

He was searching for a drug store and had made a fool-teh year to his commander the search of the street. drug store and had made a foolish vow to his companion that he would not cross the street to find one, but would keep walking till he discovered one on the south side of the street.

After a brisk half hour's walk, he discovered the fact, which comparatively few residents have noticed, that London has not a single drug store on the south side of its main business street. There are two and three to every block on the north side, but for some reason not one has been block on the north side, but for some reason not one has been opened across the road.

This condition seems peculiar to the drug business. With the exception of florists' shops, which are all situated on the south side, other business houses are pretty evenly distributed. Drygoods stores, men's furnishings stores, barber shops, grocers' cigar stores, milliners, theatres, and, in fact, every branch of business life can be found on both sides of the street.







LONDON, Nov. 17.—(Canadian Associated Press.)—Right Hon. Andrew Bonar Law explained in the House of Commons tonight the meeting of prime ministers of the empire, summoned for June next. It will be a meeting along the lines of the imperial war cabinet meetings, which took place an 1917-18, to deal with urgent problems of common interest, calling for a common policy and action by the different governments of the empire. It will not be the special constitutional conference contemplated by the resolution of the imperial war conference of 1917.

Mr. Bonar Law added that there is a general agreement on imperial defence matter, which will require the special constitutions and some pointed.

STOCK FIGURES SLUMP AGAIN AFTER RESPITE

Stopped Dispelled by Fresh Break.

NEW YORK, Nov. 17.—After a brief respite, in which hopes were entertained of a recovery from the disturbing conditions, which have attended almost every session since election day, the stock market met with fresh liquidation and short selling today. The general list fell to the lowest points for one to three years, United States Steel making a new low for three years at 80%.

Today's break was the more surprising because the market began with a show of firmness, attributed principally to assurances from banking quarters that the protracted decline of securities and commodities had uncovered no points of financial weakness.

These same assurances were tempered, however, with the statement that further liquidation would have to be effected, especially in retail branches of trade, before confidence in the general business situation could be restored.

Much of today's selling, which embraced a number of conspicuous issues, including the film stocks, probably had their origin in these intimations. There were other unsettling developments, such as the very unsatisfactory state of the steel industry, and the sharp decline in values of shipping charters.

DIVORCE TARIFF AND POLITICS. LABOR'S VIEWS

Montreal Trades Union Officials Want Industries To Continue.

FOR ADVISORY BOARD

Also Suggest Permanent Tariff **Board To Avoid "Tariff** Elections."

MONTREAL, Nov. 31 .- (By Canadian Press.)-Organized labor's views regarding the tariff were given today before the tariff commission, both by representatives of the international unions and by Canadian unions.

President J. F. Foster of the Montreal Trades and Labor Council presented a factum which he claimed represented the views of ninety per cent

resented the views of ninety per cent of the labor men of Canada, which pronounced strongly in favor of a moderate tariff or protection sufficient to insure the continuance of industries which were the source of employment to Canadian labor.

Advisory Board.

The factum further strongly advocated the appointment of a scientific advisory board to consider all matters relating to the tariff and a permanent tariff board. By such means he considered the Dominion could get relief from "the curse of tariff elections from which it was suffering at present."

He admitted that the tariff could not be altogether taken out of politics, but hoped that the appointment of a tariff board and a scientific advisary commission much of the present evil conditions would be avoided.

The same ideas were to a large extent voiced by David Giroux, representing the Canadian National Union, who came forward as an out and out supporter of reasonable protection in the interests of labor, in particular and the country in general.

These were the main features of today's session of the tariff commission here, although a number of other important discussions and factums were considered, bearing on the iron and steel industries, the flour milling trade, and other industries.

The general complaint by businessmen was against the continuous dumping into Canada of surplus American goods in times of business stress, despite the anti-dumping laws.

STEEL AND IRON VIEWS.

MONTREAL, Nov. 17.—Another appeal by the various steel and iron interests for adequate protection of their industry occupied this morning's session of the tariff commission. W. W. Butler of Canada Car and Foundry Company, Limited, read a brief which had been prepared by members of a group of steel industries. T. P. Howard, president of the Phoenix Iron Works, afterwards laid before the commission the special claims of the structural steel industry.

John H. Shaw, representing British textile manufacturers' agents, strongly opposed any increase in the tariff on textiles.





Girl Journeys From Kansas City To New York; Writes of What She "Sees."

NEW YORK, Nov. 18 .- Blind from birth, without excess funds to pay for guidance and attention, Carroll Rickert, a young girl, recently made her first journey on the cars alone, and she chose for this great adventure the distance between Kansas City and New

No one met her at points where it was necessary to change cars; she was in no one's care. When a storm de-layed the train six hours coming into Cleveland, and she realized that she was to be on the train a night longer than her funds guaranteed, she was not

Friends of friends were to meet her in New York. They failed. She did not know their names nor their addresses, but she recalled the address of a family whose son she knew in Kansas, and calling a taxi went out there.

"It was away out in East One Hun-

kansas, and calling a taxt went out there.

"It was away out in East One Hundred and Fifty-third street," she says, "so you can imagine what my taxicab bill was. I did not even know if they still lived there, and was so glad when the driver helped me up the steps and I found the woman I was seeking. Through the editor of a magazine for the blind I afterwards secured a boarding place nearer town."

Miss Rickert studied music and journalism in the University of Kansas and came to New York that she might perfect herself in music and perhaps interest publishers in music of her own composition. To pay her way, for her father is a farmer and they haven't an abundance of this world's goods, Miss Rickert is writing about New York as "seen" by one who is blind.

Meets Helen Keller.

"I think I did an interview with Helen Keller quite well," she says, "and personality work is what I like best. Then I wrote up Saint Patrick's Cathedral as I 'saw' it. Isn't it a beautiful place? My latest story was what I saw in Asbury Park. I have a guide to take me to these places that I write about, and to take me to my music lessons, and I pay her for her trouble. Naturally, she tells me of all we are seeing, but my imagination is so active I try to write scenes as they appear to me.

"Some days I get discouraged because it is so hard to remember when I write that I do not see as other folks see, and this does not please the editor. But I try to keep up my courage. It means so much to my mother to see my stories in print, and to me it means money to pay for my music."

RUN ELEVATOR FOR MEN ONLY

N. Y. Store Executives Find Sterner Sex Shrink From Women's View.

New oYrk, Nov. 18.—Department store executives profess to have made the discovery that the male of the species is more modest than the female. One Fifth avenue store is now running an express elevator on a 20-second schedule to afford shrinking he-violets utter privacy in their journey to the department where men's wear is sold. This elevator does not stop between the street and the tenth floor, thus saving time as well as mental anguish saving time as well as mental anguish for its passengers. "Twenty seconds from fifth avenue" is the slogan proone of the executives of this department responsible for the change recently said that men who came to the store to buy clothing would not recently said that men who came to the store to buy clothing would not take off their coats and vests in a de-partment that divided its floor space with drygoods, millinery or other mer-chandise that attracted women. Those who were brave enough to shed their apparel under such circumstances want apparel under such circumstances went

"While we have no cast iron rule forbidding women to ride on this 20-second limited, employees do not encourage joy-riding," said one executive. WILL WAGE WAR ON CORN BORER

Entomologists Meeting At Guelph To Help the Farmers.

GUELPH, Nov. 17 .- Prominent entoologists from various parts of Canada mologists from various parts of Canada and the United States are at the O. A. C. today attending the annual meeting of the Entomological Society of Ontario, of which Arthur Gibson of Ottawa is president. The convention will not conclude till Thursday night. This afternoon interesting papers were read by Prof. L. Caesar, of the O. A. C., on leaf bugs, dealing particularly with those which attacked the Ontario apple orchards this year, and A. V. Mitchener of the Manitoba Agricultural College, and N. Criddle of the entomologic branch, Ottawa, the latter two dealing with the grasshopper outbreak in the West.

It was pointed out that the grasshopper outbreak in the states of the state of th

with the grasshopper outbreak in the West.

It was pointed out that the grasshopper outbreak in Western Canada this year was unusually bad, but so well had, the fight against them been organized and carried out that it is estimated that \$17.000,000 worth of grains had been saved. Hundreds of tons of poisonous balt, of a white arsenic preparation, had been used. For every dollar spent on the bait and distribution, \$110 had been saved. The grasshopper eggs were so thick that in some places 3,000 eggs were found to the square foot. The speakers stated that another bad outbreak of grasshoppers was expected in the West next year, but it is believed that with another year's determined fight the pest will gradually disappear after that.

An important subject to be dealt with tomorrow is a discussion on the methods to be adopted to fight the European corn borer, which has made its way to America and has even made its presence feit in Ontario. Among the speakers on this subject are W. R. Walton and L. T. Worthley of the United States Entomological Department at Washington.



TOTAL YIELD OF ROOTS IN CANADA EXCEEDS 1919 CROP 2,000,000 BUSHELS

This Increase Exists Despite
Fact That the Area Planted
in 1920 Was 27,000 Acres
Smaller Than in 1919—
Hay and Clover Fall Off.

Excellent progress has been made in fall plowing, which usually has an important bearing on the next year's harvest.

The percentage for the whole of Canada is 71, as against 66 last year, this year's percentage being higher than that of any year since 1914, when the same percentage of 71 preceded the bumper harvest of 1915.

OTTAWA, Nov. 17 .- (By Canadian Press) .- The total yield for Canada for turnip and other roots is estimated by the bureau of census and statistics at 114,081,000 bushels from 290,286 acres in 1920, as compared with 112,288,600 bushels from 317.296 acres in 1919. The average yield per acre for the Dominion is 393 bushels, as compared with 254 bushels last year, and 3521/2 bushels the average for the ten-year period,

The yield of hay and clover this year is below that of 1919. The total in 1920 is estimated at 13,378,800 tons from 10,379,292 acres, as compared with the record 1919 total of 16,348,000 tons rom 10,595,383 acres. The yield per cre this year is 1.30, as compared rith 1.55 tons in 1919, and 1.50 tons

In Ontario the area sown is 735,000 acres, a decrease of 7 per cent from the 794,100 acres sown in the fall of 1919. The crop is reported to have made good progress, its condition on October 31, being given, in percentage of the decennial average as 102 for all Canada, 102 for Ontario, 98 for Alberta, and 104 for British Columbia.





Brindell Released On \$100,-000 Bond-Held On Three Counts.

LABOR LEADER WITH

EXTORTION ATTEMPT

NEW YORK. Nov. 17. - Robert P. Brindell, president of the Building Trades Council, was this afternoon indicted by the additional grand jury investigating New York's alleged building trust on evidence supplied by the joint legislative committee. The indictment, which contains three

counts, charges him with attempting to extort \$7,500 from a house wreckto extort \$7,500 from a house wrecking firm and he is alleged to have threatened to call a strike of the firm's men unless the money was paid over to him. Brindell was arraigned in the general sessions court, and ball was set at \$100,000. Unable to furnish this bail, he was made a prisoner in the criminal courts building, despite the protests of his counsel.

Special Assistant District Attorney Richter in his appeal to the court for heavy bail declared that collective extortion charges against Brindell would aggregate \$1.000,000.

Later counsel for Brindell arranged with a surety company to furnish the with a surety company to furnish the \$100,000 bond, and the labor leader was released.

FINANCING CROP HAS ADDED \$17,000,000 TO NOTE CIRCULATION

OTTAWA, Nov. 17.—(By the Canadian Press).—Financing the crop movement has within the last four weeks increased the amount of Dominion notes in circulation by nearly \$17,003,000. At the same time, the amount of gold held remains practically unchanged. During the four-week period, however, approved securities deposited against Pominion notes has increased by rather more than the increase in circulation. Thus the total backing of Dominion notes in circulation, gold and securities combined, bears practically the same ratio to the circulation as it bore a month ago.

ratio to the circulation as it bore a month ago.

Since the outbreak of war, Dominion note circulation has expanded enormously. On March 31, 1914, it was \$117,795,718, and the gold held by the Government as security for the notes totafied \$95,161,366, or more than the gold held today for a circulation of \$320.000,000.

As the necessities of war financing accumulated, so the circulation of Dominion notes expanded until it reached a peak of \$337,319,309 in November, 1918. There has since been a decline in circulation, although there has beer little change in recent months in the ratio of gold to circulation.





The grand monarch of France left a asting impress on the taste of the civilized world. By establishing the great Gobelin works, he gathered together artists under the brilliant LeBrun and set the standard of the world for his own day, and long afterwards, in tapestry, goldsmith's work, furniture, and jewelry, Boulle, whose clocks and cabinets are almost priceless today, worked under LeBrun and carried the inlay of metals, tortoise shell, ivory, and beautiful woods, to its highest expression.

Ormolu or gilt bronze mounts, formed one of the chief decorations for furniture of this period. The massive chimney pleces of the previous reign gave way to the "little chimneys," over which were placed great carved, glided mirrors, or elaborate mantels. The world-famous Gobelin tapestries were made at this time, and the rage for Chinese decoration dates from it.

In general outline the furniture was strong and dignified, but upon this basis a mass of delicate and intricate decoration was used. It was an age of magnificence, but not yet an age of decadence. Under the luxury there is always an air of balance and power, which lasted until the influence of Louis was ruined by the wild extravagance of his successors.

Louis Quatorze was selfish in his exploitation of his people for his own pride, but he was not small nor base, and the art of his day has a real beauty which will always claim our appreciation.

FEEDING THE YEAR-OLD CHILD.

By the time a baby is a year old he can usually take his milk much stronger than any of the formulae for modified milk for infants. Yet cow's milk should be somewhat diluted still. A good rule is to add eleven ounces of strained oatmeal or barley gruel to a quart of whole milk, containing all its cream, well stirred up so that the cream is evenly distributed; add a tablespoonful of granulated sugar, a pinch of salt and a pinch of bicarbonate of soda. In winter, if good milk is bought, it should not be necessary to sterilize or pasteurizati, but if there is any doubt, of course, it is safer.







CABINET SPLIT **OVER RENEWING RUSSIAN TRADE**

British Government Believes Soviet Will Pay Russian Debts.

LONDON, Nov. 17 .- The cabinet today held a long session, again discussing the question of the opening of trade relations with Soviet Russia. Premier Lloyd George, Andrew Bonar Law and other members of the cabinet were understood to be pressing for resumption against the opposition of Earl Curzon, the foreign secretary; Winston Churchill, the secretary of war, and Austin Chamberlain, the chancellor of the exchequer, who fear it would be difficult to enforce the provision in the proposed agreement that the Boisheviki should not attempt propaganda against Great Britain.

They desire to meet again with Leonid Krassin, the Soviet representative, and endeavor to get from him further assurances on the propaganda question. 


