

SPIRITUAL MILITARY League for women's rights,

issues manifesto. LONDON, April 7.—The Spiritual Military League for women's rights, with which Lady Aberdeen, Flora Annie Steel, the novelist, and other prominent women are identified, to-day issues a manifesto, demanding that the Government move a Bill removing the "humiliations," in the marriage service of the Applican Church. It appecifies fifteen so called moral indignities to women, "In the subtle giving of precedence and prominence to the bridegroom," being the essence of all the complaints. Indignity number one, is to the world "obey," this, the manifesto declared, must be delated or balanced by an equivalent to "obey" on the part of the man.

The manifesto says: "It is a humiliating survival, that the woman alone is given away. The man should also be given away. The man should also be given away. The custom repealed. Other indignities are alleged in the matter of the ring, and the bridegroom's accompanying declaration, with all my worldly goods I thee endow. This is denounced because it is never true, and the government is asked to drop the ring ceremony and the formula, or compel an exchange of rings, and the promise from the bridegroom, "I will tell no economic falsehoods, or give any moral offence."

"The seventh incitement to spiritual arrogance and tyranny," the manifesto says, "is the minister pronouncement of the pair as man and wife, the implication that the woman is wholly the wife and the man pot wholly the husband." The petition that a man shall love his wife as Christ did the church is declared to be "an appalling humiliation to the women and a pernicious exaltation of the man." and a pernicious exaltation of the man."
The manifesto quotes St. Paul's words,
"Wives, submit yourselves to your husbands," and says this is another indignity

LADY CONSTANCE RICHARDSON HAS "TAKEN UP" THE STAGE.
