Teuton Invaders Are Reported at City of Luga.

REDS GATHERING ARMY

Russian Government Rushing Operations for Defence of Petrograd.

TOOK TWO REGIMENTS.
Berlin, Feb. 27—(British Admiralty, per Wireless Press).—German troops, advancing north of Dorpat, yesterday captured two Russian regiments as they were retreating, the German staff announced today.

London, Feb. 27.—Luga, half way between Pskov and Petrograd, has been occupied by the Germans, according to an unconfirmed rumor, a Reuter dispatch from Petrograd says. A number of British subjects have left Petrograd for home during the past week. The embassies still remain there.

The Bolsheviki continue extremely busy enrolling men, gathering and shipping arms and supplies, and in other defence activities. A dispatch from Moscow says that 70,000 revolutionary troops have been sent from Moscow toward Bologole.

Luga is 80 miles southwest of Petrograd.

RUSSIA HELPLESS.
London, Feb. 27.—If special dispatches from Petrograd gauge accurately the situation there, the Germans are likely to find little difficulty in occupying the city with trained troops. Russian soldiers quite frankly refuse to fight, and say: "We have had enough of fighting. If the Germans come, let them take us." There is a stiffer attitude among the workmen, from whom, if at all, resistance to the Germans must come. Even though for lack of training their resistance should prove of little value, they are said to be enrolling with enthusiasm in response to the call of the Bolshevik eaders. Opinion Divided On Bill Introduced in Legislature-Jingoism, Says Collegiate Head, But the Mayor Would Discourage All Things German.

There is a division of opinion in the city on the advisability of barring German from the schools, as provided for a bill introduced in the Ontario Legislature on Tuesday. Some favor the course, but educationists as a rule take the other ground.

If it is taught in the public schools for this province it should be stopped at once. As an optional subject in the public schools information will be published as received."

Y. M. C. A. HUT IN ROOFED-OVER HOLE MADE BY 15-INCH SHELL





ASKING FOR \$86,588

Oil Increase Largely Responsible fo \$12,000 Increase.

The board of works at its session last night discussed its preliminary estimates, and sent them on to the board of control for consideration. The amount asked for is \$86,588.44. Last year the amount expended was \$74,447.29, so the board is asking for an increase of a little more than \$12,000. Two items explain the increase. Last year street oiling cost the city \$5,377.95, while this year the city's share will cost \$10,262.23, due altogether to the increase in the cost of oil, which has more than doubled in price. The balance is made up of the increase in streets and general improvements. In 1917, the city expended \$27,397, while this year the sum of \$32,893.33 is asked. The other items show small increases or decreases.
