"Tariff Cat Is Out of Bag

Count von Brockdorff-Rantza u To Proceed To Berlin To *Confer With the Chancell or, Who Will Return To Versailles If Conditions Are Accepted.

Paris, June 6.-When the Germans are handed the Allied reply to their counter proposals they will be informed, according to French circles, that the discussion has been finally closed, and will be given no less than three or more than five days in which to accept or reject the conditions.

Count von Brockdorff-Rantzau, the head of the German peace mission, is expected to leave immediately for Berlin to confer with Philipp Scheidemann, the German chancellor. If it is decided that Germany shall sign the treaty, the count will return to Versailles. If Germany refuses to sign, notification of her r fusal will be sent from Berlin, it is said.

Will a Slaughter of Jews be Next European Horror?

While the sporadic persecutions and massacres of Jews in Russia, Poland, Rumania and the Ukraine, already reported, are disturbing in themselves, they are but scattered sparks compared to the conflagration some observers foresee. Thus William G. Shepherd, in a Paris dispatch to the New York Evening Post, says that not only leading Jews in France, but even notable Russian authorities, including Kerensky, "admit the possibility that the next Russian horror will consist of attacks on Jews." In the course of a dispatch from Paris, a correspondent to the New York Day, a Jewish paper, says regarding the massacres in the Ukraine, that "the purpose is apparently to exterminate the entire Jewish population.

Regarding the reported persecution of Jews in Poland, Rev. Dr. H. Pereira Mendes of New York, declares that that country "is now at the bar of the world's judgment, for the world has to choose between Turkish atrocities in Armenia, German atrocities in Belgium, and Polish atrocities in Poland."

Poles in New York, and the new Polish Premier Paderewski, deny that pogroms have occurred in Poland, and characterize these charges as anti-Polish and pro-German propaganda. To substantiate these denials the Polish information bureau cites Dr. Vernon Kellogg, recently returned to New York from Poland, who in an interview published in the New York Times stated that while "there were constant rumors of difficulties of one kind and another between the Jews and the Poles," he did not find evidence of







Unbridled Extravagance.

It would, therefore, appear that not even the prospect of the appalling debt with which the country is faced will deter the Government from its own extravagance and wasteful methods of living.

Out of the \$680,000,000 of expenditure planned for the current year, only \$280,000,000 can be raised by revenue, according to the minister's estimate. That means that \$400,000,000 must be raised by borrowing, and, in addition, there are \$148,000,000 worth of bonds floated in the United States which come due and must be redeemed by the end of the present year.

In fact, the finance minister has practically made no provision in his present budget for meeting the burden under which the country now labors. His slogan to the people is "produce and save;" his own motto appears to "wait and spend."






