SHOT THROUGH THE BODY!

A Sad Sequel to a "Shooting" Expedition.

Though Not an Unusual One—James Ward Fires a Bullet, Which Pierces Young Freddie Wilson—The Circumstances.

A holiday—some small boys—one of them has a gun—and the usual result follows. In this case the victim is Freddie Wilson, the 14-year-old son of Mr. Malcolm E. Wilson, 223 Grey street.

Joe Steele, Freddie Wilson, Joe Talley, Will Steele, Jim Ward and Will Landry are young boys who went on a shooting expedition yesterday morning.

Ward fired a bullet at the fence, and raising his rifle, aimed at the boys, and got it first, said Freddie Wilson, as he made a dash for the fence.

Ward pulled the trigger just as Wilson ran in the line of the rifle, and with a cry the latter fell to the ground.

Ward had entered his right side towards the rear, and passing through an oblique direction, emerged from the front of his body.

His horrified companions ran to the nearest house, whither the wounded boy was carried, awaiting medical assistance from the city.

The ambulance afterwards conveyed him to the hospital. He was examined there by the physicians, who put him under chloroform and performed the medical actions usual to such a case.

At 11 o'clock last night the boy was sleeping quietly, and his condition seemed favorable. The wound is pronounced a dangerous one, and the result cannot yet be foretold.

Ward had rented the weapon for the day from a local gunsmith. He naturally feels sorry enough over the consequences of the accident.

Freddie Wilson Dies from His Injuries. Freddie Wilson, the lad who was accidentally shot yesterday by James Ward, died from the effects of his injuries about 11 o'clock this morning at the city hospital.

He passed through the night well, but took a turn for the worse after daylight. Everything possible was done for the little sufferer, but the fatal bullet had pierced a vital part and medical skill was useless to save his life.

Coroner Ferguson inquired into the circumstances of the sad affair, and decided that an inquest was unnecessary, as the shooting was clearly accidental. The remains have been taken to the home of his parents, 223 Grey street.

God's in His heaven, All's right with the world. —[UNKNOWN]

London, Saturday, April 16.

"The facts in the London election case," pertinently remarks the Winnipeg Tribune, "would seem to indicate that the ends of political justice are not always served by appeals from revising officers to county court judges."

"In Glasgow," says Sir George Trevelyan, "the water has paid of the debt of purchase, and the price of gas has been reduced one half, while the public streets are lighted for nothing." So much for municipal co-operation.

A good many people do not like the law which provides that all unclaimed human bodies shall go to the medical schools as "anatomies" for the students. The present system was indorsed by a majority of members on both sides of the House on the ground that the welfare of the living necessitated the provision of dead bodies for the purposes of investigation, and to have no means for providing them would be to encourage grave robbery, as was the case in bygone times. The Toronto Week offers a new and novel solution of the question. It suggests that the devotees of the healing art should themselves provide a full supply of subjects, "Why," asks our contemporary, "should not every medical student and practitioner make it a point of professional honor and etiquette to bequeath his body, when he is done with it, for the promotion of science?" A very reasonable question. Make your will accordingly, gentlemen.

Dr. Goodwin, professor of chemistry in Queen's University, Kingston, speaking to workmen in that city recently, drew attention to the fact that of all people Canadians can least afford to tamper with intoxicating beverages. There is quite enough champagne in our climate. "The climate," said he, "has a great deal to do with the ease with which the tipping habit is acquired. There is no question in my own mind of the truth of that as a general statement. What is comparatively safe in one climate is positively dangerous in another, and I believe that our Canadian climate is particularly perilous in this respect. I have come to the conclusion that while moderate drinking may be indulged in to a certain extent in European countries without a degree of danger, in Canada, at any rate, moderate drinking is to the born Canadian, as a rule, an impossibility. If that conclusion—the result of much observation—will be any help to you, I shall be very glad." There is much food for reflection in this declaration by a learned investigator.

IF MERCIER, WHY NOT CARON?

That is the charge laid against Sir Adolphe Caron by Mr. Edgar on his responsibility as a member of Parliament. He promises to produce evidence to prove it. Is a mere denial enough? Most assuredly not. This view is maintained by every independent Liberal and Conservative paper in the country.

TWO EXPERIMENTS.

What is known as University Extension will be a success or a failure just in so far as its promoters go the right way about it. The aim of the university teacher, and indeed of every true teacher, must be to educate his students, and that aim will attain the fullest fruition when the students are made to think for themselves. But how shall they think to the best advantage? On the answer to that question centers the subject of University Extension. In a recent article on the subject, Principal Grant relates how Queen's University at Kingston has succeeded in two experiments in this direction. It is acknowledged that it is difficult to secure interest in university work among that numerous class of high school pupils who do not go forward to the universities or professional colleges, and yet 5,000 out of every 6,000 have hitherto ended their studies on leaving the high schools of the Province. For the benefit of this class Queen's University seven years ago arranged a special class of study by correspondence, and the pupils were permitted to go up for examination in due course. Recently special classes have been formed in neighboring cities, which are taught by college professors after the Socratic method. The teacher lectures in a measure, but rather in a conversational manner, and the pupils come, pencil in hand, prepared to take notes and to ask questions. This, to our mind, is the better method of the two. The popular lecture, with its surface information, its brief biographical sketch, its sandwiched-in anecdotes to keep the inattentive from dozing into indifference, is all very well in its way, but it is not a strong educative force. It rarely stimulates inquiry. The teacher who sets his class to thinking, who asks them to let no problem however difficult to the mind of a pupil it may appear, pass without present solution, can accomplish far better results than he contented himself with lecturing them. It would not surprise us if university extension work carried out in this way, should largely supersede the popular lecture. The system can be made of immense advantage to many if judiciously gone about. There is no reason why in the near future, with the Western University in full working order, the university extension idea should not be a most popular feature. If Kingston can make a success of this class of study, why not London?
