The regular rate for the services of a rained nurse is \$20 to \$24 and board per week, writes a New York correspondent and the demand is brisk enough to employ them on an average of 45 weeks out of the year. Unusually skilled nurses ometimes get \$30 to \$35 per week whlie undergraduates in their second year's training are permitted to go out at the rate of \$16 a week. What attracts many women to the work is the fact that in most of the hospitals they are paid liberally for their time while learning. This practice is likely to be abolished before ong, however, as the managers regard the training sufficient recompense for services rendered. The nurses are recruited large y from the ranks of those who would otherwise be milliners or dressmakers, though many highly educated ladies are which seems to them especially feminine. which seems to them especially feminine.
