



One cannot blame education altogether, for people have been educated long enough along these lines. And we wonder that Campbellton-shas the proud position of having the hignest death rate, especially among children, per capita in the Province. The children play and live in these kind of surroundings, that probably has something to do with it. At the schools I am told that during the recent epedemic of measles, children were allowed to attend school and mix with others with this "ditr" disease on, their little bodies. Of course many died. The houses where these youngsters lived were not isolated or placarded, and their parents and the remaining household were not isolated. I have been into some cellars here that would make a cat sick. I didn't see see any cats around. The modern cat is a pretty wise animal. To conclude, isn't it about time we got a little public spirit into this thing; the Board of Trade can certainly help us, and the Civic Authorities can do the rest. That's their job. This is one way in which we can help along this great cause, and possibly in time we shall reap the benefit. Let us ring down the curtain and say death to the "muck heap," be it around our food purveyors stores, or in our lanes, etc. etc. it's a dangerous thing.




