Evening at 7--Illumination of the grounds and buildings. Judging of the Shropshire, Southdown, Dorset Horn and Merino Sheep. Competitions in Rigger-making, exhibition and high-jumping contests by the champion class

of Hunters. All machinery, implements and processes of manufacture in full operation. All the buildings and grounds open from 8 a.m. till 10 p.m.

Great show during the afternoon on the track and on the immense platform in front of the Grand Stand. Americans' Day—Specially dedicated to our friends from the United States, with appropriate special features. To this day, in 1898, was given the honor of beating all previous records, during the past twenty years, the attendance of visitors on Americans' Day last year being over 100,000.

All the departments will be open and every part of this great Exhibition will be at its best. The cattle will be paraded in the cattle rings, and all the horses will be paraded on the track in front of the Grand Stand from 1.30 to 2.30 p.m., followed by the great entertainment of Specialty Artists, Running Horse Races, the Breeders' Stake, one-and-a-quarter miles; an open Handicap Race in three-quarter mile heats, Musical Ride and Military Display by the Royal Canadian Dragoons, Exhibition Drill by the Streator (Illinois) Zouaves, great Hippodrome Races, Balloon Ascensions, wonderful Specialty Performances from 2 till 5, and all other prominent features as on previous days, "the Pleasance," the

Evening—Illumination of grounds, and all buildings open till 10 p.m. All the special features and entertainments complete in front of the grand stand, as on previous evenings. The Exhibition Music Hall, "Plaisance," Band Concerts, etc.

Saturday, September 9th

Exhibitors' Day Only—The public not admitted. The Exhibition will be considered officially closed at 7 a.m., after which exhibitors may remove their exhibits. The Treasurer will be ready to pay prizes at 9 a.m., and all who can make it convenient to do so are requested to call for their awards before leaving the grounds.

N.B.—Many other special features will be added to the above programme between the time of its issue and the opening of the Exhibition.
