Berlin, via London. Sept. 29.—Germany will persevere until victory is hers, the Reichstag was told yesterday by Chancellor von Bethmann-Hollweg, according to the full text of his speech, which was published here today. The chancellor declared that this year's harvest had made Germany's position much more secure than was the case last year. In his attack upon Great Britain, he declared that that country was above all Germany's "most egotistical, fiercest and most obstinate enemy.

"A German statesman," he said, "who would hesitate to use against this enemy every available instrument of battle that would really shorten this war-such a statesman should be hanged.'

ALL FRIGHTFULNESS BEING USED

The chancellor declared his contempt for those circulating reports that all Germany's means of fighting were not being employed to the fullest possible extent. He added that in order to disappoint the enemy, "who is on the watch for every breach of

our inner determination," he would not give details. 'When in August, 1914," he went on "we had to draw the sword we knew we had to protect our hearths and homes against a mighty and almost overwhelming coalition. Ardent, and until then unknown and often ignored, patriotism flamed up in all hearts defying death and certain victory. Today, after two years of MAJOR W. N. Concluding his speech, the chancellor exclaimed: "Germany will not be permitted to think of peace while her house is burning. She must first extinguish the fire.'

BRITISH CAPTURE **500 PRISONERS IN** STORMING REDOUBT

Large Part of Position Captured by Dash.

BRITISH GUNS WONDERS

Frederick Palmer Describes Accuracy of Artillery in the Offensive.

[BY FREDERICK PALMER.] WITH THE BRITISH ARMY IN THE FIELD IN FRANCE, Sept. 28, via London, Sept. 29.-2:05 a.m.-"You have just time to get into a tree top and see us go after the Schwaben redoubt," said a staff general to the correspondent of the Canadian Press today.

Attacks have been so numerou along the British front in the last few days that even if informed of all behave to possess a dual personality to be present at all. The offensive is in one of its bit-by-bit stages, but is being pressed with sustained and tire-less fury under the auspices of the 262 3.84 365 halcyon autumn weather for the last week, surpassing any other week since it began.

Beyond Thiepval. Schwaben redoubt is beyond Thiepval, which was taken Tuesday. A crucifix once crowned this ridge. Where it stood became the centre of the strongest defence German industry and ingenuity could build. This was the goal of the Ulstermen in their heroic charge on July 1, when they fell face forward under the storm of machine gun fire sent from the site of the former shrine, which peasants working in their fields could see when they looked up from their labors in

the surrounding fields and villages.
In all the weeks since July 1 the British made no further attempt at this hill. Their trenches were in the same place as before that day. The "no-man's land," or dead space, remained where it was when the Germans first formed their defensive line. But while they were swinging in from the south where the grand attack on July 1 had succeeded they had given Thiepval and Schwaben redoubt a fair daily allowance of shell fire, though making no infantry attack.

Long "Softening Process."
For nearly three months this softening process continued. Then when the British had gained the ridges running at an angle with the only German line at Thiepval they began to take fresh interest in that old first line. Now they did not have to attack it from in front, but approached it from the side, as well as having it in a crushing vice.

One German general officer who was captured said he did not think the British good enough soldiers to attack in this way, which was just the way the British did attack after their les-

HYDRO RADIAL VOTE IN NIAGARA DISTRICT







FORWARD MOVE OF ALLIES SLOW, BUT IRRESISTIBLE

ON THE FRENCH FRONT, Sept. 28 .- Via Senlis, France .- The French troops, co-operating with the British, continue their advance and are driving the Germans out of villages and fortified positions both north and south of the Somme and frustrating all attempts at counter-

The forward move of the Allied armies, although seemingly slow. appears to be irresistible. Since the offensive began on July 1, the French alone have recaptured on this front of the Somme two hundred square kilometres of territory, their advance varying from two to twelve kilometres in depth over a front of about twenty kilometres. this gain of ground, approximately 40,000 German prisoners have been taken by the French, while cannon numbering over 150 pieces, mo than half of them heavy guns, have fallen into their hands. The machine guns taken by the French total more than 600 in this drive and dozens of others have been buried in the battered German trenches, together
