Explorer Gives Naval Committee His Logbook and Polar Notes to Back His Claims.

Washington, Jan. 7.—Capt. Robert E. He produced all of his original memoranda and answered many questions. Cross-examination by Representative Macon, of Arkansas, who has announced his opposition to recognition of Peary, was deferred on account of time taken in reading data. The committee adjourned until Tuesday.
