—If the premise of its good quelities is not overstated, the coming explosive for coal mines is ammonite. When tamped clay and coal dust and fired by an electric detonator, it gives no fiame; either in a cartridge or scattered loose on an anvil. It cannot be fired by heavy weights falling from different heights; and though a cartridge was immersed in ice and water during several hours, one piece of it was fired by a detonator, and the other thrown on a coke fire, burned rapidly but did not explode. Among ten explosives fired from a mortar throwing a 29 pound shot with a charge of hve grammes, ammonite stood highest in power and gunpowder lowest. It is a nitrogen compound in unstable chemical combination.




