Daily Hints For the Cook

Cream Pie One-half cup sugar, one-quarter tablespoon flour, one tablespoon ecrnstarch. Mix and all one egg, and one yolk (white saved out for frosting) beat well, add one pint of milk and cook in double boiler. When done and partly cool add vanilla or lemon flavor. Cover with meringue and brown in over

Macaroon Pudding

Soak six macaroons in half cup of milk (or use the tiny macaroons that may be bought in bulk, and soak about a dozen). Heat a pint of milk in a double boiler, add one beaten egg, two tablespoons cornstarch, pinch of salt and the macaroons. Stir well to make it smooth and cook about twenty minutes. Take from the fire and add a little vanilla. Butter a pudding dish, sprinkle sugar over the bottom and sides, turn in the pudding and sprinkle sugar on top. Cover and set where it will cool gradually. Serve very cold. The sugar will make a sauce, or you may use oranges also when you serve the pudding.

DIXON GUILTY

ON ONE CHARGE

Judge Will Submit Case to Attorney-General--Afternoon Session of County Court

At the afternoon session of the court he case of the King vs. Robert Dixor vas taken up before his honor and the following jury, Wilfred C. Day, John S Russell, Bayard Stillwell, Charles A. Conway, Berton Evans, Frank S. Alvood, G. Heber Arnold, George T. Caljoun, Frederick Selby and George G. Keirstead and Percy J. Steele. Thomas Dillon was stood aside by the crown and William Gibbon was challenged by

nd William Gibbon was challenged by he accused.

The prisoner on being arraigned deaded not guilty to the charges consined on the two counts in the indictment that he "did on July 23 last attempt to murder Adam Macintyre and hat he did on the same day attempt to sasult Mr. Macintyre with intent to do revious bodily harm."

Adam P. Macintyre was the first witness for the crown and told of the prisoner coming into his office and trawing a knife. Edmund Chase, a city marshal, told of taking the knife from Dixon. Officer Alex. Crawford told of the arrest, and G. Earle Logan, who was present in the chamberlain's office at the time Dixon came in, told of hearing the accused threaten "to get" Macintyre at either dinner or supper time.

Dixon was not represented by counsel and handled his own case. He said that Mr. Macintyre robbed him of his share in his father's property and at one time intimated to the court that if he got a "jackknife" trial he would report the matter to the minister of justice.

The jury retired at 3.40 and returned at 8.48 finding the accused not guilty on the first count and guilty on the second. He will be sentenced later. His honor intimated that he would submit the matter to the attorney general.

In the case of the King vs. Boylen, Mr. Barry moved that a bench warrant be issued for his arrest. The accused is out on bail and did not turn up at the opening of the court. E. S. Ritchie is defending.



Dr. Hastings, Medical Health Office, Toronto, advises that the following solution rubbed lightly on the hand and face before retiring, will keep away the most insistent and blood-thirsty mosquito:— Equal parts of oil of sweet almonds and oil of citronella, or equal parts of oil of citronella and spirits of camphor. Indeed any aromatic odor is fairly effective.

Another good expedient for those who do not find the odor of carbolic acid objectionable is to hang at the head of the bed a cloth moistened with a solution of the acid. To relieve itchiness after mosquito bites the punctured spot should be rubbed with a moistened piece of laundry or ordinary castile soap. Household ammonia is even more effective, while almost any alkali is good.
