



New York, Oct. 29,-In an editorial headed, "Can Russia Invade India?" the Sun say: The present policy of the British Government towards Afghanistan and the frontier tribes appears to be based on a memorandum written by Lord Roberts at Kabul, dated May 29, 1880. It so clearly sums up the policy of those who would preserve Afghanistan and the wild tribes of the northwest frontier as a natural obstacle to a Russian invasion that it is worth quot ing. Speaking with all the authority

of experience he wrote:
"We are now fully aware of the extraordinary difficulties which Russia would have to encounter were she at any time to advance upon India via Kabul, and to how great an extent we could injure and harass her by raising the tribes along the lines of communications which it would be necessary for her to maintain, or, by taking the initiative from our advanced, yet secure, base at Kandahar. The longer and more difficult the line of communication is the more numerous and greater the obstacles which Russia would have to overcome; and. so far from shortening one mile of the road. I would let the web of difficulties extend to the very mouth of the

Khyber Pass' The late Sir Edward Hamley, in 1878, held the same opinion, and would have resisted a Russian invasion by blocking the mouths of the Khyber on the British side with an entrenched camp, armed with powerful artillery, which would effectually prevent an invading army from ever issuing from it. 

French Government Barely Supported on Military Question.

Paris, Oct. 29. — After an exceed-ingly stormy debate in the Chamber of Deputies, the Government last night escaped defeat by four votes only, and rumors are already current that Gen. Andre, the Minister of War, whose administration was the subject of the discussion, contemplates resignation. For some time Gen. Andre has been the object of violent attacks in the press, not wholly confined to opposition papers, the principal charges against him being favoring officers whose policies coincide with the Government's stopping the promotion of those suspected of clerical or conserv ative tendencies, organizing an elabcrate system of spying upon the private lives of officers, and encouraging officers to act as informers. These charges were made the subject of an interpellation by Lieut.-Col. Rousset, who went into great detail, reading correspondence alleged to have passed between a confidential subordinate of the minister and the heads of the Masonic lodges on the subject of the





This is the disease which a number of years ago wiped out many of the vinevards in the Essex and Kent districts, and forced many growers to give up raising grapes. In its November issue the Canadian Horticulturist will pubish a special report from Prof. Lochhead, of Guelph, who recently visited the vineyards of Ohio to see if the fruit growers of that state had any remedy for the disease. It is announced that Ohio fruit growers have been able to control the disease by an application of a special spraying mixture at certain stages of its growth. It is probably true that the application of a similar mixture will save







GOOD WORD FOR THE MUCH DESPISED HYENA

HIS COURAGE IS MUCH GREATER THAN GENERALLY SUPPOSED.

A traveler recently returned from Africa has a good word to say for the generally despised hyena, whose courage he declares is much greater than is supposed generally.

"Hyenas," said the traveler, "do not hesitate, when hunting in packs, to attack lions, even though the lions are in considerable numbers; and in such encounters the hyenas often get the best of it. The lion is a good deal of a bluffer. He looks so fierce and roars so loudly that he gets a greater reputation for courage than is rightfully

Dr. Donaldson Smith, a well-known African explorer, in his account of his journey to Lake Rudolph, tells stories of lion hunting which corroborate the traveler's reports of the relative merits of the hyena and the lion. On one occasion, when camping in the midst of a lion-infested country, Dr. Smith and his followers built a zareba, which is a little inclosure of brush or such other material as comes to hand. They made ready to spend the night watchfully, for they knew that lions

were all about them.

Hearing a noise, Dr. Smith parted the bushes with which the entrance to the zereba had been filled, and saw three lions prowling about. When they saw the doctor they slunk off into the brush. But when night came down the lions returned, bringing a humber of other lions with them, and began to sniff about the zereba so close that Dr. Smith, lying flat on the ground, with his rifle inside the inclosure, and watching for an opportunity to get a shot, could feel the breath of the growling animals.

THE COSSACKS FAIL TO SHINE

COWBOYS OF THE CZAR'S ARMY DO NOT SUSTAIN THEIR OLDTIME REPUTATION.

The Japanese Cavalry Appear to Hold Their Own In Manchuria-Learned Nothing From Boer War.

Although the Czar of all the Russias may proclaim his newborn son com-mander-in-chief of all the Cossacks, signifying to his gallant soldiery that the little father" has not lost confidence in his chosen troops, the world expert military critic and mere layman alike, has lost faith in the prowess of these hordes of irregular cavalry, from which so much has been expected and so little realized in the present eastern

With the memory of the Boer war fresh in the minds of military men, with the exploits of the irregular mounted farmers of the Transvaal but newly added to military records, the general expectation was that the Cossacks, famed since the days of wild Mazeppa as terrible and relnetness foes, resembling those that fought under Botha and Cronje, would add to their luster. Of all fields of battle it was particularly appropriate that Asia should be their chosen fighting ground, for, following Skobeloff and all the famous Russian leaders, the Cossack cavalry has carried the Russian empire from the Ural to the Pacific, as the ancient pioneers of America bore a more peaceful rule from the Alleghanies

to the Pacific. Military critics who study the history of the Cossack find, however, that his exploits belong rather in the volumes devoted to border warfare against uncivilized foes than to the records of cavalry in civilized war, established by generals-like Murat, Sheridan and Forrest. From the beginning the Cossacks have seldom distinguished themselves against such foes as the Japanese have

proved themselves.
As early as Poltava, the fatal battle which ended the conquests of Charles XH, of Sweden and made Peter the Great master of the land of the Don Cossacks, their battles in open field have been generally unsuccessful. Not even the famous Mazeppa could lead his Cossacks to victory here, and their independence was the price exacted by the Emperor.

Not until Napoleon started on the dreadful retreat from Moscow, when his splendid army was reduced to a wreck, did the Cossacks distinguish themselves, and here their tactics shone in fearful brilliance. The charge of the light brigade at Balaklava, however, found no parallel in Cossack bravery or success in the Crimea, and even for the Turk, when Osman Pasha held But in Asia, where Skobeloff captured kingdom after kingdom, penetrating Turkestan and crushing the Turcoman eavalry, the Cossack won great renown.

WHERE HE IS INVINCIBLE. Operating against a foe less well armed and equipped, if equal in gallantry, guided by well-trained leaders, the Cossacks proved invincible. Indeed. here their tactics were so successful that the American army in its fights against the Indians adopted many of them, and the Cossack outpost still persists in the Philippines, where an uncivilized foe is met.

But against General Kuroki the Cossack has signally failed. Military critics assert that this is due in part to the vast line of communications General Kuropatkin has to protect to the immense transport-guarding necessary and also to the huge Russian army, mmobile and entirely unlike that of the Boers, for which the Cossacks must continually act as a covering force in the endless retreats. Be that as it may, however, his gallantry may have per-ished, but the little Japanese cavalryman, mounted on his diminutive pony, has not been overwhelmed and destroyed, as the world believed he would by his huge Cossack foe, who claimed kinship long ago to the rough riders of the Spanish-American war. 


