

RISING. The addresses on footwear, also leather itself, and the retailers' condition, at present and in the near future, were well worth hearing by the delegates who were present from Halifax to Vancouver, he said. Mr. Rising had with him interesting memoranda as follows: The twenty shoemakers of 1667 were simply the forerunners of something like 160 factories today, capitalized at close to \$35,000,000, paying over \$10,000,000 in wages, and buying materials worth more than \$27,000,000 annually, much of which is produced by other Canadian industries employing Canadian labor. The net factory selling value of leather boots and shoes produced in Canada annually is now between \$46,000,000 and \$50,000,000. Even at present prices, however, the average production per establishment is comparatively small, being around \$300,000 annually. The average capital per establishment is slightly in excess of \$200,000. Small Units. The Canadian industry still consists

Small Units.

The Canadian industry still consists of comparatively small manufacturing units. Outside of three or four plants, the average production and average investment are small. This situation has been partly due, apparently, to the leasing system under which bench men or others with small capital could obtain equipment and become manufacturers of boots and shoes.

Many of these plants, under normal conditions, have made a very meagre return on investment over any considerable period, and every cycle of declining prices and slackening demand has men-

Thirteen Canadian factories have a combined production of over 15,000 pairs of shoes per day. There are, however, a number of small mills as well which turn out from 100 to 500 pairs per diem. In 1918 the largest Canadian manufacturing plant was producing only slightly over 2,600 pairs per day, although it output in 1919 was much larger.

One manufacturer in the United States has a daily production of more than all the Canadian plants combined. In connection with the consideration of competition from the United States and Great Britain, it will be shown that the boot and shoe manufacturers in the Dominion do not base and have not at any time based, domestic prices on prices abroad, plus duty, and that Canadian leather boots and shoes in certain lines are today actually lower in price than similar goods sold in the United States.

Montreal Leads.

Montreal Leads the boot and shoe manufacturing of Canada. In the Montreal district are some 53 factories, producing 46.3 per cent of all the leather footwear made in Canada. Ontario, with approximately the same number of factories, makes 30.8 per cent of the entire Canadian production. In Quebec

The commander of the schooner Amy G. McKean, which made a run from Halifax to Tralee in fifteen days is Captain Ryder, formerly in command of the St. John schooner, General Hogg, which he piloted 7,000 miles to safety with a broken rudder.

Four large sailing vessels, including the first square rigged vessel to enter the port this year, probably, are on their way to St. John. They are the British barkentine Whiteson, which sailed from Torrevieja, Spain, on July 4 with a rargo of salt; the five-masted schooner Dieppedale of Boulogne-sur-Mer, which sailed yesterday from Havre for St. John; and two four-masters, the British schooner, Harry A. McLennan, which left Setubal, Portugal, with sail on June 30, and the American schooner Mary Manson Gruener, which left Barbadoes with molasses on July 13.

A large three-masted schooner is being built at Moss Glen, Kings county, by Captain Peter McIntyre, of Main street. The schooner is being built under the supervision of Master Builder L. P. McLean. The work on the vessel was commenced about a year ago, and it is expected that it will be completed and ready for launching this fall. The tonnage of the schooner will be in the vicinity of 500, and it will be used for coastal and foreign trade. The house is being finished by Coes & McDonald, and the planking is being done by A. L. B. Smith, of Newcastle Creek. The schooner is owned by Captain Peter McIntyre and his son. A. A. McIntyre.

On a flight to Nome, Alaska, that promises to be historic, four army service atriplanes started from Mineola, Long Island, on last Wednesday, led by Captian St. Claire Street. The distance is practically 9,000 miles. The planes are Dehavlland 4-B machines.







WAR ON RODENTS, **BUT SPARE SNAKES**

Federal Biologist Says Worst Pests Are Imported Mice and Rats

Some Useful Flesh Eaters -Eagles, Hawks and Owls Are Listed as Doing More Good Than Harm.

(New York Times.)

(New York Times.)

Since time immemorial mice and rats we been a plague to the human race, le damage and destruction they did in ancient times are vividly described in the scriptures and subsequent histories and narratives of the world. What an annoyance and plague they were during the world war, when at times they swarmed into trenches, is known to every soldier. They are to be found in city, country and wilds. No place, it would seem, is too congested or remote for them to inhabit.

"The house mouse and three kinds of rats," David E. Lantz, assistant biologist in the department of agriculture, says in a bulletin to farmers, "are the only rodent pests in North America not native to the country. They are our most injurious rodents, however, and inflict nearly as much loss as do all the native species combined. House mice are easily trapped or poisoned, but poison is not suited for use in occupied dwellings. Traps, however, are sufficiently effective for clearing the premises of these pests. The ordinary small guillotine traps are recommended. They should be set as

The ordinary small guillotine traps are recommended. They should be set as lightly as possible and balted with oatmeal. A few grains should be placed on the trigger pan and a little more in he vicinity and close to the trap. Peristent trapping will soon clear an ordinary dwelling of mice.

"Rats are much more suspicious than mice and are rather hard to trap or poison. Either method of destroying them may be made effective by making inaccessible all food other than the baits used. The importance of rat-proofing buildings in extensive operations against these pests should not be overlooked; and much loss may be prevented by rat-proofing all containers of stored grains and food products. No one kind of poison can be relied upon to be effective under every circumstance. In general poisons cannot be used in occupied dwellings without disagreeable results, for no poison will prevent decomposition of dead bodies of rats. Inside of residences, therefore traps must be the main reliance. Simple traps of the guillotine type are recommended as best. Baits should be varied to suit local conditions—in meat markets grains are recommended, and where grain is stored meat and fish are more effective.

"Some cats and some dogs are useful against rats, but the well-fed and pampered feline or canine will refuse to hunt them. Ferrets are of no use in rat catching unless handled by an experienced person helped by trained dogs. Rat viruses seldom prove satisfactory, and in occupied premises are open to the same objections that hold against poisons; besides they are much more expensive.

"Under most circumstances the best."

"Under most circumstances the best results in ridding premises of rats may be obtained by the use of a sufficient number of ordinary guillotine traps. Oatmeal is recommended for bait, but fish, bacon, sausage and even pastry and cheese are sometimes usefal as alternatives. Traps should be set lightly, and all food other than baits should be covered or made inaccessible. Traps may be placed in runs, behind furniture or boards leaned against the walls, or at the entrance to rat holes. As they are often sprung when rats run over them, they need not always be baited. It is needless to say that in order to succeed the trapper must take an interest in his work and attend closely to every detail.

"Most carnivorous or fiesh-eating animals feed extensively on the rodent pests of the farm. Coyotes, fexes, wildcats, badgers, skunks, minks and other flesh-eating mamals are among the most potent agents in preventing an undue increase of mice, ground squirrels, pocket gophers and the like; and much of the damage now done by rodents is due to the unceasing warfare that has been waged against their enemies, the carnivorous animals.

The fact that many of them destroy far more noxicus rodents than do useful animals has often been forgotten, and, in the name of game protection, legislatures have sometimes proscribed by bounties species that dof far more good than harm. As a matter of fact many of our fur animals are an asset to the country, equally as valuable as our game, and experience has often proved that their destruction is no real help to game conservation.

"Birds of prey, including eagles, hawks and owls, may be included in the list of fiesh-eating animals that on the whole are more useful than harmful, because their chief economic function is to destroy noxious rodents. A few species of hawks that feed mainly on small birds should not lead to warfare against the individual. It is within the should not lead to warfare against the individual. Hardware commodities manufactured from iron or steel continue to advance in price and the tendency is for still higher quotations. Many important price changes have been made this week and with the exception of linseed oil and

turpentine all lines have been revised upwards.

Wrought pipe prices have again been advanced. Wire nails also have higher quotations. Nipples, couplings and unions are up several points. A sharp advance has been made on lanterns. Bar iron and steel, wash benches, wringers and washing machines. clay picks, mattocks, car movers, sisal and jute halters, polishing mops, curry combs, cross cut saw sets, pipe wrenches, toilet clippers. sweat pads, shears, roofing shingles, roofing nails, gem casters, chandelier hooks, rope cleats, hitching rings, nail pullers, stocks and dies, pliers, carpenters' pincers, plumb bobs, band screws, whiffietrees, doubletrees and neck yokes, bull rings, paper clips, paper files and some lines of cutlery all are on the list of higher revised prices.

Many are concerned for future delivery of goods especially for fall delivery, on account of the set back the majority of industries have experienced, owing to the tie-up of freight transportation. The great shortage of coal is also an important factor in holding back production. The scarcity of many lines of hardware is not being readily overcome and many will have to be satisfied with a smaller turnover on account of not being able to secure the goods to sell. Wire and wire products are daily becoming more scarce with little-signs of an early relief.
