach of the eastern and southern portions of the city for some time. It may lead also to the reclamation of land which would prove valuable. At this place the reef will protect the shore considerably and will be able to reclaim the land surface a distance of about fifty feet by using it as a dump. It has been suggested by the road engineers that it might be worth while for the city to erect a protecting sea wall farther out and, by filling in the space between, reclaim a large area.

NEW G.O.C. CAME TO CITY TODAY

Brigadier General Macdonell Here to Take up Duties in Command of N. B. Military District

Brigadier-General A. H. Macdonnell, C. B., C. M. G., D. S. O., who is to succeed Brigadier-General H. H. McLean as general officer commanding this district, arrived in the city this morning to take over his new duties. He was met at the station by Brigadier-General McLean, Lieutenant-Colonel A. H. Powell, Col. Sturdee, Lieutenant-Colonel Anderson, Lieutenant-Colonel Spittal, Captain Blake and the junior officers of the command. Also there to greet him were some who had served under him in South Africa, in G Company—Major Weeks, F. W. Coombs and others. He was escorted to the Royal Hotel, where he was the guest of General McLean at dinner. He will not take over his duties until tomorrow morning.

Now that the new G. O. C. has arrived it is expected that within a very short time all plans will be made for the forming of the province of New Brunswick into a separate military district.

General Archibald Hayes Macdonnell was born at Toronto Feb. 6, 1868, of United Empire Loyalist descent, and is a son of the late Angus Macdonnell, of the city. He is the son of the late Claude Macdonnell, former M. P. for Toronto. After graduating from Kingston Military College he became attached to the Royal Canadian Regiment as lieutenant in 1890, becoming captain in 1892 and major in 1895. In 1897 and 1898 he acted as D. A. G. for the maritime provinces and was D. A. Q. M. in 1910, in the latter year being appointed chief staff officer of the western Ontario command. He was also for a time A. A. G. of the first division and in 1911 was appointed a member of the board of visitors of the Royal Military College at Kingston.

In 1899 and 1900 General Macdonnell, then captain, served with distinction in the South African war, taking part in operations in the Free State, including those in Paardeberg, and actions of Poplar Grove and Dreefontein; also in operations in Transvaal east of Pretoria and in Cape Colony south of Orange River. He was mentioned in the despatches on different occasions in 1901 and was referred to as "a brave and meritorious officer." During his service in South Africa he was captured by General De Wet and was for six months a prisoner in the hands of the Boers. In 1901 he received the D. S. O. medal for conspicuous bravery and also received the Queen's medal and four clasps.

The general also served in West Africa in the Aro expedition, in the operations in Nigeria, Ibeju-Olokoro, the Aflipo country, Miani, and in Ibibio and Obokum. For this service he was also mentioned in the despatches. About a year ago the order of the Companion of the Bath was conferred on Brigadier-General Macdonnell by King George.

In the present war General Macdonnell has seen much active service at the front and was also mentioned for bravery. He was wounded in battle a few months ago. He had only returned to Canada a few weeks when he was asked to accept the New Brunswick command. General Macdonnell is a member of several upper province clubs. He is unmarried. In religion he is a Roman Catholic. During his former residence in this province General Macdonnell was very popular both in military and in civilian circles and won and retained the respect of all ranks in both.

THE PARTRIDES

Hon. E. A. Smith, minister of lands and mines, is beginning to secure from every New Brunswick county reliable information as to the number of partridges, whether scarce or as plentiful as usual, for the purpose of ascertaining whether or not it is advisable to enable them to multiply up to some reasonable standard. From what The Times has heard, sportsmen all over the province will be delighted to know that Hon. Mr. Smith has seriously taken up this investigation, with the purpose of preventing that magnificent game bird, the partridge, from being exterminated.

NO FIXING OF PRICE OF MILK

That is Recommendation by Committee—Limit Difference Between Farmer And Consumer

Ottawa, Nov. 1.—The milk committee recommended to the food controller that the price of milk should not be fixed, but that the maximum spread be fixed, effective December 1. The recommendation provides that the difference between the price paid by the distributors for the factory and the price charged to the consumer should not be permitted to exceed five cents a quart in the provinces of Ontario and Quebec and in the maritime provinces.

CHAPLAIN HOOPER MOVES TO BUXTON

Hospital Will Retain Name and More Patients Will be Cared For—Appreciation of Contributions

Major the Rev. E. B. Hooper, has removed from Broadstairs, Kent, and now his address is Donington House, Clifton Road, Buxton, Derbyshire, England. The Granville Canadian Special Hospital which is being moved from Ramsgate to Buxton, will retain its name, and Major Hooper will continue his work in connection with it, a most important work as there now will be 1,500 wounded Canadian soldiers in the hospital, or 500 more than it contained when at Ramsgate.

In a letter to friends here, Major Hooper speaks with appreciation of recent contributions to his fund for wounded soldiers. He says that at the present time many of the worst cases are in the Granville Canadian Special Hospital, cases which need special treatment, and he says these patients most heartily appreciate the thoughtful and generous contributions of New Brunswickers who have contributed something to enable the chaplain to minister to their needs by providing comforts, special food, and outdoor motor rides for those able to go out.

Major Hooper was going from Broadstairs to London for a few days and thence on to Buxton, where he expected to be settled down by October 15 or 20.
