Worry over personal affairs is said to have been the motive in both cases. Meiczylaw Pochenow, an attache of the Polish legation. shot and killed himself in the Champs Elysees, while a short distance away Guillermo Erazurdi junior secretary to the Chilean legation, fired a bullet from a revolver into his temple. Erazurdi was removed to hospital in a precarious condition.

Archaeologists Claim Period Lasted in B. C. Until Century Ago.

Occupants Said To Have Belonged To New Stone Age.

Victoria, B. C., April 30 .- (By Can adian Press) .- The stone age which after making the cave man famous came to an end in Western Europe about 1700 B. C., was carried on for more than three thousand years later, and in its most characteristic form existed in British Columbia up until as late as a century ago in so tricts, according archaeologists who have been exploring some of the old community sites, mounds and aboriginal graves along the coast and in the interior of the provinces.

The stone age in British Columbia

has for years been the study of scientists of note, who have been working the field in an effort to build up the story of the evolution of the prehistoric civilization as exemplified in tribes of human beings worked out their existence between the Rockies and the coast. Valuable collections have been obtained. It only recently that British Columbia has, in an effective way, turned its attention to the past. Under Pre-mier Oliver the Provincial Museum has been partially rebuilt and the collections put on exhibition. The aboriginal occupants of this

ountry belonged to the neolithic, or new stone age, according to the specimens. The specimens came from old village sites and burying places Stone and bone tools were in com-mon use when the first white explorers reached the North Pacific, alhough iron and copper in quantities were also found nearly everywhere. In some instances the native races had developed a degree of art. One of the feature objects i the exhibit is a copy of a human fig-ure seated holding a bowl. It was chipped out of a solid block of stone and then polished off smoothly. There are two of these specimens very much alike. One was discovered near Departure Bay, Nanaimo, and the other in North Saanich, on Vanouver Island. Perhaps most characteristic of the

tone age are the stone axes and hammers discovered in many places They are almost identical with the tools of the neolithic man found in Europe. The stone weapons include daggers and war clubs. There are many examples of stone dishes, hewn out of small boulders. Of what appear to be rolling pins of a somewhat angular design the prehistoric woman of this coast seems to have been well supplied. These instruents made of solid stone have been found in many places.

Primitive man in British Columbia pparently did a little smoking once a while. Old shell mounds on the Thompson and Fraser rivers have yielded what appear to be stone pipes. The early explorers found that the native races were using a attenuata tobacco, true which grows wild in the Thompson River country, and was smoked along







The older type of pedal sometimes gave out because of excessive strain or shock, but the new solid pedal is exceptionally sturdy and will stand much abuse.

It is interesting to note that the new one-piece pedal is lighter than other types because it is made of aluminum. The pedal rubbers are inserted between the aluminum sides and cannot possibly turn. The lighter and stronger pedal is now standard by foreign manufacturers.

Other developments include the simplification of the bicycle brake, perfection of various cycling accessories, new methods of "stringing" some wheels and improvements in manufacturing systems.



The reasoning for high tariffs comes easy. If a moderate tariff gives some protection and helps a concern, then why not go ahead and pile up more protection and let the industry go?

Such a theory might work out ver well were there coupled with it provision that would also grant protection to the people who were forced to buy in such a tariff-protected area.

Canada gave a certain amount of protection to the makers of agricultural machinery, and the business grew in this country. On June 12, 1914, the duty on this line was lowered to 121/2 per cent, certainly not a high figure when the protection afforded some other concerns is taken into consideration. But there were other advantages in locating in Canada, one of the chiefest of these being the opportunity that was afforded to export from this country to other places in the British Empire on a more favorable basis than from United States or other countries.



MEXICO CITY, April 30.—Serious disturbances are reported at Guanajuato, capital of the state of the same name, where a textile factory owned by Dr. Eusebio Gonzales, a Spaniard, was closed several days ago after a protracted strike. There have been several clashes between the striking workmen and those who remained loyal to their employer, the situation becoming so acute yesterday that troops patrolled the streets adjacent

MEXICO CITY, April 30 .- Secreary of the Treasurer de la Huerta plans to leave for New York between May 15 and 20, and his conference with the Wall street bankers will begin about June 1, says an official treasury department statement.

Thomas W. Lamont of J. P. Morgan & Co., who has been discussing a general plan for funding the Mexican debt and the obligation of the Mexican national railways with a coms mittee of international bankers in Paris, is expected to return to the United States by May 28, according to Secretary de la Huerta, and the conference will start soon thereafter. Senor de la Huerta is optimistic of the results of the conference, and predicts, as one of the results of the financial arrangements to be made, the establishment of a Banco Unico, or single bank of emission

MOSCOW, April 30 .- The famous Troitzki, or Trinity, Cathedral in Petrograd has been robbed of all its valuables. Similar robberies are reported at various other places, but generally speaking the requisitioning of church valuables is proceeding with little difficulty.

The removing of the valuables from the churches in Moscow is about three-fourths completed. aggregate of treasure taken includes silver by the ton, gold by the hundredweight, pearls by the bushel and diamonds by the peck. The valuables are stored in boxes and placed in warehouses under guard, where they await sorting.



The bill provides for compensation for citizens who suffered because of the recent Rand rebellion. In course of the debate Premier Smuts commented on an earlier statement of Gen. Hertzog, leader of the Nationalist party, that the republic would come when the English and Dutchspeaking people decided through Parliament in favor thereof.

Premier Smuts said that Tielman Roos, leader of the Transvaal Nationalists, who always gave the keynote of the Nationalist policy, had repeatedly said that the farmer and laborer must rule South Africa.

# SLAYS CRIPPLED

York County Farmer Also Inflicts Severe Injuries On Stepdaughters.

Robert Stevenson Placed Under Arrest While On Way To Toronto.

SUTTON WEST, Ont., April 30 .-One of the most gruesome tragedies which the northern part of York county has known for many years occurred late yesterday afternoon, when Robert Stevenson, who lives on a farm several miles south of here, killed his wife by battering her over the head with an axe and inflicted such frightful injuries on his stepdaughters, 11 and 13 years of age, that the condition of both is grave, and the recovery of one is most doubtful.

The tragedy came as a climax to a series of domestic troubles which, it is understood, had been in progress for a long time.

Mrs. Stevenson, who was partially crippled, and unable to defend her-self, evidently was killed almost instantly. The wounds inflicted upon the two children were most severe, Chief Kirk stated, their heads being cut open by blows from the axe.

The older girl, Nora, ran out of the house and started across the fields. 


