ASSOCIATED BOARDS OF TRADE

The second annual convention of the Associated Boards of Trade of Eastern British Columbia is now in session at Nelson and doubtless much good will result from the consideration by the association of the many questions before it.

It was unfortunate that at this time last year, when the association was organized, and the first convention held, the politics of the province were in such a chaotic state.

Among these questions are many matters about which there can be no controversy. The name "Boundary District" which has become a household word in mining circles, should be found on all maps of the province.

HER FUTURE IS THE BRIGHTEST. The announcement of the purchase by the Grand Forks Townsite company of the land of the Columbia Townsite will be learned with satisfaction by all who are desirous of the rapid development of the Boundary district.

FOREST FIRES. With the increase in population there are more forest fires. The province has been dowered with an enormous wealth of timber, which should not be allowed to simply furnish food for flames if there is any possible way to stop it.

A GOOD RESOLUTION. Among the resolutions adopted by the Associated Boards of Trade is one which says that in the opinion of that body a department of the public service should be formed to which the duty of the preservation of the forests of the province should be delegated.

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MONTANA POLITICS

Attempt by the Standard Oil Trust to Dominate the State.

SOME OF ITS HIRELING GANG

The Fight not Between Republicans and Democrats but One of the People Against Monopoly—The Standard Oil Trust is After Plunder.

Butte, Montana, August 6, 1900. To me Montana politics are the funniest I have ever known. The comical side seems ever uppermost. There is occasionally a touch of pathos, if not tragedy, but the comedy touches are legion, while the pathetic are few and far between.

Saturday John R. Toole grouped around him his political friends. He had a very important message to convey. In fact he brought them there to tell them that it was idle to try and form a Standard Oil Democratic Hump; that the best thing that they could do was to align themselves with the regular Democracy. In fact, a little later, Mr. John R. Toole confessed that he had seriously considered going over to the Republican party, but that he was going to stay by principle and Democracy. In a confiding manner he told a Miner reporter that he was against the company store that he had denounced that system to Mr. Daly and Mr. Burrage and Mr. Hennessy. And because he denounced the trust store, therefore he wants the Democracy of Deer Lodge to send him to the next legislature. The gall and the humor of confiding John R. Toole! Toole's pre-eminence is cunning. There never was a pet fox that could outfox him. And his bid for the nomination to the legislature from the Democracy of Deer Lodge is a superb piece of cunning.

C. D. Nolan is no man's fool, nor woman's either, and yet John R. Toole can bamboozle and wheedle and fool Nolan from dawn till dark. There is a certain amount of rugged honesty about Nolan that nobody can fail to like, and yet he will accept a gold brick from John R. Toole as eagerly as a Louisiana coon accepts a ripe and juicy watermelon. Nolan is a diamond in the rough. He needs hammering and polishing, and needs them badly, but a day will come when C. D. Nolan will play a big part in Montana politics. But John R. Toole was never meant to play a great or important part. He has been an echo all his life and will be a thing of the past. There will be no eight-hour day. He knows that their triumph means the reduction of the wages of labor, the sending of the farmers with heavier taxes that the railroad and copper kings might be relieved, and he knows too that those Standard Oil people will ruin every rival in trade, in business or in mining. And yet with this knowledge in view Senator Carter is found in daily consultation with the agents and tools of the Standard Oil people. He is allowing them to swamp the Republican party, and in doing so he is digging his own political grave so deep that he will never be heard of again until the judgment day. This is not a battle of Democrats and Republicans. It is a fight of the people against monopoly. W. A. Clark is fighting with the people, and if the people are victorious, and give the people are right. This time Carter and Maginniss are wrong. They are dead wrong if they do not come out and save the state from the pirate kings of the Standard Oil Trust. I am not at all sure it can be saved, but in any case a day will come when all the ailers and abettors of the Standard Oil in this fight will stand out as the foremost knaves and traitors that ever cursed Montana.

ASSOCIATED BOARDS OF TRADE

A LARGE NUMBER OF SUBJECTS WERE DEALT WITH.

A Great Many Matters of Importance Suggested for the Legislators to Act Upon.

Showing the wide scope of the action taken by the Associated Boards of Trade the following brief summary of the subjects dealt with and the recommendations made in connection therewith should prove interesting:

Resolution urging on the government the necessity of issuing quarterly bulletins giving general information about the mines of the province and more particularly exact data regarding their output and dividends.

The necessity of putting the office of agent-general in London on a more satisfactory basis, by appointing at least \$25,000 a year for its maintenance and by appointing either an agent-general or as a member of his staff some one thoroughly competent to give information regarding the mines and mineral resources of the province.

Another resolution urged upon the provincial government the necessity of an adequate presentation of the resources of the province at the Glasgow exhibition next year.

A resolution protesting against permitting the registration of places of additions to incorporated cities by the department of land and works without such plans having first been approved by the local municipal authorities.

Asking the government to establish a school of mines at some central point in the interior.

Drawing attention to the injustice done incorporated cities with regard to mining royalties within city limits, and asking that 25 per cent of the royalty paid by mines within the limits of any municipality should be turned over to said municipality to aid in the construction and maintenance of such roads.

Approving of the appointment of the mining commission and urging that its scope be extended so as to cover the question of how best to raise and expend funds for the construction and maintenance of wagon roads and trails throughout the mining district.

Protesting against the collection of timber dues from mine owners and owners of mineral claims on timber cut by their own claims and used for mining purposes.

Pointing out the inadequate representation of the interior in the provincial legislature and demanding at least one member for the Boundary at once.

The following resolutions are not of such general local interest in Rossland. Asking that the Boundary district be defined as the Kettle River basin, and that it should be so shown on all the maps of the province.

Urging the immediate opening of the Nelson land registry office. Asking that maps showing occupied lands, corrected up to date, be on exhibition at all local government offices.

For the protection and encouragement of inland fisheries. Urging the creation of a department with special charge of the woods and forests of the province with a view to their preservation from destruction by fire. It provides for timber rangers and other protection.

To provide for advertising out defaulting co-owner in mining claims. In relation to the surface rights of mineral claim holders be allowed to purchase the surface at the same rates as any other purchasers of crown lands under the land act.

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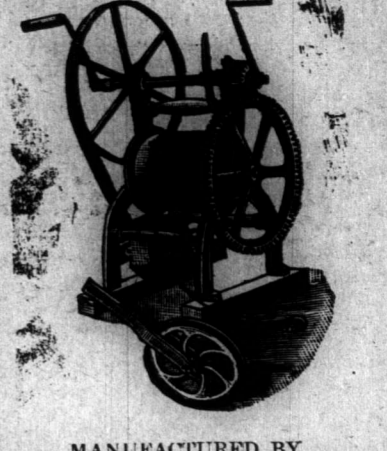

Sales for the Week Aggregate 87,000 Shares.

GIANT WAS THE CHIEF SELLER

Evening Star Came Next Numerically as it Sold to the Extent of 19,000 Shares—There Were 15,000 Tamarac Disposed of for the Week Just Ended.

The stock market continues full of promise, brokers say, but the realization, in the way of sales, is not nearly as large as it should be under the generally favorable condition of mining affairs.

War Eagle and Centre Star should be ready to ship early in October. This would indicate, if the prognostications of the brokers are correct, that there will be a betterment of the market at about that time.

The shipments for the week ending yesterday by days, were as follows: Thursday, 35,000; Friday, 9,300; Saturday, 12,000; Monday, 8,000; Tuesday, 11,000; Wednesday, 12,500.

THE WAGON ROAD TO SUMMIT CAMP TO BE BUILT.

Rich Claims Being Opened Up Close to the Nickel Plate—Great Field for Mining Investors.

Mr. T. G. Blackstock Talks About Mining Affairs.

WAR EAGLE AND CENTRE STAR

There is no Deal on for their Acquisition by the B. A. C.—No Amalgamation Contemplated by the two Companies—Work on the Crown Point.

The following interview with Mr. T. G. Blackstock is taken from the Toronto World of August 9th: Mr. T. G. Blackstock, vice-president of the War Eagle and Centre Star Gold Mining companies, will, in a few days, leave the city for Rossland, to look after the interests of the two corporations, in company with President George Gooderham.

There are four ledges on the property. The one recently discovered was uncovered 400 feet from the east boundary of the Christina. It runs north and south, the ledge being nearly 15 feet in width.

There has been for some time in circulation a persistent story that the Gooderham-Blackstock interests would buy out the Canadian Pacific railway's smelter at Trail or establish one of their own.

When asked concerning this, Mr. Blackstock replied that if the C. P. R. will not sell its smelter, the Gooderham-Blackstock people would not build a competing plant—at least they would not at the present time.

Mr. Blackstock was at the same time emphatic in declaring that the C. P. R. is mistaken in its policy of maintaining its own smelter. He thought the War Eagle and Centre Star should have a reduction plant of their own, but he believed no move would be made in that direction while the C. P. R. remained in the smelting business.
