Early Destruction of Paper Money Is Blamed on The Bootleggers

Washington, Aug. 22-The automobile and bootlegger were blamed for one more brand of trouble, when it was learned that they are believed partly responsible for the treasury's new policy of trying to substitute the old-fashioned silver dollar "cartwheel" for the crisp one dollar bill. It's the dirt.

The automobile and bootlegging are dirty businesses, the greasy and soiled bills with oily finger prints and the filthy bills that came out of the country's bootlegging centres so attest. Some of this money is so unfit that it is almost beyond description. So fast has the paper money, especially \$1 bills, been coming in because of this condition that the Government has been reduced to a hand to mouth condition so far as printing money is concerned.

It is unable to keep up with the demand for well seasoned, fresh, new money and the new \$1 bills have to be rushed from the Bureau of Engraving and Printing and shipped out to the banks of the country so fast that the ink is hardly dry. No time can be given at all for "seasoning," which experts agree is necessary to the life of a bill.
