A RIOT IN GASPE
A serious riot has broken out among
the fishermen at Fox River, about 40
miles from Gaspé. On the 7th instant
about 500 men assembled around the
establishment of Wm. Fraing & Co.
and Wm. Hyman & Son, demanding
four dollars per quintal for fish. They
mobbed Hyman & Son. The manager
of the W. Fraing & Co. establish-
ment, Mr. Brian, was interrupted, and
while six men lashed him to a fence,
one or two struck him on the face and
another held a revolver to his head.
Giving him two minutes to sign a
paper granting their request or else
on the spot. To save the lives of
others and the property of the com-
pany, he granted their request. The
merchants then closed their stores and
left with their clerks for Gaspé.

to run a clean election. And no

ing on election day. The result of
the balloting was as follows: There
were 376 votes cast of which 64 were
plumpers and 302 split votes; the count
being: Wm. Mawhinney, 151; John C.
McLean, 136; and John H. Galbraith,
79. The sixty four plumpers were
divided among the candidates as fol-
lows: Mawhinney 23; McLean 26; Gal-
braith 16. And there were four votes
lost by spoiled ballots, of which Maw-
hinney lost two votes, and the other
candidates lost one vote each.

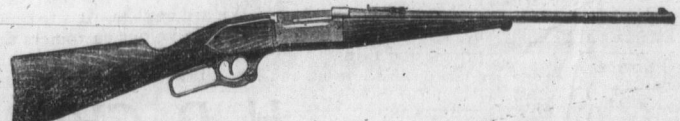
