The Easter Day Communicants this year were 210 at the early Service, an increase of 30 as compared with Easter, 1903; and 118 at the mid-day Service, exactly the same number as in 1903. The offertory at the mid-day Service was \$182.53, just three cents more than last year. The total offertories for the day (not including the children's boxes) amounted to \$251.17, which is a little disappointing as a response to a circular issued to the congregation asking for \$400.

"Out of sight, out of mind," may be frequently true, but that is not always so was made agreeably apparent to us by finding in the Easter offertory a gift from our good friend, Miss McClure, sent from Riverside, California, "to the Cathedral of Toronto." She has also sent a donation to the funds of the W.A.

The want of a second large chalice has been much felt. This deficiency has been made good by the gift from Mr. David Orr of a chalice of shape and size to match the large one hitherto in use, and decorated in a similar style, with engraved ornamentation and with four shields in enamel. These display the armorials of the Diocese, the Bishop, and Canon Macnab, and the St. Alban's Cross. Around the foot is an inscription recording the gift.

Change of voice has caused a falling off in the number of boys in the choir, and we are likely to lose some others besides those who have already dropped out. Therefore Mr. Kemp will be glad to have some new boys, especially young ones.

The Rev. A. U. DePencier has accepted the appointment of Rector of Brandon, Manitoba, and has already left for that place. Mrs. DePencier and the children have gone for a visit to England.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CHOIR GUILD
1903.

On September 29th, at a meeting of the Choir Guild, it was decided to hold all meetings of the Guild on a different day from the W.A. meetings. Judging from the amount of work accomplished this was a very wise move.

Fourteen Cassocks have been made and are now in use. Three more men's cassocks have been ordered from England and paid for and are now on their way out and expected to arrive very shortly.

Three surplices have been made and are also in use, while six more are being made and will be ready for Easter. Besides this the Choir Rooms have been attended to; a cupboard mended and a new rod put up to hang a curtain on to protect the cassocks and surplices when not in use.

We have to thank Mr. Kemp and the members of the Choir for the capital concert they gave us at which we netted, after all expenses, the nice sum of \$42.35. We have also to thank a member of the Guild for the very serviceable give of a new curtain for the boys' room. Our thanks are due also to two other members of the Guild for two looking glasses for the choir rooms. All the members of the Guild have worked faithfully and well, meeting every week when necessary and lately every month.

WOMAN'S AUXILIARY REPORT,

1903

Last year at this time we were all feeling very depressed on account of the serious illness of our Diocesan President, Mrs. Williamson, whom shortly afterwards God saw fit to remove from her busy and useful life and call to rest. A newspaper paragraph appeared a little while ago that seems appropriate; it was, "God never removes a worker without seeing a way clear for the work to be carried on"; and I am sure that the truth of this statement has been made plain to us who have watched Miss Tilley striving faithfully to fill her place and carry out Mrs. Williamson's last message—"Be Brave." Apart from this great loss, I think we in St. Alban's can congratulate ourselves on a very prosperous year. We regret very much the loss of several hard-working members through their removal from town, but we are glad and thankful to welcome some new members who bid fair to be *active* members in more than name. At present we have 46 on the roll, 7 less than last year, the loss occasioned almost altogether by people leaving town.

Financially we are more than holding our own. We have not only paid all our old pledges, amounting to \$16 a year, but have taken up a new pledge of \$2 a year besides a donation of \$10 a year to the Cathedral. Our pledges altogether amounting to \$28 a year.

Twenty-seven meetings have been held, with an average attendance of 14. Fourteen out of 32 is not what it ought to be. It is to be hoped the members will make an effort to be more regular next year. In September the Choir Guild thought they could do better work if they were an organization by themselves, so decided to separate from the W.A., thus relieving the members of the work of attending to the cassocks and surplices. Four bales have been sent off this year, two in May and two in December, all being sent to Rev. W. G. White, of Lesser Slave Lake, Athabasca. Besides these a Christmas parcel was sent to Rev. Canon Harding of Apsley.

I cannot close my report without recommending to the members the example of one of our Branch, who not only came to the meetings when she could, but in her spare moments made articles for the bales, and at Christmas time when the bale was being packed, surprised us by sending quite a large bundle of beautiful things. Several of our Honorary Members also have helped considerably by doing work at home.

The receipts for the year ending at Easter, 1904, were \$46.72; Expenditure, \$33.50; leaving balance on hand, \$13.22. A bale was sent in May, 1903 to the Gordon Schools at Qu'Appelle, valued at \$32.99; and at Christmas a bale to Ironmount Mission, Ontario, valued at \$13.52.

P. M. C.

The Secretary Treasurer of the P.M.C. received most encouraging reports from the Collectors at the Quarterly Meeting held on March 8th.

It is gratifying to note that of the returns made by the City Churches at the Monthly Board Meeting of the W.A., St. Alban's Cathedral came second on the list, the Treasurer reporting, \$38.80 as the amount received for February. Collections for March, \$13.65.

The amount of collections for the year ending Easter, 1904, was \$99.10.

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The *New Era* prints a list of contributions from 255 Sunday School Auxiliaries to the Missionary Society of the Church of England in Canada, in which S. Alban's, Toronto, takes the fifth place with \$46.25. The four larger are Lunenburg, Nova Scotia, \$106.60; St. Paul's, Halifax, \$62; All Saints', Hamilton, \$54.50; Holy Trinity, Toronto, \$53.30. The two next on the list after S. Alban's are Grace Church, Brantford, \$43.81; and St. Paul's, Brockville, \$41. The list, however, does not include many of the large churches; Quebec Cathedral, Montreal Cathedral, St. George's, Montreal, and St. James', Toronto, do not appear in it (no doubt they make their gifts in some other way); nevertheless, there are many larger churches than S. Alban's, so that our position on the list is a creditable one. We hope the Sunday School will make an effort to maintain it. The children's Lenten Boxes for this year, brought in on Easter Sunday, produced over \$70.

Among the Easter gifts to the Cathedral must be mentioned a joint donation from Mrs. Victor Hughes, of England, and her sister, Mrs. Macnab, of a handsome red silk Burse, Chalice Veil of the same material, and Stole. The embroidery on all is of heavy gold work, similar to the beautiful Sanctus on the Altar, which is so much admired. The Stole is further enriched with

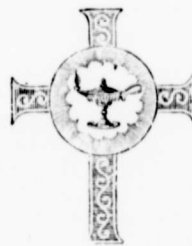
clusters of rare Neapolitan coral with pearl and coral pendants. The work was executed in England, and donated by Mrs. Victor Hughes, who is widely known in Oxford for her interest in Church work. The Jewels are the gift of Mrs. Macnab.

The three Illustrated Lectures given in the Crypt of the Cathedral during the Lenten season were very successful in every way.

On March 3rd, Mr. Ben Oriel's "Evening in Palestine" was well patronized, notwithstanding the very inclement weather, and proved a most interesting entertainment.

On March 17th Mr. Stanger gave an admirable lecture on "Ancient and Modern Temples of Italy." The subject was illustrated by a large number of lantern views many of them from original photographs taken by the lecturer. The proceeds of these lectures enabled the Altar Guild to make much needed improvements in the fitting up of the Chapel in the School House.

On Maunday Thursday the Rev. Canon Dixon gave a number of Bible readings on the "Passion of our Lord," and illustrated his subject with nearly one hundred lantern views, which were greatly appreciated, the proceeds were for Diocesan Missions.
