POLITICAL MATTERS.

The Capital in a Furore of Excitement.

SEVEN MINISTERS HAVE RESIGNED

Ottawa, Jan. 3.—The Ottawa Ministry is tonight being second Ottawa in a furore, totally unsmashed. The following members of the Cabinet: sent in their resignations yesterday to the Premier: Messrs. Foster, Tupper, Dickey, Montague, Haggart, Ives and Wood. The Premier produced a week ago in this correspondence as likely to occur before the House met, and dwelt on Thursday and Friday, was precipitated by the publication yesterday of the charge against Dr. Montague that he had written and sent anonymous letters to the Governor-General, accusing Sir Adolphe Caron of having accepted a bribe to procure a seat before the Government during the session of 1894. These letters are said to have been turned over to the Premier, and by him to the Postmaster-General.

Sir Adolphe Caron, on being seen this evening by your correspondent, made the following statement: "With reference to the article published in 'The Citizen' purporting to be a denunciation of the Hon. Dr. Montague and myself, I do not think it is either directly or indirectly given to me any knowledge of how its publication came about. The Postmaster-General added that he did not think it would be proper for me to say anything further at this time." In reply to a further question as to the official situation, Sir Adolphe, who wore a very jaunty air, said: "There are a lot of rumors."

Dr. Montague has issued the following statement: "I do not know of any statement that I either wrote or implied any anonymous letters in regard to Sir A. Caron or anything else, know anything directly or indirectly in connection with this is a falsehood and simple. I did not know that any such insinuation was made in regard to Sir A. Caron or anything else at 5 o'clock or a little later. The moment I learned of it I demanded of the Postmaster-General that he should retract the whole matter as a miserable, contemptible attempt to injure me. I do not know what the anonymous letters were which were sent in regard to Sir A. Caron or anything else, but they contain in regard to him, not having the courtesy extended to me. Nor do I know the dates upon which the letters were written, nor, except in general and general way, what they contain. When I learn of these facts I shall be able to vindicate my position more thoroughly. Permit me to say, in addition, that I have never written any anonymous letters to injure the character of any man, and in this case have nothing to do with the matter. It is a very necessary for such an act."

PUMPING AIR INTO THE LUNGS.

At the Presbyterian Hospital in this city, recently, an instance of this kind occurred.

A female, aged thirty-seven years, had taken twelve grains of morphine, and was brought to the hospital at 8:30 p.m. in a condition of stupor.

Her body had that blue, or cyanose, appearance which is characteristic of morphia poisoning.

He was immediately placed under the charge of Dr. Walter B. James, and various drugs were administered for the purpose of counteracting the effect of the morphia.

The stomach was also washed out. It was seen that the man's condition was such that, unless some remedy was employed for keeping up the breathing, he would die.

It was, therefore, resolved to use one of the O. J. resuscitators.

The tube was inserted at 10:30 P. M., and respirations were forced into the man's lungs at the rate of eight to ten per minute.

The patient's whole condition improved at once. The blue became almost normal, and the blue color of the lips and hands disappeared.

The stomach pump was once more inserted alongside the tube, and the stomach emptied thoroughly, after which more medicine was administered.

At 11:30 P. M. the patient was aroused, but his pulse was not good. At midnight he became restless, and the tube was removed and he was made to sit up.

In spite of the diligent efforts made to keep him awake, in about ten minutes his face and hands again began to grow blue, and his pulse rapid and feeble.

The tube was replaced, with the result that his condition immediately changed for the better.

At 2:30 A. M. the tube was again removed, but once more the blue color made its appearance on the hands and face.

It was put back again at 1:45 in the morning, when the patient became so restless that its removal was a necessity.

After this, until 7 o'clock, the patient was kept awake by the sleeping tube.

At 7:45 o'clock his respiration was sixteen a minute and his pulse 130. At the end of five days he was discharged cured.

The tube had remained in seven hours and fifteen minutes, during all of which time the use was necessary for during all of that time the patient was quite unable to do his own breathing.

The United States Senate Mr. Foster offered a resolution for the negotiation of a conference between Great Britain and the United States for making the boundary line between Alaska and British North America.
