WELL KNOWN CITY MAN TAKES OWN LIFE

J. L. SUTHERLAND FOUND SHOT IN PYTHIAN CASTLE

J. LEE SUTHERLAND, 55 Pitt street, committed suicide in one of the basement rooms in the Knights of Pythias' Castle soon after 2 o'clock this afternoon by shooting himself through the forehead with a .32-calibre revolver. Two men who found him report that when they entered the room which was the scene of the tragedy they were met with a rush of gas from turned on burners.

Detective Biddlecombe, who was quickly on the scene and made an investigation, said there was no doubt that it was a clear case of suicide, the revolver, a .32-calibre, being found clutched tightly in his hand. The heavy bullet pierced the forehead and lodged in the brain.

FOUND BY TWO MEN. The tragedy was discovered by John N. Golding, caretaker of the hall, and George Currie, also a Pythian member. Mr. Golding had left the hall at noon, and said that the door of one of the rooms was left unlocked, but when he returned about 2:30 o'clock in company with Mr. Currie, the door was fastened.

Mr. Sutherland was keeper of records and seals of Union Lodge, Knights of Pythias, and had keys of all the rooms. It is believed that he had recently been employed with the New Brunswick Power Co. Ltd. Inspectors are said to have been the probable cause of the tragedy.

TO WELCOME RHODES

Elaborate Plans to Greet N. S. Premier-elect at Halifax Tonight.

Canadian Press Despatch. HALIFAX, July 8.—Elaborate plans have been completed for the public welcome which is to be extended to Hon. E. N. Rhodes, Premier-elect of Nova Scotia, who is expected to arrive here from Ottawa this evening. Three bands will be in the procession that will accompany the premier-elect to the arena, where radio amplifiers and loud speakers have been installed.

QUIT OUT - POSTS

French Staff Consolidation of Line Opposite Rifis in Morocco.

PARIS, July 8.—The French have destroyed and abandoned some of their outposts north of Ouzenzan.

Presumably this is part of the consolidation of lines accompanying the French counter-movement intended to offset Abd El Krim's attempt to capture Taza.

WARRANTS ISSUED

Several Hailed to Court in St. John's For Customs Act Breach.

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., July 8.—In the Herbert Green case, arising out of the action taken against the vessel of that name on last Saturday when she attempted to leave port with a valuable cargo of liquor, after having been ordered to stop, several warrants have been issued. Capt. Nauflts and Chief Engineer Jones are charged with resisting the police and Capt. Byrne, of the four-master Orleans and Super-cargo Ryan of the Green have been summoned for an alleged breach of the customs act.

48 Canadians Flee Chinese Troubles

TORONTO, July 8.—The Methodist Mission Board here has received a cable from Chungking that 48 Canadians had left that place for Shanghai under escort because of further trouble by the Chinese in West China.

Severe and Costly Storm Cools New England After Mercury Climbs to 110

ANTHRACITE STRIKE PREDICTED

Glasgow Blaze Wrecks Fair Buildings and Church, Does Damage To Hundred Houses

Canadian Press. GLASGOW, July 8.—Glasgow was badly fire-scarred today, after a fierce blaze, one of the worst in the history of Scotland, which last night destroyed Kelvin Hall, famous exhibition building, and the Kelvin Grove Free Church, damaged 100 houses, and threatened the lives of hundreds of persons. The first started in Kelvin Hall, which was erected at a cost of \$200,000, and quickly swept through the flimsy structure. The Kelvin Grove Church, a quarter of a mile from the Hall, was ignited by sparks. It was a reproduction in miniature of the famous Rheims Cathedral with two huge towers fronting on the street. These crashed to the ground and the whole roof caved in. From Kelvin Hall a strong wind blew the flames across Blythie street to a row of tenement houses which were badly damaged. The tenants fled in terror, carrying a few hastily snatched belongings. Other houses were ignited by sparks and at one time six separate fires were blazing. Only two casualties were reported, one the injury of a fireman and the other of a young seaman, who suffered a lacerated hand from falling glass while engaged in rescue work.

COLLEGE STUDENTS HELD FOR THREATS

Demanding \$50,000 From Capitalist to Prevent Kidnapping and Torturing of Sister.

Canadian Press. SAN FRANCISCO, July 8.—Bliss Y. Baker, 20, and C. Russell Crawford, 25, university students, and self-styled "experimenters in crime" appeared in police court yesterday on charges of attempted extortion, and were bound over to the superior court, under bonds of \$5,000 each, or \$20,000 cash bail. Baker, a student at the University of California, and Crawford, a former student at the University of Oregon, were arrested following an unsuccessful attempt on June 28, to extort \$50,000 from Colonel D. C. Jackling, San Francisco capitalist. Written threats to kidnap and torture Mrs. Jackling, a sister of Mrs. Rudolph Spreckels, of this city, were sent by the youths. They have announced their intention to plead not guilty.

DESERTION CHARGED

Poet Files Suit For Divorce Against Metropolitan Opera Star.

LOS ANGELES, July 8.—Ian Keith Ross, poet and film actor, has filed suit for divorce in Superior Court, against Marie Blanche Yurka Ross, Metropolitan Opera star, charging desertion. The opera singer sued Ross for divorce in New York last year, naming an actress, Marguerite Hambeau, as co-respondent. The case is still pending.

MINISTERS RESIGN

Finance and National Economy Portfolios in Italian Cabinet Now Vacant.

ROME, July 8.—Finance Minister Alberto de Stefani and Minister of National Economy Cesare Nava presented their resignations to Premier Mussolini today, the latter referred them to the king.

Sailors Quarrel; One Cut, Another Jailed

MONTREAL, July 8.—Joseph Cote, aged 30, of Montreal and Kenneth Turkington, aged 28, a sailor on a boat visiting the port, quarrelled yesterday. Cote is in hospital with seven knife wounds in his body and Turkington was today remanded on a charge of attempted murder. He pleaded not guilty. Cote probably will recover.



TARRYTOWN, N. Y., July 8.—John D. Rockefeller was 86 years old today. His programme for celebration of the event included a round of golf, on his private course, a family dinner with a big birthday cake, and an organ recital. Says a message given out at the estate: "Mr. Rockefeller is well and full of good cheer, and gratitude for all blessings, that the coming year holds for him. Friends regard Mr. Rockefeller the best 86 year old golfer in the world. He shot nine holes in 48, a few days ago, a score which many a young golfer envies, and his game is the best of his career."

WOMAN FALLS SEVEN STORIES TO DEATH

Baroness Victim of Accident at End of Party in New York Hotel.

NEW YORK, July 8.—Baroness Helen Zur Muehlen, of Java, Dutch East Indies, was killed today, by a fall from a seventh story window of a downtown hotel.

Mrs. Susan Welen, the Baroness' companion, said they were to sail for Europe today, and that last night the Baroness gave a farewell party. As the party was about to break up, Miss Welen said, the Baroness went to a rear window in her suite and stood looking out over the roof. Suddenly her companion saw her press her hand to her heart, and topple forward over the window sill.

THREE KILLED, ONE HURT IN CAR CRASH

Car Hits Telegraph Pole Near White Plains, N. Y.—Driver Held.

WHITE PLAINS, N. Y., July 8.—Three men were killed, one injured and a fifth escaped unscathed, when their automobile, running into his car, crashed into a telegraph pole near White Plains and Tarrytown, N. Y., today.

ARMSTRONG BETTER

N. S. Premier Expected Out Again in Week, Following Operation.

HALIFAX, July 8.—Premier E. H. Armstrong, who underwent surgical treatment at the Victoria General Hospital yesterday for an infected leg, was reported from the hospital this morning as having passed a very restful night, and the expectation was expressed that he would be out within a week.

N. S. MAN DROWNED

Seven Others Rescued When Boat Upsets in Cumberland Basin.

AMHERST, N. S., July 8.—Alex. Reitor was drowned yesterday in Cumberland Basin off Minville, N. S., when a small boat, in which he and seven other people were rowing, capsized. The others in the boat were rescued. Reitor arrived in the county from the United States just a few days ago, to visit his family.

NEW YORK ACTOR SHOT BY CHORUS GIRL NIF

NEW YORK, July 8.—Allen Davis, 28, understudy to the leading man in the play White Cargo, was shot in the shoulder and head last night by his chorus girl wife in an apartment where he was dining with two friends. He was taken to the Polyclinic hospital in a serious condition.

Prompt Action of Civilian Averts Disaster on U. S. Train

SPRINGFIELD, Mass., July 8.—Just in time to hear the express whistle about a mile down the tracks. He tore off his coat and ran toward the oncoming express, waving it over his head. He attracted the attention of the locomotive crew just in time, and the train was brought to a stop only after the cowcatcher had thrust its way into the outermost branches of the fallen tree. Railroad officials say a train was almost certainly averted by McDonald's quick action.

Rain and Wind End One of Summer's Hottest Days

TROLLEYS STUCK

Districts Flooded, Lights and Telephones Disabled, Harbor Craft Endangered

BOSTON, July 8.—New England today was recovering from the effects of a series of severe thunderstorms, which swept over the section yesterday, accompanied by high winds and torrential rains, causing one death, scores of minor injuries, and property damage which will run into hundreds of thousands of dollars.

The storms ended one of the hottest days of the summer, the highest thermometer being 110 degrees, reported from Springfield.

Seven trolley cars, crowded with home-going passengers, were struck in various suburban districts, and in Maiden 800 to 400 passengers were forced to wade through four feet of water from a line of stalled cars. Scores of fires were started by lightning.

In outlying districts, gardens, sidewalks and road surfaces were washed away. Scores of homes were struck without light or telephone service, and several harbor craft in New England waters narrowly escaped being struck or driven ashore.

DEAD IN NEW YORK. NEW YORK, July 8.—The second day of the heat wave, which swept westward from the east from the middle west, has caused at least nine deaths, directly and indirectly, and dozens of prostrations.

Violent thunderstorms in most sections yesterday brought only temporary relief. Scores of buildings were struck by lightning.

In New York City a temperature of 90 degrees with high humidity struck one man and prostrated nine other persons. Three boys were drowned, a white youth giving his own life in an attempt to have two negro boys in the Harlem River. One died from the heat in Hoboken, N. J., and two were overcome.

105 IN WASHINGTON. Lightning killed a motor cyclist who sought shelter from the rain under a tree in Medford, Mass.

A farmer near Wheatfield, Pa., died of heart failure, while firemen battled a fire in his barn, struck by lightning. There were two deaths in Washington, when the mercury went up to 105.

SMALL CYCLONE

CORNING, N. Y., July 8.—A miniature cyclone sweeping through the business section of Ouzenzan, Pa., late yesterday, did damage that could not be estimated this morning. Without warning, the terrific wind followed a rainfall, winding its way through the main street and doing damage to practically every store. Windows and doors were broken and signs blown from their fastenings. More than fifty trees were uprooted. One of the largest trees was torn from the ground and blown on top of the house of Mrs. Margaret Chappell, while the grandstand in front of the school building was lifted in the air and deposited intact on the roof of a nearby residence. No one was injured.



DANGEROUS BUILDINGS.

It is easy to be wise after the event. Many now discover that the Pickwick Club building, by the collapse of which more than forty people were killed and many wounded, was dangerously weak and wholly unfit for occupation, yet that it had been inspected by an officer of the building department and pronounced "absolutely safe."

Not long ago there was a fire in one of the paper stores of this building, and after repairs were made it could not be again occupied without the approval of the Building Commission. That approval was given. An examination was being made for a new building, alongside the Pickwick Club, and it is now said that it must have been clear that the walls of the club building should have been given outside support, but the B. M. Co. says that a building inspector who is supposed to have examined the structure from roof to cellar a day or two before the accident decided that no shoring was necessary.

PROGRESSIVE "HANDICAPS"

Mr. Harry Leader, M. P. for Portage La Prairie, in an address to his constituents the other day praised the efforts of his fellow-Progressives to protect Western interests during the session at Ottawa but his testimony was a revelation of the party's troubles. There has been a great deal of comment throughout Canada of late regarding the split in the Progressive party. Considerable doubt has been expressed as to Mr. Forke's success in healing the breach toward the end of the session, although the leader has asserted that more harmonious relations were established. Judging from Mr. Leader's speech harmony in the Progressive party is still greatly needed.

In discussing the work of the Progressives, Mr. Leader described them as not only outnumbered but disorganized. Mr. Leader recognized that there is a general feeling throughout the country that the Progressive party is a failure, but with that view he did not agree. After four years' experience in Ottawa he felt justified in saying that the party is not a failure, but he immediately went on to make this statement concerning it: "Consider how we have been handicapped. Our party includes free traders, protectionists, men favorable to the Hudson Bay railway, men opposed to it; men who would tumble us over into the arms of the government, and others who wouldn't support any government."

These are handicaps indeed. A party made up of such elements could scarcely hope for that harmony which Mr. Forke says is essential to success. The Winnipeg Tribune says Mr. Leader's own description of the Progressive party is a failure, notwithstanding his protests to the contrary. Be that as it may, Western opinion as expressed by the newspapers in that section is not inclined to the view that either Liberals or Conservatives have much chance of electing supporters in the Prairie division when the federal contest comes.

BRITAIN AND MEXICO.

It is announced from Washington that negotiations between Great Britain and Mexico, looking to the re-establishment of diplomatic relations, have been halted in view of the situation created by the recent American note of warning to Mexico. Great Britain withdrew its Ambassador from the Mexican capital two years ago, because of the failure of the government to protect British subjects and to afford satisfaction in the case of the British legation which was killed. Six months ago informal negotiations were begun and some progress was being made toward a confession of sin from the American Secretary of State called the Mexican Government sharply to account.

The understanding is now that Great Britain will take no further steps until such time as Mexico has satisfied the American Government that the rights of foreign residents will be fully guaranteed. Failure to arrive at that stage will mean further American protests, and while the United States has made no threat of armed intervention, it is recognized as a likely consequence.

Canada's Motor Car Industry

In 1924 the 11 automobile factories in Canada produced 93,245 passenger cars, 19,049 trucks and 16,172 chassis, a total of 132,466 cars with an aggregate selling value of \$89,040,418. This was a decrease of 10 per cent. from the 1923 production of 147,202 cars valued at \$96,014,176, according to a statement issued by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics at Ottawa. With a capital investment of 50.5 million dollars and using raw materials costing 64 millions, the automobile industry employed 9,270 persons during 1924 and paid over 14.2 million dollars in salaries and wages.

Production of closed cars increased to 81,041 from 77,209 in 1923, but the output of open cars dropped 15 per cent. to 67,204 in the same time; production of trucks and chassis varied against 19,226, in 1923. The average selling value of motor cars remained about the same as for 1923, the figures being \$882,404.81, as compared with \$864 and for trucks \$450.

Registrations of passenger cars in Canada numbered 273,972, of trucks 55,572, and of other motor vehicles 22,574, giving a total of 352,118 registrations in 1924 as compared with 358,580 in 1923. Although production declined 10 per cent. below the 1923 total, the average number of wage-earners for 1924 was slightly higher at 7,867. In maximum of 4,819, and then declined to 7,467 in August and to 7,060 in December. Salaried workers numbered 408 making a total of 9,270 employees in 1924 as compared with 9,205 in the previous year.

Canada imported 6,544 passenger cars, 897 trucks, 27,311 engines, and automobile parts worth \$15,778,108, giving an aggregate import value of \$23,170,000 as compared with \$22,081,094 in 1923. Exports included 12,772 trucks, 43,888 passenger cars, and parts valued at \$4,092,040, a total value of \$31,864,040, a decrease of 6 millions from 1923.

This is the Centenary of the Match.

(London Observer.) This year is the centenary of the invention of the lucifer match, the invention of John Walker, a Stockton chemist, who discovered the igniting mixture (sulphide of antimony and chloride of potash) more or less by accident, and sold boxes of "friction matches" at 1s. 4d. each. The idea had been anticipated as far back as 1680 by Godfrey Hawkins, who used phosphorus to light pieces of wood dipped in sulphur. Other inventions on the same lines continued to be made, but it was John Walker who introduced the present scientific experiment and popular acceptance.

During its hundred years the match has had many variations of name. John Walker's became known as "Congreves," after Sir Wm. Congreve, the inventor of the Congreve rocket. In 1870 a Mr. Jones patented the "promethians," and a rival presently appeared under what a paper of the match called "the frightful name" of Lucifer matches. The safety match arrived from Sweden in 1828, and the progress of science brought the specialist varieties of vestas, fuses, and vestivians.

NEW SERVICE IS GAINING FAVOR

Torhamvan's Second Cargo From Here Greater Than First One

Shippers Save Money by Water Transportation From Here to Upper Canada.

The "Torhamvan," plying between the Maritime ports of Saint John and Halifax and the cities of Montreal, Toronto and Hamilton, made its second sailing from Saint John for the Kirkwood Line, Ltd., yesterday.

The freight secured on the last trip here from Upper Canadian cities was considerably greater than on the previous voyage. The steamer brought 280 tons of freight to Saint John in addition to a considerable quantity of general cargo discharged at Halifax.

The main items taken by the vessel on this, her second voyage since the inauguration of this service, were sugar and tea. There are approximately 3,100 tons of refined sugar, which according to a representative of the steamship company, means a saving of more than \$7,000 for the shippers over the railway freight rate. On the consignment of tea, which consists of 390 boxes containing 47,244 pounds, there would be a saving of about \$243 over the rail rate.

SUGAR AND TEA. Included in the Torhamvan's cargo on her initial voyage was 1,200 boxes of sardines for Montreal, totalling 48,000 pounds.

PLEAD FOR 'DRY' CANDIDATES

Reward Offered For Conviction of Assault of Long Island Servant.

PORT WASHINGTON, L. I., July 8.—Thomas Nolan of Haven avenue, Port Washington, will be arraigned before Justice of the Peace Jones to answer a charge of assault made by Helen Moyan, a maid, employed in the household of Carl Fischer, real estate developer and sportsman, at Sands Point.

Miss Moyan was returning from a bathing beach with Evelyn Barry and Helen Mosher, two other maids, when in front of the home of H. B. Anderson an automobile drew up and five men got out. One man is said to have tried to attack Miss Moyan.

Her screams, however, brought William Galloway, Fischer's negro butler, to the scene, armed with a repeating shotgun. He placed the muzzle of the shotgun against the body of Miss Moyan's assailant and pulled the trigger, but the gun failed to go off.

The five men fled, and Galloway conducted the young women back to the Fischer home. When members of the family were informed of what had taken place they notified Chief of Police Arthur Miller of Port Washington and he and Patrolman William Boyce began a search of the vicinity.

On the lawn of the Anderson home they found a cap which Chief Miller said was identical in a Port Washington store as that which had been sold to Nolan only a few days previously.

As an evidence of how the village was stirred by the affair, Chief Miller received a letter today from Charles W. Wyong, a former District Attorney of this county, offering \$500 reward for the arrest and conviction of the man responsible for the attempted attack on Miss Moyan. The reward is believed to have been offered by Mr. Fischer through Wyong.

The police say that John Kehoe and Michael Blake, also of Port Washington, have confessed being with Nolan in the automobile and have confirmed the story of the attack.

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ASK MARRIAGE BAN ON ALL DIVORCED

Episcopal Organization Calls Proviso Favoring Innocents Unscriptural.

NEW YORK, July 8.—The Society of Marriage Association has launched a movement to bar absolutely the marriage of divorced persons in the Protestant Episcopal church. The association announced that it was sending a petition for the repeal of the one proviso by which innocent parties in divorce based on infidelity have been allowed to marry, to the general convention of the Episcopal church for presentation at the biennial convention in New Orleans in October. The petition attacks the proviso on the ground that it is unscriptural and contrary to the practice of the early Christian church.

The proviso to the canon forbidding the remarriage of divorced persons is as follows: "This canon shall not be held to apply to the innocent party in a divorce for adultery; provided, that before the application for such remarriage a period of not less than one year shall have elapsed after the granting of such divorce; and that satisfactory evidence touching the facts in the case, includ-

ing a copy of the court's decree, and record if practicable, will, proof that the defendant was personally served or appeared in the action, be laid before the Ecclesiastical Authority, and such Ecclesiastical Authority, having taken legal action thereon, shall have declared in writing that in his judgment the case of the applicant conforms to the requirements of the canon; and provided, further, that it shall be within the discretion of any minister to decline to solemnize any marriage."

Consolidated Smelters Makes Overnight Gain of Nearly 4 Points

NEW YORK, July 8.—Stock prices swept forward in another outburst of bullish enthusiasm at the opening of today's stock market. New peak prices were established in the first few minutes of trading by Robert Reils, Woolworth, Electric Power certificates, and American Safety Razor. James Power Gives Facts of Great Encounters



"Your correspondence clearly accepted cup in good faith. Hoover's trip to England made in same spirit. Appeal to your British sportsmanship for immediate consent."

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

DETOURS FOR AUTO DRIVERS

Road Construction Between Rothesay and Hammond River the Cause.

Roundabout Ways Through Fine Scenic Places, Says Auto Assoc. Sec.

J. C. Berrie, secretary of the N. B. Automobile Association, said today that because of road construction going on between Rothesay and Hammond River, which is a part of one of the principal highways in the province, several detours have been provided between Rothesay and Hampton.

The first necessitates turning to the right at Rothesay church and following the Dolan road until the sign indicates a turn to the left, and then proceeding practically straight through a well gravelled road, which is being daily repaired, as far as French Village and Hammond River covered bridge. The way then is to Smithtown and thence to Lakeside and Hampton. This takes the automobilist through a part of the country not excelled for beauty of scenery.

There are other detours at Rothesay via the Gondola Point road, and a short distance beyond Gondola Point where a road leads over the hills to Model Farm, he said, which will eliminate, for a considerable time, any inconvenience caused by road construction between Hammond River and Rothesay. If the tourist wanted a real drive, Mr. Berrie said, he might go as far as Gondola Point Ferry, cross there, take the road to the old historic village of Kingston, and two miles beyond take the Ketchum road, plainly marked, to Hampton, and have an opportunity to see the most delightful scenery along the Norton shore and the Kennebecasis Valley to Hampton Village. The obstruction caused by road construction in this case, he concluded, afforded motorists and motor visitors opportunities for beautiful side line scenic views.
