York, Nov. 15 .- (Special.)-Hon. for the Province of Ontario, who is on visit to the United States in search of light upon educational methods, visited the Workingmen's School of the Society for Ethical Culture Thursday, and inspected the system of manual training pursued there. Decimal System of Time.

The decimal fanatics, says the London Chronicle, have broken out in a new place. As soon as the French Chamber gets to work again, M. Ettenne, the Depüty for Oran, will introduce a bill to establish the decimal hourthat is, an hour divided into 100 minutes, each minute consisting of 100 seconds. M. Ettenne and his supporters contend that many laborious calculations would be avoided by this innovation. The reform, however, must of necessity entail a rearrangement of the circle, and a consequent modification of the received methods of angular measurement. Moreover, there can be little doubt that the most thorough-going advocates of the change aim at the ultimate institution of 24 hours—an idea adopted for a brief period by the convention, and Decimal System of Time.



SILENT "THE SINGER OF AN EMPTY DAY.

The Famous English Poet a Man Whose Heart Went Out in Fellowship For the Poor and the Distressed—He Strove to Make Life Brighter.

William Morris, one of the most famous poets of his time, was born in 1834 at Walthamstow, near London. His father, an English merchant, acquired a large fortune, which passed to his widow and children at his death, in 1844. William graduated at Exeter College, Oxford, and soon thereafter began the study of painting. In that field, however, he did not succeed, nor in architecture, to which he next turned his attention.

His first important literary work appeared in 1858. It was a small volume of poems, bearing as its title "The Defense of Guenevere," the title of the principal poem of the collection.

In 1883, with several partners, amongst whom were D. G. Rossetti, Ford Madox Brown and E. Burne Jones, he started in London an establishment for the artistic designing and manufacture of various articles, especially wall paper, stained glass, woven goods and household decorations. The

field, however, he did not succeed, nor in architecture, to which he next turned his attention.

His first important literary work appeared in 1858. It was a small volume of poems, bearing as its title "The Defense of Guenevere," the title of the principal poem of the collection.

In 1863, with several partners, amongst whom were D. G. Rossetti, Ford Madox Brown and E. Burne Jones, he started in London an establishment for the artistic designing and manufacture of various articles, especially wall paper, stained glass, woven goods and household decorations. The manufacturing part of the business has since been moved to Merton Abbey, Surrey, where much success has been achieved. At this business the poet wrought as a designer down to the close of his life, devoting only his leisure to the composition of the poetry that won him wide celebrity.

A lady who visited the quaint old place wherein Morris tolled and sang, thus wrote of her observations there:

In 1867 Mr. Morris published "The Life and Death of Jason," a narrative poem, and in 1868-70 appeared in three volumes his now famous work, "The Earthly Paradise," a number of legendary and romantic tales in verse, recited by a company of travelers who had sailed westward from Norway to find on earth an Eden. The prologue to this poem is one of his happlest efforts and strangely suggestive of his turn of mind. It is as follows:

The first proposition therefore is that there was no motive for the perpetration of a fraud. In all trials involving crime or fraud the absence or presence of motives is an important factor. of motives is an important factor.

There was every apparent motive why Christ should not take the course He did. He assailed the accepted religion, a course fraught with danger of social ostracism, personal violence, judicial and religious persecution. He assailed an institution which the Homans protected. He could not have aspired to wealth. His life proved that. It was not power He sought, for He preached and practised humility, and selected as associates the poor and humble. It was not desire for luxury, for He courted hardship, deprivation and peril. The evidence shows Him an honest believer in the importance, directness and truth of His mission.

Christ's conduct previous to His death Carist's conduct previous to His death is inconsistent with the theory of the fraudulent intention because He openly and repeatedly stated that on the third day He would rise again from the dead.

It is absurd that a man should conceive and carry out a fraud that was to result in his own death. No motive but the one the Christian attributes to Christ is consistent with such a purpose. The man intending to commit a crime, alms at concealment, otherwise his purpose would be frustrated. Christ made no secret of the intended resurrection. He preached about it openly. His teaching reached the ears of all classes, and were held of enough importance to demand that efforts be made for their suppression.

When arrested, accused, tried and executed, Christ's demeanor was not that of a guilty man, but was that of a person wrongfully accused, but whoknew that He must be condemned in carrying out His mission.

Pilate, it was plain, was opposed to His condemnation, but Christ neither sought nor encouraged his clemency. During the ordeal of execution He said nothing which showed other than perfect faith in His mission and perfect honesty of perpose. Before His death and during—His torment. He prayed for His persecutors. All these things are inconsistent with fraudulent intent. He had foretold His death and was enduring merely what He had prophesied. His was not the behavior of an imposter.

Mottled Butter.

I have made hutter.

Motifed Butter.

I have made butter for years which has sold at the highest price to private customers, and I have never heard a word about its being mottled or streaked. My manner of operating is as follows: While the granules are the size of shot, they are carefully washed with water cold enough to prevent massing. Then after it is drained the salt is added while the butter is in the churn, turning the churn from side to side so as to sprinkle it evenly over it. It may be necessary to use a large wooden fork to stir the butter and salt together; but the point is, whatever the means employed, to have as many of these granules as possible come in direct contact with some of the salt. When the salt has all been added, replace the cover of the churn and revolve slowly (if a barrel churn), so that the salt may become thoroughly incorporated with the butter.

Then drain the butter in the churn af few minutes, take out upon the worker and press out the brine sufficiently, leaving the butter in a firm.
