SOCIETY.

LAWS AND REGULATIONS

OF THE

British and Foreign Bible Society.

I. The designation of the Society shall be THE BRITISH AND FOREIGN BIBLE SOCIETY, of which the main object shall be to encourage a wider circulation of the Holy Scriptures, without note or comment; the only copies in the language of the United Kingdom to be circulated by the Society, shall be the authorized Version.

II. This Society shall add its endeavours to those employed by other Societies; for circulating the Scriptures through the British Dominion; and shall also, according to its ability, extend its influence to other countries, whether Christian, Mohammedan or Pagan.

III. Every subscriber of One Guinea annually shall be a member.

IV. Every subscriber of Ten Guineas at one time shall be a member for life.

V. Each subscriber of Fifty Pounds at one time, or who shall by one additional payment, increase his original subscription to Fifty Pounds, shall be a Governor for life.

VI. Governors shall be entitled to attend and vote at all meetings of the Committee.

VII. An Executor, paying a bequest of Fifty Pounds, shall be a member for life; or, of One Hundred Pounds, a Governor for life.

VIII. A Committee shall be appointed to conduct the business of the Society, consisting of thirty-six laymen, six of whom shall be foreigners, resident in London or its vicinity; half the remainder shall be members of the Church of England, and the other half members of other denominations of Christians. Twenty-seven of the above number,

who shall have most frequently attended, shall be eligible for re-election for the ensuing year.

The Committee shall appoint all officers except the Treasurer, and call Special General Meetings, and shall be charged with procuring for the Society suitable patronage, both British and Foreign.

IX. Each member of the Society shall be entitled, under the directions of the Committee, to purchase Bibles and Testaments at the Society's prices, which shall be as low as possible.

X. The annual meeting of the Society shall be held on the first Wednesday of May, when the Treasurer and Committee shall be chosen, the accounts presented, and the proceedings of the foregoing year presented.

XI. The President, Vice-President, and Treasurer shall be considered *ex officio* members of the Committee.

XII. Every clergyman or dissenting minister who is a member of the Society, shall be entitled to attend and vote at all meetings of the Committee.

XIII. The Secretaries for the time being shall be considered as members of the Committee; but no other person deriving any emolument from the Society shall have that privilege.

XIV. At the general meeting, and at the meetings of the Committee, the President, or in his absence the Vice-President; first upon the list then present; and in the absence of the Vice-President the Treasurer, and in his absence such member as shall be voted for the purpose, shall preside at the meeting.

XV. The Committee shall meet on the first Wednesday of every month, or oftener if necessary.

XVI. The Committee shall have the power of nominating such persons as have rendered essential service to the Society, either Members for life, or Governors for life.

XVII. The Committee shall have the power of nominating Honorary members from among foreigners who have promoted the object of the Society.

XVIII. The whole of the minutes of every general meeting shall be signed by the Chairman.

REGULATIONS

Adopted at the Annual General Meeting of the Society in 1826 and 1827.

I. That the fundamental law of the Society, which limits its operations to the circulation of the Holy Scripture, be fully and distinctly recognized as excluding the circulation of the Apocrypha.

II. That in conformity to the foregoing resolution, no pecuniary aid can be granted to any Society circulating the Apocrypha; nor, except for the purpose of being applied in conformity to the said resolution, to any individual whatever.

III. That in all cases in which grants, whether gratuitous or otherwise, of the Holy Scriptures, either in whole or in part, be made by the Society, the books issued be bound, and on the express condition that they shall be distributed without alteration or addition.

IV. That all grants of Scriptures to the Society which circulate the Apocrypha, be made under the express condition that they be sold or distributed without alteration or addition; and the proceeds of the sale of any such copies of Scripture be held at the disposal of the British and Foreign Bible Society.

LAWS AND REGULATIONS
OF THE
NOVA SCOTIA BIBLE SOCIETY.

I. This Society shall be called ~~THE BIBLE SOCIETY OF~~ NOVA SCOTIA AND ITS DEPENDENCIES; the object of which shall be the same as that of the British and Foreign Bible Society, viz., to encourage the circulation of the Holy Scriptures without note or comment, and to furnish copies of the Scriptures gratis to the indigent, and at reduced prices to those requiring them.

II. The business of the Society shall be conducted by a President, Vice-President, Treasurer, Secretary, and a Committee.

III. In order to give effect to the designs of this institution, benefactions and subscriptions shall be solicited, and books opened for receiving the names of benefactors and subscribers.

IV. Every person contributing annually ten shillings at one time, or a donation of ten pounds, shall be considered a member of the Society.

V. A general meeting of the members of this Society shall be held every year, before which will be laid the accounts and proceedings of the preceding year.

VI. The whole of the subscriptions and donations, after deducting the incidental expenses, shall be remitted annually in aid of the funds of the British and Foreign Bible Society.

VII. Every member of the Society shall be entitled to purchase, under the direction of the Committee, Bibles and Testaments at the reduced prices of the Society, which are as low as possible.

VIII. The Committee shall be authorized to meet for the purpose of conducting the business of this Society as often as may be necessary, and shall have power to add to their number as occasion may require.

SUGGESTIONS

FOR THE COMPLETE

ORGANIZATION AND WORKING

OF A

BRANCH BIBLE SOCIETY.

ANY BRANCH, which, in the past has not attained eminence as a tributary to the AUXILIARY—whose annual grant has not compared favorably with others in districts of less note as to population, wealth or religious privileges, is earnestly requested to consider the following suggestions of means whereby its latent resources may be made more available in the blessed cause of Bible dissemination.

1. The Bible Society being undenominational, care should be taken to preserve its character, as such, in its Branch organization and operation, and to this end the *committee* and *collectors* should, as far as possible, represent every Christian denomination in its district. The *sheet* in the *Auxiliary's Report* containing the *list of Branches* is divided into four columns: one for the name of the Branch and three for the *chief members* of Committee, viz. . *President, Treasurer* and *Secretary*. Where there are more than three denominations in any district, they can be represented by *Vice-Presidents*. When a branch embraces an extensive district, its outlying sections should also be represented by *Vice-Presidents*, who could superintend the work of collecting in their respective localities.

2. At every ANNUAL MEETING (which it is desirable should be held during the *Agent's visit*), the COMMITTEE, if necessary, should be re-cast and *collectors appointed, competent to present the Society's claims, and earnestly interested in the work*; for to zealous collectors, rather than to Committee or contributors, belong the honor of placing the silver and the gold at the service of the Redeemer.

3. Should a Committee be impaired by the death or removal of any of its *chief members*, notice of such should be furnished the Agent at the earliest opportunity.

4. Each Branch should decide upon always carrying on the work of collecting during the month most favorable for such in its district, (of which, also, the Agent should be informed) and, previous to the collector's canvass, the annual reports of the Auxiliary should be distributed among the *best* subscribers, and placed in the hands of other persons likely to become valuable supporters. And during the canvass *all* ministers of the gospel should be notified of the same, and asked to encourage their congregations in a liberal response to the collector's call.

5. When a Committee receives notice from the Agent of his intended visit, no delay should be made in appointing the place of meeting and making such known from the pulpit and press; for the delay of a day may possibly result in the preclusion of the meeting by another of merely local interest, whose object might as well be attained at any other time, whereas *the loss of one day means the loss of a whole year*, in so far as a due visitation of the Branch by the Agent is concerned. All ministers in the district should receive special invitations to be present on the platform, and should also be requested to call the attention of their congregations to the meeting, and urge upon them their attendance. The editors of local newspapers should also be asked to insert a brief notice of the meeting.

6. As the annual accounts of the Auxiliary are *closed on the last working day of December*, it is desirable that remittances, with lists of subscribers, should be forwarded to the Secretary or Treasurer in Halifax, not later than Christmas.

7. Any Branch can, if necessary, have its DEPOSITORY, but such should be under its own care. During the Agent's visit, a statement of all Bibles in stock should be duly rendered and payment made to him or the Committee. The depository may be paid a commission of 10% on his sales. *All orders for the supply of Bibles for the Depositor should be sent by the Secretary of the Branch to the Secretary of the Auxiliary in Halifax.*

8. In view of the transcendent aim and ever growing work of the British and Foreign Bible Society, it is hoped that in every locality *a few persons* may feel moved to espouse its cause as their *special Christian Work*, and use their influence in making their Branch an institution deeply established in the popular heart.

EIGHTY-FIFTH ANNIVERSARY

OF THE

Nova Scotia Auxiliary Bible Society,

HELD IN

ST. MATTHEW'S AND BRUNSWICK STREET
(METHODIST) CHURCHES.

The annual meeting of the Nova Scotia Branch of the British and Foreign Bible Society was held in St. Matthew's and Brunswick Street churches, Jan. 5th. The President, J. C. MACKINTOSH, Esq., presided in St. Matthew's, and CAPT. THORPE, R. E., in Brunswick Street church.

The following report was read by REV. H. L. ALMON :

In presenting to their friends and subscribers a brief abstract of their seventieth annual report, the committee of the Nova Scotia Bible Society remind them that their object is to encourage the circulation of the Holy Scriptures, without note or comment, throughout the world, and to furnish copies freely to the poor and at reduced prices to those needing them, and that in order to carry out this design the whole of their subscriptions and donations, after deducting the incidental expenses, are remitted annually in aid of the funds of the British and Foreign Bible Society.

The total receipts of the Bible Society from all sources for the year ending 31st of March, 1898, were £229,749 14s. 3d. Of this amount £91,392 17s. 2d. was derived from sales. The total payments amounted to £221,857 13s. 6d.

During the past year the work has advanced in all departments. The issues of Bibles, Testaments and portions of the Holy Scriptures are 4,387,152—611,019 copies above the total for the previous year. This increase consisted of over 2,300 Bibles, 270,600 Testaments and 300,900 portions.

The average number of colporteurs abroad has risen by over 250, and colportage sales (1,300,000 copies) have advanced 200,000 copies. These issues exceed the largest annual issues of the society ever announced by 181,120. The number of Bible women employed by grants made to the various missionary societies and missions at work in the east has been increased by over 200, making a total of 500. These Bible women in their ministry of love not only read the Bible to secluded eastern women, but teach some of them to read it for themselves; they also visit them in the wards of hospitals, in famine relief works, crowded by thousands of otherwise inaccessible women; they tell of Jesus, the true bread of life among all classes of society, they spread the glad tidings of the gospel of peace. Through their efforts through the past year 1,873 became able to read the Scriptures and every week about 31,000 heard the Bible read. They also circulated over 17,000 Bibles, testaments and portions of which, 12,777, were sold. This precious seed will not be loss.

In China the open door is widening rapidly and last year's circulation exceeded 560,000 copies, an increase of 200,000 copies on that of the year preceding. The expansion of Eastern Siberia must increase the society's work in the Russian Empire, where the circulation already reaches 550,000 copies in over 50 languages. In India, in spite of want, famine and plague, the circulation has risen to nearly half a million.

Preparation is being made to meet the opportunities which promise in the near future in the Philippine Islands, in Bolivia, in British Central Africa, and the Upper Nile. Over 100 Auxiliary Societies have been added to the home department, and to the associated societies abroad there has been a similar addition. Colportage work has been carried on with vigor in different parts of England and 36,000 copies were circulated by colportage during the journeys made by the Manchester Auxiliary Bible van.

In the work of translating the Bible into new languages and revising and improving old translations continued progress goes on. 12 languages and dialects have been added during the last year to the society's list of translations which have now risen to 351. "Since the last anniversary, the Queen's Diamond Jubilee has been celebrated. Bound samples of almost all the 106 new languages, in which translations of more or less of the Bible appeared for the first time on the society's list during the Queen's reign, were presented to Her Majesty and found a home in the library of Windsor Castle.

The issue of Tavara St. Mark, which is now being printed in New Zealand, will introduce a new language into the society's translations. There is also a new translation of

the Gospel of St. Mark into Quiché for Indians in Guatemala, made by a native scholar under the direction of the society's sub-agent in Central America.

A new translation of the Gospel of St. John in Goudi has been made under the supervision of the Church Missionary Society's mission to the Goud Aborigines in India. Details as to several other new languages or added translations will be found in the full annual report. The revisions of Holy Scripture in eleven of the great languages of India and Ceylon are at present undergoing elaborate and careful revision. Through the kind co-operation of the Chief Missionary Societies the best European and native Christian talent is being devoted mainly, at the charges of the Bible Society, to improving the accuracy and clearness of translations which are in each case the Christian lamps for millions. In China the United Board of Revisers are steadily pushing on their work.

In Burmah there is now hope that something of the same kind will soon be begun. The Bible Societies are an essential feature in the evangelization of the world. Every missionary looks to them for his store of the word of God. From them every mission school draws its supplies. From them come the Bibles, which native Christians need at home and in the house of prayer. Through its numerous colporteurs and Bible women, especially in eastern countries, the Bible Society employs many devoted missionaries who urge on the indifferent, and also the opponents of the Bible, its value, and the gospel it contains, and in many cases leave or send the Bible in places where no ordained missionary resides. While much has been done during this century by the British and Foreign Bible Society and kindred institutions to make our translations of Holy Scripture and circulate them far and wide among the nations, it is said there are still 2,500 dialects and languages into which no portion of the Bible has been translated, and by far the great number of mankind neither possess nor desire the Holy Scriptures; yet the steadily increasing number of missionaries and converts has increased, and will increase, the number of those who both need and value the word of God."

The various extensions of work brought a corresponding increase of demands on the funds of the society, and but for the receipt of a legacy of £30,000, there would have been a great deficit instead of a balance in hand. The free contributions remain stationary. Since the birth of the society in 1804, one hundred and fifty-five million copies have been issued, of these nearly two-thirds are English, French, or German; so that very much remains to be done before the world is provided with the word of God. To aid the great and benevolent work of Bible

circulation in connection with the British and Foreign Bible Society in England and Wales alone, 5,600 Auxiliary Societies have been formed and 1,800 Bible depots established.

In Europe and the colonies there are 1860 auxiliary societies, and branches; these auxiliaries carry on the work in India and Ceylon. Besides 500 Bible women, 700 colporteurs carry the scriptures to country villages and scattered homes, offering copies at low prices to the people at their own doors. In Europe and the colonies there are in connection with agencies and auxiliaries 220 depots through which the scriptures are put in circulation in large centres. The societies also provides the scriptures, in a great variety of editions, types and bindings, for the people of Great Britain. Special editions for the poor and the young are sold below cost. Several thousands are annually spent for providing the scriptures for day schools and Sunday schools, and for benevolent and Christian undertakings of every kind. To encourage all classes to buy for themselves nearly seven millions of legible and well-bound Testaments have been published at a penny each. An English Bible in good type is sold for one shilling. For the blind scriptures are provided in raised types of more than one variety, and though these Bibles are costly, copies are freely given to deserving persons unable to purchase them. Thus through the great British empire and many parts of the world is the Bible offered at low cost through means of this society. About 1,000 scholars in various lands are engaged through the Bible society in the translation and revision of the Bible. Some are translating the scriptures into unwritten tongues or extending the work in languages, where only a small portion of the Bible exists, others are revising translations and making them more accurate, thus the Bible Society has an immense claim upon all friends of Christian missions to aid it in its great and indispensable missionary work.

Our last annual report shows that the Nova Scotia Bible Society only raised from subscriptions and collections \$2,778.05, and from legacies \$518.25, in all \$3,276. Surely for such a cause we ought at least to raise \$5,000 annually! As our financial year does not close till the 31st of March, we have time to make the effort to increase largely our annual subscriptions to the Bible Society.

Our earnest travelling secretary, Mr. MacKelvie, has visited nearly all our auxiliary branch societies in Nova Scotia, addressed many meetings, and advocated the claims of the society. He hopes that the advances of contributions in some branches will make up for deficiencies in others. Our sales at the Halifax depository have for the year ending 31st Dec., amounted to \$435.64.

Where free grants of Bibles and Testaments were needed and applied for they have been given.

In conclusion, the committee urges on all true Christians to esteem more highly God's written word, circulate it more earnestly, and to make more earnest efforts for the world wide circulation of the book of books, whose value as a personal power the late Mr. Gladstone has described in these true and eloquent words: "From the teacher's chair and from the pastor's pulpit, in the humblest hymn that ever mounted to the ear of God, from beneath a cottage roof and in the rich, melodious choir of the noblest cathedral their sound is gone out into all lands and their words into the ends of the world." Not here alone, but in a thousand silent and unsuspected forms will they unwearily prosecute their holy office. Who doubts that times without number particular portions of scripture find their way to the human soul, as if embassies from on high, each with its own commission of comfort, of guidance or of warning? What crisis, what trouble, what perplexity of life has failed or can fail to draw from this inexhaustible treasure house its proper supply?

What profession, what position is not daily and hourly enriched by these words, which repetition never weakens, which carry with them now, as in the days of their first utterance the freshness of youth and immortality? When the solitary student opens all his heart to drink them in, they will reward his toil. And in forms yet more hidden and withdrawn in the retirement of the chamber, in the stillness of the night season upon the bed of sickness and in the face of death, the Bible will be there, its several words how often winged with their several and special messages, to heal and to soothe, to uplift and uphold, to invigorate and stir—nay, more, perhaps, than this, amid the crowds of the court or the forum or the street or the market place, when every thought of every soul seems to be set upon the excitements of ambition, or of business or of pleasure, there, too, even there, the still small voice of the Holy Bible will be heard and the soul aided by some blessed word, may find wings like a dove, may flee away and may be at rest."

The REV. W. J. ARMITAGE, rector of St. Paul's Church, moved the First Resolution which was as follows:—

"That the abstract of report be received and printed;

"That this meeting urges all true Christians to unite in thanking Almighty God for the increased circulation and translation of the Bible during this century; for those by whom the work has been done or maintained; and in devout praying Him to make His Holy word still more a means of extending the Saviour's Kingdom over all the earth.

Mr. Armitage said it was a matter for regret that owing to other engagements Bishop Courtney, the chief pastor of the Church of England in Nova Scotia, who takes such a deep personal interest in the work of the Bible Society, was unable to be present.

It is always a pleasure and a privilege to stand on the platform of the Bible Society, forming as it does a common meeting ground for all Christians. The preacher as a rule has the privilege of selecting his own text. But to-night I am called upon to speak from one which has been chosen for me. Its chief note is one of thankfulness, and its subject matter is chiefly concerned in the forces connected with the circulation and translation of the Bible. It is no easy matter to make figures interesting to the ordinary mind. Even Finance Ministers, as Mr. Fielding knows from experience, find this true, and few men have the power which Gladstone possessed of making a Budget speech so full of human interest that men thronged to Parliament to hear him as in eloquent periods he held a listening senate by his words. And indeed there are some people who find delight and pleasure in the abstruse and difficult as when in illness Sydney Smith put aside light reading and asked for Adam Smith's "Wealth of Nations." Dalhousians have a story of Professor McDonald who turns at times from the study of great problems in higher mathematics and seeks recreation in fishing or in the perusal of the pages of Æschylus, the father of Greek tragedy.

The pervading note of the resolution which I offer for your adoption is that of Thankfulness. The Word which we endeavor to translate into all tongues and to circulate in all lands is God's Word. We thank Almighty God for the message which He has given us. The revelation of His Name, His Nature, of His Will towards men, which He has given through His holy prophets, and through the lips and words of His only Son.

The story of the beginnings of the Bible Society is of surpassing interest in connection with the spirit of thanksgiving which it is our duty to show. The work grew out of a felt need. When the young Welsh maiden, Mary Jones, unable to obtain a Bible of her own willingly walked

50 long miles to procure one, the incident brought home to the mind of the Bey. Mr. Charles the necessity of making better provision for the distribution of God's Word. This same conviction seized the minds of a Committee of friends in London. The result was the formation of the British and Foreign Bible Society. A glance at the conditions in 1804 will show many reasons for thanksgiving. Even in Europe Bibles were not easily obtained. In Holland half the people did not possess Bibles. It was a most difficult matter to get a Bible in Poland. There was, it is estimated, 14,000 families in Sweden without Bibles. It was shown that amongst 50,000 people in Iceland who could read there was only 50 Bibles; and have now no Bibles in the language of the people. Wherein they were born vast millions of people in almost every land.

The work like every great work was gradual. In the first year St. John's Gospel was printed in Mohawk and English. But by the 33rd year, which marks the accension of Queen Victoria, the Bible had been translated into 157 languages. While in 1898 the Scriptures had been translated into 351 languages and dialects.

It has been said that circulation is the test of all literature. The Bible of all books is able to stand this test. It stands first and with an ever increasing demand. In 94 years the Bible Society has circulated 155,529,954 copies and portions, other societies 92,000,000—a grand total of nearly 250,000,000 apart altogether from Bibles sold by private enterprise.

There was a circulation last year by the Bible Society of 4,387,152, an increase of 600,000 over the previous year. There is no more encouraging sign than the number circulated under the highest civil and ecclesiastical authority in Russia the number last year exceeding 550,000. China is looking for the light and took 500,000 copies. India gave a circulation of 450,000. Germany, the land of Luther, took 773,000.—France—176,000. Italy 129,000. Spain 90,000.

There is much cause for gratitude, and our prayer to God is that doors which now seem shut may be opened, that His Word may have free course and be glorified. If a

man burns a Bible in Russia he is put in prison, but it remains a blot on the fair name of our enlightened Dominion that Bibles have been publicly burned at Quebec. There is still much opposition to Bible circulation in Spain, Belgium, and Germany, which we pray God may soon be removed.

The resolution was seconded by REV. H. H. MACPHERSON who, having indicated that it called for thanksgiving and prayer, went on to show that the circulation of the Bible throughout the world ought to be dear to every true Christian, and that the British and Foreign Bible Society is the very best agency for the furtherance of this desired object. The Bible is God's message of love to man telling him of sin and salvation. It brings life and peace to all who receive it. All who believe it experience its regenerating, sanctifying, comforting power. It is needed by, and adapted to, men of all nations. It is needed not only for the eternal salvation of immortal beings but for the moral elevation, the betterment, the transformation, for this life, of the nations of the world. It is for want of it that China, notwithstanding her boasted civilization extending back for three thousand years, is ready to collapse. It is for want of it that Spain and France are in such an unhappy state. Our own elevation and our privileges as British subjects are due to the Bible. Our heritage of liberty *e. g.* is due to the Bible. They who would do away with God's precious word would blot out the sun from which all the light and life and gladness which we enjoy in this world proceed. Its circulation ought to be dear to us especially because by it the Saviour's kingdom is advanced. That the British and Foreign Bible Society is the best agency for promoting the circulation of the Bible is clear from the following facts:—

(1.) The society is an indispensable aid to the various churches and missionary societies in their work. It prints Bibles translated by the missionaries and it employs translators of its own. "Without the agency of the Bible Society," said a missionary, "our own work would assuredly be of little effect if indeed it did not collapse altogether."

(2.) Through its numerous colporteurs, Bible women, and Bible depots, the word of God is taken to multitudes

who would not be reached by any other agency. The men and women who are employed in the work are not mere Bible sellers. They are missionaries whose aim and effort are to show the people the value of God's word and to lead them to welcome the message it brings.

(3.) No other agency does the work at so small a cost. The society has every facility for Bible printing; and its colporteurs and Bible women do their excellent work for very small remuneration.

(4.) The society never ceases its operations. It never turns aside to reply to criticisms of, or attacks on, the Bible. It goes on putting the word of God into the homes and hearts of the people leaving it them to say, "Know me by my fruits. If ye believe not me believe the works." It knows that the Bible needs no other defence than to be let out into the world. Accordingly it never ceases its splendid work, and like Nehemiah it says to all the Sanballats and Tobiahs who would tempt it to come down from its high place, "I am doing a great work so that I cannot come down. Why should the work cease whilst I leave it and come down to you?"

The REV. WM. AINLEY, pastor of Charles St. Church, moved the second resolution, which was ably seconded by REV. Z. L. FASH, pastor of North Baptist Church. We regret that Mr. Fash has declined to give us his speech for publication. The following is a synopsis of Mr. Ainley's speech:—

Resolved,—That the success which God has granted to the British and Foreign Bible Society, and kindred institutions, and the increase and opportunities of missionary work in the world demand the deepest interest and increased support of all who believe that the Holy Scriptures are able to make men wise unto salvation through faith in our Lord Jesus Christ.

While recognizing with devout gratitude to God the success which has attended the operations of the society let it be borne in mind that the entire issue of the society, one-third of which has been portions, (Psalms, Gospels or Epistles) would not give more than one to nine of the present population of the globe.

Last year's issue, though the largest in the societies history, comes very far short of supplying the crying need of the most needy. Take India with its population of 287,000,000. There the circulation last year was 530,000, or about 1 to 540. Half of which only portions. Take China with its population of 386,000,000. There the circulation last year was 567,012 or about 1 to 680. Half of which were only portions. The entire circulation of the societies Scriptures in China since the commencement of its operations to the present, if all were now in existence, would not give more than 1 to 60 of the present population, and fully one-third of these were only portions.

The income of the society for the year 1897-8 was \$1,148,750.00. The expenditure for the same year \$1,109,275.00. Leaving a balance on hand of \$39,470.00. But had it not been for a legacy of most unusual proportions, \$150,000.00 left by Rev. E. M. Pochin, late of Barkby, Eng., there would have been a deficiency of over \$110,000.00. These figures surely show the need of deeper interest and increased liberality on the part of the friends of this society.

The following are a few reasons why the Word of God should be placed in the hands of the individual.

Without detracting in the least from the high status of the missionary, who is frequently the incarnate truth to the heathen around him, we must magnify the Word of God.

Here the speaker gave striking illustrations of the effect of missionary effort under the Roman Catholic Church in Congo territory without the circulation of the scriptures, and under the Protestant Church in Madagascar with the circulation of the Scriptures, showing the great advantage of the latter.

From the days of the Bereans till now the best type of converts have been those who having heard the word have searched the Scriptures to see whether these things are so.

The lack of personal acquaintance with the word largely accounts for the lack of character in many converts in the Home Church. What better can we expect abroad.

Another thing essential to success is the giving of the Scriptures to the people in their own tongue. This the British and Foreign Bible Society are endeavouring to do.

BRUNSWICK ST. METHODIST CHURCH MEETING.

CAPT. THORPE, R. E., acted as chairman, and made the following remarks:

It is a great pleasure, and I esteem it also the greatest privilege, to have been asked to take the chair at the meeting here to-night for this society. As it is, I believe, usual on these occasions for the chairman to make some remarks, may I ask you to bear with me whilst I place before you three elementary questions which I think it will do us all good to ask ourselves. It is an acknowledged fact that the elementary principles of any subject are the hardest to thoroughly grasp, but again when they have been so grasped the further study of the subject becomes much simplified. The first question then I would have you ask yourselves, "What do I really know about the need for any such society?" Dear friends, do we believe that a Bible is about a necessity to every man, that he may for himself get something of that true light which lighteth every man that cometh into the world. Then are you aware of the vast

regions and nations of so-called Christian countries where the Bible even to-day is practically an unknown book, I was going to say word. Are you also aware of the hundreds of languages into which the word of God has to be translated so that it may be spread abroad in heathen and Mohammedan countries, nay more even among the Jews themselves. Surely then if we stop to consider the question even for a little we shall answer it in the affirmative. Next, I would enquire what do I know of how far this society is supplying this need. We are stewards and in stewards it is required that a man be found faithful. God has put us here and given us means to use for his work, but unless we look and see how these various societies which we support do their work and are satisfied that they are doing the work in the best way possible, I do not see how we can be called faithful, for, for all we know, they may be wasting our Lord's goods. I do not believe in just paying the collector your money when he makes his annual call and then taking no more interest in what becomes of it. Now I am not going to tell you to-night what the society is doing, but I am going to tell you how you can find out for yourself. Get the annual report of the parent society, it can be bought in the city for a matter of 30 cents, read it. You will find it interesting, instructive, and above all elevating. Leave it on your table and let your friends read it too. Having discovered the good work this society is doing, lastly I would have you ask yourself, "Am I doing all I can as an individual to help this society?" By helping. I do not mean merely paying so much a year. The society, even more than your money, needs your prayers, and dear friends, in order to pray definitely we must know the subjects we are praying about, these we shall find by studying that report I spoke about. May I suggest one or two subjects, (1) That the word or seed may fall on good ground. I heard the other day of a Mohammedan gentleman in Persia, who was led to believe in Jesus as his Saviour by simply reading the Bible in Persian. He had never come in contact with missionaries, and only after he had found out the truth did he come to them to be taught. (2) Prayer for the colporteurs, those devoted men, aye, and women too, who are going up and down thro' so many lands carrying the precious word. That they may be protected

from danger, that they may be kept faithful, that they may have the right word given them to speak. (3) Prayer for those translators that, as they endeavour to interpret the Bible into so many tongues, just the right meaning may be given to each word and sentence and so the word of our God may be glorified.

Dear friends, I have brought before you these few thoughts to-night, may I ask you to take these questions home and to consider them.

REV. DR. BLACK addressed himself to the appearance of the condition of some of the nations of the world in the closing years of this century. He laid stress on the importance of the Bible to civilization and national greatness. France was an example of weakness and disorder, characteristic of nations from which the Word of Life is excluded. The sad condition of France to-day seemed to indicate that God would lay the nation low again. Russia also would have to amend her ways in respect to the Bible. Though not so exclusive in that country, there was not the widest religious toleration in Russia. There would require to be a change. No country could advance without the Word of God.

REV. F. H. ALMON seconded the resolution. He referred to the origin of the British and Foreign Bible Society in 1804 in the smallest proportions in London. Now many countries have their own Bible Societies. The Bible or parts of it have been translated into 250 languages, and millions of copies have been circulated in the hundred years the society has existed. There were over 2,000 dialects still untouched. The dark continent of Africa was now open from the Cape to Cairo. He asked the audience if they knew the comforting effect of the fine passages of Scripture read to a sick or dying person. Should not the millions of human beings who have not the Gospel have the blessing of the Word? He appealed to the people of Nova Scotia to do their share—do more than they have done in the past—to help support and extend the great work of spreading the Word of Life in heathen lands.

The motion was then put by the chairman and passed unanimously.

REV. WILLIAM DOBSON moved the second resolution.

The mover referred to the broad brotherhood of the human race which included all colors and all peoples living on this earth. It was only in recent times the world seemed to fairly grasp this idea. It took powder and ball in the sixties to liberate the southern slaves. We are beginning to think the Chinaman has a soul and an African on the Congo a soul. After we begin to realize the awful responsibility upon the church to spread the gospel through every land. The object of the Bible Society is to follow up the missionary and secure the work first started.

REV. MR. LAWSON seconded the resolution. He described the object of missionary enterprise as the salvation of souls. Christ came on earth to save what was lost and He said by the name of Christ only and by no other name, could salvation be secured. The Saviour was the first missionary and the spirit of Christian missions was the salvation of souls. He asked if this was not a purpose that should be supported. The second feature of missions was self-sacrifice. This too was a divine example. The plan of the Bible was co-operation and the result was victory.

AGENT'S REPORT.

To the President and Committee of the Nova Scotia Auxiliary Bible Society :

GENTLEMEN,—In submitting the following Annual Report of my travels during the year, and my visitation of the Branches of your Auxiliary, I beg to say, at the outset, that there is not much to mention beyond the usual affairs incident to travels and meetings—bad roads and small gatherings, fine weather and large or small audiences, according to the spirituality of the people or their over-weening interest in temporal affairs. Sometimes I have been privileged to address for half or three-quarters of an hour full churches ; at other times I have been thankful for a score or two of good listeners gathered around the stove in a corner of a church or Sunday School room. Sometimes conveying our hearty thanks for liberal and timely contributions, but always pleading for larger support from well-to-do Christian people or prosperous congregations in aid of the best of all Christian institutions - for that Society which more than any other has given heavenly lustre to British Protestantism ; whose single aim is the circulation of God's word in every human language ; best because its work penetrates the dark places of the earth shedding saving light and dissipating error, where the voice of the missionary would not be heard ; best because the Bible Society seeks not its own aggrandisement, but being the greatest Apostle to the nations in this missionary age it places itself at the service of every other Christian mission. But not only is the Bible Society the indispensable handmaid of all evangelical missions, but it is of itself a grand missionary institution, whose Colporteurs and Bible women, numbering over a thousand, sell or read the holy Scriptures in 350 languages. Truly, the wonder is that this grand polyglot missionary, this Bible Society, which publishes four million Bibles annually in 350 languages, has to plead for financial support from year to year, and that instead of being a preferred claimant, it too often receives the crusts which falls from the rich man's table, or, to speak without metaphor, the last of all calls upon the purse to be responded to.

On the other hand, it is pleasant to think of the many friends that the Bible Society has in Nova Scotia ; men and women, yes, and children too, who, knowing the value of God's

word to themselves, are unfailling in their annual remembrance of this great and good cause, and whose liberal contributions, kind words and generous hospitalities cheer your agent in the prosecution of his work. During the past year some new Branches were formed or placed in an incipient stage of formation, while a few others have for a time slacked off in their work owing to untoward circumstances, mention of which will be made in the order of my annual rounds, which also for the sake of space in the report will be necessarily brief.

My last year's report began and ended with reference to Amherst. This one will be almost, if not wholly, similar, as I may make another visit to that town before this sheet goes to press. On March 16th I made a canvass of Amherst and arranged for assistance by other collectors, and also for a public meeting later on. From a few friends I obtained \$20.75, and our kind friend, Miss E. D. Moffatt, subsequently gathered \$4.25, in all \$25.00. For some cause the expected meeting on May 25th was not held. Again, a meeting which was appointed for December 7th, for some reason was postponed. On March 18th, during my short stay in Shubenacadie, I collected \$4.25, and proceeded by stage to Middle Musquodoboit, where we had a small meeting. Owing to the bad state of the roads a large gathering was not expected, still we were disappointed at seeing so few. I am always sure of seeing some familiar faces at our meetings there, as indeed in many other places. If these never-failing attendants and good subscribers could each induce one or two of their negligent neighbors to accompany them to our meetings, the annual gatherings would be more interesting and the Society's affairs more prosperous. I notice that your Treasurer has received Middle Musquodoboit's contribution, \$27.43. This shows a decrease from last year's gift of about \$5.00. Perhaps next year's subscription will more than make up for the present falling off.

I was at Upper Musquodoboit on the 19th, where I received four collectors' cards with \$8.85, and on the following Sabbath at my meetings there and at Dean Settlement I got the collection of \$3.35, in all \$12.20. At the close of the second meeting I was kindly conveyed by Mr. Jas. Creelman from Dean Settlement to Upper Stewiacke Cross Roads, where I held a meeting in the hall and received the collection, \$1.05. Arrangements had been made by Rev. D. S. Fraser for another meeting at some distance on Monday in connection with the Springside Branch, but owing to the very bad state of the roads such could not be accomplished. At the present writing I had not heard of any returns from Springside, but I have no fears of our Society being forgotten there, as it is one of the oldest and most faithful Branches in the Auxiliary.

On the 23rd we had a good meeting at Upper Stewiacke, with collection \$2.75. From this good Branch I also have not heard, but I may say the same regarding it as of Springside—a never-failing, well-managed, and liberal Branch. Indeed, all through the Stewiacke Valley, since I began my agency, I have never been at the outlay of a dollar, except occasionally for stage hire. Would that the same could be said of many other parts of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick.

On the 24th the annual meeting of Middle Stewiacke was held, the attendance being about the same as usual. There I received the contribution of \$22.25. This goodly sum is about the same as last year's, and contributed by a small congregation, whose individual gifts are only recorded in the Branch's minute book. There I got no lists for publication. By the kindness of the Rev. Clarence McKinnon I was conveyed to Brookfield, over a fearfully bad road, where on the following night I addressed a meeting. I am glad to know that the small Branch of Brookfield has done so well, \$12.90 having been timely remitted to your Treasurer.

On Saturday I reached Noel via Truro and Black Rock ferry, where we had a very good meeting in the Noel hall. I was also privileged to address the Presbyterian congregation on Sabbath, 27th. I received from Miss Ellen O'Brien, the treasurer of this Branch, \$18.90, and at a later period \$9.80, which with 71c. meeting collection, amount to \$29.13. This is quite an improvement on the annual contribution for many years past. Noel has some liberal subscribers to our cause, while your Agent is happy in having a standing welcome when there to a most comfortable Christian home.

On the 29th we had a small meeting at Lower Selma—collection 71c. This is part of Noel Branch, and I think that almost every family contributes to the cause.

At Selma—a district of Maitland Branch—I addressed a small gathering in the Methodist Church, and the following night another very good meeting in the Presbyterian Church at MAITLAND. During my visit there I gathered \$17.32, which is the smallest contribution from Maitland for many years past. This was partly due to the absence of some good subscribers and partly to the general falling off in the business of that once very prosperous village. I would like that Maitland would fall into line with our method of carrying on Branch work, having a band of say four or five collectors, who could thus once a year canvass the village and adjoining district. Every family by that method would have the privilege of giving some help to this good cause, whereas by the present method only a few can

be reached by the travelling Agent. Will some of the good ladies of Maitland think over this and consummate this ideal plan of Bible Society branch work? The same may be said of Shubenacadie, which many years ago when under committee and collectors it was a very successful Branch, but has now only a few subscribers

On April 2nd I had hoped for a meeting at Glengarry, but the roads in that part were almost impassable, hence very wisely no meeting was appointed. On the following Sabbath I had the privilege of addressing three large congregations in the Hopewell and St. Columbia Branch, a branch formed only a few years ago, but already one of the best country Branches of the Auxiliary. Last year it yielded us about \$58.00, and this present year, including the gift from Ferrona of \$24.10, it amounts to \$69.35.

On the 8th I addressed a small meeting at Ferrona, where I asked for either the formation of a Branch or that a band of collectors would be appointed to work in connection with that of Hopewell and St. Columba. A collection was promised in either case, but no Branch having been formed, the friends decided in the meantime to let the gift be included in the Hopewell and St. Columbia Branch work. This, according to my instructions, has been done. It will remain for the decision of another meeting hereafter to decide whether Ferrona and its neighboring districts will prefer to have a separate organization, or continue, as now, recorded in this report. The kind and faithful secretary of this Branch, in a letter to me, expresses deep disappointment at the smallness of the contributions from some sections, but whatever this new Branch may contribute, be such large or small, the gift will be gratefully received by the Auxiliary, while the Agent will be ever happy by the remembrance of many kindnesses at the hands of his new acquaintances in Hopewell, and happy also in the hope of enjoying their friendship and fellowship in the years to come.

On Sabbath, 10th, I was at Scotsburn, Millville and Plainfield, where I addressed three meetings. At Scotsburn I got the plate collection, \$6.25; Millville \$1 00, and at Plainfield \$2.25. Millville is part of Pictou Auxiliary, which I visit occasionally, and I trust that that Auxiliary is benefited thereby.

On the 11th we had a small meeting at River John, with a collection of \$1 31. At this writing I have not heard of any returns from that Branch, but I will again resume correspondence there on the matter.

I was at Wallace on the 12th, where we had a very interesting meeting. I received the collection, \$1.91, but as

yet, as far as I know, the annual returns have not been made. Wallace has been usually up to time, and always very liberal. I suppose that the prevalence of la grippe has retarded the collections there as elsewhere.

On the 13th we had a very good meeting in the Methodist Church at Oxford with a plate collection of \$376. I also obtained \$3.00 from two subscribers, and I notice your Treasurer has just received \$14.87. This sum of \$21.63 is \$5.00 better than last year's gift, for which we are grateful, but yet it is much below the old-time subscription when Oxford was only a small village. Oxford contains some citizens of wonderful enterprise, and who are very generous towards many good objects. Would that the Bible Society may in the future receive from such a larger share of their consecrated means; their largest could not flow through a better channel than that which conveys to every land the saving oracles of God.

My second journey in Nova Scotia began on the 22nd June. We had a good meeting at Sherbrooke on the 24th, and during the day I gathered \$12.92. At the meeting a new committee was elected, who I trust will collect or appoint others to canvass the village and outlying districts yearly on behalf of our society; for it is an unnecessary waste of money on the part of the Agent to go every year so far by costly stage coach, two days being also occupied in the visit. Will the new committee think of this and kindly follow the example of the late president of the Branch by forwarding Sherbrooke's annual gift to Halifax. A visit to Sherbrooke every second or third year ought to suffice, unless specially called for oftener. Again I was disappointed as to obtaining a meeting at Glenelg, and proceeded to Lochaber, where on Sabbath night I addressed the congregation assembled. Whether my earnest appeal was effective or otherwise remains to be seen. Year after year I have presented our cause and claims for support, but so far the fruit of my labor has been very small.

When in Antigonish on the 27th I collected \$27.50, and received \$1.28 for sale of Bibles at that depository. The Bible Society has subscribers in almost every family of that nice town. There I seldom have to plead for support. As soon as I present myself in store, or office, or dwelling, or even when met on the street, my mission is graciously acknowledged by everyone, and all I have to do is to receive their gifts and enter such in my book.

On the 29th, when at Port Hood, I collected \$7.00, and proceeded to Mabou, arriving there just in time for a free con-

veyance to Strathlorne, where I had a large meeting and obtained \$8.70.

On July 1st we had a small meeting in Mabou Hall. During the day I had collected in that village and at Glendye Mills \$18.50. In this picturesque part of Cape Breton the Protestant population is small, but those whom I meet are very generous and hospitable. Cameron's commodious hotel, like some others in the Island, are to me invariably free quarters while the residence of Mr. Walter McDonald, of Glendye with its terraced flower and fruit garden—fair as the idea Garden of Eden—affords your Agent rest and sweet refreshment annually.

On Sabbath, the 3rd, I had a meeting in the hall at West Bay, and in the afternoon at Cleveland, where I received the plate collection of \$4.37, and the promise of a larger contribution later on, but I am afraid that the promise has again been forgotten.

On the 4th I was at Hawkesbury, where I collected from our few friends \$7.75, and proceeded to St. Peter's, where I got \$8.00.

On the 6th we had a very small meeting at Whycocomagh and my canvass only amounted to \$5.50, some old-time subscribers being from home during my visit.

We had a very good meeting on the 7th at Baddeck, and collected during my visit to that picturesque village on the Lake \$19.56. I regret, however, that I missed some old subscribers.

I arrived at North Sydney on Friday night, and began my canvass of that town on the following morning, obtaining \$50.00. This was less than last year's amount, and is partly due to the absence of one of the best subscribers. As you already know, North Sydney contains some of the best supporters of the Auxiliary.

On Sabbath, the 10th, I addressed a meeting at Sydney Mines, and during my short stay there collected \$17.50, and had also the promise of a canvass by collectors towards the close of summer.

do hope that the new mining enterprise which is being projected near that city will prove successful, and that by a revival of business resulting therefrom the hearts of its citizens may be gladdened and annual contributions to the Bible Society increase with the prosperity of the place.

On Saturday I made a canvass of Glace Bay, and on the following Sabbath addressed the congregations there and at Bridgeport. My receipts were respectively \$25 06 and \$5.21. This was cheering support at Glace Bay, but rather disappointing at Bridgeport. The comparative failure of my mission at Bridgeport was not due to any waning of interest in our cause there, but that other demands were that day made upon the congregation for another good cause.

I arrived at Canso on Tuesday night, and next day, which was very stormy, I called upon the leading people for subscriptions, obtaining from them \$9.70. We had also a small meeting on that wet night. I will have to ask our kind friend, Mrs. Chittick, to collect for our cause next summer, as the distance is too great and travelling expenses too heavy to warrant an annual visit. A visit every second or third year will be more prudent, unless I can obtain a free pass on the steamer which plies between Mulgrave and Canso.

On my arrival at Ferrona Junction on Thursday afternoon it stormed so badly that I hesitated to consider whether it was more prudent to face the storm during the five mile walk or remain there under shelter. A momentary clearing in the sky induced me to proceed, and although well drenched when I reached Springville, the weather had improved before dark, and we had a very interesting meeting. The time there, however, was divided between two objects, one of which being advocated by a lady from Halifax having the first consideration. Ample time, notwithstanding this break in the programme, was devoted to the Bible Society's cause, and you have already received the very liberal contribution from the Springville and Bridgeville Branch. \$23.75 is a larger sum than that remitted the previous year, and for which the collectors there merit our warm thanks.

The following night I was at Sunny Brae, where we had a fair gathering and a collection of \$1.85. I have not yet seen any further returns from Sunny Brae.

On Sabbath, the 24th, the Rev. Mr. Campbell loaned me his pulpits at Merigomish and French River, where I received the plate collections of \$8.00 and \$5.90, in all \$13.90, for which I thank minister and people of those places.

On the 25th and 26th I visited our friends at Hopewell and Stellarton, and on the 27th addressed a meeting in the Presby-

terian Church at Westville. That day was one of the warmest of the summer, and hence the meeting was unusually small. I determined to visit that town again, reference to which will be mentioned in the order of my travels.

I had hoped for a meeting in Truro on the 28th, but in that I was disappointed, but was successful on a second visit.

On the 29th I was at Clifton and received the sum of \$28.27. This is quite an advance on the gifts of that Branch for many years past, and I hope it will continue in the line of progress.

On Sabbath, 31st, the Rev. J. H. Chase gave me the use of his pulpits at Onslow and Belmont, when the following plate collections were handed to me: Onslow, \$16.57; Belmont \$17.13; and \$1.00 from the Fort; and when in Halifax in October the Rev. Mr. Chase handed me \$2.00 as the subscription from Mr. Chas. Hill, thus making a total of \$29.70 from his congregation. I have always been heartily received by the pastor and people of Onslow and Belmont, and their contributions have been unfailing and liberal.

On the 23rd August we had a fair gathering at Folley—collection \$1.04. I hope that the annual subscription will be in time for the press.

On the 24th, at Economy, we had a fair meeting, with collection \$2.39. I notice that your Treasurer has received \$15.32. Economy Branch has not been so flourishing in late years as in the former years of its history. I would like very much to see the Branch embrace the district of Five Islands, which is connected somewhat congregationally, and if so, also as a Branch Society it would enhance the value of our support in that part of the Province. Will the committee at Economy please think over this suggestion, and if agreeable to their views carry out the plan of campaign.

I was at Bass River on the 25th, but there was such a down-pour of rain all afternoon and evening that a meeting was out of the range of possibilities. That Branch has remitted \$16.85. I hope that more may follow, as this sum is much below the usual contribution.

I began my last journey in the province on October 4th, but failed to obtain a meeting that night at Lower Stewiacke, ours being precluded by some other meeting in the place. I briefly presented the Society's claims and work to the few people I saw, and arranged for another meeting on my return trip in winter.

I had also hoped for a meeting the following night at Dartmouth, but our friends there, for good reasons, postponed their annual gathering until November.

On the 7th I called upon our friends in WINDSOR, who informed me by another year they hoped to resume their contributions to the cause.

On Sabbath, 9th October, I had a good meeting at Kempt Shore in the morning, and was kindly conveyed by the Rev. Mr. Mason to and from Walton, where I had also a meeting.

Our Chevaree friends handed me \$21.58, for which good gift they merit our deep thanks. Part of that sum I gathered on Monday when on my way to Somerville, where I also held a small meeting.

On the 11th we had a very nice meeting at Avondale—collection \$1.25, and I notice that the subscription list subsequently sent contains \$14.15. This is \$4.00 less than last year's gift, but is an indication more of the depopulation of the village than of any lessening of interest in the Bible Society. Many of our friends have gone to other parts; some have gone to the better land, and before going have kindly remembered our good cause.

The annual meeting of Newport was, as usual, held in Brooklyn, and also as usual very small. I am delighted, however, to see such a good subscription—amounting to almost \$50.00. This is an advance of \$10.00 over the average contribution for many years past. Our Society is deeply indebted to James Farquhar, Esq., who for twelve years has been secretary of that Branch, and by whose zeal and prompt business-like efforts such success has been achieved. I notice also that a legacy of \$50.00 from Mr. Curry, of Newport, has been received in January.

Through the kindness of the Rev. M. G. Henry, of St. Croix (an old friend, who, when pastor of Shubenacadie Presbyterian Church years ago did us good service), a meeting was arranged on the 13th. There was a large and attentive audience, who at my request immediately formed a Branch, to be called "The ST. CROIX and ELLERSHOUSE." I received the plate collection of \$3.17, and was assured that a general canvass of the Branch would be made next summer.

On the 14th we had a small meeting in the Methodist Church at Wolfville, the weather being wet and boisterous. During my canvass of that town I obtained \$20.61. This was better than last year's subscription. Although I missed some old friends, I was fortunate in obtaining some new subscribers who, I think, will continue to render our Society liberal aid.

It stormed so heavily and the roads were in such a bad condition that no meeting was held at Horton. The kind president of that Branch handed me his usual subscription and said that he hoped to be able to find collectors later on. At this writing I have not heard of any canvass being made, but am hopeful that such will not be forgotten.

On the 18th our meeting at Church Street was, as usual, held in the hall. If our gathering there is always small, it is nevertheless, pleasant and profitable. I was glad to see the two young lads who collect for our cause, and to know that they had again been so successful in their work. Although they stated that many upon whom they called refused to contribute, yet they managed to collect \$19.35. It is always pleasant to visit Church Street, for although our friends there are busy from dawn to dark, gathering potatoes or their famed apples, I am most cordially welcomed to their hospitable homes, and when occasion requires conveyed kindly to my next place of meeting.

The meeting on the 19th, in the Baptist Church at Canning, was unbecomingly small, and general regret was expressed at the absence of two ministers of the town. I am glad, however, to learn that a good contribution was timely forwarded to Halifax, and but for the sickness of our friends the subscription at Canning might have been as large as that of last year. The prosperity of this Branch for some years past has been chiefly due to the zealous and thoughtful efforts of Mr. and Mrs. Nicholson and one or two other friends.

On the 20th we met as usual in the Presbyteian Church at CANARD. The collection of \$1.28 was handed to me, and although president and secretary of the Branch were absent from the place at that time, the friends present promised to see that a canvass of the district would be made later on.

We held a meeting at KENTVILLE on the 21st, when resolutions were made for having a band of collectors for the town. I hope such has been successfully accomplished.

Waterville promised some help to the cause. Berwick's kind collector managed to obtain \$5 70, to which is added \$1.27 received by me. I feel very sorry to see so small a sum as the tribute of a beautiful village to a missionary institution which is world-wide, and I am sure that the venerable president and willing collector both feel as I do in this matter. Years ago I expressed the hope that the very liberal contributions of the neighboring Branch at Somerset would stir up a worthy emulation in Berwick. Will the good people of Berwick think of this carefully and prayerfully, and surely our future reports will shew a better record than in the past.

Somerset's valuable contribution of over \$20.00 has, as usual, been forwarded in good time. The liberality of our supporters there is beyond all praise, but confined to only a few families, who work from dawn to dark, true, humble and unassuming Christians, who spend little on luxuries or fashionable frivolities, but whose aim in this life is to glorify God by hastening the coming of His Kingdom, and in sharing in its eternal joy.

Our meeting in the Methodist Church at Aylesford was not as large as I expected, and I missed the presence of good old Mr. McMahon, who for many years was the faithful president of that Branch. On Monday we had a very good meeting in the Presbyterian Church at Digby, when I received \$20.21. This is the best gift from Digby for many years past. I deeply grieve over the great loss that little town has lately met by fire. It may be some years before it will have recovered from such terrible disaster.

On November 1st. our meeting at Weymouth was small, the date being unfavourable for a better attendance. Our friends there, however, were as usual up to time in doing collecting work, and if the result of their labors was not so good as in some previous years the deficiency is due to some other cause than indifference to the interests of the Bible Society. I have been most kindly treated by the two ministers of that town, and will always look forward with pleasure towards my annual visits. My thanks are also due to the Rev. Mr. Tufts of Stellarton, for the loan of his pulpit, and for his own encouraging words and countenance, and to Mr. James McKay for his active and successful canvass of his neighbourhood. His kindness towards our cause is indeed beyond praise.

The annual meeting of Truro Branch was held in the First Baptist Church. The night was very wet and hence the attendance small. The meeting expressed the hope that in future the annual meeting of the Branch should be held on a Sunday, when the cause could be advocated before large audiences. It is therefore my intention to henceforth visit Truro on such occasions and to share in the exercises of its Bible Society Sunday. I know that in many cities of the British Empire this plan is popular and promotive of success to the cause of Bible circulation. If God magnifies His Word above all His name, surely the Lord's day cannot but be honored if, in its observance, a portion of its hours is devoted to the praise of God's word and for offerings in aid of its circulation throughout the world. Truro's contribution this winter is not equal to that of last year, but to what cause this failure is due I have not heard. I deeply regret the loss our Society has met there by the death of Mr. Blair, who for many years was its esteemed President. A man of genial presence and fluent of correct and sweet speech, in himself a living epistle of Christ, he fittingly filled the President's chair at Bible Society meetings. I hope that the committee of Truro Branch will meet in due time, and that by the Holy Spirit's guidance they will choose a good man to fill the position lately vacated.

The night was stormy when our meeting was held in Springhill, and the gathering small in the Methodist Church. I received the plate collection of \$1, but at this writing I have not heard of any subscriptions.

On December 1st and 2nd I was at Parrsboro, when I addressed a meeting and did some collecting work, chiefly among the business people. We received there \$21.37, and the prospect is that Parrsboro's gift will increase with the growth of the town.

I had hoped to be at River Hebert on the following Sabbath, but was advised to postpone my visit to a more favorable time. I met with another disappointment at Amherst, where I had arranged for a meeting on the 7th.

On the 21st December, by the kindness of the Rev. R. McArthur of Nappan, a meeting was held in the Methodist Church there. The gathering, however, was small, and on my request for the formation of a Branch, it was decided to leave that matter to the consideration of a larger meeting, which was hoped might be obtained in the near future.

This closed my year's work as far as related to travels and Branch visitation in Nova Scotia. Since that time I have been in almost constant correspondence with the Branches, reminding them of the work expected at their hands. I regret that the returns from some places are small, and that some Branches have not yet finished their work, but knowing that LaGrippe yet prevails in many parts, and that some of our best and hitherto active friends have been prostrated with that malady we must have patience to wait their opportunity for carrying on collecting work. Trusting that your Treasurer will hear from every Branch before the closing of his annual account, that the offerings of all the Society's friends will be blessed by Almighty God to the end in view, and praying that every contributor to this good cause may, on the great day, be addressed by the Master, "Well done, good and faithful servant".... How else but by written records, reproduced and translated and carried far and wide by others, could they to whom the command "Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature" was addressed obey that command? If this sum be added to the New Income, a gross total of £229,749 14s. 3d. is attained. The receipts for Special Funds amount to £2,188 7s. 7d. The expenditure from them has for the moment been only £473 2s. 4d.

IV. TRANSLATION AND REVISION.

Three names of special significance have been removed from the list of those honoured brethren who for Christ's sake are devoting their talents to translating the Holy Scriptures for the everlasting welfare of their fellow-men. They are those of the Rev. E. Lewis, a reviser of three versions, the Kanarese, the Dakhani, and the Telugu; the Rev. Dr. Bryce Ross, one of the translators of the Kafir Bible; and George Lawrence Pilkington, the chief translator of the Bible for Uganda.

Since the last anniversary the Queen's "Diamond Jubilee" has been celebrated. Bound samples of almost all the 196 new languages in which translations of more or less of the Bible appeared for the first time on the Society's lists during the Queen's reign, were presented to Her Majesty, and have found a home in the library of Windsor Castle, accompanied by the most interesting little book by Canon Edmonds, of Exeter, on the Expansion of the Society's work in the Sixty years from 1837 to 1897.

The issue of the Tavara St. Mark—which is now being printed on behalf of the British and Foreign Bible Society, in Auckland, New Zealand—will introduce a new language into the Society's record of translations. The Rev. C. W. Abel (L. M. S.), of Kwato, New Guinea, is the translator, and the Gospel of St. Mark is the first portion of Scripture to be translated into the Tavara language.

Among the new translations of the last year is also the Gospel of St. Mark in Quiché for Indians in Guatemala. The translation has been made by a native scholar, under the direction of Mr. F. de P. Castells, the Society's Sub-agent in Central America. The Guatemala Exhibition of last year led Mr. Castells to spend a long time in Guatemala City, and thus he came into contact with these Indians. The Society was awarded a gold medal for its display of translations of the Scriptures in the exhibition—a noticeable occurrence in a Roman Catholic country, and as the award of a Board of Roman Catholics.

A new translation of the Gospel of St. John into Gondi has been made by Babu Phailbus, under the supervision of the C. M. S. Mission to the Gond aborigines in India. Details as to several other new languages, or added trans-

lations, will be found in the Annual Report, Appendix For as Suffice it to add here that the Rev. T. J. Lee Mayer, who has already done such excellent work on the Pashtu Bible for Afghanistan, has been commissioned to go to Baluchistan to translate more of the Scriptures for a people whose evangelisation he has earnestly at heart.

The versions of Holy Scripture in eleven of the greasiest languages of India and Ceylon are at present undergoing elaborate and costly revision. Through the kind co-operation of the chief Missionary Societies, the best European and native Christian talent is being devoted, mainly under the charges of the Bible Society, to improving the types and accuracy and the clearness of translations, which are in each case the Christian lamps for millions. In China the united boards of revisers are steadily pushing on their work. In Burma there is hope that something of the same kind will now soon be begun. The Bible Societies are an essential feature in the evangelisation of the world; every missionary looks to them for his store of the Word of God. From them every mission school draws its supplies. From them come the Bibles which native Christians need at home and in the House of God.

The Society's work in country after country will not be passed rapidly in review. It is like the procession of vessels of all nations moving day and night through the Suez Canal. And their treatment of the Bible may be illustrated by the conduct of the fifty-nine war-ships and troopers that passed Port Said in 1897. All the twenty-three British ships were accessible, many giving a warm welcome to the colporteurs. Twelve of the twenty-three Russian vessels received our men freely, buying 600 volumes. An Italian war-ship and two out of three Spanish men-of-war were accessible, but nearly all merchantmen of these nations were closed against the book. All vessels flying the Dutch and the Austria-Hungarian flags were freely open. The colporteurs sold Scriptures on a Mexican ship of war, and on two out of three Turkish transports, and had a pleasant welcome on the one American war-ship that visited Port Said.

VII. REVIEW OF THE YEAR.

The story of each year's work of the Bible Society has many familiar features, many constant lights and shades that fall across its pages. It may sometimes seem that nothing new can be told about it, that history is so full of the fortunes of this book that it can now only repeat itself. Its friends may consider the Society's object so excellent as to be above praise or discussion; its enemies believe its condemnation to be equally clear. The former think it calls

In the Roman Catholic countries of Europe, with which for practical purposes the Society's German Agency must be associated, the picture is very different. Yet when one remembers the facts, one can hardly wonder that the progress is slight. In these lands the Bible is not wanted it is proscribed by the priest, and disliked on mere hearsay by the people. To possess it or to read it is the distinctive mark of disloyalty to the prevalent faith. When the demand is made for "bad books" to be given up, it is this which is aimed at. And the term "bad books" is understood in Spain, in Quebec, in Belgium, and elsewhere as a sufficient description of the Holy Scriptures. And their fate when given up is to be torn or burnt. Mr. Morrison speaking of the hard life his colporteurs have to endure says of one of them: "Colporteur N. was one of those men who with the best intentions, and animated by sincere Christian impulses, was yet unable to withstand the fierce opposition of the Catholic clergy. The priests of West Prussia were also Bible burners. What do they hope to accomplish? They and their predecessors have been burning Bibles for centuries. Last year I was shown the spot outside the cathedral of Constance, where a pile of Wycliff's Bibles were burnt. The pile was burning as John Huss was led from the cathedral towards the beautiful meadow outside the town, where he was also given to the flames. He cast a look of amused contempt at the cardinals and bishops around the burning books. These burning books and burning men reproduce themselves in the strangest manner possible, and it is high time the Romish Church gave earnest consideration to this aspect of the question. In Russia, if you burn the Bible you are sent to gaol as a person guilty of sacrilege; but in Germany these priests burn it with impunity. If they think that their intolerant conduct is likely to get rid of the Scriptures among their people, they are vastly mistaken. If any of them will read this Report, they will learn that their ill-directed hostility will never deter us from our Christian duty. Our conviction cannot be shaken that the entrance of God's Word giveth light."

The incident here referred to is by no means an isolated episode, and the testimony of all the Agents is in remarkable accord as to the fierceness of the opposition to be endured. M. Monod says that the French Protestant is attacked for lack of patriotism and the colporteur is denounced as the agent of a foreign society.  power, and on the other by the extreme radicals and
 socialists, who are as determined enemies of the Bible as
 the priests themselves. It was with no little difficulty that
 leave was obtained to sell Scriptures at the kiosk in the

 is arduous. "To sell a Bible," says Colporteur Peruggia,
 "is almost a battle." But when it has been effected, it is
 a victory over ignorance, prejudice and unbelief. Yet on
 all sides the Agents complain that they cannot keep their
 staff up to its proper level. "The difficulty," says Mr.
 Morrison, "of obtaining suitable workers appears insuper-
 able. One after another the men we engage leave us
 disheartened by the trials confronting them, and unable
 to face their work with the necessary courage and
 patience." If this is the case in Germany, with its num-
 bers from which to recruit, how much more must it be so
 in Italy, Spain, or Central America.

But let us look at the brighter side of things and ask
 what our victories are. Many will remember from last
 year's Report the story of the English gentleman who went
 about in Belgium as a volunteer colporteur. He offered to
 take charge of the kiosk at the exhibition held in Brussels
 last year, and pursued his labours among the crowds who
 passed by with an assiduity that has seriously impaired his
 health. But he had done a unique work. The influence of
 the Bible had been made to permeate all classes and parts
 of Belgium to an extent never before reached, and copies
 which he gave away must now be in many homes where
 the Scriptures had been unknown. From France M.
 Monod reports a growing demand, which has resulted in
 an increase of circulation to the number of nearly 30,000
 copies. He quotes the Abbé Gayraud, speaking at the
 ecclesiastical congress held at Rheims, to the following
 effect: "There is a general cry for the Sacred Writ, a
 growing desire that our sermons should be the paraphrase
 of the Gospel. What the world is most in need of is the
 Word of God, and I hold for certain that it craves for it.
 It is the Word of God that people expect to hear when we
 address their thick crowds from our pulpits." M. Monod
 also notes a movement among the clergy towards the
 Reformed Faith, which has led many out of the Church of
 Rome. The work of the last eighty years is beginning to

produce its effects, not only on a few individuals but on the national life as a whole. There is no better foundation for the quickening of a people's faith than a deeper knowledge of the Holy Word in the tongue of their daily life.

To pass to the wide field of the Russian Empire, the environment is clearly more genial, if the labour is not so strenuous, than in Western Europe. One cannot but be struck by the almost silent forces which make for the expansion of that Empire. Its growth seems inevitable. It moves at many points towards the open sea like a huge glacier, which is checked in one quarter only to push forward in another. Everywhere it maintains and fosters the same characteristics among its subjects. They are passive, loyal, and reverent, and they hail the Bible-messenger as the bearer of holy things. He and his books, most of the output of the press of the Holy Synod, are often conveyed by rail and steamboat free of charge, and everywhere find a friendly reception. The total circulation of the two Agencies, the one for European Russia and Central Asia, and the other for Siberia, is over 550,000 copies.

In the first of these, the headquarters of which are at St. Petersburg, there has been an important change in the administration by the retirement of the Rev. Dr. Nicolai from the position of Agent, which he has held since 1881, and the succession to the sole responsibility of the Russian Agent by W. Kean, his assistant and colleague since 1895. The transfer could not take place, as it were, by a mere stroke of the pen, but made necessary the presence of a deputy and a Secretary, and Mr. I. P. Werner attended on their behalf and made a tour last September—fully described in the pages of the *Monthly Reporter*—over several of the chief centres of the work in Northern Russia. Mr. Kean himself, immediately after the transfer, had a long programme of journeying to fulfil, spending more than two months and travelling over 10,000 miles in order to visit all the Depôts. If we add to these the journey of Mr. Davidson over the entire breadth of his Siberian Agency, from the Ural Mountains to the shores of the broad Pacific, a great distance of nearly 5,000 miles, further prolonged by the journey over America and Europe, which brought him back to his starting-point, we have a significant record of energy and movement.

From Russia the mind turns to Turkey and those neighbouring fields, once the home of early Christianity, now mainly of Islam. The report for Turkey and Greece may be given in the vivid summary of Mr. Hodgson: The year under review has been full of vicissitudes, and the record of our Bible work presents a somewhat broken character. The war between Turkey and Greece interfered with our plans and operations in both these countries. In Greece the opportunity was taken of reaching large masses of the population of the country by a free distribution in the army. In Turkey the unsettled state of affairs and the political feeling caused by the war made it difficult for our colporteurs (mostly Greeks) to carry on their work. Parts of the field had to remain unvisited and tours had to be curtailed. In Janina our Depository was put into the hands of the good offices of a friend in power. Both in Thessaly and Macedonia the work has practically been at a standstill. The unhappy state of affairs in Crete has made it impossible for our work in that distracted island to be resumed. In Macedonia and Albania, if the work has not suffered to any great extent, it is entirely due to the order maintained by the able and upright Turkish official who has kindly penetrated to our field north of the Balkans, and the colporteurs have made their usual journeys in Bulgaria without let or hindrance. Here, as has been the case in Macedonia and the Islands, the obstacle most noted seems to be the accentuated poverty of the people. This is true to a great extent of Constantinople itself, where so large a part of the steady wage-earning classes has either been exterminated or exiled, and where security and trade and credit have alike been shaken. In the capital our men have pursued their duties without interference, and the work has gone steadily on. For the entire Agency there is an increase in circulation of over 8,000 copies, a remarkable result under the circumstances.

In Egypt and the associated countries of Palestine and Arabia there has been a slight falling off, owing to sickness among the staff, and other adverse causes. The polyglot character of the circulation of this Agency is remarkable.

being made up of versions in no less than fifty-five languages. The predominant language of the field is Arabic, and its influence is apparent on others spoken within the boundaries of the Agency, such as Turkish, Maltese, and Swahili. But two facts explain this large total. One is the inclusion within the field of the Agency of Mombasa, from which the neighbouring missions of the C. M. S. and other societies have been supplied and colportage has been carried on among the natives of India at work on the railway to Uganda. The other is the active visiting from the Depôt at Port Said, the ships passing through the Suez Canal. These ships are of many nations; but the crews are still more varied, Malay, Chinese and Japanese seamen being greatly on the increase. Although this work has been hindered by quarantine and other restrictive regulations, the large total of languages is evidence that it must have far-reaching effects.

An account of the Egyptian Agency naturally leads to a review of the continent of Africa. The Mediterranean coast which lies west of Egypt is occupied by the Agencies of Algeria with Tunis and Tripoli and of Morocco. Here also, as in Egypt, the true counteractive to the fanaticism of Islam is the noble Arabic version of Scripture. It is due to the wide knowledge of this language that the Gospel is beginning to penetrate the Soudan from Biskra on the north, from the Gambia on the west of Lokoja on the south, and the Upper Nile on the east of this region with its vast deserts here and its dense populated area there, with its little-known hinterlands whose value is now so greatly magnified in the eyes of traders and politicians, is being gradually opened up. To the south of the centre of Mombasa lies the island of Madagascar with whose annexation by France has led to a large demand for the French instead of the Malagasi version. In West Africa the new Agent, the Rev. C. R. Johnson, has made journeys which have been fruitful of the best results. He has established Depôts for Scriptures in the chief centres and become a long-desired medium of communication between the Society in London and its Auxiliaries and the Missionary body in Africa. Through him translation has been encouraged and grants of Scriptures made. In Sierra Leone colportage has been promoted, and at all the chief centres the Society's action in sending him out has met a quick and generous response in the form of help from the native churches. In many places where cruelty used to prevail, and most recently in Ashanti and Dahomey, the Bible is now taught. Finally in South Africa the Auxiliary knows no abatement in its energy, reporting the largest circulation ever attained within its borders, and forwarding to London a free contribution of £1,200. The great

continent is thus encompassed on all sides, and rapid progress is being made towards the interior. No better proof could be found of this than the fact that there are versions of some part of the Scriptures published by this and other Societies in at least ninety-eight native languages in the field of the South Africa, and that of one of these alone, the Luganda, there are now 80,000 readers. This once dark land is surely making to its heritage in Christ.

"The year 1897 will long be remembered in India for a succession of calamities almost unexampled in number and severity. Famine, pestilence, earthquake, civil violence and war have all been suffered to afflict the land." With these words begins the Report for 1897 of the North India Bible Society, and the picture they present, one only too familiar to us all, is reproduced from the other five centres of the Society's work in India. The angel of death has been hovering over the land, visiting thousands, and spreading desolation and terror far and wide. Unrest and trembling have seized hold of many; and the sense of an impending storm that threatened from the Himalayan mountain tops has disturbed rulers and people alike.

Mr. Wynkoop goes on to describe the effect of the famine thus: "At the beginning of the year prices of food had risen to a rate at which the great mass of the peasant population and a large proportion of the artisan class could not purchase enough to support life. In the region of country with which the North India Bible Society has to do, famine conditions of varying intensity were recognized by the Indian Government as prevailing over an area of 146,000 square miles, with a population of 45,000,000 people. Except where artificial irrigation was possible, the country, which from December to March is covered with growing crops, lay bare and parched. There was no food for man or beast. The masses of the people, always miserably poor, were only able to prolong life by the most desperate expedients. Taking India as a whole, over four millions of people were in receipt of public relief, besides uncounted others who were cared for by private charity.

"Under these conditions there seemed to be little hope of an extensive circulation of the Word of God. The supreme duty of the hour, alike to Government officials, missionaries and all who have a heart for doing good, appeared to be to save life, to feed the hungry, to shelter the orphans, and when the summer rains rendered agriculture again possible, to give the people seed to sow and clothing for the approaching winter.

"But as has so often happened in the providence of God, our time of trouble has been also a time of blessing. Our missionary friends have not neglected the circulation of the Scriptures. Our colporteurs and Bible women

have worked earnestly and well. Perhaps the hearts almost the people were prepared for the Word of God. Whether the reports for the year were gathered in, it was with joyful surprise we found that our circulation had reached an aggregate of 101,786, including Bibles, Testaments and Portions, an advance of 24,080 over the circulation of 1880 and a greater number than in any previous year of our Society."

So much for North India: but what of the other Auxiliaries? They all tell the same tale of blessing through affliction. From the plague-stricken Bombay Presidency the report comes of a circulation considerably in excess of that of any previous year. In Madras the total for the year is, with a single exception, the highest reached. Calcutta does slightly better than last year; so also Bangalore. A spirit of inquiry and a willingness to seek comfort in dire distress prevail. Speaking of the Scriptures given to University students, the Rev. W. Penn, of the Noble College, Masulipatam, says: "I have every reason to believe these gifts were appreciated and read by the recipients. The ordinary educated Hindu reads more about Christianity than he is willing to admit. Another well-informed witness says: "There is no doubt that a sort of incipient faith is growing up in the minds of many in the principles and doctrines of Christianity. Some may be found who can go no further than say, "Well, if there be a divine creed in the world and a religion fitted to the conditions and wants of man, that religion is Christianity." Others again read the Bible with reverence, though they hardly like to confess it; others again have embraced intellectually the greater part of the doctrines of Christianity, but stop short of one or two serious difficulties. Not a few have got over these difficulties, and after fighting their way, it may be for years, through doubts and fears, have come to embrace in their hearts unreservedly the whole Gospel of Christ, but are kept back by the social martyrdom which the open avowal of Christ in India involves." Thus both figures and testimonies from India show that Christ is never more a Saviour to men than in their worst hour of need.

Around India there are several fields which must be noticed in passing. In Persia harassing restrictions have operated, and one of the best colporteurs has in consequence been idle. Burma has been visited by Mr. Organe from Madras, and under him the beginnings of an Agency for which an Agent is now sought have been made. The Auxiliaries in Ceylon and Mauritius continue to make good provision for their fields. In Malaysia, under Mr. Haffenden, there has been an increase in sales of more than 15,000 copies, an increase which consists

Perhaps the hearts almost entirely of Chinese Portions, and is due to the wonderful activity of Mr. Walter James, the Society's sub-agent in Cochin-China. Mr. James sold 25,690 copies by colportage in that country, of which number only 1,000 copies were not in Chinese. The other sub-agents meet Muhammadans frequently and find them less accessible than the curious and intelligent Chinese.

It is on turning to China that the most remarkable advance of the year has to be chronicled. No foreign Agency of the Society has ever in a single year circulated so large a number of copies of Scripture. The actual circulation in China during 1897, which Mr. Bondfield reports, amounts to 567,012 copies, giving an increase for the year of more than 200,000 books, and doubling the total of 1894, the next best year in the history of the Agency. The causes of this progress are various. In the first place, it is contemporaneous with the direction of the Agency by Mr. Bondfield, whose energy and enthusiasm rise to seize every opening. The staff of Sub-agents have been doubled, the local committees have been met, consulted, and encouraged, and great attention has been paid to the production of books. The staff of native colporteurs has been increased, and a new scheme for Biblewomen has been formulated and has found a welcome among missionaries. But what has made this advance and the means taken to secure it possible can only be a great awakening in the land, and a breaking down of the stubborn resistance so long offered to Christian truth.

A noteworthy feature in the increase is that it applies to the sale of Bibles and Testaments as well as of Portions. This is a sign of increase in the native Church, or in the number of those who have placed themselves under Christian instruction. The colporteurs are not encouraged to sell Bibles and Testaments promiscuously in their itinerations, but to supply them only to interested and instructed readers.

'Another feature in the colportage returns,' writes Mr. Bondfield, 'is the wide extent of the ground covered by our workers.' Thanks to the energy of our Sub-agents and to the hearty co-operation of an increasing number of missionaries, we have been able during the past year to circulate the Holy Scriptures, in whole or in part, in seventeen out of the eighteen provinces, as well as in Manchuria, Mongolia, Tibet, Hainan and Hong Kong. And, side by side with their ordinary duties, it is gratifying to report that our colporteurs in many districts are doing a work of special importance by seeking out in their own villages and hamlets those who are known to be interested in the Truth or to have come under the influence of the Gospel in hospital or preaching hall or by casual attendance at

some service. In places far removed from any mission centre the catechumen or inquirer is often to be found, and the colporteur is perhaps the only helper or instructor. Such scattered disciples are able to meet with from one year's end to the other. Could the story of some of our native workers be fully told, it would be seen that these men with the Book, are indeed bearers of the Word of Life to many a heart. In their visits to the houses of inquirers in their evening gatherings for prayer and Bible reading and in their frequent talks by the wayside, they are rendering service, the fruitfulness of which it is difficult to estimate. The reports which have reached us as to the good work done by our colporteurs are most encouraging and the help which so many missionaries have rendered both in instructing them and in superintending their work, is gratefully acknowledged.' Dr. Ross, the well-known missionary in Manchuria, confirms this statement. He says that he has been much impressed with the evangelistic value of the work of the colporteurs. Among its results are little bands of believers, gathering here, there and everywhere, often in remote mountain villages. The fruits of the reading of the Scriptures in conversions are perhaps nowhere more numerous than in China.

In Japan an absorption in material progress and a reaction against Christian influences seem to be at work. Korea, however, is opening up in many ways, and here, at least, the development of the country has aided the Society's Agent, Mr. Kenmure.

This review of the field has taken little account of America and the colonies of Great Britain. In many parts of these colportage is industriously pursued and pushed forward into new fields. It is hoped that by this time an entrance has been found in Bolivia by a missionary who has received the aid of the Society, accompanied by one of its colporteurs. Cuba has been a field of the American Bible Society, but the men of Spanish speech who may be found far away from home in the stress of these troublous times will not be forgotten. In Canada there are many warm friends and devoted helpers of the Society. For Klondyke English Scriptures have been supplied through the Bishop of Selkirk, and Archdeacon Macdonald's version in Tukudh is published for the Indians of that locality under instruction at the C. M. S. mission stations. Although there has been a considerable falling-off in the contributions from Australia, it has sent a recruit to Singapore as assistant and *locum tenens* to Mr. Haffenden. Local interest in Biblework would receive a sure impetus were there many more additions to the staff from the colonies.

It is well to bear in mind and to set forth in a Report which traverses so wide a field, that this Society is not the only, although it is the chief, instrument in God's hands for this work. Nor does the work start with this century: it has a long and suggestive history. It owes much to the revival of learning, much to the reform of religion, but still more to both when they have been combined. The prototype of all Christian labourers in this field is perhaps to be found in a scholar and saint of the Early Church, the martyr Pamphilus, the admirer of the Christian thinker, Origen, and the friend of the ecclesiastical historian, Eusebius. Pamphilus wrote many books, now lost to us almost without exception, and founded the theological school and the celebrated library of Caesarea. It is by the establishment of the latter he is best remembered, as there is little doubt that our knowledge of the first three centuries of Christianity is in a large measure due to the use Eusebius made of the books his friend gathered for this library. But history also records that he prepared and gave away copies of the Scriptures to those desirous of possessing them, no light task when books were copied by hand, and parchment was scarce and costly. Pamphilus is therefore the forerunner of the Bible Societies of modern times, the father of organizations which, though so much better equipped for their purpose than he, can only emulate his diligence and generosity.

Two hundred years ago the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge was founded. Having for one of its objects the diffusion of Christian literature, it has published and circulated the Scriptures in a number of languages. While its devotion to other high aims has necessarily limited its activity in this special direction, and left the field to be occupied mainly by the Bible Society, its issue of Scriptures to many churches and missions of the Church of England commands the praise of all. Next year the Religious Tract Society, the parent of our own Society and sometimes its associate, will complete its centenary, and already it is beginning to recount its many gracious achievements. So also the Church Missionary Society, over whose imperial field there has been the most brotherly reciprocity with the Bible Society. In Scotland, America, Holland, and elsewhere there are many sister Societies, all of whom help to swell the total result. But when all have done their utmost, how much yet remains undone. How many there are still opposed or indifferent to the Word of God, how many to whom it is yet inaccessible. The burden becomes heavier with years, but the strength to bear it is never withheld. In faith and hope and love may the Society labour on, knowing that its work is not in vain in the Lord.

These statements of the Report of the British and Foreign Bible Society should stimulate all who value the Bible, to make persevering and earnest efforts to increase its income and thus promote a wider circulation of the Word of God, and enable the Society to supply the increased demands on its income caused by the steady extension of its world-wide work.

The Report tells of a circulation of Bibles, Testaments and Portions of the Holy Scriptures, shewing an increase of 611,017 copies, and amounting to 4,387,152, and of increased expenditure caused by expansion of its benevolent work.

While an increase of income is reported, this is due to one of the legacies being of an exceptional amount; apart from it, other legacies do not reach half the figures of the year before.

The free contributions from Auxiliaries at home and abroad are not encouraging, for they are much less than they ought to be. And the Treasurer's report will shew that the amount contributed is far less than would be raised were the Protestant and Evangelical Christians of Nova Scotia to unite earnestly in the great effort of increasing the circulation of the Bible so as to supply the needs of the vast numbers who do not possess it.

In order that we may do our part to enable the Society to meet the increased demand for and need of God's Word, caused by the progress of missionary work, and the new avenues now opened for the circulation of the Scriptures throughout the world, the ministers of the Gospel should press more earnestly on their congregations and Sunday Schools the claims of this Society, on account of the wideness of its work and its missionary character, and the way God has blessed the labours of its colporteurs and Bible women, and
