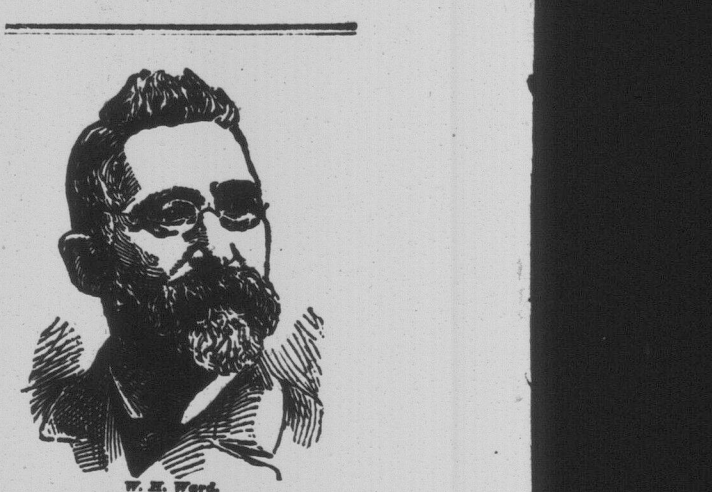

On Wednesday last Mr. Emmerson introduced a bill to consolidate and amend the several acts relating to highways, Mr. Dibble, chairman.

THE PUBLIC ROADS.

Hon. Mr. Emmerson said he did not think the subject of highways had claimed its full measure of the attention of the people of the country, and he certainly did not think it had claimed its full measure of the attention of the Legislature. While in other countries the condition of the country roads was looked upon as a matter of paramount importance by the Legislature, we seemingly have contented ourselves with amendments made from time to time to previous acts, certainly always with the idea of a betterment of the condition of our roads, but he did not think we had applied ourselves to the subject to such a degree as our sister provinces or as some of the states of the Union. In Ontario the government had appointed a commission and the matter had been exhaustively gone into by them; in Massachusetts a like commission had been appointed, which had certainly devoted a great deal of time, and very concentrated attention to the matter of the improvement of country roads. 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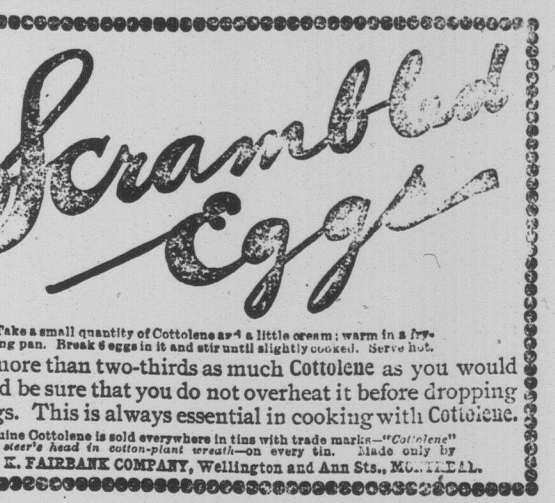
