Washington, May 22.—In the House yesterday Mr. Baker, of New York, offered an amendment to the Tariff Bill providing that all articles on importation into the United States, whether embraced in the free list or otherwise, shall be subject to and pay no less rate of duty than is or may be imposed by the country of export on like articles exported into the United States. The Tariff Bill was reported to the House at noon by the Committee of the Whole. The previous question on the engrossment

The Tariff Bill was reported to the House at noon-by the Committee of the Whole. The previous question on the engrossment and third reading of the Tariff Bill and amendments was ordered by a vote of 161 yeas to 143 nays. Coleman, of Louisiana, and Featherstone, of Arkansas, were the only Republicans voting in the negative. Adams, of Illinois, and Butterworth refrained from voting.

Tha House then considered the amendments agreed to in Committee of the Whole. The first amendment upon which a separate vote was demanded was that of changing the phrascology of the tin plate clause and it was adopted by 150 yeas to 149 nays. A committee amendment, to restore jute yarns from 30 per cent. (as in the bill) to 35 per cent. (the present), was rejected by 144 nays to 143 yeas. The effect is to reduce the duty 5 per cent. by taking advantage of a point in the bill, and is the first Democratic victory so far.

The Tariff Bill was passed in the House by a strict party vote, with the exception of Mr. Coleman, of Louisiana, who voted with the Democrats in the negative. Mr. Butterworth voted aye.

LITTLE HELEN KELLER,

Though Blind and Deaf, Learning to Use the Spoken Language,

\* Boston, May 21.—About two weeks ago an account was published of a remarkable child, Helen Keller, who came from Alabama and was placed in the South Boston Blind Asylum. She was blind, deaf and dumb, presenting the same obstacles to teaching that Laura Bridgeman did. This child showed a remarkable desire to learn, and in the first year she had gained a vocabulary of 1,800 words. Two years before that she knew absolutely nothing of language. Her efforts to learn showed that before that she knew absorbety nothing of language. Her efforts to learn showed that she had within her a tremendous in-tellectual force, that must either find an outlet or make a wreck of the child. The child was well formed, physically pretty and pleasing in her manners to an unusual degree, and she aroused an unusual interest among philanthropists. At the end of her among philanthropists. At the end of her second year in school her vocabulary had increased to 3,000 words. Now comes a increased to 3,000 words. Now comes a still more remarkable development. About four weeks ago the child was placed in the care of Miss Fuller, of the Horace Mann School, and since then she has acquired the power to express herself in spoken words which are perfectly intelligible to everyone. The wonderful progress made by the child within two years after she had first been placed in the South Boston Asylum is illustrated by her ability to write. After the words became familiar to her she began to use them in her writing, as shown in this little composition which she wrote during her visit to Boston:

"This morning teacher and I sat by the window and we saw a little boy walking on the sidewalk. It was raining very hard and he had a very large umbrella to keep off the rain drops. I do not know how cld he was, but think he may have been 6 years old. Perhaps his name was Joe. I do not know where he was going, because he was power to express herself in spoken words

BEHRING SEA

The British Proposals Rejected by the U. S. Government-The Modus Vivendi Temporarily

New York, May 22.—A Washington dispatch to the Herald says; "At the Cabinet meeting Wednesday it was decided to reject the British proposition submitted three weeks ago for a settlement of the Behring Sea question. Secretary Windom was decidedly opposed to the acceptance of the proposal. First, because its provisions were deemed by him entirely inadequate to secure the proposed object of preserving seal life in Behring Sea; and, second, because it virtually ignored the established position of the United States in that sea, arising out of its ownership of the partially surrounding shores and of islands within the sea, the possession of a universally recognized boundary line which included in the cession to the United States the very part of the sea wherein alone this country has sought to exercise a territorial jurisdiction; the inheritance from Russia of a continuous claim of jurisdiction never directly questioned nor successfully assailed, and the undoubted right that the United States has to exercise a reasonable police jurisdiction to protect its own property and interests in Behring Sea and secure to itself the natural use and profit thereof.

Secretary Blaine did not advocate an acceptance of the proposal, and thought it probable that further negotiations would abate the Canadian contentions and improve the position of the United States.

The British proposal being without support from either of the two departments immediately concerned with it necessarily met with rejection—a like fate with that which overtook the preceding American proposal in the council of the Governor-General of Canada. It is said that in neither case was an acceptance of the proposal anticipated by the party submitting

proposal in the council of the Governor-General of Canada. It is said that in neither case was an acceptance of the proposal anticipated by the party submitting it, but that the only result expected from the exchange of proposals was the bringing of the parties a little nearer together by elimination of some points of difference. To some extent this expectation has been realized, so that negotiations are really in a better state, notwithstanding the rejection of counter proposals, than at the beginning. The next step in the negotiations will be discussions and settlement of the details connected with the creation of a joint commission of experts to prepare and submit to the two governments a full and particular project as the basis of a treaty, by which the whole question can be permanently settled. It is possible the Government of Russia may be lirectly represented in this commission of experts, but that has not yet been considered. In any event there is a confident expectation that a treaty can be framed in time for submission to the Senate immediately upon the opening of the second session of the present Congress.
