OTTAWA, Nov. 22.—The third session of the tenth parliament of Canada was formally opened this afternoon by Earl Grey. At three o'clock a salute was fired from Nepean Point, announcing the arrival of the governor general on Parliament Hill, accompanied by a Dragon escort.

SPEECH FROM THE THRONE. Hon. Gentlemen of the Senate and of the House of Commons: In opening the third session of the tenth parliament of Canada I avail myself of the opportunity to offer you my congratulations on the unparalleled prosperity prevailing in all parts of the Dominion.

Walsh Victorious in St. Anne's Division With Majority of 205, While Martin Won Out in St. Marys by About 200.

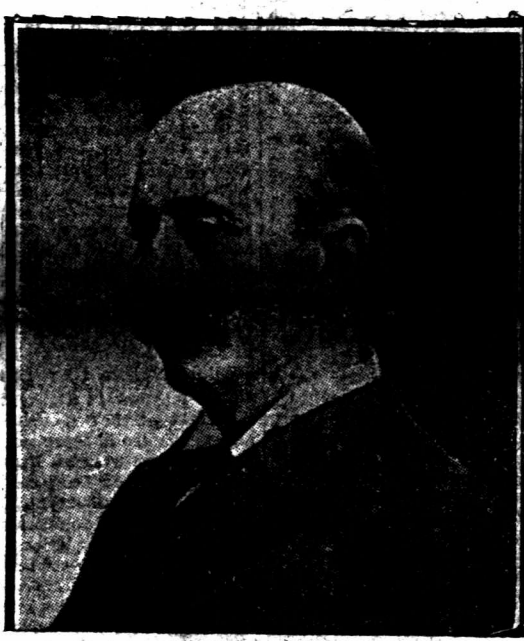

CHATHAM, Nov. 17.—The cases of Scott Act violation occurring in Newcastle have now been coming before the local magistrate for the past two weeks, and so far about ten convictions have been made, the dealers fined being T. J. Durick, James Foley, H. H. Pallen, M. Kane and Wilbur McLean. The fines in each case were \$50.

REV. ALGERON S. CRAPSEY HAS BEEN CONDEMNED TO SUSPENSION FROM THE CHURCH

BUFALO, Nov. 19.—Rev. Algeron S. Crapsey, D. D., of St. Andrew's Episcopal church, Rochester, is condemned to suspension from the church as a result of the decision of the Protestant Episcopal Court of Review, just made public here. The court of review sustains the decision of the lower court, and the decision of the lower court was that Dr. Crapsey should be suspended for alleged heretical teachings. The announcement of the decision was made as follows:

"The Court of Review has affirmed unanimously the decision of the lower court in the case of Rev. Algeron S. Crapsey, D. D." ROCHESTER, N. Y., Nov. 19.—The decision of the Court of Review in the Crapsey case covers 24 closely typewritten pages, of which the following is a summary: First—The ecclesiastical court of the Diocese of Western New York had jurisdiction to try the accused for offenses charged in the presentment.

Second—The trial court was legally authorized in conformity with the canon and ordinances of the Diocese of Western New York. Third—The finding of the court is that the accused in making statements charged and admitted to have been made by him, violated and broke certain declarations made by him at the time of his ordination, involved the finding of what was the doctrine of the church on the subjects to which the declarations related.

HARRIMAN AND ROOT IN DEBATE On the Subject of Government Regulation of Railroads. Rook Thinks the Companies Themselves Are the Ones to Regulate Traffic if They Would Only Do It.

THAW DOES NOT CARE TO TALK

His Trial for Murder will Probably Begin Dec. 3

Report that Three Alienists After Examination of Prisoner Pronounced Him Insane is Not Denied

NEW YORK, Nov. 19.—District Attorney Jerome today served notice upon counsel for Harry K. Thaw that the prosecutor would appear in court tomorrow and ask for a special jury before the murder of Stanford White. A panel of 150 names will be requested. Mr. Jerome adds that the case is one that requires attention and dispatch. Thaw is charged with murder in the first degree.

Following the visit of counsel to the Tombs, it was reported that they told Thaw to pay no attention to the state of the law, but to concentrate on the defense regarding the alienists, as it was without foundation. Tonight, however, A. R. Peabody, also of Thaw's counsel, declared emphatically that the published denial, as the attorney for the defense had decided to do no further talking for publication. When a note was sent to Thaw inquiring whether he had anything to say regarding the matter, he replied: "Nothing whatever." See Mr. Hastings.

THE SOUTHERN STORMS WERE QUITE SERIOUS And Late Reports Show That Conditions Are Becoming Worse—Damage is \$300,000.

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Nov. 20.—As more detailed reports are received from those portions of Alabama, north and central Mississippi and west Tennessee swept by wind and rain storm for 48 hours, the situation increases in seriousness. Following the wind storm of Saturday night rain has fallen almost continuously throughout this territory and practically the entire district is under water to a depth of several feet. Creeks on small streams are leaving their banks and many persons have been forced from their homes. From Winona, Mabon and Mathison, Miss., more complete reports were received today. The total damage to these towns is estimated at \$300,000. Miles of railway trackage and bridges have been washed away, telephone and telegraphic communication demoralized, and street car traffic blocked to such an extent that on several lines operations have been temporarily suspended.

HEARST SPENT OVER \$250,000 IN RECENT ELECTION FIGHT.

Official Statement Filed by the Candidate Creates a Sensation in New York Political Circles.

NEW YORK, Nov. 19.—Somewhat of a sensation was caused in political circles here today when William R. Hearst, who was candidate for Governor of the Independence League, and Democratic tickets, filed with the secretary of state at Albany a statement showing that he had spent the sum of \$250,702 in his efforts to win the election. Not since the law requiring candidates for public office to file a list of their expenses went into effect a number of years ago has anyone seeking the favor of the voters admitted expending of one-tenth of that sum for the purpose of winning the state.

Of the amount expended, Mr. Hearst reported to the secretary of state that he had given to John G. Follenbee, the treasurer of the Independence League, \$198,872, and to William J. Connors, chairman of the Democratic State Committee, \$51,900. The balance of \$500 spent in travelling expenses, as largely as this sum appears to be for one man to spend on an attempt to gain an office which pays a salary of \$10,000 a year for two years, the total cost would compare with the actual amount that Mr. Hearst spent in his fight to be governor of New York. In the first place, the total does not in any way include the preliminary fight he made to get the nomination, and the law does not require that such expenditures should be included.

TWO WERE KILLED IN AUTOMOBILE SMASH A Third Member of the Party Will Likely Die.

NEW YORK, Nov. 19.—Tom Cooper, of Detroit, well known as a bicyclist and automobilist, was instantly killed in an automobile accident in Central Park late tonight. Three companions were seriously injured, and one of them, it is believed, will die. The four were riding in Cooper's automobile when the machine collided with another automobile on the drive. Cooper was hurled twenty feet and struck upon his feet. He was lifeless when picked up. A man named Barlow, said to be a Wall Street broker, with a home at Paterson, N. J., was also thrown from the machine and sustained a fatal skull fracture. At the hospital tonight it was said he would probably die.

NEW YORK, Nov. 20.—Dennis Barkalow, a Paterson, N. J., cotton broker, who was one of the party of four in the automobile in which Tom Cooper, bicyclist and automobilist, was killed in Central Park last night, died today. Miss Helen Lambert, another member of the party, is in a critical condition and is not expected to live through the day. The fourth member of the party, a young woman who gave her name as Virginia Vernon and said her home is in Jersey City, has a broken leg and is suffering from shock. It is believed she will recover.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19.—Acting under orders of Secretary Taft, Major General Ainsworth, the military secretary, has directed that further charges of the men of the 25th Infantry of the shooting at Brownsville, Texas, be suspended pending further orders. The action, it is stated tonight, is to await the return of Secretary of War Woodburn to Washington tomorrow and to await further advice from President Roosevelt, who has been communicating with the subject.

These soldiers took up a town. All of them refuse to tell anything about the disgraceful affair at Brownsville which resulted in murder. The companies are shielding murderers. The Government has no means of punishing the crime committed except by discharging all the men.

CARELESS REMARK CAUSED RUN ON BANK

CHILLICOTHE, Ohio, Nov. 19.—A careless remark made by some citizen unknown to the police started a run on the Savings Bank here today. It began at noon and continued until late this evening. Women, children and men quit their employment and ran to the bank. One depositor said he saw a statement that the bank had closed in an evening paper. It was discovered, however, that the bank was not closed. The bank's semi-annual statement, which read:

Balance on hand at close of business Nov. 10. The officers of the bank say that they have not estimated the amount of the run, but it is reported that these will reach from \$10,000 to \$15,000. PORTION OF WEAKENED DOCK SLIPS INTO RIVER

PORT WILLIAM, Nov. 20.—For some time the new Grand Trunk Pacific dock at West Fort has shown signs of settling, but nothing serious was reported. Saturday, however, a portion slipped into the water, and today nearly fifty feet totally disappeared into the river along with eight hundred tons of rails which were piled on the dock.

SENSATION IN FRENCH SENATE

Visious Attack on Foreign Policy of Government Senator Gaudine de Villaine Charges Government with Playing Into the Hands of Great Britain

PARIS, Nov. 20.—Senator Gaudine de Villaine created a sensation in the senate today by making a vicious attack on the foreign and interior policy of the government. After expressing regret at the fact that the Catholics had not had the courage to reply to their persecutors, as the Terrorists did in Russia, M. De Villaine charged the government with playing into the hands of Great Britain and demanded to know whether the report that a military convention had been signed between Great Britain and France as a prelude to the great adventure Minister Pichon and War Minister Clemenceau was true.

CHARGE AGAINST CHARLES MCGILL

Frank Pope, Clerk in Head Office, on the Stand Magistrate Anxious to Secure Evidence of New York Broker in Regard to Loans There

TORONTO, Nov. 20.—Evidence of a fraud in the investigation of the charge against Charles McGill in the police court today opened up new grounds. Frank Pope, a bank clerk in the head office, who first made the misappropriation of the bank funds, was cross-examined by R. E. McKay. Pope swore to hearing discussions between the general manager of the bank and some directors upon the subject of certain stocks.

SIR WILFRID LAURIER 65 YEARS OLD YESTERDAY

OTTAWA, Nov. 20.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier, premier of the Dominion, received congratulations today on the occasion of his sixty-fifth birthday. Sir Wilfrid was born at St. John, Quebec, Nov. 20, 1841, and has been active in public life since 1871, when he was returned to the Quebec legislative assembly.

SIX IMMIGRATION AGENTS SUSPENDED

OTTAWA, Nov. 20.—Six immigration agents have been suspended by the Minister of the Interior and are being investigated. It is understood that they have been making false returns of expenses in travelling from Quebec to Winnipeg with immigrant trains.

JURY SHIRKED FROM ANNOUNCING VERDICT

OTTAWA, Nov. 20.—Laderoute, the French-Canadian, charged with the killing of Charles, a Syrian pedlar, near Bryson, Quebec, was tonight found guilty of manslaughter with a recommendation for clemency. The jury apparently shirked pronouncing a verdict which would send a man to the gallows for every man in the evening.

ISLAND MEN LOST IN SEATTLE DISASTER

CHARLOTTETOWN, P. E. I., Nov. 21.—Albert MacDonald and Frank McQuarrie, each aged 25, natives of Charlottetown, P. E. I., were drowned in the collision of the steamers Dix and Jeannette on the Pacific coast on Sunday last.
