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TO INVESTIGATE LIGHTING DEPT.

Auditors Report to Be Sent Out—Resolution Passed.

A meeting of the town council was held Monday evening. His Worship Mayor McKay in the Chair with Councillors Chamberlain, Bissett, Duncan, Belle Isle, Moore, St. Onge, Wallace and Patterson present.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and confirmed.

A communication was read from the Public Works Department. Ottawa, notifying the council the Department had instructed its engineer, Mr. W. F. Sparrow, to have the sidewalk opposite the post office repaired. Placed on file.

A communication was read from the General Accident Insurance Co. stating that in a recent inspection made of the boiler of the fire engine one of the seams were found to be leaking. Referred to Fire Protection Committee.

A communication was read from Long Wing paking application for a license to conduct a restaurant on Roseberry street. Referred to Police and License Committee.

The usual departmental accounts were then gone into and ordered paid.

Councillor Belle Isle brought up the matter of having the planks now being used for the forms in laying our concrete sidewalks, used for repairing the plank sidewalks when we were through with them. Councillor Wallace stated such use would be made of them.

Councillor Belle Isle brought up the matter of at once getting the town department ready to store all town supplies, suggesting that the Chairman of all committees instruct the heads of their departments to get their supplies into the store, department at once in order that the system of keeping proper takes upon all town supplies could be put into operation without unnecessary delay.

Councillor Patterson from the Police and License Committee reported recommending that trucking licenses be issued several parties. Report received and adopted.

Councillor Patterson brought up the matter of withholding payment of Building Inspector Adams' salary.

Councillor Duncan said he would not recommend the payment of this salary until the Building Inspector had placed before the council a proper report of his work. It was the duty of the Inspector to inspect all buildings when under construction and report thereon. Such a report the council had not received.

On motion of Councillor Duncan, seconded by Councillor Bissett the report of the auditor, Messrs. Belys & McNeer, was received, and the recommendations in the report ordered carried out. Also that the auditors complete report be printed in pamphlet form and the ratepayers supplied with a copy thereof.

In speaking to the motion Councillor Belle Isle said the report certainly proved there had been extravagance in the management of the electric lighting department and highly complimented the auditor on the thorough manner in which he executed his work, a work which undoubtedly would be the means of saving this town much money. The council was certainly justified in moving for such an audit.

Councillor Patterson brought up the Police motion, stating Attorney General Byrne had written Chief of Police Adams informing him that it was his duty to enforce the Prohibitory law. That Mr. Byrne had also written the Mayor and Councillor Belle Isle to the same effect. He wanted to know what was going to be done regarding the matter.

Councillor Wallace said he was not in favor of the police motion and thought there should be some way of straightening out matters.

Councillor Belle Isle said the matter had been repeatedly thrashed out at the Council Board and he could not see that anything further could be done in the matter.

Referring to the Attorney General's letter he stated that Mr. Byrne, who undoubtedly had misrepresented conditions in Campbellton. This gentleman had informed the Attorney General that there was much more drunkenness in Campbellton since the town council passed the resolution forbidding the policemen from taking any part in the enforcement of the Prohibitory law. This statement was entirely at variance with the report of Chief of Police Adams which showed there was not as much drunkenness in Campbellton this year as there was last year. Councillor Belle Isle also pointed out the Attorney General expressed no legal opinion but simply quoted section 156 of the Prohibitory Act. There was a section in the Act however which the Attorney General failed to quote. This section positively stated the work of enforcing the Prohibitory law developed upon the Chief Inspector and the Inspector appointed under the Act. It was admitted by many strong prohibitionists that the council helped the leopards cause in forbidding the policemen from enforcing the Prohibitory law, as it resulted in an extra Inspector being appointed for this district.

Councillor St. Onge took strong objection to the letter which had been written the Attorney General informing him of these being more drunken

MEETINGS AT THE IMPERIAL ENDED

Rev. Mr. Kenyon and Party Had Crowded Houses—Interest Prevails.

On Sunday Dr. Kenyon held his last services in this town. During the four weeks of his campaign here the Imperial Theatre has been thronged with large crowds and at some of the meetings many have had to stand up while others could not even secure that accommodation.

Throughout all the meetings the audiences were most attentive. They comprised representatives of all denominations and of no denomination at all. Neither in the sermons nor in the evenings was it like a church-going crowd. Presbyterians, Roman Catholics, Episcopalians sat side by side with enthusiastic Methodists and Baptists comprising in all a contented audience but in a way a peculiar one.

On the platform, on the right of the preacher stand were seated the Rev. Mr. Camp and the Rev. Mr. Boothroy under whose auspices these services were conducted.

The singing by Prof. Fletcher, Prof. Duffy and Miss Willie was all that could be desired and they had the happy faculty of imbuing some of their enthusiasm into the audience.

On the whole these services have done a great deal of good in our community, and it is expected that Mr. Kenyon's supporters will inaugurate weekly meetings in order to continue the good work begun by Mr. Kenyon.

Mr. Kenyon left on Monday morning for Fredericton, accompanied by Mr. Havelock Sansom and Mr. John Smith. While in Fredericton Mr. Kenyon conducted two services, then motored to Spencer, Mass., where Mr. Sansom and Mr. Smith will work in connection with the building of The Kenyon Bethel Bible Institute.

The next campaign will be held in Doaktown and in the interval Prof. Fletcher and Miss Willie are holding services in the Orange Hall at Flatlands.

business here than elsewhere. As a matter of fact there was considerably less drunkenness now than heretofore. His Worship also strongly resented the statement written the Attorney General as to drunkenness in Campbellton. There was but one way the motion could be resented, and that was for who had voted in favor of it moving to have it rescinded, and it was useless to discuss the matter, until such a reconsideration was moved by a councillor who had voted in favor of the motion.

Councillor Moore brought up the matter of the appointment of a meat and milk inspector. There was much discussion over the question. Councillor Moore felt that an experienced man should be appointed, and he should be employed the year round. Asked as to salary, he suggested \$50 per month. On motion appointment was laid over until next night of meeting.

Councillor Belle Isle moved that a committee of three be appointed to consult with the town solicitor regarding the matter of holding a legal investigation into the workings of the Electric Light Department. This motion was seconded by Councillor Bissett and on the question being put carried unanimously.

The Mayor appointed on that Committee Councillor Belle Isle, Moore and Bissett, the first named to be chairman.

Councillor Moore brought to the attention of the Council the careless manner in which many of the automobile owners were storing their gasoline, and gave notice that he would at the next meeting of the council move a by-law regulating the manner in which such gasoline should be stored. Only recently a fire had occurred through the carelessness of storing gasoline, a lighted match having been thrown near the gasoline by one passing along the street.

He also asked for the loan of the town scraper and steam roller to put the base ball field in shape for the base ball league. Request granted.

His Worship brought to the attention of the council that he had been approached by several of the merchants regarding the enforcement of the early closing by-law. Considerable discussion took place over the matter, in which practically all the councillors took part. It was finally decided that the Chairman of the Police Committee consult with the town solicitor regarding the legality of the by-law, and if same be constitutional that he give instructions to have it enforced.

The following resolution which was moved by Councillor Duncan and seconded by Councillor Moore was carried.

INSTANTLY KILLED IN GUERTIN'S MILL

Simeon Fleury was Caught in Machinery and Badly Mangled.

Word was received here on Tuesday evening by Coroner Martin that Simeon Fleury of Restigouche, P. Q. had been instantly killed while at work in Guertin's Mill at Kaines Siding.

Mr. Fleury was caught by the legs by the machine he was operating and was so badly crushed that death was almost instantaneous. Coroner Martin went up the L.N.R. yesterday morning and held an inquest in the afternoon, a verdict of accidental death being given.

Mrs. Fleury was immediately notified of her husband's death and went up to Kaines Siding with Dr. Martin to bring the remains home.

Mr. Fleury who was fifty years of age is survived by his wife, an adopted daughter and an adopted son.



TABLET UNVEILED AT JACQUET RIVER

Women's Institute of Empire Day Celebration at Jacquet River, N. B.

Empire Day was fittingly observed at Jacquet River by the Local Branch of the New Brunswick Women's Institute, when a Memorial Tablet erected by this society in honor of the boys of the Parish of Durham who participated in the great war, was unveiled. The Honor Roll contains the names of one hundred and ten young men, who enlisted voluntarily for overseas service; sixteen of these have reached the ultimatum of patriotism by sacrificing their lives for King and Country. Also the name of one nursing sister, Miss Agnes Donnelly, is recorded. Miss Donnelly went over with a Canadian Unit in June 1915 and did service until June 1919, several months after the cessation of hostilities. The Honor Roll is very beautiful, being of varnished oak, with names arranged in alphabetical order, engraved in black lettering in old English style. It is artistically decorated with gilt scrolls, colored flags and maple leaves, and a gilt star is placed before the name of each one who made the supreme sacrifice.

A splendid musical and literary program was rendered and practically, inspiring and patriotic addresses were delivered by Rev. Father Cormier, Rev. M. MacLeod, Rev. Father LeBlanc, and A. T. LeBlanc Esq., ex-M. L. A. Pleading remarks were made by Miss M. Culligan R. N. W. R. MacMillan, Esq., and Sergeant T. Gasey, veteran of the Boer and Great World Wars. The keynote of the addresses was brotherhood of man, and sisterhood of woman, and each speaker exhorted the people to frequent assemblies of this kind which fostered a community spirit.

Mrs. J. W. V. Lawlor, President of the St. John Women's Institute and New Brunswick representative to the Dominion Federation of Women's Institutes, was present, and presided in a most efficient manner. Mrs. Lawlor in her own inimitable way set before the gathering some interesting facts about the Women's Institute of New Brunswick and Canada. Mrs. Lawlor's opening address in reference to the patriotism displayed by the Parish of Durham both by the boys who have returned and those who won't come back, and the long list of names on the Honor Roll, was touching in the extreme. Such thoughts as these were suggested:

"It is well that such thoughts should take place from time to time for we are a forgetful people. We are apt to forget, too quickly, the deep debt of gratitude which we owe the brave and valiant living of this Parish, who offered their all, that we the home might peacefully enjoy our noble heritage." "We are proud that our boys showed their patriotism by responding to their country's call in such large numbers. They co-operated with the sons of the whole British Empire in achieving such glorious results, and in maintaining the honor of the Empire, untarnished and inviolate. They surely have helped to make a noble name for Canada."

An interesting feature of the evening was the reading of the Report of the Jacquet River Red Cross activities during the war. A most wonderful amount of work was accomplished by a small band of workers. Members of the Women's Institute were Red Cross workers also.

M. A. for the occasion was furnished by Prof. R. L. Doucet of Bathurst, was particularly fine and much appreciated by the audience. It is the consensus of opinion that this was the best put on meeting for any purpose ever held in the Parish of Durham, and the Women's Institute is being warmly congratulated on the success of the evening.

On the afternoon of May 25th the Roll of Honor was placed in the Advanced Department of the Public School by Mrs. D. McAlister, Miss A. Ulficant and Mrs. P. Doyle, ladies of the executive of the Women's Institute, where it will ever be an inspiration to both teachers and pupils, help make the community a nobler and better place to live in.

Investment at Buckingham Palace, London. The King conferred the honor of Knighthood on Knights Bachelor designate at Buckingham Palace. Sir Harry and Lady Lauder leaving the palace after the investiture.

Among the recent interesting immigrants who have been coming to Canada from Europe there arrived a party of Finlanders, in care of Lieut. T. C. Wetton, F.R.G.S., F.R. C.I.I. of the Devonshire Regiment, Imperial Army, who had previously served as our Allies in the "Finnish Legion" in North Russia. These Finlanders with many of their comrades had been driven out of Finland into North Russia when the Germans invaded their country. The "Finnish Legion" was formed from now as among these exiled Finns and rendered good service to the British forces. The Legion was commanded by Lieut.-Col. R. B. J. Burton, O.B.E., of Toronto, formerly of the 5th Canadian (Winnipeg) Regiment. After the Armistice most of the Legionnaires were repatriated to Finland, but some Legion Details, including several refugees Finnish women and children, were left in charge of Lieut. Wetton who was one of the English last to leave North Russia at the Allied Evacuation of that country. His chief Finnish officer under him was Oskari Takala, previously the first Prime Minister of Finland after the Russian Revolution. Later Lieut. Wetton was sent to Helsinki, Finland, where the repatriation of the Legionnaires was being carried out. Having suggested strongly to the British War Office that the remaining Legionnaires who were being repatriated to Finland should be given an opportunity to see the place in Canada, Lieut. Wetton was placed in charge of these Finns on current

BE PREPARED

On the first day of June, the next decennial census of the Dominion of Canada will begin. It is a large task over a vast extent of country. Engaged in the work there will be 240 commissioners and 11,500 enumerators. The questions to be answered cover a great variety of subjects. There is some speculation as to how large the population will prove to be. In the last two census-taking the population fell below the estimates. In 1901, it was supposed the number would exceed 5,371,000. In 1911, eight millions or more was the popular guess but the tally only discovered 7,206,643 inhabitants. The present estimate is nine millions or more. It is somewhat difficult to make a well-founded estimate. Canada does not keep an account of those who emigrate to other lands. A tragic loss of 55,000 men was suffered through the war.

THE BY ELECTIONS.

The Farmers party did not succeed very well in the two by-elections on Saturday, utterly failing in their attempt to win new representation in the Federal Government. In York-Sunbury, the Farmers' candidate, aided by the Liberals, was beaten by a nine hundred vote margin. In Yarmouth, the Farmers' candidate, in a three cornered fight, did not receive four hundred votes. One of the speakers of the Farmers' party claimed that his party will capture forty-five seats in the Province of Quebec when the general election takes place, but when he considers the figures in Yarmouth he will lose some of his optimism. The results in York-Sunbury were generally expected, for York has been a Conservative stronghold for years. Sunbury however has been a Liberal stronghold on a small scale, so that the Government can get very little satisfaction from the polling. As to Yarmouth, the Liberals won a decided victory. The constituency has been Liberal and Conservative in turn with no large majority on either side, but this time the Liberals got a majority of over sixteen hundred votes. The results suggest that the Liberals are at strong in Quebec as they claim to be and that the Rt. Hon. A. Meighen has very slim chances of securing a minority from that province.



SHIVES CO. WINS IMPORTANT CASE

Matter of Lines Between Timber Limits Tried in Court.

Ottawa, Ont., May 23rd, 1921. Judgment has been delivered in the case of Price Brothers vs. Shives Lumber Company.

Price Brothers claimed that Shives Lumber Company had trespassed on their property up the River Kimouski, and therefore, sued for a certain amount of trespass amounting to \$6,500.00.

The Shives Lumber Company pretended that there was no line between the two timber limits. The Crown Land Department had given instructions to have the lines established between the two limits, but the Shives Lumber Company claimed that they never understood these instructions, and that by the running of the line in question, they had been deprived of a considerable part of their limits.

The Superior Court at Rimouski, presided over by Justice Royt, maintained the pretensions of the Shives Lumber Company, and dismissed the action taken by Price Brothers.

An appeal was taken to the Court of King's Bench, and this court, by a majority of four judges against one, reversed the judgment of the first court.

An appeal was then taken to the Supreme Court at Ottawa. The question of the right to appeal arose, and by a majority of three judges, against two, the Supreme Court decided that Shives Lumber Company was entitled to appeal to the Supreme Court.

The Supreme Court was then called upon to decide the question, and by three judges against two, they decided that the record should be sent back to the first court for additional evidence. The additional evidence was put in, and judgment rendered by Justice Letellier, dismissing the action taken by Price Brothers against Shives Lumber Company, and declaring that no line yet existed.

The judgment in this case will have considerable bearing upon the interpretation of the Crown Land Law of the Province of Quebec relating to lines between timber limit holders. The case thus ran the gamut of all the Courts of the Province of Quebec, and back again to the first Court, taking a period of six years, and having been heard by twelve judges.

The action of Price Brothers was therefore dismissed, with the costs of all court against them.

Shives Lumber Company was represented by the Honorable John Hall Kelly, K. C., of New Carlisle, and Price Brothers by the firm of Messrs. Tessier & Cote, of Rimouski.

TO INVESTIGATE LIGHTING DEPT.

(Continued from page 1.)
Ordered by Councillor Belle Isle was passed:

RESOLUTION.

"As it is expedient for this Council to practice the strictest economy in all the Town Departments and as the Electric Light Department desires being a self-supporting one, should yield to the existing rates, which surplus could be applied to extensions and improvements, thus helping to reduce our rate of taxation.

Be it therefore resolved that the staff on our Electric Lighting plant be immediately reduced to four employees as follows:—One manager, one engineer and two firemen. The said Engineer and a least one fireman or if not the engineer, then the two firemen to be also competent line-men.

The hours of duty for the said Engineer and firemen to be of nine hours each, the two firemen to work each a shift of nine hours, at the Power House, and the Engineer a shift of six hours. The other three hours of his regular time to be devoted to the general repairs and to keep of the plant and system in conjunction with and at the request of the manager.

Whenever the said engineer and firemen may be called on in cases of emergency, pertaining to the electric system outside of their regular hours duty, they shall be paid extra for such over time. The manager who is receiving the highest salary shall be on hand on any and every case of emergency, without any additional pay. The said manager to have eight hours of duty in the day.

The said manager, engineer and firemen, not to be allowed to engage in any private business, while in the employ of the Town of Campbellton. Electric wiring of any private property not to be carried on by the above named employees.

As it is the duty of this Council to see that the Electric Department as well as any other self sustaining department make good and are handled at a reasonable minimum cost of operation, the Council hereby resolves to see that fair and equitable rates be charged to consumers.

Be it therefore resolved, that this Council take up at an early date the readjustment of electric rates, both for lighting and power purposes, such rates to be made equitable to all light and power users. That also a readjustment of salaries in the different offices be taken up at an early date, by this Council.

His Worship the Mayor made enquiries of Councillor Wallace as to who employed an outside engineer to take street levels. Councillor Wallace replied that he had done so. There was a very heated discussion over the Chairman of the Public Property and Streets Committee taking it upon himself to engage an engineer without having at least been given authority to do so.

Council then adjourned.

The opportunity is afforded other organizations, however, to introduce into their own program unique features appealing to interest which are universal among boys. The method is summed up in the term Scoutcraft, and is a combination of observation, deduction and commonsense, or the ability to do things. Scoutcraft includes instruction in first aid, life saving, tracking, signalling, cycling, nature study, camp craft, seamanship, woodcraft, civility, patriotism and many other subjects. This is accomplished in games and team play and is pleasant, not work, for the boy. All that is needed is the out-of-doors, a group of boys and a competent leader.

"Something to do, something to think about, and something to enjoy, with a view always to character building; for manhood, not scholarship, is the first aim of education."

The Boy Scout Movement is developed in practically every country of the world as well as in all the overseas dominions and colonies of Great Britain and the United States. According to a pamphlet just issued by the Provincial Headquarters of the Boy Scouts Association, 24 Ritchie Building, St. John, there are in Canada alone some 22,692 registered Scouts.

BOY SCOUT.
As an organization, the Scout Movement is neither militaristic in thought, form nor spirit, although it does instill in boys the military virtues such as honor, loyalty, obedience and patriotism.

The purpose of the Boy Scout Movement is to develop character, initiative and resourcefulness in boys by cultivating their interest in the fascinating outdoor activities of the Scout program.

It is in the wearing of the uniform and doing of things together, as scouts, that they absorb the force and truth of the scout law which states: "A Scout is a friend to all and a brother to every other Scout."

The movement aims to supplement the various existing educational agencies, and to promote the ability in boys to do things for themselves and others. It is not the aim to set up a new organization to parallel in its purposes others already established.

H. G. WELLS WANTS BIBLE REVISED.
"The Book That Has Held Together the Fabric of Western Civilization."

London, May 2.—"We want a Bible, we want a Bible so badly that we cannot afford to put the old Bible on a pinnacle out of daily use. We want it readjusted to daily use."

"It is true that the old Bible falls short in its history and does not apply closely to many modern problems, then we need a revised and enlarged Bible in our schools and homes to restore a common ground of ideas and interpretations if our civilization is to be held together."

Mr. H. G. Wells, thus states, in the London Sunday Times what he conceives to be one of the first steps of our times if the salvaging of civilization is to be achieved.

Among the modern problems with which the Bible does not deal—problems that enter intimately into the moral life of all of us—he mentions the establishment of American independence and the age-long feud of Russia and Poland.

"And there are all sorts of moral problems arising out of modern conditions on which the Bible sheds little or no direct light; the duties of a citizen at an election, or the duties of a shareholder to the labor employed by his company, for example. For these things we need at least a supplement, if we are still to keep our community upon one general basis of understanding, upon one unifying system of thought and behavior."

Mr. Wells is not belittling the influence of the Bible. He says it is "the Book which has held together the fabric of western civilization." It has been the handbook of life to countless millions of men and women. The civilization we possess could not have come into existence, and could not have been sustained, without it.

He goes on to say that the Bible during the last century has lost much of its former hold, and no longer grips the community.
