MINERS CLAIM VICTORY
Madisonville Ky., April 3.—Striking coal miners in Christian, Webster and Hopkins counties claimed first victory last night when it was announced the Circle City Coal Co. met their demands and signed a one year contract, effective on Tuesday.

Pointing out that seventeen per cent. of last year's tax assessment remained uncollected at the end of the year, Duncan G. Lingley, city chamberlain, in his yearly report presented to the Common Council today, expressed the opinion that there would not be any improvement in this connection until a change in income taxation was made which married men with families would receive a larger exemption than at present.

Under the present regulations no distinction is made by the city between married and single men. Those carrying \$1,000 or less receive exemption of \$400; between \$1,000 and \$1,500 the exemption is \$200, and those carrying more than \$1,500 get no exemption.

Not any debentures were issued during the year, but an issue to provide for capital expenditure in 1922 will be necessary in the immediate future.

Moscow, April 3.—Vicar General Butchavitch was executed, the Pravda says the execution occurred on March 31. The Pravda asserts: "The sentence of death on Butchavitch, whose reprieve was refused, has been carried out." The time and place are not given.

Protests of No Avail—Believed He was Placed Before a Firing Squad—Brief References Made in Moscow Papers.
The details of the execution will probably never be known, judging from what has happened in previous cases. It is thought probable that after the execution had already taken place, they branded the rumors as false and asserted that "Soviet justice" must take its course regardless of protests and attacks abroad.

ALBINO NEGRO IN HOSPITAL

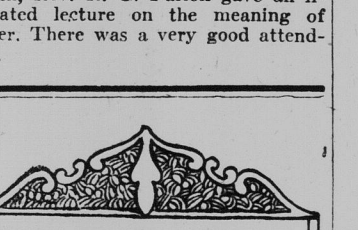

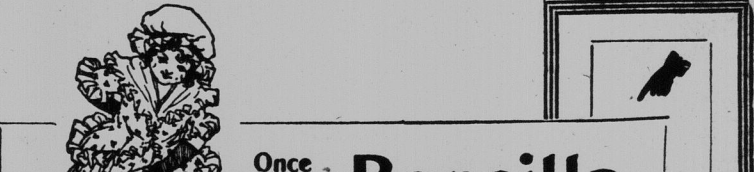

OBJECTION TO PROPOSED BILL

Matter Up at Hospital Meeting—Reports of Record Month Presented.

A delegation from the County Hospital Board was present yesterday afternoon at the meeting of the Board of Commissioners of the General Public Health, Mr. A. G. Aggar presided. J. King Kelley presented a copy of the bill now before the Legislature. It was an amendment to the act relating to public hospitals and concerned the responsibility of the place of residence of a non-resident patient who was cared for in a hospital and was unable to pay for treatment. He objected to the clause making it necessary for a county councillor or supervisor of the poor to furnish a certificate before any case but an emergency could be treated. He also felt that the bill should make either husband or wife responsible. Dr. H. A. Ferris objected to the clause that said an incurable case discharged from one hospital could not be treated at another. A committee consisting of Mr. Aggar, Dr. E. J. Ryan, Mr. Kelley, Dr. Ferris and L. W. Simms was appointed to act in the interests of the General Public and County hospitals. Arrangements were made for an adjourned meeting to complete the business.

MEASLES SRUM REPORTED TO GIVE FULL IMMUNITY

Paris, April 3.—Dr. Mery, director of the Emile Zola Hospital for Children at Meulan, has reported to the Academy of Medicine the discovery of a protective serum against measles. The serum is taken from the blood of children who have just recovered from the disease, and inoculation with it seems to afford a certain though probably only temporary immunity against contagion.

The method is based on the results of the researches of Charles Nicolle, director of the Pasteur Institute in Tunis, who has shown that by the injection of the serum of convalescents children as well as adults can be protected against an outbreak of measles. Dr. Mery had occasion to keep within bounds by this method two epidemics. It was shown that an injection made at the beginning of the incubation time and the breaking out of the disease—was followed by a mild development of the disease.

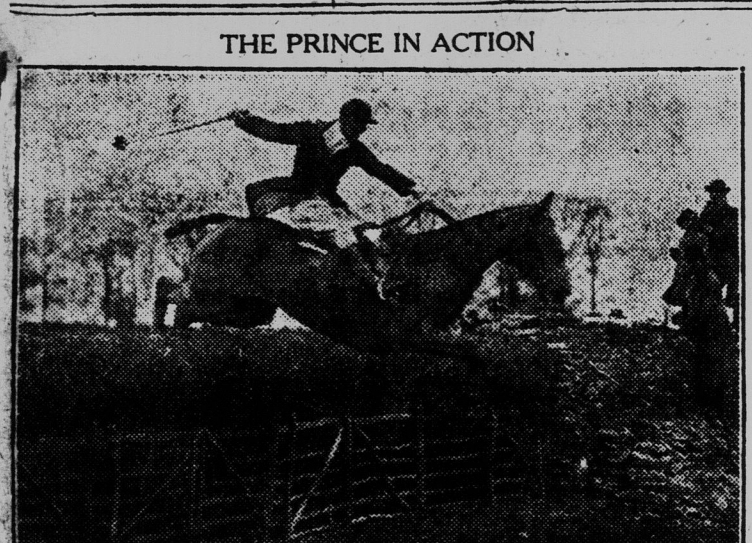

CECIL, AS APOSTLE OF LEAGUE, ARRIVES TO CONVERT AMERICA

Eminent Briton is Frank in Discussing Mission—Eager to See U. S. Sitting in World Court.

(New York Tribune.) His stooped, lank form, bundled like a person's in black frock and loose-fitting topcoat and wearing a circular-crowned black felt hat, Lord Robert Cecil, member of a distinguished English family, leading European advocate of the League of Nations, arrived here on the Majestic on Tuesday as an avowed apostle from the League to unbelieving Americans.

The object of his visit, which will last a month and take him to nine cities in this country and Canada, is twofold, he told reporters who met him at the Majestic.

"I do not want to beat around the bush about it," he said when asked for a statement of his purpose in coming here. "My trip is obviously for the purpose of explaining the league, of answering questions and something of difficulties—in short, of popularizing the League of Nations in the United States."

Argument, Not Fear, His Forte.

Lord Robert received newspaper men, sitting slumped and almost motionless in a corner of a writing room on the Majestic, where he submitted to volleyed questioning for a half hour. He spoke slowly, at times hesitating over his answers, and a quick, easy smile came and vanished repeatedly. Although he left no doubt of his complete absorption in the league cause, he stated his case quietly and without fervor. It is clear that he has no de-

signs on the emotions of Americans, and that he will seek to evangelize with argument rather than fervor. The most distinguished Cecil of his generation is built on Lincolnian lines. Preternaturally tall and gaunt, with deep-set eyes, prominently arched nose and thin cheeks, he exhibits many points of resemblance to the martyred President. Standing, he appears as a relaxed samphire, rising erect to a point midway of his shoulders, where he droops abruptly, thrusting his head forward almost at right angles to his body, his arms hanging loose. He walks with a vigorous, rhythmic roll. He discussed freely his mission, the accomplishments of the league, the world court, his desire to see America enrolled in both and his pleasure at being in this country.

Refuses To Be "Presumptuous."

Asked if he thought America should join the league, he replied:—"I should be very glad to see America enter the league, but it appears a bit presumptuous for a foreigner who has just landed—and I haven't landed yet—to suggest what America should do."

"But if I should like to see the United States in the league, I am just as strong an advocate of Germany's entrance. It is my impression that if Germany applied she would be admitted. I should like to see Russia in also. I favor the admission of all countries. All the more, if there is one you distrust, because if you distrust a country it is better to have it in where you can observe it, than out."

To the question whether the league can function without America, he replied, pointedly, "It has." Adding a moment later: "It will be, of course, much more of a real League of Nations with the United States in it."

Lord Robert said he would heartily welcome this country's adherence to the world court, pointing out that the tribunal is an independent organization from the league, and saying he believed such reservations as might be affixed to American membership would be hospitably received in England and France.

Sees Aid to Peace of World.

After expressing his pleasure at hearing recounted evidences of growing support for American entrance into the court, he said:—"America's joining the world court would be of immense advantage to the court and of advantage to the peace of the world. Evidently, the more countries that come in the more the court will be strengthened and the United States would bring an unique addition of authority and prestige because of its record in international arbitration."

Told of Senator Borah's advocacy of compulsory arbitration of compelling nations to submit their differences to the court, Lord Robert expressed agreement. "I favor the principle of compelling nations to arbitrate their disputes, but I would not wish to push it too rapidly," he said, adding that he did not know whether European public opinion would support that extension of the court idea at present. Lord Robert evaded a direct expres-

Dies To Save Man Walking in Street

Motorcycle Policeman Crashes Into Elevated Pillar and is Instantly Killed.

New York, April 2.—A motorcycle policeman and a taxi cab driver were killed in accidents in the city streets one day last week. Two others were injured when an automobile truck ran wild in Washington Avenue, the Bronx.

James R. Baker, the motorcycle policeman, was driving south on Milford Street when, near Pitkin Avenue, Joseph Ross crossed the street. Ross became confused and Baker, to avoid hitting him, swerved sharply. His rear wheel skidded and he ran into an elevated pillar.

This body was wedged between the pillar and the motorcycle. Rose called other policemen and an ambulance from Barford Street Hospital was summoned. Dr. Richter found that the policeman had been killed instantly. The speedometer showed that Baker had been going eighteen miles an hour when he struck the pillar.

Baker joined the Police Department three years ago. He had previously served in the Navy. He had won several medals for athletic events.

Thomas Coleman, 42, a taxi cab driver, was killed by a touring car while waiting in line with about thirty other chauffeurs before the Bureau for the Inspection of Taxicabs. None of the other drivers saw the accident and they knew nothing of it until they saw his body in the street. Some of them recalled that a touring car had passed at high speed a few minutes before.

Mrs. Sadie Shank, 40, and Fernando Lombardi, 32, were injured when an automobile truck ran wild on Washington Avenue. The driver of the truck, Charles Schliefer, was arrested on a charge of reckless driving.

Schliefer, according to witnesses, turned out to pass a horse-drawn vehicle and swerved into a small touring car. The impact tore a front wheel off the lighter car. The truck then ran upon the sidewalk, striking Lombardi, a street cleaner, and Mrs. Shank who was passing. It came to a stop against a railing in front of Public School 42.

The injured persons were taken to the Bronx Hospital, where they were treated by Dr. Frank Mrs. Shank had scalp cuts and possible internal injuries. Lombardi's right arm and shoulder were sprained and he had possible internal injuries.

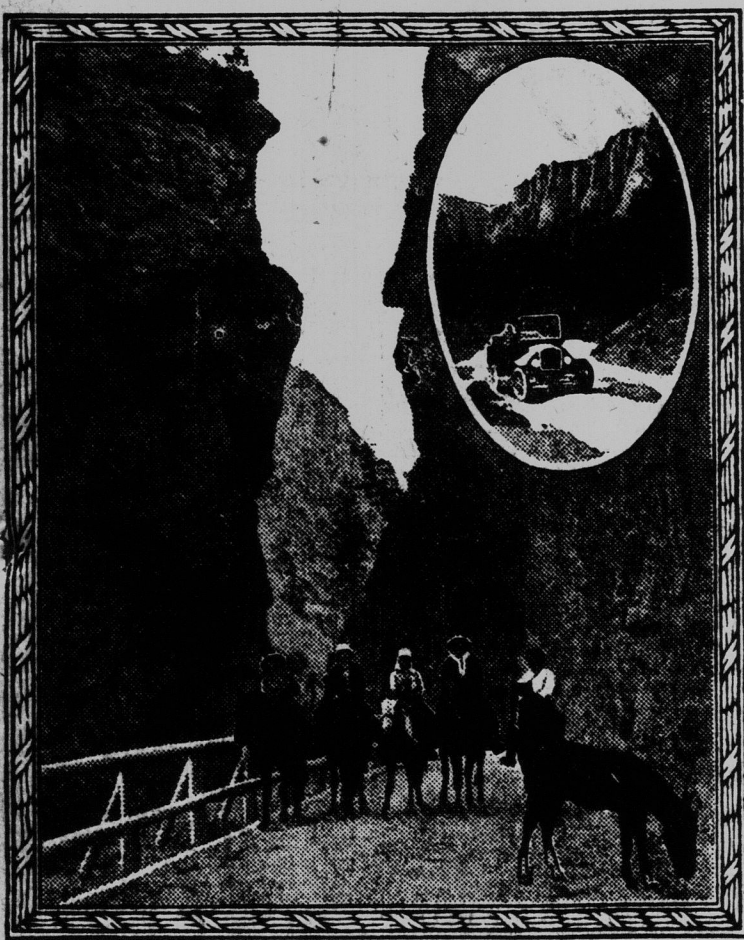

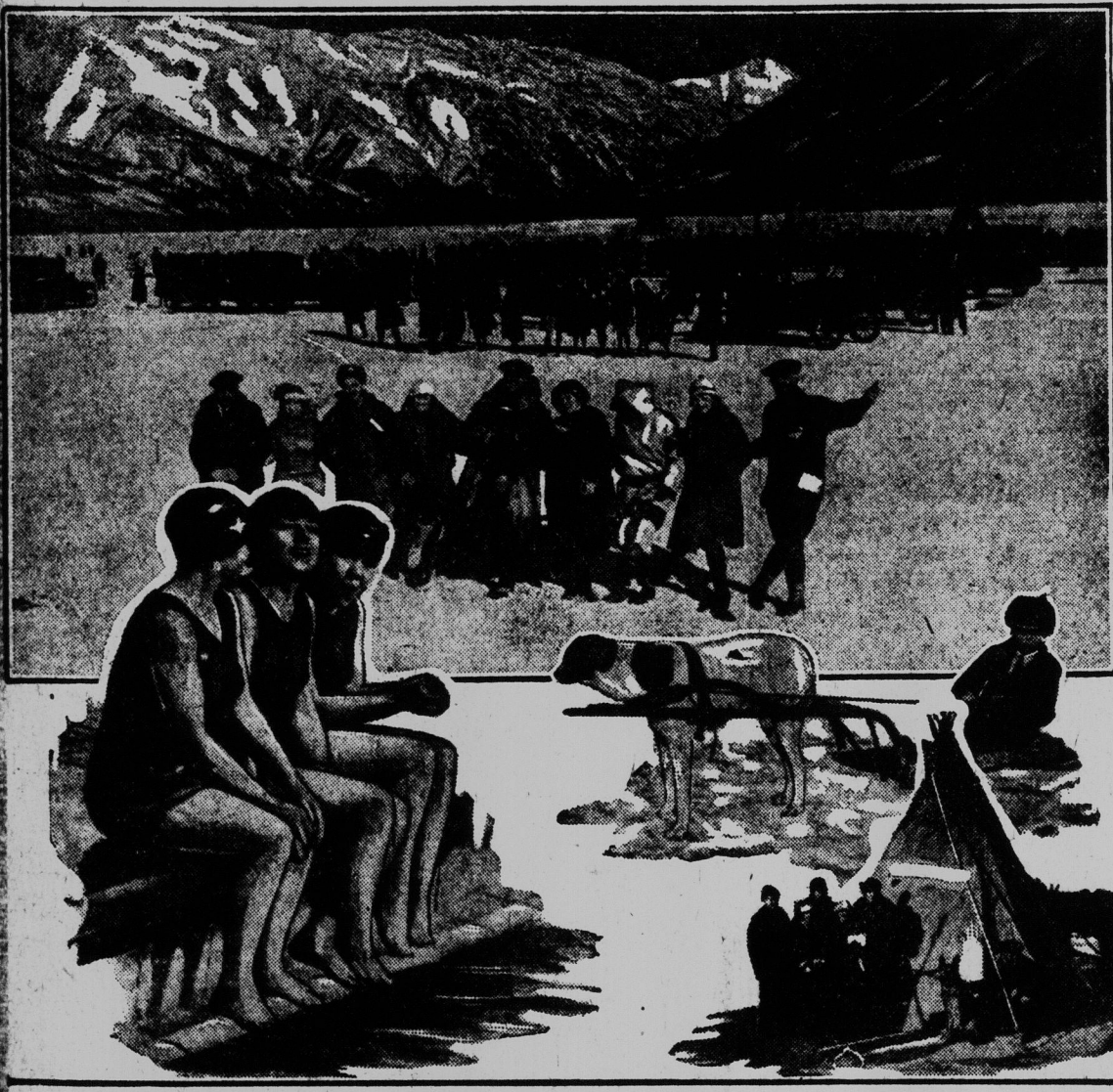

FRANCE GOES AHEAD ON NAVY GUN RANGING CHANGES
Ministry of Marine Makes No Secret of Activities in Alteration of Turrets

Paris, March 30.—(By The Associated Press).—The navy ministry is making no secret of the slight changes on the battleships of the French navy, and it is through this channel that many details of the alterations have become available. It is explained that the old observation posts on each of the two masts are being altered and converted in a manner that the director of the warship's fire stationed at the top may control the fire of all the guns. This is done by a well known system of mechanical devices, with light control wires running to the guns through hollow masts attached to the mainmast. Increased range for the guns is being obtained by enlarging the angle of elevation of the guns. It is pointed out that this involves the cutting away of a certain amount of steel in each turret, thus increasing the risk of the turret being struck by shells in the interior of the turret.

The address concludes: "The courage is simply courage plus the tenacity and the stubbornness in the face of danger which characterized the 'old sea dog,' and which has built up the history of the British Isles and England, now being shared by his sons and heirs to past deeds. Captain, you have been true to the old tradition, and that medal which is conclusively given for life saving at sea cannot rest on a nobler bearing. In the name of France let me render it to you."

The Feeble Minded

(E. M. M., in Halifax Chronicle)

Every authority on the question of feeble-mindedness in children insists upon the necessity for segregation and special training for them, to the end that they may know happiness and a certain degree of usefulness. Also that society as a whole may be less menaced by them and their criminal potentialities. Experience justifies this contention. Now that we know that reformation is impossible for them, and that the road first traveled is the road they will continue to travel, we are realizing how necessary it is to begin training early.

Any community which has a group of feeble-minded children within its limits is in duty bound to provide a home for their custodial care and training.

ard of comparison, there is, of course, no "adult" feeble-minded. But from a physical standpoint they are adults, that is, chronologically speaking. Moreover, they have the impulses and passions of an adult with the mind and will and judgment of a young child for their handling. If the feeble-minded child is like oil-soaked cotton waste with a lighted match always suspended near it, the feeble-minded adult is like T. N. T. in an iron foundry.

From the ranks of the adult feeble-minded come the larger number of murderers, thieves, prostitutes, vagrants, unmarried mothers, sufferers from and carriers of venereal diseases, as well as incendiaries, drunkards and paupers. These are not the classes that go to make a country successful. They are instead the cloth that eats the fabric of Christian civilization, leaving it weakened and unfit to stand the strain of centuries. As we learned before, punishment is neither deterrent nor reformative in its effect. Nor is education possible to the adult feeble-minded. There is no moral sense to

which to appeal, there is no deep sentiment to arouse, no sympathy to noble, no regret, no vision.

Segregation for those whose evil tendencies rule their lives is the only hope. This is particularly true of the feeble-minded female during the child-bearing age. If she is at large, the chances are ten to one that she will add one or more feeble-minded infants to the group the public must directly support, or indirectly through being preyed upon. A custodial home for feeble-minded females of child-bearing age will not only benefit the present age, but is the only thing that will tend to eliminate this group in the years to come.

Feeble-minded males, however, are a menace to the welfare of any community. If they are arrived at manhood without proper training, they are the source of supply for law-breakers, tramps, burglars, highwaymen, thieves and criminals generally. It is impossible to say when the strain will come which will prove too great for them to withstand—a harmless crea-

ture today, tomorrow possibly a murderer, because the environment and opportunity are provided.

The main argument in favor of failure to provide proper homes for the care of these hapless creatures is the financial cost of constructing, equipping and maintaining such institutions. It is evidence of lack of vision, in itself an indication of a mental defect, that cannot see cost in its relation to the future as well as in the present. For every ten thousand dollars we refuse to spend now, we will be forced to spend a million later on.

To refer to the much-quoted Juliet family, whose history was thoroughly investigated and traced, the State which failed to take care of two feeble-minded sisters, in seventy-five years paid a million and a quarter of dollars in caring for the paupers and prosecuting the criminals who were their direct descendants. And as that was not the end of the family, the end of the cost was not reached.

The same thing holds true of the feeble-minded youth. A few years in a reform school, particularly if those in charge have no natural characteristics and no technical training to fit them for handling the feeble-minded will do no good. As soon as released from such an institution a feeble-minded person will return to the old life of crime, and during his whole experience will go through that same routine. Mallart turned on the hot water and went away for twenty minutes. When he returned the patient was dead.
