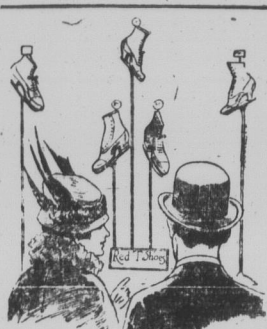

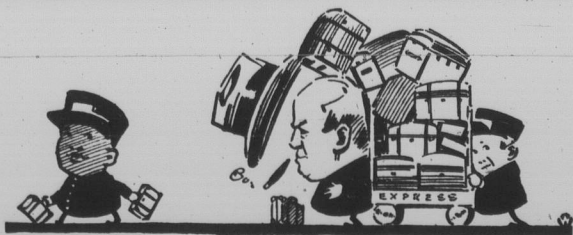

ANOTHER WRECK

ON I. N. R. ROAD

Regular From Campbellton Off Track at Upsalquitch Again

Another spill occurred on the International branch of the I. C. R. at 9 o'clock yesterday morning at a place called Upsalquitch about eighteen miles west of Campbellton, where four cars of the east-bound regular train jumped the rails and started for the woods. A wrecker was summoned from Campbellton and also got off the track while hastening to the rescue. After the wrecker had replaced its own derailed cars, it proceeded to Upsalquitch and straightened up the trouble there.

A passenger who travels over the I. N. R. quite frequently, says that the track is extremely crooked and the road-bed very poor, which accounts for the numerous wrecks and runoffs. He says the regular train spends more time off the track than it does on—which may be a slight exaggeration, as the gentleman was no doubt somewhat peeved by his long wait at Upsalquitch. So frequent are minor accidents that the crew carry with them a complete set of tools for replacing cars, etc. So expert have they become in this respect that a spill which would leave main line men helpless has no terrors for them, and when they are obliged to send out the "S.O.S." for the wrecker, the authorities there are assured that it is a wreck indeed.

The regular was held up about seven hours.

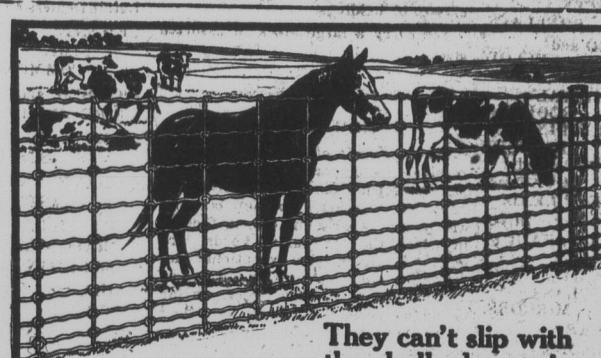



THE SUBWAY

The railway authorities are taking necessary steps for providing another subway.

Preliminary surveys are being made and estimates of the cost of the work, and land necessary for the extension of central street to Union or Water streets are being made.

It has been stated that the C. G. R. officials will make a proposition to our city fathers that if the town will purchase the necessary land, they will do the work.

Now we believe we are voicing the sentiments of the ratepayers when we state that it is up to the C. G. R. to provide this further subway without cost to the town. Because of lack of yard room, the Andrew street crossing is closed by trains at many times and great inconvenience results. It is therefore the duty of the government to provide our citizens with other means of crossing their tracks.

By the extension of Central street this can be done without excessive land damages, as the route of the said extension is fairly clear of any but the cheaper class of buildings, and the land is not expensive.

Certainly the government should bear the entire cost of this work.

Ex-President Theodore Roosevelt pays this tribute to Canada: "Canada has faced the time that tries men's souls, and with gallant heroism she has risen level to the time's need. Mighty days have come to her, and she has been equal to the mighty days. Greatness comes only through labor and courage, through the iron willingness to face sorrow and death, the courage of women and the blood of men, if only thereby it is possible to serve a lofty ideal. Canada has won that honorable place among the nations of the past, and the present, which can only come to the people whose sons are willing and able to dare and do and die at need."

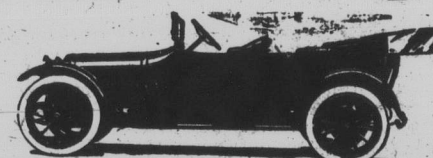

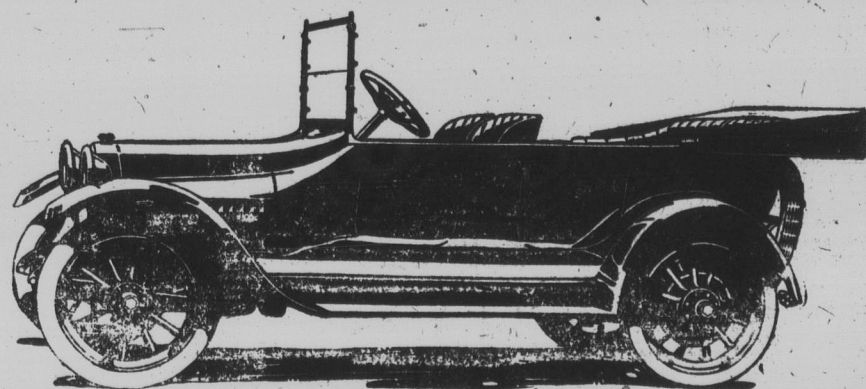

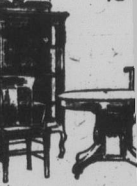

DOUBLE FUNERAL AT BATHURST

Jacob White and His Daughter Passed
Away on Same Day

After a long and trying illness Mr. Jacob White, one of Bathurst's most widely known citizens, passed peacefully away Thursday evening last. His long life of 78 years was all spent in Bathurst, and until several years ago he conducted a prosperous business.

While Mr. White's last hour was known to be surely approaching on Thursday, a telegram was received from the Hospital in Beaufort, Quebec, where his daughter, Miss Marie, had been receiving treatment for the past two months, that her condition was very grave, followed later in the day by the sad news that she had passed away. Miss White was one of the best known young ladies of Bathurst and her unusually lovable disposition made her friend of all, rich or poor, with whom she came in contact. Two years ago she responded to her vocation by entering the convent of the Hotel Dieu in Chatham, where the dread disease, consumption, attacked her and she was brought home about a year ago, and later sent to the Jordan Sanatorium for treatment, where she made very satisfactory progress toward recovery until about two months ago, when the disease attacked her brain, and she was sent to Beaufort for special attention. The disease made rapid progress and caused her death on Thursday at the early age of 22 years, thus ending a young life of exceptionally useful promise.

The funeral on Sunday afternoon, when Mr. White's remains were carried to the Sacred Heart Church together with those of Miss Marie, was one of the largest and most representative attended that Bathurst has seen in a long time. DALHOUSIE BOY WOUNDED

Ald. P. Robinson of Dalhousie has received a letter from the Chaplain of No. 3 General Canadian Hospital, France, informing him that his son, who was reported wounded, is in that hospital with a bullet through his right shoulder. The bullet hit a nerve of his right arm and this is paralyzed, but will be better in time. On this account he cannot write. Pte. Robinson is otherwise in good health.

SHOT IN RIGHT SIDE

Mr. R. K. Shives of Campbellton has received a cable from his brother, Lieut. Robt. K. Shives of the Royal Flying Corps in France, who was recently wounded. The cable announces that he received a gun shot wound in the right side, also that he had been transferred from the hospital in Boulogne to London.

I. C. R. TO TRY OUT NEW SAFETY DEVICE Automatic Cab-Signal and Train- Stop is Electrically Oper- ated

Permission has been granted by the Intercolonial Railway to W. W. Macfarlane, of Philadelphia to try out at his own expense a device he has patented for automatic train control. The test will be made on the eight mile run between Moncton and Paines, Jct., and it is expected that many other railway officials in addition to the chief ones of the I. C. R. will be present for, while naturally skeptical, railway men live in hopes that some day a device will be perfected that will not be subject to the vagaries of the weather, obstructions on the rails and the like.

Mr. Macfarlane, makes great claims for his invention. It combines a train control and telephone system and consists of using the railroad tracks instead of wires. He claims it is continuous in its automatic control of the speed of the train and of the signals which are given on a special instrument in the cab of the engine, operating upon a single or double track system, with either direct or alternating current.

By his system he claims that, whenever a train is within one or two blocks of another train, its speed is controlled by the train in front and a signal dial, showing the condition of the track for two blocks, ahead is always in front of the engineer in his cab.

WHAT APPARATUS IS
The apparatus attached to the engine itself is not very elaborate. It consists of a frame work attached to the under part of the locomotive between the pony truck and the first pair of driving wheels, from which depends on either side, in contact with each track, a special metal shoe, which picks up the current supplied by the storage batteries installed at intervals along the track. From the shoe, wires are connected to the series of sensors, whose signals arranged to be always visible in the engineer's cab. The apparatus gives a green signal to the engineer instantly when the train is within two blocks of a preceding train, and automatically reduces the speed to any predetermined number of miles an hour, after the train has run one hundred feet in this block. A red signal is given when the train is within one block of the preceding locomotive, and the speed reduced to one or two miles.

If a switch is thrown in front of the train on the same block, the engineer receives a red signal and the brakes are applied instantly and automatically through the specially installed electrical mechanism, working in conjunction with the electric shoes on the track. If traffic conditions change in front of the train the engineer is immediately informed through his signals, no matter in what part of the block the train may be. Mr. Macfarlane claims that this will enable the railways to run more trains and to run them with absolute safety, for the engineer is reckoned as a negligible quantity inasmuch as if he fails to take heed of the signals given in his cab, the device applies the brakes and safeguards the train automatically.

CAN TELEPHONE TOO.

The system can be operated on the regular closed-block-circuit principle such as is now used on ordinary block signals and it can also be used in conjunction with the usual semaphores or without them, he said. The same current is utilized that is now used for the operation of electric signals but a special apparatus is brought into play to pass this current through the rails. The telephone system can be operated at the same time as the safety device is working, or independently, and three conversations may be held with the train while it is in motion, even while the train is speeding at sixty miles an hour, he claims. This train telephone system accomplishes the fact of putting the train despatcher, towermen, etc., in constant communication with the train while it is moving and the connection between the engineer and the despatcher is instant, in any part of the track. The system also saves much time and trouble in transmitting messages to freight trains, and in foggy weather will enable the engineer and caboose man of a freight train to keep in touch with each other, even if a drawhead pulls out and the caboose is in one block and the engine in another; and, said Mr. Macfarlane in conclusion, provided connection is made with the regular Bell Telephone System, trains can be put into communication with subscribers.

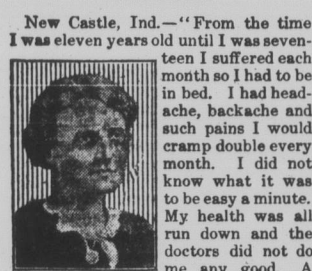

Thanks to the efficient Councilors comprised of the leading men of our community, and our well known Mayor, Gabriel Myles; they have worked hand in hand with the citizens. Mr. Dubuc and Hon. John Hall Kelly, in furthering the interest of our rising town, with such men at the helm, we do not fear for the future, and wishing them every success and a reelection when the annual term expires.

BLACK CAPE

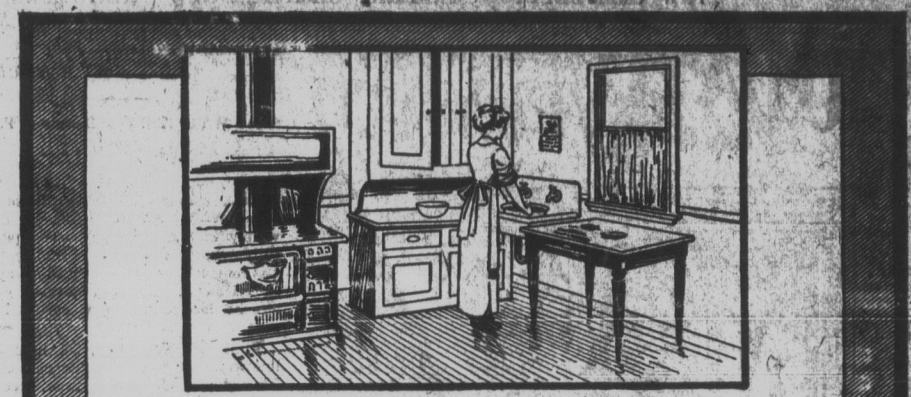

Paquet, general manager and president of the General Car and Machinery Company, whose plants at Montmagny were wiped out by fire last night, stated today to the Canadian Press that there never was a single fire forge, or anything inflammable in the section of the shops where the fire started. The origin of the fire is a mystery.

Work will not be interrupted at the shops, added Mr. Paquet. Of the whole and extensive plant, there still remains the latest erected buildings, where machinery will be installed with all possible haste. The shops destroyed will not be reconstructed.

A searching inquiry will be conducted.

MRS. F. A. WIGHTMAN HAS PASSED AWAY

Mrs. F. A. Wightman, wife of Rev. F. A. Wightman of the Methodist Church, Bathurst, passed away at the Parsonage, Friday morning at 2 o'clock. The death, though not unexpected, was not looked for so soon, notwithstanding the fact that she failed considerably during the past few days.

About fifteen months ago, Mrs. Wightman developed symptoms of cancer and about a year ago she went to the Royal Victoria Hospital in Montreal for further examination. The celebrated Dr. Garrison decided that an operation offered the only chance of recovery and this was performed a few days after her arrival at the hospital. It was hoped that a speedy recovery would follow and for a time this seemed likely, but evidently the disease had gone too far and in October it gave evidence of return. 26TH BATTALION HAD A HARD TIME

Miramichi Boy Describes Fighting at The Front—Suffered Quite Heavily

A Miramichi boy writing from Belgium to the editor of the Chatham World says:

"We lost Major Belyea and Lieut. Ferguson some time ago, sorry to say, and two weeks ago we lost about seventy more of our men. The Germans bombarded us with artillery, the heaviest we have yet been against. It was pretty hard to keep clear from getting hit, blowing up dugouts all around us and implacable, and blowing in the parapets on top of the boys in lots of places. The other week they moved us down to a new part of the line held by the English. They blew up six mines and left the Canadians to hold them. It was a living hell to do so. However, we held five of them. The Germans were changing batteries and opened up with both full force of a ten mile frontage on a 600 yard frontage, so you can have a slight idea of what it would be like from a 5.9 up to 12 inch. It was fierce. We held them back, but suffered quite heavily, having Lieut. Lockhart, our machine gun officer, wounded under the eye, and one more of that gun crew. The rest were killed. Our batteries did good work also, as we had a ten mile frontage playing on them, also up to 15 inch. The enemy suffered heavy losses, besides losing about 500 prisoners. Expect it will be more or less like this all summer now, but for my part I don't want to see the like of it again, with a lot of the boys coming out of it maimed for life. The weather has been cool and damp all winter, rain and mud to your hips all along—a little better now, but still cool. Had one lovely day like summer a week ago, but they are few and far between, but it is feeling more like spring although we hardly had any snow all winter, just two to three and four inches on for a day or two and then go away again. The latter part of March was the worst we had all winter and coldest. Never is very cold or warm either here, so I understand.

That the 26th New Brunswick Battalion is holding the worst place on the western front is the information received by Major C. G. Pincombe, officer commanding the Company of the 104th Battalion, Fredericton, in a letter from his son, Lance Corp. Charles A. Pincombe, of the Machine Gun Section of the 26th Battalion. In part the letter says:

"I am writing this in the French dressing station of the supports, as I am in reserve this trip to the trenches. We are now in new trenches that were formerly held by the English troops. It is supposed to be the worst place on the western front, but everything is going fine so far, only an high explosive shell comes unpleasantly near—and then, just as I am things up a bit, but we are getting to be quite expert at dodging those things nowadays.

"You asked how Major Belyea got killed. Well, he was second in command and was on his rounds through the trenches; he was in a corner, being trench when an H. E. shell burst close alongside of him, quite shattering his body. We carried him to our dugout, where he breathed for about 15 minutes, then passed away. He was my old company commander, as you know, and most impressive funeral I ever saw, nearly the whole battalion being present, with generals and staff officers. When the band played Abide With Me the tears flowed, for we all felt it keenly. Poor Lieut. Ferguson was shot by a sniper through the chest, and died instantly; he, too, was one of the best and had a fine funeral.

"They brought a crowd of prisoners in the other day. As we looked at the specimens of German culture we were of the opinion we would not have taken any of the snicker prisoners. We know too much of how they have treated our poor fellows who have unfortunately fallen into their hands."

N. B. TROOPS WILL GO TO VALCARTIER

St. John, May 9.—Brigadier-General H. H. McLean, M. P., who came back from Ottawa at noon today definitely states that there will be no camp at Sussex this year, but that all the New Brunswick troops will go to Valcartier for training. They will leave before the end of this month.

GOING TO U. S. TO ESCAPE ENLISTING

Ontario Officer Plays the Young Men Who Leave Country, "The Will be Outcasts Forever," Says Captain

London, Ont., May 8.—At a monster public meeting Sunday evening, Captain Dancy made a furious attack on district young men who are going across the border at Detroit and other points to escape enlisting. They will be outcasts forever, he declared. Farmers and mothers are greatest hindrances to recruiting in Canada today, he said, keeping both their sons and money. Returned soldiers, he charged, are used brutally and heartlessly. After being wounded they return home and are met by a band, given a lunch and next day ignored on the streets.

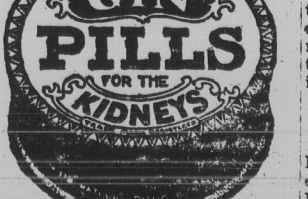
