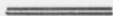

### STRIDES IN BRITISH TOWNS.

Glasgow owns and operates its water system, for that is usually the first public work that a city enters upon. In this case, however, the water, instead of being furnished to the citizens at so much per thousand gallons or at fixed hydrant rates, is paid for by a tax upon the value of the property, writes W. J. Bryan, who has been investigating municipal ownership in Europe.

gas to consumers at about fifty cents per thousand cubic feet. More recently the city has entered upon the work of supplying electricity to the city and private houses.

The tramways, too, are owned and operated by the municipality. The service is excellent, and the fare depends upon the distance travelled, two-pence being the rate for a long ride, and a penny for shorter distances.

#### ONE CENT FARES.

At certain hours in the day there are special trams that carry the labouring man from one end of the city to the other for a half-penny or one cent.

It is the settled policy of the city to use all the income from public service corporations in improving the service and lessening the charge.

It has built a number of model tenement houses for the poor, and rents them at something less than the rate private individuals charge for similar quarters. These buildings have had for their primary object the improvement of the sanitary condition of the city.

These tenement houses are rented by the week or month, and the charge for those that I visited was about \$36 per year. This covers taxes and water.

#### WIDOWERS AND BACHELORS.

The city has established a number of lodging houses for single men, and here lodgings can be obtained ranging from  $3\frac{1}{2}$ d (7 cents) to  $4\frac{1}{2}$ d (9 cents) per night. The lodger has the privilege, and most of them take advantage of it, of cooking his meals in a large kitchen connected with the building. He also has the use of the dining and reading room.

One lodging house is set apart for widowers with children, and is the only one of its kind in the world.

To the public baths have been added public wash houses, where women can bring the family linen, and, at the rate of 2d per hour, make use of the tubs and drying room.

water service and is also furnishing to some extent electricity. Just now the County Council is putting down tramways and preparing to follow in the footsteps of Glasgow in the matter of furnishing transit for its citizens. Like Glasgow, the County Council is also furnishing lodging houses for the poorer classes.

Nottingham has furnished its citizens with gas for over 30 years. The price of gas has been reduced from time to time, until it is now about 50 cents per thousand for private citizens; even at this low rate the gas plant pays into the city treasury a net profit of about \$120,000 a year.

It is only about five years since the city entered upon the work of furnishing electricity, but the profit from that source is now nearly \$45,000 annually.

The city has recently taken over the tramways, and notwithstanding that it has raised the wages of the employes, shortened their hours of labor, improved the service, extended the lines and reduced the fares, it has now derived about \$90,000 profit from the earnings of the tramways. This has been the rule wherever private services have been undertaken by the municipalities. Nottingham has a population of about 250,000.

Birmingham furnishes water and light to its people, and has just decided to take charge of the tramway service. It already owns the tracks, but has been allowing private corporations to run the cars. The people have decided to operate the lines in the future.

The following is the programme and list of sports for Labor Day, September 5, 1904. The procession formed in Queen's Park and adjacent thoroughfares, and proceeded to Hanlan's Point, where the following games were held:

1—100 yards race (union men only)—Pudding dish, biscuit jar, carving set.

2—100 yards race (apprentice boys)—Cup, links brush.

3—Quarter-mile relay race (union men only), four teams to run, each man to run 110 yards—Four umbrellas.

4—Wheelbarrow race, 100 yards (union men only)—Two breakfast castors, two fountains.

5—Bicycle race, 2 miles (union men)—Sugar and cream, cake basket, carving set.

6—Quarter-mile race (open)—Eight-day clock, biscuit jar, breakfast cruet.

7—220 yards race, hurdle (open to union men)—Pudding dish, oaken butter dish, butter knife and sugar spoon.

8—75 yards race (single ladies)—Chatelaine, purse, cloth brush (ebony).

9—Donkey race, 100 yards (open to union men)—Two umbrellas, two scarf pins.

10—100 yards race (married union men only)—One dozen spoons, one sugar spoon, one butter knife, cream jug, salt and pepper.

11—High jump (open)—Silver tray, half dozen silver knives, butter knife and spoon.

12—Hop, step, jump (open)—Biscuit jar, half dozen silver knives, umbrella.

13—75 yards race (married ladies, open)—Silver berry spoon, salt and pepper, purse.

## Factories and the Nation.

### Physical Degeneration Caused by Strain on Human Spindles.

We take it for granted that a policy must be good if it is likely to add to the number of our factories. Is this quite certain? The factory system had to come, and it has vastly added to the volume of production, and consequently to our material well-being. But is it in itself happy? What is a factory hand but a human spindle or hammer spending his days in monotonous toil, without interest in his work, and without even seeing it in its completed state? Women in factories must be unfitted for home and maternity. A factory girl learns nothing which can be useful to her as the mistress of a home. The aspect of the great manufacturing cities of England is not inviting. Of the physical degeneration, into the causes of which the nation is anxiously inquiring, not a little is probably due to the effects of the factory system in England.—Goldwin Smith in the *Sun*.

### Public Ownership the Natural Thing.

In some quarters a proposal looking to the nationalization of our entire railway service would be a startling proposition—as something altogether out of the regular order.

As a matter of fact, public ownership is the most natural thing in the world. If some one could come here from another sphere altogether and inquire into existing conditions, he would certainly look upon it as an extraordinary thing that our people were ever foolish enough to allow the control of the carriage of their products (control which carries with it the power to largely fix the selling price of these products) to pass into private hands. Even we have been wiser than to allow the ordinary highways of the country to pass under the control of private corporations. It would

seem an intolerable thing to a farmer if the wagon road which leads to his nearest market town were wholly in the hands of a company operating the same for personal profit. And yet that would be less objectionable than the present system, under which highways leading to foreign markets—where the price of everything we have to sell is fixed—are in the hands of railway companies.

There is one very obvious objection to a system which places the control of railway lines in private hands. In such cases the primary object is to make a profit out of the operation of the lines. Under public ownership the primary object would be the development of the country, and this should be the purpose of all transportation facilities. This fact is clearly realized in Russia. J. D. Allan, vice-president of the Toronto board of trade, when in the empire of the Czar some time ago, asked the minister of transportation there if the state-owned railways of that country made a profit as railways. "I am," was the reply, "not concerned regarding the question as to whether they pay as railways or not, but I do know they pay, and pay handsomely, as a means of developing the country." That the Russian minister spoke truly is evident to anyone at all familiar with the remarkable progress which Russia has made in developing her export butter trade by means of her national railways.—Goldwin Smith.

## A Modern Octopus.

---

The Departmental Store has been hailed by some who claim to be Socialists, on the ground of economizing of labor. The big shops can and no doubt do, economize in the matter of heat and light, but such saving is trifling compared to their total bill of current expense. In the larger item of wages, while many of their employees are paid starvation wages—many of their young men and girls getting as little as \$1.75 per week, and up to \$5.00 per week for old timers—yet to get the best results from such poorly paid help, they must employ experienced floor walkers, heads of departments, purchasing agents, spotters and private detectives, thus making their wage bill average quite as high as that of small shops where the above-mentioned officials are not employed. In any event, were there a saving in expense, the public could not expect to receive any benefit from it in a reduction of price.

But the question of economy in the present is a small matter compared to the general effect upon employees and the buying public that will surely make itself felt in higher prices, a lower scale of wages, and a lessened degree of independence enjoyed by their employees, if departmental stores should gain a greater share of the public confidence than they now enjoy.

The purpose of a retail shop, as of all traders, being to get gain; what, we might ask, is the price they now pay for labor? It is not the price that they must pay? What, again, is the price they now get for their wares? Is it not the highest obtainable? This being so, the tendency to increase the size of the departmental store, and thus close other shops, is to lessen competition and so make it possible for them to get an enhanced price for their wares. The same is true in reverse order of employers and employed. The fewer shops requiring help, the greater the power of the big shops to grind down, dominate and fine the poor unfortunates who have nowhere else to go and no choice but to take

whatever the employing agent chooses to name as the weekly wage.

#### TEN CENTS WORTH FOR ONLY TWENTY CENTS.

That is what it is coming to in Toronto and elsewhere if the Departmental Store is to be continued. In almost every outlying quarter of Toronto shops have ceased to keep many small wares because of the rush of bargain hunters to the big shops to get their things on "bargain day." The time is coming when your neighbor will not get trade enough to keep an open door : then the trifle that should cost ten cents bought near by will cost the same or more plus two car fares and a loss of one or two hours' time.

#### BUYS MEN LIKE CATTLE.

The tendency to concentration brings other and serious evils. The Departmental Store, with a large bank account and a correspondingly small conscience, will stop at nothing to accomplish its purpose, and will always be found ready to lend a hand to support any other monopoly in which there is a community of interest. In the near past we have seen a Departmental Store defy the Municipal authorities in the matter of assessment again and again. The power of these corporations is such that public officials can be found standing idle while the task of fighting for the communal interest is left to private individuals. In view of these facts, facts of common knowledge, are we not justified in assuming that, for monetary considerations, the departmental store can secure special application and interpretation of Municipal laws and customs ?

Among the tendencies to check the power of the departmental store one would like to see the Factory Act or Acts made applicable to the big shops in relation to ventilation and light. By what right should a departmental store be allowed to burrow into the earth and make shop room, where boys and girls spend what should be their brightest and best years in other than ordinary daylight the year through? Why should the sales room have a less proportion of window to floor space than the school room? It only requires sufficient agitation to secure the necessary legislation to have the

By an act passed at the 1900-1901 Session of the Ontario Legislature, a Bureau of Labor has been established for the purpose of collecting, assorting and publishing information relating to Employment, Wages, Hours of Labor throughout the Province, Co-operation, Strikes, or other labor difficulties: Trades Unions, Labor Organizations, the relations between Labor and Capital and other subjects of interest to workingmen, together with such information relating to the commercial, industrial and sanitary conditions of wage workers, and the permanent prosperity of the industries of the Province, as the Bureau may be able to gather.

For which purpose the co-operation of the Labor Organizations and others interested in the general prosperity of the Province is invited.
