THE GOVERNMENT'S RECIPROcity POLICY. The government has made public a despatch dated the 13th Dec. 1920, from the Governor General to the Secretary of State for the Dominion of Canada, proposing a joint commission to prepare a treaty between Canada, represented by Great Britain, and the United States, which will serve in different subjects which are thus specified:

- (1)—Removal of the reciprocity treaty of 1854 with the modifications required by the altered conditions of the two countries and with the extension down to the 49th parallel of the reciprocity treaty of 1854 with the United States. (2)—Removal of the treaty of 1854 with respect to the Atlantic fisheries, with the aim of securing the free admission into the United States markets of Canadian fishery products, in return for facilities to be granted to the United States fishermen to buy bait and supplies, and to transit through Canada, all such privileges to be mutual. (3)—Protection of mackerel and other fisheries on the Atlantic coast and inland waters. (4)—Elimination of hard board laws of the two countries. (5)—Elimination of the existing laws of the two countries on the inland waters dividing Canada from the United States. (6)—Mutual salvage and saving of wrecked vessels. (7)—Arrangements for settling the boundary between Canada and Alaska. It will be seen that this proposed treaty covers all the points in regard to which there are differences between Canada and the United States. The first subject on the list is reciprocity over which our critics who sympathize with the people of the United States have been making such a fuss. The old reciprocity treaty which would be the basis of any new negotiations with the United States covered the following articles:— Grain, flour and breadstuffs of all kinds. Fresh, unsmoked and salted meats. Canned, dried, and fresh fruits. Fish of all kinds, products of fish and other creatures living in the water, fish oil. Hooly, eggs, hides, furs, skins or tails undressed, pelts, wool. Butter, cheese, tallow and lard. Horses, mules, pack animals, and pack animals. Coal, pitch, tar, turpentine, shales. Timber and lumber of all kinds, round, squared, and sawed, unmanufactured in whole or in part, finished lumber. Plants, shrubs and trees. Rice, broom corn and bark. Dynamite, gunpowder, or unworked barytes or strontianite. Dye stuffs, unmanufactured tobacco, fax, hemp and tow unmanufactured. Such were the articles covered by the old reciprocity treaty, and Sir John A. Macdonald is willing to make the basis of a new treaty. He is willing also to extend its provisions or to modify it as may be required by the altered circumstances of the two countries. But he is not willing to agree to unrestricted reciprocity and thus transfer our manufacturing industries and our whole staple trade to the United States. Sir John is also willing to recede to the abortive reciprocity treaty of 1888. This treaty which was sent by the president to congress in February was rejected by the senate in the following August by a vote of 30 to 27. The Republicans voting against it. The debate on this treaty was mainly made up of abuse of Canada for being so presumptuous as to attempt to maintain her rights in the fisheries against the United States. Those Yankee sympathizers of the Grit party who wish to hand us over bag and baggage to that country may read this debate with pleasure but no true Canadian can peruse it without feeling his blood stirred. In the course of the debate Senator Edmunds declared that the United States should not make any arrangement of treaty of any kind with Canada and it was after its rejection that President Cleveland sent his famous retaliatory message to Congress asking for power to suspend the baring privilege with regard to Canadian goods crossing the territory of the United States, and suggesting that Canadian vessels should be denied entry into the ports of the United States. President Cleveland's friendly suggestions were not carried out. In making this new proposal for the settlement of all differences with the United States every candid man will admit that our government has gone as far as it ought to go and more than fulfilled its duty in the premises. The publication of this despatch also shows that when Mr. Blaine wrote the other day that there were no negotiations whatever on foot for reciprocity with Canada, he was simply lying, an accom-
